6-2. If you wanted to get in contact with him, you'd have to go to the corner of Croesus and Mammon streets, or call him at 555-5001. Graduating from Yale in 1914, he later saw action in World War Two, and even foiled an assassination attempt on Hitler. He was defeated in his run for governor by Mary Bailey, after he had trouble eating fish. He credits his longevity to Satan, and it has been confirmed that has every disease known to man. Earlier in his life, he had a beloved Teddy bear named Bobo, which was returned to him many years later. FTP, identify this oldest citizen of Springfield.

6-3. In May, Austin Smith of the University of Edinburgh isolated the gene dubbed Nanog, which appears to control them. James Thompson of the University of Wisconsin has also done work on them. Work on them in mice started more than 20 years ago, and in early 1999, Angelo Vescovi showed that a neural one could produce blood if placed in bone marrow. Their pluripotentiality (plur-i-po-ten-chee-al-ity) has lead many to speculate that they could be used to cure degenerative disorders such as Parkison's and Alzheimer's. The first embryonic ones were isolated in 1998. FTP, these are what type of cell, which can become any cell in the body?

6-4. The child of Gaia and Tartarus, he had six children with Echidna, including Cerberus and the Sphinx. He was so terrifying that when confronted with him, the Olympians changed into animals and fled to Egypt. Using a knife, he cut out all of Zeus' sinews and imprisoned Zeus in his cave. Once restored, Zeus beat him by throwing the island of Sicily on top of him. FTP, identify this mythological creature who is supposedly the fire beneath Mount Aetna.
ANSWER: Typhon
6-5. In defense of women she said, "A Poet's pen all scorn I should thus wrong, For such despite they cast on Female wits: If what I do prove well, it won't advance, They'll say it's stolen, or else it was by chance." Her final work, Here Follows Some Verses upon the Burning of Our House July 10th, 1666, was not published until 1867, long after her death. Her masterpiece was republished in 1678 with many new additional works, including "Before the Birth of One of Her Children" and "A Letter to Her Husband,

Absent upon Public Employment. " FTP, identify this British poetess, whose masterpiece was 1650's The Tenth Muse Lately Sprung Up in America
ANSWER: Anne Bradstreet
6-6. An eight grade dropout, this truck driver was arrested for stealing \$8.00. Convicted later of more serious charges, he had them thrown out on a technicality. Retried later, his girlfriend testified that he had told her of the kidnapping and rape. Killed in a 1976 bar fight, his suspected killer was never prosecuted because he chose not to talk when arrested. FTP, what man lent his name to the advisement of rights which begins "you have the right to remain silent."
ANSWER: Ernesto Miranda
6-7. Leon Brillouin debunked it a 1956 article in Science and Information Theory. He argued that it would require energy to observe the molecules, in the form of photons. As a result, you would be unable to build a perpetual motion machine because it wouldn't be able to separate hot and cold molecules without expending energy. Well known for opening and closing a molecule sized door, FTP, identify this imaginary beast who seems to violate the second law of thermodynamics, first conceived by a Scottish physicist.

## ANSWER: Maxwell's Demon

6-8. The name's the same. The movie by this name was written in 1975 by Donald Wrye and based on the novel. That novel was one of the two that Homer Simpson said he had read after he had a crayon removed from his brain. It is the true story Johnny Gunther's struggle against a malignant brain tumor, which kills him at age 17 . The poem by this name, a sonnet, is written in the second person as a warning to the grim reaper himself. FTP, all of these share a name with what 1610 poem by John Donne?
ANSWER: Death Be Not Proud
6-9. It is named after a tribal chief of the Delaware, who is said to have welcomed William Penn and to have signed the Treaty of Shakamaxon. Although it would survive in one form or another until the 1960's, its downfall started in the 1930's with the election of Fiorello LaGuardia. Ostensibly dedicated to helping the common man, it was synonymous with corruption and scandal. FTP, identify this New York City political machine, which achieved national notoriety during the conflict between Thomas Nast and Boss Tweed.
ANSWER: Tammany Hall
6-10. The author's daughter recently released a book bearing the same name with the words "for our time" appended. Winner of the 1956 Pulitzer prize, today many people argue that it was ghost-written by Jules Davids and Theodore Sorensen, and that accepting the prize was scandalous. It tells the story of eight people and their fight against overwhelming opposition, including John Quincy Adams, Daniel Webster, and Thomas Hart Benson. This is, FTP, what book written by then-senator John Kennedy? ANSWER: Profiles in Courage

6-11. In video gaming, it refers to the distorted picture that results from bad texture generation in a moving environment. Its namesake project at the Allegheny Observatory has published 10 volumes of measurements of this quantity in stars. Measurements of it involve taking photos of stars at different times during the year and the comparing them. FTP, identify this quantity, uses the apparent shift in position of the observed caused by movement of the observer to calculate distance.
ANSWER: Parallax
6-12. William, the petitioner, sought a writ of mandamus seeking to get his commission as a justice of the peace. The chief justice had a conflict of interest, being that he was the one who created the problem in the first place by failing to deliver the commissions on time. The respondent, the secretary of state, had refused to do so on orders from the President, Thomas Jefferson. In the end, the court agreed that with the petitioner, but refused to issue the writ on the grounds that didn't have the power to do so. FTP, name this 1803 Supreme Court case, in which the court asserted the power of Judicial Review. ANSWER: Marbury Vs. Madison

6-13. He reasoned that no theory of reality is possible, because there can be no knowledge of anything beyond that which we experience. Despite this theory of knowledge and its great impact on philosophy, he seems to have considered himself chiefly a moralist. He wrote Three Essays, Moral and Political, Philosophical Essays Concerning Human Understanding, and the essay "On Miracles." FTP, name this Scottish philosopher best known for An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding. ANSWER: David Hume

6-14. Theseus's deals with replacing planks on a ship, while Cantor's is that there is no cardinal larger than every other cardinal. Russell's is that a set that belongs to itself if and only if it does not belong to itself. The one involving Hilbert's hotel has a guest arriving into a full hotel with an infinite number of rooms, and the proprietor moves all of the guests down a room. Zeno's says an arrow flying through the air can never get anywhere. FTP, if you kill your mother before you are born, you might just be stuck in one of these. ANSWER: Paradoxes

6-15. Comprised of three 48 -foot wings, plans for this work of art started in the late 1960s, but it wasn't until 1979 that it premiered at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art. One of the major motifs of the work is imagery based on the butterfly that appears strongly vaginal, similar to one of the subject's depictions of flowers. The wings are arranged in a triangle and are divided into thirteen settings of embroidered fabric runners and china-painted porcelain representing rulers, authors, philosophers, and other historically important women. FTP, name this installation recently acquired by the Brooklyn Museum of Art, a work by Judy Chicago.
ANSWER: The Dinner Party
6-16. It began when James re-introduced the harsh penalties for recusancy. Robert Catesby, Thomas Percy, Thomas Wintour, and John Wright met together to plan it, although it would take almost 2 years to happen. The first step was renting lodgings and
digging. Then, on October $26^{\text {th }} 1605$, Lord Monteagle received a letter, presumably from his cousin Francis Tresham, warning him not to go to Parliament. On the night of November 4th, one of the conspirators was caught in the cellar beneath the Parliament building. FTP, name this 1605 plot which saw Guy Fawkes attempt to blow up parliament.
ANSWER: Gunpowder Plot
6-17. Originally trained as a Buddhist monk, he later studied as a carpenter before joining the anti-French resistance headed by Ho-Chi-Minh, and later his country's communist party. Starting in 1963, he worked to overthrow the government of Norodom Sihanouk and later the military government of Lon Nol. An extreme xenophobe, almost no pictures of him exist, although his party supposedly removed him from leadership in 1985. Dying in 1998, this is, FTP, what former leader of the Khymer Rouge in Cambodia?
ANSWER: Pol Pot
6-18. Charles Dickens complained bitterly about how little respect Americas had for it. Although its original use was as a form of royal censorship in England, in later times it was used to break up the power held by the printing guilds. The recently concluded Eldred v. Ashcroft upheld the most recent extension, now making its duration the life of the author plus 70 years. FTP, name this legal concept which limits who can legally duplicate a work ANSWER: Copyright

6-19. It's not Point Blank, but they're both based on the same novel - 1963's 'The Hunter', written under the pseudonym Richard Stark, actually by Donald Westlake. About Asians, character Val Resnick comments "They don't feel pain the way we do." Director Brian Helgeland elected to change the name of the main character from Parker to Porter. Porter takes on the syndicate in order to get back seventy thousand dollars he thinks they owe him. Violence and hilarity ensue. FTP, name this 1999 revenge-oriented Mel Gibson movie.
ANSWER: Payback
6-20 Originally, each movement was preceded by an Italian sonnet also written by the composer. Composed in 1726 in Venice, it was written by a then-violin teacher. Notable for using instruments to simulate water, wind, snow falling, and even a dog barking, it consists of four concertos. This is, FTP, what work based on a natural phenomenon, composed by Antonio Vivaldi.
ANSWER: The Four Seasons
