1. (MC) Breakthroughs made with it include the confirmation of dark matter and support for the accelerating universe theory. Among its components have been the Wide Field and Planetary Camera and the Faint Object Spectrograph, and it also caught dramatic photos of the comet Shoemaker-Levy 9 colliding with Jupiter, but while it scheduled to be replaced its ability to pick up faint objects and scan ranges from near infrared to near ultraviolet cannot be matched by that replacement. Known for its initial problem with a faulty mirror, FTP name this device to be supplanted by the James Webb Space Telescope and named for the astronomer who posited that the universe is expanding.

3. (OK) For much of his life he was a hostage in Thebes, where he was educated by the generals Epaminondas, Pammenes, and Pelopidas. He returned to his kingdom after the deaths of his elder brothers, Alexandros II and Perdiccas III, serving as regent for Perdiccas' infant son, Amyntas IV, before seizing the throne. He then embarked on a tremendous campaign of expansion, culminating in de facto rule over all of Greece except for Sparta after the Battle of Chaeronea. FTP, who is this king, who, despite all of this, is better known as the father of Alexander the Great?

Answer: Philip II of Macedon or Philippos II

4. (GR/CS) The third section is titled "The Visit to the Quack Doctor"; the last two are "The Death of the Earl" and "The Suicide of the Countess." A variety of common objects are depicted, such as playing cards, music books, and dogs on chains. Taken collectively, the work gives a moralistic warning predicting miserable tragedy as the result of an ill-considered marriage for money. FTP what is this best example of serially-planned artwork, a six-painting cycle by William Hogarth that does not include any ice cream?

Answer: Marriage-a-la-Mode

5. (BK) He drew heavily on his father's "Seven Point Creed" in his advice book *Pyramid of Success*. One of only two members enshrined in the Basketball Hall of Fame as a player AND a coach, he was a three-time All-American at Purdue. He only went 47-14 as head coach at Indiana State before leaving to lead the UCLA Bruins to 10 National Championships, including 5 in a row. Nicknamed "The Wizard of Westwood," FTP name this legendary coach, namesake of the NCAA's men's basketball Player of the Year award.

6. (GR/CS) Algae possess simpler ones, often with conspicuous starch-accumulating structures called pyrenoids. They are similar to mitochondria, sporting their own DNA, but are found only in plants and protista. They have double-celled composite membranes with an inner membrane space. FTP what organelles catch light energy from the sun to transform it into free energy through the process of photosynthesis?

Answer: chloroplasts

7. He lives atop Mount Kailash and possesses great "reproductive power" in the form of the *lingam*, and he is sometimes known as "Nataraja", or the cosmic dancer. He possesses a third eye when when opened is capable of great destructive power, and while he sometimes embraces his consort in her various forms as Durga and Kali, it is by her manifestation as Parvati that he is the father of both Kartikeya and the elephant-headed god Ganesha. Known for his blue neck and his violent temper, FTP, name this destroyer god of the Hindu pantheon.

8. (IL) A dedicated pacifist, he resigned as Woodrow Wilson's secretary of state in 1915 in a dispute over the handling of the sinking of the *Lusitania*. The founder of a journal called *The Commoner*, he ran for president in four different elections, losing every time. Famous for r asserting that America would not be crucified on a cross of gold, FTP, name this populist Democrat, the loser of the 1896 presidential election.

Answer: William Jennings Bryan

9. (IL) In this novel, the repeated passing of Kemmerich's boots serves to represent the transience of human life. Kindervater and Tjaden are forced to share a bunk by the cruel Himmelstoss, and Joseph Behm's death results in the distrust of Kantorek's rhetoric. Muller and Kat are the practical, resourceful soldiers, while the protagonist serves as the author's mouthpiece for illustrating the horrors of war. FTP name this novel focusing on Paul Baumer's experiences in World War I, written by Erich Maria Remarque.

Answer: All Quiet on the Western Front

10. (GR/CS) This nation also includes the islands Juan de Nova, Europa, the Glorioso Islands, Tromelin, and Bassas da India. The written history of the main island began in the 7th century, when Arabs established trading posts along the northwest coast. In the 18th and early 19th centuries it served as a haven to pirates, including some Americans, who brought Malagasy rice to South Carolina. Known for such exotic flora and fauna as baobabs and lemurs, FTP name this nation with capital at Antananariyo, the world's 4th largest island

Answer: <u>Madagascar</u>

11. (IL) Charles Babbage is sometimes credited with inventing a device which can measure power and this quantity in machines, a device called a dynamometer. Equal to the cross product of the dipole moment and the magnetic field for a current-carrying coil, the net amount of it sums to zero in any kind of statics problem, and it is likewise equal to the time derivative of angular momentum. Arising when forces are applied at a distance from the center of mass and usually defined as the cross product of a force and its lever arm, FTP, name this quantity, the rotational analogue of force.

12. (NR/SK) Critics have attributed certain religious motifs in this series, such as the appearance of Count Iblis and a character's apparent resurrection in the episode "War of the Gods", to the Mormon faith of creator Glen Larson. Its opening narrative speculated that unexplained technological advances of the Egyptians, Toltecs, or Mayans, may have come from space. The series revolves around a "ragtag" fleet being pursued by android spacecraft and defended by snub fighters called Vipers. Now being redone with Edward James Olmos in the role once inhabited by Lorne Greene, FTP name this classic television show featuring the red-hot Jane Seymour, Dirk Benedict, and Richard Hatch as human trying to find earth while pursued by Cylons.

13. (NR/SK) This literary archetype's first appearance came in the Tirso de Molina play *El Burlador de Sevilla*. Jose Zorilla's namesake play gives him the last name Tenorio, as does. Pushkin's poem "The Stone Guest." George Bernard Shaw's *Man and Superman* depicts him in hell. He's also ostensibly the subject of an epic poem by Byron which bears little resemblance to the traditional figure and more resembles, well, Lord Byron. FTP name this Spanish literary figure, a seductive playboy in the vein of Casanova whose name is now synonymous with a lover and sexual adventurer.

As propaganda Minister for Adolf Hitler and the Nazi Party, he was responsible for many atrocities and crimes for which he was never put to trial.
