1. For ten points each, name the Motown act which performed these songs written or co-written by Smokey Robinson:

- 1. "The One Who Really Loves You" and "My Guy" Answer: Mary <u>Wells</u>
- 2. "Get Ready" and "The Way You Do the Things You Do" Answer: the <u>Temptations</u>
- 3. "The Hunter Gets Captured By the Game" and "Don't Mess with Bill" Answer: the <u>Marvelettes</u>

2. For ten points each, answer these questions about the cinematic adventures of Senator Joseph McCarthy.

- Senator John Iselin, a McCarthy parody played by James Gregory in this 1962 film, decides to say that there are 57 Communists in the Defense Department after looking at a bottle of Heinz ketchup. Answer: *The <u>Manchurian Candidate</u>*
- 2. This 2005 film dramatizes the struggle to make and air a 1953 episode of *See It Now* that attacked McCarthyism. Test audiences complained about the overacting of the actor playing McCarthy, not realizing that it was archive footage of McCarthy himself.

Answer: Good Night and Good Luck

3. The true star of Emile de Antonio's documentary *Point of Order*, about the 1954 Army-McCarthy hearings, is this lawyer, who at one point asks McCarthy, "Have you no sense of decency?" He later played the judge in the 1959 courtroom drama *Anatomy of a Murder*. Answer: Joseph N. Welch

3. Given clues about the Game Boy entries in a video game series, name the series for ten points each.

- The three Game Boy games released in this series based on a popular cartoon include *Radical Rescue*, *Back From The Sewers*, and *Fall of the Foot Clan*. Answer: Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles
- 2. The first portable entry in this series, *Operation C*, features only three weapons... but at least the always-useful spread shot is available. Answer: Contra
- 3. This series made its Game Boy debut with *Bad 'N Rad*, but that entry ditched the freestyle, high jump, jam, race, and joust events in exchange for traditional platform gameplay. Answer: Skate or Die

4. One time and it's a "bit"; multiple times, it's a feature. For ten points each, name these features from the *Late Show with David Letterman*.

- 1. Newer versions of the segment have superimposed Alan Kalter into the front row of the dais at the Kennedy inauguration. The segment ends with George Walker Bush stuttering or chuckling. Answer: <u>Great Moments in Presidential Speeches</u>
- 2. Augmented by a multi-hooped dancer and a grinder girl is this science-based aquatic guessing game. Answer: <u>Will It Float?</u>
- Stolen from *The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson*, this musical audience-participation feature usually shows Paul Shaffer inexplicably wearing a Carnac headdress. Answer: <u>Stump the Band</u>

5. For ten points each, name the last unanimous winners of these baseball awards (excluding 2008).

- American League Most Valuable Player, 1997 Ken <u>Griffey, Jr.</u> Rookie of the Year, either league, 2001 Answer: Albert <u>Pujols</u>

6. Sold at Target stores for \$1.99 during the month of October, answer questions about "cereal" murderers for the stated number of points

- 1. For ten points, in a skit, a Saturday Night Live contributor threatened to sue the maker of this cereal for appropriating his name and likeness, and later considered using boxes as a campaign prop. Answer: <u>Franken Berry</u>
- 2. Name the two companion cereals to Franken Berry in blueberry and chocolate flavors for five points each. Answer: <u>Boo Berry</u>, <u>Count Chocula</u>
- In 2004, for ten, this company famously announced a switch to using whole grains in all its cereals including the sugar-laden monster cereals Answer: General Mills

7. The first name's the same, but the last name is different. For ten points each, give the last names of these old school television characters:

- 1. Andy Griffith's character on *The Andy Griffith Show*. Answer: <u>Taylor</u>
- 2. Mary Tyler Moore's character on *The Mary Tyler Moore Show*. Answer: <u>Richards</u>
- 3. Lucille Ball's character on *The Lucy Show*. Answer: <u>Carmichael</u>

8. Simpson isn't the only controversial O.J. For ten points each name these spokespersons attached to orange juice advertisements.

- Currently the voice of the Florida Orange Growers is this often-mustachioed, sometimes-political member of the Board of Directors for the NRA. Answer: Tom Selleck
- 2. In the 1990's this Florida transplant was hired and summarily dumped as the voice of Florida Citrus long before his statements about Donovan McNabb, or Michael J. Fox, or well, you get the picture. Answer: Rush Limbaugh
- Beginning in 1948, this crooner and his family, and his second family, did ads for Minute Maid, in which he owned a large portion of stock for the last 30 years of his life. Answer: Bing <u>Crosby</u>

9. Before becoming a political punch line, Eliott Spitzer was a righteous crusader with, among other things, a possible explanation for the continued existence of Jessica Simpson's music career. For ten points each given clues identify the song or artist that Spitzer alleged owed some of its rise up radio playlists to payola.

- It has been alleged that one radio programmer was supposedly flown to New York City while another one received a flat-screen TV in exchange for adding "Get Right," an irritating song by this actress and singer's 2005 release *Rebirth*, to their station's playlists. Answer: Jennifer Lopez or (if you must) J.Lo
- Free Adidas sneakers were allegedly handed out to urban radio disk jockeys for playing the song "A.D.I.D.A.S" by this Atlanta rapper and frequent collaborator with OutKast. Answer: <u>Killer Mike</u> or Michael <u>Render</u>
- 3. But it's apparently not just hip-hop or urban stations. Another supposed beneficiary of record label payola is this John Mayer song, which in 2005 won a Grammy Award for Song of the Year. Answer: "Daughters"

10. We who are about to TRASH salute you. For ten points each, answer these questions about the new *American Gladiators*.

- 1. For five points per answer, name the wrestling and boxing co-hosts of the revival. Answer: Hulk <u>Hogan</u> (or Terry <u>Bollea</u>) and <u>Laila Ali</u> (5 pts per answer)
- 2. Heard but not seen is this former CNN *Headline News* sports anchor who does play-by-play. Answer: Van Earl <u>Wright</u>
- 3. This event, which was not part of the previous incarnation, involves the Contender and Gladiator battling on a moving circle.

Answer: Earthquake

- 11. Name these notable web sites owned by Conde Nast Publications for ten points each.
 - This web site for a Conde Nast magazine stirred up controversy earlier this year with a cover featuring Barack Obama wearing typical Muslim garb; it features articles from the print edition as well as its famous cartoons. Answer: <u>newyorker</u>.com (accept The <u>New Yorker</u>)
 - 2. This tech site with a Latin name often lists the good, the bad, and the ugly about products and contains sections called journals, such as Infinite Loop, which covers Apple, and Opposable Thumbs, which covers gaming. Answer: <u>arstechnica.com</u>
 - 3. Contributors to this social news aggregation web site can earn karma by submitting stories that are up-voted. Answer: <u>reddit</u>.com

12. So you lost the primary to an inexperienced 40-something dreamer who doesn't know who many U.S. states there are and/or a 70-something crank who doesn't know how many houses his wife owns. Cheer up, you still got on *Saturday Night Live*. For ten points, identify these defeated politicians who appeared on *SNL* in Spring 2008.

1. This Connecticut senator's dinner with Lorne Michaels was interrupted by Andy Samberg pitching a rough copy of *Laser Cats*.

Answer: Chris Dodd

- This Arkansas governor was mistaken in thinking that he would be helped by the superdelegate count during the lead-up to the RNC convention in a Weekend Update segment. Answer: Mike <u>Huckabee</u>
- Also on Weekend Update, this one-time *SNL* host blamed his appearance in a dress with Cheri Oteri for his failure to win the Republican nomination. Answer: Rudolph <u>Giuliani</u>

13. Answer questions about "The Greatest Game Ever Played," about to mark its 50th anniversary, for the stated number of points.

- 1. For five points each, the December 28, 1958 NFL Title game was played by these two teams Answer: <u>Baltimore Colts, New York Giants</u>
- 2. For five points each, name the starting quarterbacks for Colts and Giants in that game Answer: Johnny <u>Unitas</u>, Charlie <u>Connerly</u>
- 3. For ten points, this fullback scored the wining touchdown in overtime Answer: Alan <u>Ameche</u>
- 14. For ten points each, answer these questions about onscreen depictions of Adolf Hitler.
 - Hitler is played by David Bamber in this upcoming 2008 film from Tom Cruise's United Artists, about a July 1944 assassination plot. Answer: *Valkyrie*
 - 2. Numerous YouTube parodies have been made of this 2004 depiction of Hitler's last days, which stars Swiss actor Bruno Ganz.

Answer: <u>Downfall</u> (or Der <u>Untergang</u>)

 Noah Taylor took on the role in this 2002 film, written and directed by Menno Meyjes, which deals with the young Hitler's relationship with a Jewish art dealer played by John Cusack. Answer: <u>Max</u>

15. For ten points each, identify the following comedians based on their 2008 accomplishments.

- The self-titled debut full-length by this duo from Australia... whoops, New Zealand, peaked at number three on the charts and contained songs from their HBO show like "Business Time" and "Robots." Answer: <u>Flight of the Conchords</u>
- Do You Believe in Gosh?, a new posthumous album of unreleased material from this comedian, was a top-selling comedy album in the fall of 2008. Answer: Mitch Hedberg
- 3. This suit-wearing comedian was recently promoted from talking head to become the host of *Best Week Ever*. Answer: Paul F. <u>Tompkins</u>
- 16. Teen girl fiction, for ten points each:
 - 1. Lisi Harrison writes this series about Massie Block and other members of the Pretty Committee. Answer: The <u>Clique</u>
 - This interactive book by Sean Stewart, Jordan Weisman, and Cathy Brigg includes evidence for solving the mystery of the title character's disappearance, but caused a bit of a controversy due to its product placement deal with Proctor and Gamble that included mention of CoverGirl makeup. Answer: <u>Cathy's Book</u>
 - 3. This series by Cecily von Ziegesar about rich kids in New York City made the jump to TV in 2007. Answer: <u>Gossip Girl</u>

17. It's an election year, so it's time to see bands taking a stand for their favorite (or least favorite) political causes. For ten points each:

- 1. After this band was prevented from playing a concert in St. Paul during the RNC, Zack de la Rocha led a crowd in an a cappella sing-along of "Killing in The Name" and "Bulls on Parade" while Tom Morello sung guitar riffs. Answer: <u>Rage Against The Machine</u>
- Rage Against The Machine also played with this band during the 2008 DNC in Denver, their hometown. Their biggest hit-to-date is the song "Handlebars." Answer: Flobots
- Four years after the Bush campaign earned the ire of this band for using their song "Times Like These," they have similarly denounced the McCain campaign for their use of "My Hero." Answer: <u>Foo Fighters</u>

18. Back to back winners in the 2008 NASCAR Sprint Cup season for ten points each.

- 1. He's won back to back races twice this year, taking the Auto Club 500 and UAW-Dodge 400 at the start of the year and the Pep Boys Auto 500 and the Dickies 500 during the Chase for the Cup. Answer: Carl Edwards
- Among his eight wins this season were the back to back Coke Zero 400 and Lifelock.com 400, which could have been part of a four race win streak if Juan Pablo Montoya hadn't broadsided him at the start of the Lenox Industrial Tools 301. Brother Kurt took the win there. Answer: Kyle Busch
- 3. He won the regular season ending Pepsi 500 and Chevy Rock & Roll 400, closing nearly 400 points in the standings and setting up a Chase run that sees him more than 100 points ahead. Answer: Jimmie Johnson
- 19. "You Must Remember This" in order to rack up a higher score. For ten points each:
 - "You Must Remember This" was used as the title of a 2008 American Masters documentary about this Hollywood Studio, which is currently celebrating its 85th anniversary. Answer: Warner Brothers
 - 2. The documentary was narrated by this actor-director who starred as Inspector Harry Callahan in five Warner Brothers films.
 - Answer: Clint Eastwood
 - 3. This veteran *Time* magazine film critic wrote and directed the documentary. He also wrote a 1997 biography of Eastwood.

Answer: Richard Schickel

20. Answer the following about a mystery author for ten points each.

- The pen name of Barbara Mertz, this name appears on works featuring librarian Jacquelyn Kibry, art historian Vicky Bliss, and stand-alones like The Night of Four Hundred Rabbits and The Camelot Caper. Answer: Elizabeth <u>Peters</u>
- Peters is best known for a series of books like *Crocodile in the Sandbank*, *The Last Camel Died at Noon*, and *The Snake*, *The Crocodile, and the Dog*, featuring this female detective. Answer: Amelia <u>Peabody</u>
- 3. Both real-life author Barbara Mertz and Amelia Peabody share this scholarly profession, reflectd in the crocodile and camel in the book titles. Answer: Egyptologist

- 21. Identify the following terms for genres of rock music that have something in common for ten points each.
 - This two-word alliterative term was coined by Pete Townsend in 1967 to describe The Who's music, but it's used far more often to describe '70s acts like The Raspberries and Big Star, or more contemporary bands like Jimmy Eat World and The New Pornographers. Answer: power pop
 - 2. This two-word term was used to describe the token down-tempo love song that predictably appeared on most albums by arena-rock or hair-metal artists from the late '70s to early '90s, many of which became hits and inspired fans to break out the lighters in concerts. Examples include Journey's "Open Arms" and Motley Crue's "Home Sweet Home."

Answer: power ballad

3. This term for a subgenre of hardcore punk, a close relative of thrashcore, was coined by the mid-90s band Man Is The Bastard in their song "HSMP." Other bands working in the genre include Capitalist Casualties and Charles Bronson.

Answer: Powerviolence

- 22. Just because it's fake doesn't mean it can't contain the flesh of animals. FPTE:
 - 1. Shaped and cured to resemble snow crab legs, this imitation seafood has a texture similar to string cheese. Answer: <u>Crab Stick</u>
 - 2. This popular type of sushi roll usually consists of crab stick, avocado and cucumber rolled in nori and rice. Answer: <u>California Roll</u>
 - Crab sticks are made out of this finely pulverized white fish product that gets a rubbery texture when cooked, perfect for imitating shellfish meat. Answer: Surimi
