1. This man's gravesite is inscribed with the character "Mu." Early films made by him include the gangster drama *Dragnet Girl* and a comedy about mischievous children called *I Was Born, But* His works in color, like *Equinox Flower, Good Morning, The End of Summer*, and *An Autumn Afternoon*, show an obsession with symmetrical composition and an almost total absence of camera tracking. Also known for his use of "pillow shots," he frequently worked with Chishu Ryu and Setsuko Hara on such family dramas as *Floating Weeds, Late Spring*, and *Late Autumn*, and well as his masterpiece, which climaxes with the question, "Isn't life disappointing?" for ten points, name this Japanese director of *Tokyo Story*.

4. On *Everybody Hates Chris*, he plays Chris's grandfather, who dies during a visit with the family. He starred in the military sitcom *At Ease* and *Bustin' Loose*, based on the Richard Pryor movie of the same name, but neither show lasted more than one season. He worked as a vendor at Yankee Stadium in the 1960s, and turned his work for a local radio station into a stand-up career that he still pursues. Fellow comedian David Brenner referred him to Bud Friedman, and it was his work at his improv club that led him to get his biggest break, a role on the show Norman Lear was spinning off from *Maude*. Name, for ten points, this actor and comedian whose catchphrase of "Dyn-o-Mite!" swept the nation as he played the eldest Evans child on *Good Times*

Answer: Jimmie Walker

5. 80,000 cans were stockpiled in New Jersey in 2007 to send to Iraq, where it is often used to detect tripwires for booby traps. Weighing in at about 200 milligrams per meter, it uses freon, which led it afoul of ozone regulations and can cause frostbite. It is banned in Marlborough, Massachusetts and Huntington, NJ, and is illegal to possess in Hollywood on Halloween. Invented by Leonard Fish and Robert Cox, this "foamable resinous composition" is currently marketed by Just For Kicks. Causing permanent damage to vinyl, for ten points, name this toy also marketed as Nickelodeon Smatter, advertised as having over 400 feet per can.

6. K'ung Fu Tze, who has the last line in Stand on Zanzibar. HARLIE, in When Harlie was One. Mike, in The Moon is a Harsh Mistress. AM, in "I Have No Mouth, and I Must Scream". Who answers the Final Question in the Asimov story of that name. In the Iain M Banks' Culture series, they are ubiquitous and run society. They were the target of the Butlerian Jihad in the Dune setting, and a similar mentality is found in Bill Joy's essay "The Future Doesn't Need Us". For ten points, name this science fictional trope dealt with twice by Stanley Kubrick, including in his final film.

Answer: <u>Artificial Intelligences</u> (prompt on computers or supercomputers)

7. Its first store opened in Michigan over 40 years ago under the guidance of Harry J. Hoenselaar, who also developed and patented the machine used to ensure even servings of it. Three generations later, the business is still family-owned and has over 400 locations throughout the US. Available side dishes at stores now include cinnamon apples, broccoli rice casserole, cornbread dressing and sweet potato soufflé. The process for creating one involves curing in a secret marinade following by hours of smoking over a blend of hardwood chips, while the crowning touch is a crackling sweet glaze. Also serving lunchtime sandwiches and turkey prepared in a similar manner, identify, for ten points, this staple of holiday celebrations which is sold in gold foil wrappers featuring spirally sliced meat.

The third game caused some controversy for the suicide-like imagery invoked by the player's use of pointing a gun-like Evoker at one's head during combat. For ten points, identify this RPG series that features combat in which the player summons the type of character state named by the title.

13. The Amazing nickname of professional wrestler Jonathan Figueroa, it was the stage name of the comedian born Aaron Chwatt. The nickname of Bertha, one of the students at South Park Elementary, in a film adaptation of a Stephen King novel, a character jokingly claims that he has this nickname because he's Irish. A creature whose real name was Nanaki is given this moniker, appended with the number XIII, by Hojo, and Kurtwood Smith played a sitcom character with this nickname. Also the nickname of Johnny Kerr and Arnold Auerbach, name, for ten points, this colorful name shared by a mascot for M&M's and, with an extra "d," the comedian who starred in *Sanford and Son*.

Answer: Red

14. One member of this family wrote a play and screenplay about a man who thinks he's Sherlock Holmes, *They Might Be Giants*, as well as the book for Stephen Sondheim's musical *Follies*. His brother denied ghostwriting *Good Will Hunting* in *Which Lie Did I Tell?* and authored a novel and screenplay in which a grad student gets tortured by a Nazi dentist, *Marathon Man*. They have won 3 Oscars between them: the former for a work set on Christmas Eve 1183, and the latter for such lines as "The fall'll probably kill us!", "Who *are* those guys?", and "For a second I thought we were in trouble," as well as "Follow the money." He also wrote a book that tells us, "Life isn't fair. It's just fairer than death, that's all." 15. In his slightly disappointing senior season, in which his team lost four games, this native of the Fort Worth area broke the record for career total offense set by former teammate Brad Smith. He did - amidst some speculation - measure as exactly 6 feet tall at the NFL draft combine, but is still getting far less attention than teammate and wide receiver Jeremy Maclin. She also popularized the Monty Hall problem, which appeared in the September 9, 1990 column. Married to artificial heart creator Robert Jarvik, her most recent book is Growing Up. For ten points, name this columnist for Parade magazine, who claims to be the smartest woman in the US.

18. Real people using this name include the singer and songwriter of "Bad Case of Loving You (Doctor, Doctor)" as well as an actress appearing in *Street Fighter: The Legend of Chun-Li*. In fiction, it is the name of fictional characters such as a theatre critic from Tom Stoppard's *The Real Inspector Hound*, as well as an entire family from *EastEnders*. She is the mother of Yvaine in Neil Gaiman's *Stardust*, and an artificial red one is the location of Fusoya and Zemus in *Final Fantasy IV*. For ten points, identify this celestial body, the shooting of which is both an Easter Egg in *Grand Theft Auto III* and a good way to get ahead in the card game Hearts.
