8-3 Highly sensitive to wind, many special precautions had to be taken to prevent interference. It allowed for the first calculation of the mass of the solar bodies such as the earth, sun, and moon. In it, two 350-pound spheres are attached to each other via a rod, and the rod is suspended from a wire. Measurements are taken using telescopes. FTP, first conducted by Henry Cavendish in 1798, this is what experiment that first measured the gravitational constant.

8-5. It tells the tale of a scholar leaving Europe for America and moving in with a woman named Charlotte, and eventually marrying her. She eventually finds and reads his diary, runs away in disgust, and is hit by a car. His diary reveals that he married her so he could be close to her daughter, the titular character. First published in 1955 and made into a Stanly Kubrick movie, FTP, identify this Vladimir Nabokov work where Humbert Humbert falls in love with Dolores Haze.

ANSWER: Lolita

8-6. It was first observed by Ngoy Mushola in 1976 after outbreaks in Yambuku and Nzara. Named after the river where it was first recognized, it includes four of the five members of the family Filoviridae. It is also suspected of being related to the fifth

member, the Marburg virus. Richard Preston described the outbreak in the United States in his novel, the Hot Zone. Its strains are named after the places in which they occurred—Ivory Coast, Sudan, Zaire, and Reston, Virginia. FTP, name this virus, a type of hemmoraghic fever, with a fatality rate of over 90% and contagious through the air. ANSWER: **Ebola**

8-7. Surname's the same: Louisa is best known as a sister killed by tetanus bought on by a cab accident; Charles Francis served as minister to England during the 1860's. One of the most notable made his name as a writer of novels such as *Democracy*, *Esther*, and *Mont St. Michel and Chartres* but is most famous for a more autobiographical work. FTP, give the surname of the author of a famous "Education", the direct descendant of both the sixth and second presidents of the USA.

ANSWER: Adams

8-8. Minor works of his include Sleeping Beauty and Dandelion; examples of his trademark form of short fiction include "Up in the Tree", as well as a condensation of his most famous work. One of his most famous works uses the tea ceremony as a central methaphor in imitation of The Tale of Genji, while another tells the story of the middle aged Shimamura and Komako. While he condemned suicide in his Nobel acceptance speech, he killed himself four years later, two years after Mishima. The author of The Sound of the Mountain, FTP, name this author of hundreds of extra-short "palm-of-the-hand" stories, The Thousand Cranes, and the tale of an aging geisha, In The Snow Country.

ANSWER: Kawabata Yasunari

8-9. At the end of it, Surtur, the leader of the fire giants, burns the world. Lif and Lifthrasir survive by hiding, and repopulate the world afterward. Vili, Vidar, and Vali survive, while Tyr and Garm kill each other, as do Heimdall and Loki. Fenrir is killed by Vidar shortly after he devours Odin. Thor kills Jormungand, but dies from poison. FTP, identify this final battle of Norse mythology

ANSWER: Ragnarok

- 8-10. The name's the same. McGeorge was the national security advisor to presidents Kennedy and Johnson, who later went on to become a dean at Harvard. Ethel Griffies played the ornithologist by this name in Hitchcock's 'The Birds'. Christopher Pallies, who was a WWF star of the 1980's uses it as his professional title, preceded by King Kong. Ted was arrested in Florida as serial murderer, and was executed in 1989. FTP, give the common surname, also shared by Al, the perpetually luckless shoe salesman. ANSWER: **Bundy**
- 8-11. The radical exo variety tends to separate management services from protection services. The monolithic variety tends to be larger and implement high level functions, especially security. The micro variety consists of creating a simple virtual machine over the hardware with system calls implementing as few services as possible. The one Linux uses is currently in version 2, and Windows NT's is derived from OS/2. Process

management, RAM allocation, and processor allocation are its most important jobs. This is, FTP, what piece of software, the brain of any operating system?

ANSWER: kernel

- 8-12. For landing their helicopter in the middle and stopping it, Colburn, Andreotta, and Thompson were credited with saving at least 11 peoples' lives, and were awarded medals. A young solider named Tom Glen, wrote a letter accusing the division of covering it up, but that letter was suppressed by Colin Powell. A year later, William Calley was tried for it. He claimed that Ernest Medina, his commander, had ordered him to do it. 347 people were killed in, FTP, what massacre of the Vietnam War? ANSWER: My Lai ("Mee lye") massacre
- 8-13. In book three, we meet Uriel, standing guard. In book five, over dinner, Raphael relates the story of Abdiel's loyalty to God. Book four tells of Eve's first impression of Adam she goes back to staring at her reflection in a pool. Book one opens with a council meeting in the palace Pandemonium in Hell to discuss recovery of heaven, with the lord-of-the-flies Beelzebub in attendance. FTP, name this 1677 work by John Milton, which tells of the expulsion of mankind from Eden.

ANSWER: Paradise Lost

- 8-14. In late antiquity, some variants of Gnosticism used the term to refer to several servants of the Demiurge, the "creator god". In modern times, it is a title bestowed by the Greek Orthodox Church for outstanding service. The Athenians used the name of the Eponymous one to label their years, the Polemarch was in charge of the armed forces, and the Basileus (buh-sil-e-us) one was in charge of civic religious arrangements. Name, FTP, this Greek word that in English has come to mean 'a high official.' ANSWER: Archon
- 8-15. It began near Beauvais in the north of France and was lead by Guillaume Karle, who was later captured and beheaded by Charles II of Navarre. Primarily a reaction to poverty during the HundredYears War, the peasantry destroyed and looted castles and revolted against the écorcheurs, mercenaries who fought for the French. FTP, name this uprising of French peasants in 1358.

ANSWER: Jacquerie

- 8-16. According to Assyrian records, at the battle of Qarqar against Shalmaneser III of Assyria, he fielded 2,000 chariots and 10,000 men. While excavating Samaria, archaeologists from Harvard found his palace in which one of the rooms was filled entirely with ivory. The second king of the fourth dynasty of Israel, he was convinced to take up worshipping Baal and to make the state religion by his wife, Jezebel. FTP, name this most despised king of ancient Israel, after whom the captain of the Pequod is named. ANSWER: Ahab
- 8-17. In alkenes, the essential requirement for it is that each carbon of the double bond must have two different substituent groups. Geometric and optical ones are considered a subset of them. One example is the relationship between cis-2-butane and trans-2-butane.

The composer first saw Simpson in a production of *Romeo and Juliet* in 1827 and became obsessed with her. Two years later, this obsession formed the basis of the work, which focuses on a young musician's unrequited love and his nightmarish visions after an opium overdose. Throughout the piece, the musician's obsession is represented with the *idée fixe*, which also appears at the beginning and the end of *Lélio*, the sequal.
