Tossups:

1. Born in in 1938 in Millersport, New York, she started her education in a one-room school house, and now teaches at Princeton. One of her most well known short stories is "Where are you going, where have you been?" inspired by the Bob Dylan song. She first gained national attention with the publication of *Sweeping Flood* in 1966, and the wone the National Book Award in 1970 for *them*. For ten points, identify the writer of the novels *Rape: a Love Story, We Were the Mulvaneys*, and *Middle Age: A Romance*.

ANS: Joyce Carol Oates

2. There are at least 35,000 objects here that are greater than 100 kilometers in diameter including 2003 UB 313 AND 2004 DW. Occasionally, the orbit of the objects in this region will be disturbed by the interaction of the giant planets in such a way as to cause the object to cross the orbit of Neptune. In fact, Neptune's moon Triton is thought to be a captured object from his area. For 10 points, name this disk-shaped region that extends roughly from 30 to 50 astronical units from the Sun containing many small icy bodies.

ANS: Kuiper belt

3. The Hatti-Huyamun, a charter furthering the reforms first included in the Tanzimat, was included in this treaty. Other terms of this peace agreement included the internationalization of the Danube and the establishment of British and French protectorships over the Danubian provinces of Wallachia and Moldavia, that latter of which was also granted control over southern Bessarabia and the Danube delta from Russia. Meanwhile, Russia was also forced to return its gains in Asia in return for retaining its possessions in the southern Ukraine FTP, name this treaty which in 1856 brought the Crimean War to an end.

ANS: Treaty of Paris

4. In the 19th century it was known as the Logia and is now widely considered by scholars to be an integral part of the solution to the Synoptic Problem. The first person to hypothesize its existence in modern times was Herbert Marsh in 1801, but Schleiermacher also advanced the theory behind this (*) hypothetical document. Argument still exists as to whether it is simply a collection of sayings, to which the Gospel of Thomas lends credence, or whether it has a complete narrative structure. This is, FTP, what undiscovered source that accounts for the similarities in the gospels of Matthew and Mark and is a major component of the two source hypothesis?

ANS: Q Source/Gospel or Quelle or Sayings Gospel Q or Synoptic Sayings Source

5. A member of the Islamic Society of Engineers, he is a former mayor of a world Tehran. He studied civil engineering at Iran University of Science and Technology, and later served on the faculty there before earning his Ph.D in transportation engineering there. He became the sixth president of Iran after running under the campaign "It's possible and we can do it" and defeating Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani in a run-off, receiving 62% of the vote. FTP, Name this leader of Iran, whose comments denying the Holocaust have earned him infamy in many Western circles.

ANS: Mahmoud Ahmadinejad.

7. It opens with the titular character announcing "And so begins the twelfth year of my idiotic war" and subsequently looking to the sky and maliciously thrusting upward his middle finger. When a blind bard referred to as The Shaper appears, the protagonist is amazed at how the singer can transmute reality by greatly embellishing the history of the Danes. Later, the titular character meets an existential dragon who lectures on the possibility of free-will and on time-space among other things. When the thane Unferth attempts to kill him, he mocks and throws apples at Unferth, refusing to grant the young idealist an honorable hero's death. It ends when the protagonist, having had his arm ripped off, stumbles into a fissure. FTP, name this modernist novel by John Gardner about a monster from the poem *Beowulf*.

ANS: Grendel

8. This element shares its name with an ill-fated satellite phone company. Discovered in 1803, it is the most corrosion-resistant metal known, and it was used as part of the alloy that the standard meter bar was made of. It is also used in high-dose radiation treatment of prostate cancer, as well as a catalyst for the carbonylation of methanol to produce acetic acid. For 10 points, name this transition metal, atomic number 77, best known for its anomalous presence at the K-T boundary.

ANS: Iridium

9. The treaty that founded this union was signed in London, rather than in any of the involved countries. This was because at the time the treaty was signed in 1944, World War II had forced the governments of all three countries into exile. The treaty creating it's Economic Union will expire in 2010. French and Dutch are the official languages of, for 10 points, this union which derives its name from the first few letters of each of its member countries: the Netherlands, Belgium, and Luxembourg.

ANS: Benelux Customs Union

10. When James the Anabaptist falls off a boat, this man stopped a would-be rescuer from jumping in after him, saying "The bay of Lisbon had been formed expressly for him to drown in". He contracts a horrible case of syphilis, is the subject of a painfully execution at the hands of the Spanish Inquisition, and becomes a slave on a Turkish galley; still, he nonetheless upholds his ridiculously optimistic philosophy. FTP, name this caricature of Gottfried Leibniz who teaches that this world is the "best of all possible worlds" in Voltaire's novel, *Candide*.

ANS: Dr. Pangloss

11. In the 1986 film, The Aurora Encounter, the alien is played by a real-life sufferer of this disease. Different from Werner's syndrome and Cockayne's syndrome in that it is not caused by defective DNA repair, it was first described by Dr. Jonathan Hutchinson in 1886. Recently, researchers discovered that a tiny, point mutation in a single gene, known as lamin A, causes death in children on average at the age of 13. For 10 points, name this extremely rare genetic disease, greek for old age, that affects approximately one in 8 million newborns worldwide.

ANS: Progeria (also accept Hutchinson-Gilford progeria)

12. A bird in flight connects the subjects in the foreground with the craggy mountains of the background in this 1565 painting. On the far left, two characters seem to be working at a forge, and the sign advertising their business hangs disfarred and at an angle. A snowy hill rises from the lower right-hand corner where ice-skaters skirt a frozen mill wheel, and then flattens out in the foreground where three title characters precede their dogs down the hill. For ten points, identify this painting by Pieter Bruegel the Elder.

ANS: Hunters in the Snow

13. He once said in an interview near the time of the release of his fourth album, *The Chase*, that he had more money than his grandchildren's grandchildren could spend. The album's first single, "We Shall Be Free," is said to be partially inspired by a homosexual family member. He recorded an album under the pseudonym Chris Gaines in 1999, but disappointing sales led to the cancellation of an associated film. Though he officially retired in 2001, he has released some new material under an exclusive sales agreement with Wal-Mart. For 10 points, name this country singer whose songs include "The Red Strokes," "The River" and "Friends in Low Places".

ANS: Garth Brooks

Though the fact that it remains unratified by Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Utah is occasionally used by opponents of its provisions as an excuse not to follow it, in addition to claims that different versions were signed by the different states that ratified it. It is also sometimes incorrectly argued that Ohio was technically not a state at the time of its ratification, and thus the amendment could not have ratified because Ohio was one of the original 36 states that ratified it. FTP, Name this amendment which overturned the case of Pollock v. Farmers' Loan & Trust Co. when it was passed in 1913.

ANS: Sixteenth Amendment

16. Probably written between 1601 and 1606, its plot is borrowed from a tale found in the third day of Boccaccio's *Decameron*, though Shakespeare added the characters of Lafew, the Countess, and (*) Parolles. Like the original, it takes place in Florence and centers on a young woman who tricks her love into sleeping with her. For ten points, in what ironically named play does Helena earn the love of her husband, Count Bertram?

ANS: All's Well That Ends Well

17. After gaining commission to pay off debts in 1743, this man was reinstated at the outbreak of the Seven Years' War and became a captain in the Foot Guards. In his later life he regained some of his lost fame for writing a comedy, *The Heiress*, which ran through ten editions in one year. Though he was promoted to lieutenant colonel for his gaining possession of (*) Fort Ticonderoga and Fort Edward for the British, he faced harsh criticism and demotion for his disastrous surrender of 6,000 men at Saratoga to Horatio Gates. FTP, name this British general nicknamed "Gentlemen Johnny."

ANS: John Burgoyne

18. The variability period of the layers in their envelopes is proportional to the inverse square root of the layer density, and is closely correlated to their luminosities. They are usually population I (one) yellow giants and their variability was first discovered by John Goodricke in 1784. Those visible to the naked eye include Eta Aquilae, Zeta Geminorum, and Beta Doradus. For ten points, what oscillating stars provide a value for the standard candle, and are used by astronomers to judge distances to other star clusters?

ANS: Cepheid variable stars

19. In the 1930's, he collaborated with W. H. Auden on Our Hunting Fathers. He conducted the first Western performance of Shostakovich's 14th symphony, and his only ballet, *The Prince of the Pagodas*, is one of his secular works, along with operas *The Rape of Lucretia*, *Billy Budd*, *The Turn of the Screw*, and *Peter Grimes*. He is also well known for his choral works, like *A Ceremony of Carols* and the *Festival Te Deum*. For ten points, name this British composer of the *War Requiem* and *A Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra*.

ANS: Benjamin Britten

20. Their era ended with the appointment of Hugo Black. Consisting of George Sutherland, Pierce Butler, James Clark McReynolds and Willis Van Devanter, they continued the Liberty of Contract doctrine in such cases *as United States v Butler* and *Schecter Poultry v United States* that invalidated New Deal policies, and created the impetus for FDR's infamous court-packing scheme. Opposed by Louis Brandeis, Benjamin Cardozo, and Harlan Stone, or the Three Musketeers, For 10 points, name this apocalyptically named group of Justices.

ANS: Four Horsemen of Reaction (or Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse)

21. Types of this tradition include agnatic, cognatic, absolute and matrilineal. The matrilineal variety is never known to have occurred in any European monarchies, but governs the ascension to the position of Rain (*) Queen in South Africa. Feudal claims often followed proximity of blood methods of inheritance, but this system dominated European monarch successions through most of history. FTP, identify this term that describes the mode of inheritance by which the first-born receives the entirety of a parent's wealth and estate.

ANS: Primogeniture

22. It was founded in 1793 as "Town of York," and several John Irving novels, including Until I Find You, and A Prayer for Owen Meany, are briefly set in this city. Its current name is a slightly modified spelling of the Mohawk phrase "where there are trees standing in the water." Its Pearson International Airport was the focus of the 1981 instrumental song "YYZ" by local band Rush. Name this capital of Ontario, where Rogers Centre is home of their Major League Baseball franchise, the Blue Jays.

ANS: Toronto

23. At the beginning of this novel, which is actually the end chronologically, the narrator is concerned about his ability to make witticisms and please his new American employer. As the protagonist travels across the English countryside, he recalls various incidences from his long career including the fall from grace of his former boss, (*) Lord Darlington, and his tenuous love relationship with Miss Kenton. At the end of the novel, Stevens realizes he has wasted

his life. FTP, name this 1989 Booker-prize winning novel by Kazuo Ishiguro, later made into a movie starring Anthony Hopkins and Emma Thompson.
