ANSWER: Parasite (accept Parasitics)

- 5-3. Having no definitive edition, its author faced legal troubles in 1882 on obscenity grounds. He repeatedly changed its contents in its nine plus editions, culminating in 1891 with the so-called death-bed edition. Published anonymously in 1855, its 12 poems are written in long prose, with an "organic" structure. Its poems include 'I Sing the Body Electric' and 'Out of the Cradle Endlessly Rocking'. FTP, what work by Walt Whitman contains the poems 'Oh Captain my Captain' and 'Song of Myself'? ANSWER: Leaves of Grass [my ass]
- 5-4. Her name literally means "she who destroys the light." She was known in some cults as Kore. One day as a little girl, she and the Oceanids were picking flowers on the plain of Enna when she was stolen. Following her imprisonment, Herakles negotiated a truce between the parties feuding over her. Fated to spend six months a year with her mother and six with her husband, FTP, identify this goddess who was kidnapped by Hades. ANSWER: **Persephone** (Accept **Proserpina**)
- 5-5. Many people point to it as the event that ended the Era of Good Feelings. The Republican party split, with Georgian William Crawford coming in third. The South Carolinian contender backed out in the hope of getting the vice presidency, which he did. Meanwhile, following voting in the House of Representatives, the twelfth amendment kicked in and a run-off ensued. The fourth place finisher, forever after known as the Judas of the West, threw his support to the northeasterner, who won the election. This is, FTP, which presidential election, which saw Andrew Jackson lose to John Quincy Adams, in what he labeled as the Corrupt Bargain.

ANSWER: <u>Election of 1824</u> (accept the <u>Corrupt bargain</u> before it is mentioned in question)

5-6. It probably stood on top of a column in Cosimo d'Medici's garden, so that passers by in the city would be able to see it as a celebration of civic pride. An elaborate helmet at the bottom of the statue with visor and wings recalls depictions of Zephyr, an aggressive and destructive force, while the simple wreathed helmet at the top of the statue evokes peace and civility. Thus, the artist presents the victory of peace over destruction as an allegory for God's favor of the Florentines over the Dukes of Milan, who were warring against Florence in the mid 1420s, when the sculpture was created. The first free-standing bronze since antiquity was, FTP, what Donatello sculpture depicting a Biblical victory?

Answer: Donatello's David

5-7. This property describes quantum mechanical interactions at the atomic level which cause unpaired electron spins to line up parallel with each other in a region called the domain. Neither paramagnetism nor diamagnetism, this is FTP, what property, most exaggerated in the element iron.

ANSWER: Ferromagnetism

5-8. His master and employer is a rich, foolish, post World War One bachelor. He uses his near-omniscience to get him out of tricky situations, which are usually unsuitable engagements. As a member of the Junior Ganymede Club, he writes down all of his employer Bertie's wrongdoings. The quintessential gentleman's gentleman, Stephen Fry and Dennis Price have both played him on TV. This is, FTP, what memorable P.G. Wodehouse character, butler to Bertie Wooster, after whom a popular search engine is named?

ANSWER: Reginald Jeeves (accept Reginald as well)

5-9. First postulated in the manuscript Metrica, circa AD 100, this formula can also be used on tetrahedrons as well. Although it's not the law of cosines, you can use that to easily prove this formula true. Generalized by the Hindu mathematician Brahmagupta around 620 AD, the degenerate case does yield the Pythagorean theorem. It states that given a triangle with sides of length A, B, and C, and semiperimeter S equal to A plus B plus C all over two, the area of that triangle equals the square root of S times S minus A times S minus B times S minus C. This is, FTP, what formula named after its Greek discoverer?

ANSWER: Heron's formula (Accept Hero's formula)

5-10. In a simplified version of this dance the gentleman faces and bows to his partner, who curtsies at the same time. The woman places her left hand on her partner's right hand, and he leads with small steps of the right foot, then left, then right again. Both partners point their left toes and tap three times, and repeat this process 3 times. The partners bow or curtsy as before, turn in the opposite direction, and repeat the entire process. steps to this dance. FTP, name this dance that was popular on plantations and in courts, and that takes its name from an Old French word meaning dainty or small.

Answer: minuet

5-11. Born in New York, he served as a Captain in the Army during the Vietnam War, where he was awarded the Bronze Star. He entered politics in 1972 as the finance director for Tom Bradley's mayoral campaign. He then served as the Chief of Staff to Governor Jerry Brown Jr., before being elected state assemblyman, controller, and lieutenant governor. He won his 1998 election by defeating state Attorney General Dan Lungren. FTP, name this former California governor, recalled in 2004.

Answer: Joseph "Gray" Davis

5-12. First Stilson, and then Bonzo Madrid, the titular character has a penchant for accidental murder. Teased for being 'a third,' at the age of six, he is removed from his family for training by the IF. Ultimately, he would lead humanity to victory in the war against the Formics. First appearing as a short story in 'Analog' in 1977, it was turned into a novel in 1985 and won the Hugo award. Boasting 7 sequels and an upcoming movie, this is FTP, what most famous work of Orson Scott Card?

ANSWER: Ender's Game

5-13. Its end freed up funding for Columbus's first voyage. Occurring gradually over 700 years, it started in about 711 AD. Most of the fighting was done by the descendants of the Visigoths and the Romans, who were aided by the French around 1100 AD. It ended on January 2, 1492, with the fall of Grenada. Most of the displaced Muslims fled across the Mediterranean to Tunisia. This is FTP, what action that saw the expulsion of the moors from Spain?

ANSWER: Reconquista

5-14. Ironically, it was blacked out in the home city because of NFL rules at the time, which were changed the following year after congressional pressure. Jack Fleming called it solo because Myron Cope had already left for the postgame interview. To this day, free safety Jack Tatum disputes the call that let the play stand. The score had been 6-0 until a broken play let Kenny "The Snake" Stabler scramble 30 yards for an Oakland touchdown. With 22 seconds left to go, Terry Bradshaw passed to Frenchy Fuqua, who missed the pass. FTP, what is the name given to this play, which saw Franco Harris catch the deflected pass and run it in for a touchdown?

and these surfaces are named after him as a result, as are a mapping theorem and metrics arising from continuously varying positive definite forms. FTP, name this man who devised the most common procedure of defining an integral in calculus, namely by taking the limit of sums of small areas.

Answer: Georg Friedrich Bernhard Riemann
