#### Toss-Ups

1. One of this man's earliest recurring roles was as Damon West on *Dr. Kildare*; he also played Zack Powers on the *Dynasty* spin-off *The Colbys*. Guest appearances include the head of a prison colony on the first season of *Mission: Impossible*, a Japanese-American crime lord in the fourth episode of *Hawaii Five-O*, and a bullfighter who murders out of pride on *Columbo*. One of his last performances was as a cow on an episode of *Family Guy*, and he also voiced Senor Senior, Sr., on *Kim Possible*. A better-known character of his is a Sikh who once controlled a quarter of Earth, while another is a mysterious immortal with a diminutive helper who grants people's wildest desires. For ten points, name this portrayal of Mr. Roarke on *Fantasy Island* and Khan Noonien Singh in the "Space Seed" episode of *Star Trek*.

Answer: Ricardo Montalban

2. [AUDIO] For ten points, name the album given clips of several tracks, the last of which is the title track: [Track #40]

Answer: American Idiot by Green Day

3. It was first held at Hyames Field in Kalamazoo, Michigan in 1947, moved to Wichita in 1949, and landed in its current city the following year, where it will stay until at least 2035. It was a double-elimination tournament until 1988, when it went to two brackets of double elimination, with each bracket winner playing in a single title game. The final moved to a best of three series in 2003. Future president George H.W. Bush played in the first one, with his Yale team losing to Cal 8-7, while Texas has appeared in it 32 times, the most of any school. With its current home field of Rosenblatt Stadium scheduled to be replaced in 2011, name, for ten points, this Omaha-based tournament that decides the NCAA division 1 champion in baseball.

Answer: College World Series

4. Belgian violinist Joseph Merlin created some in 1759 to bring to a party, using spools, but his invention did not catch on after he crashed into a mirror. The first modern appearance may have been in 1980, when Life magazine published a photo of Eric Heiden using them on a Wisconsin road. A Minneapolis company founded by Scott and Brennan Olson, both hockey enthusiasts, became the primary supplier and gave its name to the product, which improved on earlier designs like the Plimpton 2x2, and competes with the single-wheel "quintessence" model used for telemark ski training. For ten points, name these products developed by Rollerblade, Inc.

Answer: Inline skates (accept Rollerblades before last clue, prompt on roller skates before 1980 is mentioned)

5. A graduate of Stanford and Oxford, this woman became the first openly lesbian American Rhodes Scholar, with a doctoral thesis about the spread of HIV in prisons. After winning a contest, she was hired to host a morning radio show in Northampton, Massachusetts. The co-host, along with Liz Winstead and Public Enemy's Chuck D, of the short-lived program *Unfiltered on Air America*, she got her big break in summer 2008 in the form of a stint on TV subbing for Keith Olbermann on *Countdown*. For ten points name this unabashed liberal, host of a namesake nightly show on MSNBC.

Answer: Rachel Maddow

6. Roger Ebert described the climax of this film as "unconvincing, contrived, meretricious and manipulative, all at once," adding that, "I don't know when I've disliked the ending of a movie more," and screenwriter Ian McEwan disowned the final product. It begins with Mark's mother dying of cancer, after which his father goes on a business trip and leaves him with his aunt and uncle in Maine. After he sees Henry kill a neighbor's dog with a crossbow and drop a dummy on the highway, causing a massive collision, he comes to suspect this his 3-year-old cousin Richard's drowning death was not an accident, but can't get anyone to believe him. For ten points, name this 1993 thriller starring Elijah Wood and, in the role of a cherubic psychopath, Macaulay Culkin.

Answer: *The Good Son*

7. A drum instructor whose students included Jimi Hendrix Experience drummer Mitch Mitchell, he owned a West London music shop notable for being among the first in the UK to sell Fender guitars and amplifiers. He and a young EMI employee named Dudley Craven would tinker extensively with the amps at the request of such friends as Pete Townshend, leading to the founding of his eponymous firm in 1962. Since the 1980s his company has made mass-market solid state MG models but are still best known for high-end valve amplifiers, both vintage models such as the 1959-SLP and more modern ones such as the JCM800 line. For ten points, name this English industrialist, nicknamed the "Father of Loud," whose name is now often associated with heavy rock bands playing in front of walls consisting of stacks of his company's cabinet amplifiers.

Answer: James Charles Marshall

8. The formula for it was invented in Knoxville in the 1948 by Barney and Ally Hartman. The history of this beverage was detailed in a book by Dick Bridgforth, the son of the man who changed the taste from the Hartman creation to its now familiar flavor developed to compete with Sundrop Cola in 1960. Originally featuring a hillbilly on the bottle label, it was dropped after the realization that teens and young adults didn't identify with it. The only clear bottles of it were produced at the Knoxville plant, and collectors are willing to pay upwards of \$1,000 for one to contrast with the typical green ones. Discontinued flavors of it include 1988's Red, the first variation of it, Blue Shock, which was offered exclusively with Slurpees, as well as promotional releases for *Star Wars Episode III* and *Superman Returns*. Often accompanied by Cheetos when playing Dungeons and Dragons, name, for ten points, this citrus flavored offering from PepsiCo.

Answer: Mountain Dew

9. Dean Dalton raced it in 1975, making all of two starts. Ed Negre made 21 starts with it in the same year, and raced it on and off until 1979. Bobby Hillin, Jr. spent most of the '80s driving it, and was the first to win with it. It bounced around several drivers in the 1990s - Dick Trickle raced it in 1992, Hut Stricklan and Jeff Burton had multiple years with it - before it landed with a new driver in 2000. He won twice with it in that year, and would get 15 more wins in it through 2007. Mark Martin and Aric Almirola drove it in 2008, with the latter taking it over in '09, only to see it shelved due to lack of sponsorship. Such is the history of, for ten points, what car number in NASCAR best known as the red Budweiser car driven by Dale Earnhart, Jr.

Answer: 8

10. A Harvard graduate, his household contains a gypsy houseboy named Djuna, and he's romantically linked to agoraphobic gossip columnist Paula Paris and his secretary, Nikki Porter, who appeared in There Was an Old Woman. Though he spent much of his time in Wrightsville, in The Four of Hearts and The Origin of Evil he was a Hollywood scriptwriter. The creation of two cousins, his main assistants included Inspector Richard Queen and Sergeant Velie. One key element in his books was the "challenge to the reader", where all clues he used to solve crimes were clearly laid out in the text. For ten points, name this detective and pseudonym who first appeared in The Roman Hat Mystery, created by Frederic Dannay and Manfred Bennington Lee, the namesake of a mystery magazine still in publication.

Answer: Ellery Queen

11. This actress won a 1980 National Book Award for her autobiography *By Myself*. She played an 83-year-old lifestyle guru who attributes her youthfulness to virginity in Robert Altman's *Health* and a secretary abused by Robert Stack in the Douglas Sirk melodrama *Written on the Wind*. Better known as Schatze Page in *How to Marry a Millionaire* and Nora Temple in *Key Largo*, she sang "How Little We Know" - but was not, contrary to rumor, dubbed by Andy Williams - in her debut. Another film of hers added innuendo-laced dialogue about horse racing to capitalize on her offscreen romance with her co-star. For ten points, name this woman whose roles as Slim Browning in *To Have and Have Not* and Vivian Rutledge in *The Big Sleep* paired her with husband Humphrey Bogart.

Answer: Lauren Bacall

12. This show's viewers were asked to donate money for a library in Cambodia named for its fictional protagonist's mother. One episode featured Stephen Colbert as a master forger who sends a mail bomb, while in another Austin Pendleton played a wheelchair-bound physicist who nevertheless manages to commit a murder. One central character discovers that he was the son of serial killer Mark Ford Brady, and his mentor Declan Gage is revealed to have killed his recurring nemesis Nicole Wallace. Season 5 saw the departure of Captain Deakins and ADA Carver, while Mike Logan became a regular. Soon to topline Jeff Goldblum as Zach Nichols, this is, for ten points, what NBC detective series starring Kathryn Erbe as Alex Eames and Vincent d'Onofrio as Bobby Goren?

Answer: Law and Order: Criminal Intent (prompt on "Criminal Intent"; do not accept "Law and Order")

13. Brought into its current form by the magician Feron, it is described as "the embodiment of the very passion of Creation ' the spark that gave life to the Universe". Baron Zemo, Rook'shir the Shi'ar, the Stepford Cuckoos, and Necrom were all temporary hosts. It has the power to leech the life force of future generations, and is responsible for the destruction of the D'Bari people through devouring their sun, and also defeated Galactus. As the nexus of the universe's psionic energy, it has a natural affinity for telepaths, such as Professor X and Emma Frost. It appeared briefly in a lake at the end of X2. For ten points, name this energy force whose most notable host was Jean Grey.

Answer: the Phoenix force

14. The writer and singer of this song played a small role in 1990s protests of the building of an A46 bypass road, since a section of the road traversed the title location. Found at the southern end of the Cotswolds area, it was home to a stone fort that Geoffrey of Monmouth claimed to be the location of the Arthurian Battle of Mount Badon, with a famous view of the city of Bath. Among the best known songs to be primarily in 7/4 time, its lyrics explain the singer's feelings reflecting upon his recent departure from the band he co-founded, as he was "feeling part of the scenery" and that he "just had to trust imagination." For ten points, "grab your things" and name this 1977 hit, the first solo single in the post-Genesis career of Peter Gabriel.

Answer: Solsbury Hill

15. A samurai one of these is the hero of a Namco-developed Turbo-Grafx 16 side-scroller. Dusknair, Shuppet, and Misdreavus are all this type of Pok'mon. Before taking on other forms later in the series, the first *Monkey Island* game features the pirate LeChuck as one of these. The plot of the adventure game *The 7th Guest* is frequently revealed by cutscenes featuring them and it's the first type of enemy encountered in *Gauntlet*. Also used to refer to a previously recorded player performance, for ten points, name this entity exemplified by the main antagonists of *Luigi's Mansion*, the Boos.

Answer: ghosts

16. In one movie, this character conspires with Ziro and Asajj Ventriss to kidnap the Huttlet Rotta. In another, this leader of the Confederacy of Independent Systems barely manages to escape from Geonosis. One of his last two lines in yet another film is "Twice the pride, twice the fall" after noting that he is looking forward to a confrontation; he then informs his opponent that he "sense[s] great fear" as well as "hate" and "anger" before being beheaded. Also known as Darth Tyrannus, this is, for ten points, what man who engaged in a ferocious lightsaber duel with Yoda, an ex-Jedi portrayed by Christopher Lee?

Answer: Count Dooku (accept "Darth Tyrannus" on early buzz)

17. *The Office's* Lucy Davis played a woman who tricked Ben into marriage on this show, while another character, Kristin, is a Japanese girl who slept with her stepbrother. Guest stars have included Jamie Kennedy as an untalented musician and Patton Oswalt as presidential assassin Leon Czolgosz, while Ken Marino and Michael Ian Black play a gay couple. In addition to working for first Ted and then his girlfriend Andi at the Buy More, Sam has another job, which has required him to use such objects as a defective toaster, a white dove, and a Christmas sweater as "vessels" to deliver something to the DMV. For ten points, name this CW series starring Bret Harrison as a guy who discovers on his 21st birthday that his parents have made a deal with the Devil and he must now collect souls.

Answer: Reaper

18. In music, Marianne Faithfull recorded an album based off of Kurt Weill's work with them, while an album by Ice T is named after the last one. Represented by the demon lords in *Digimon*, while in *Devil May Cry 3* they are represented by different types of enemies. In *Fullmetal Alchemist*, each of the homunculi is named after and represents one of them, while each one has served as a demon foe for Captain Marvel. Bishop Gianfranco Girotti has offered a modern list of them, which includes environmental pollution and genetic manipulation, while the original *Bedazzled* showcased the more classical ones. For ten points, identify this set of vices about which John Doe, as portrayed by Kevin Spacey, commits a series of crimes in a 1995 film.

Answer: Seven deadly sins

19. Teams that played here in its early days include the International League's Crackers and the North American Soccer League's Chiefs. It would later host the 1972 MLB All-Star Game, see Steve Bartowski lead its home team to 12-4 record in 1980, and was the stage for Sid Bream's famous slide during game seven of the 1992 NLCS. The most famous event to happen here is a homerun hit April 8, 1974 that propelled Hank Aaron to the top of the all-time homerun list. Currently home to parking lot for Turner Field, for ten points, name this former home of the Falcons and Braves.

Answer: Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium (prompt on Atlanta Stadium)

20. According to this song, the title character has "all the puppets with their strings up," and "can't find the right companion," even though, or perhaps because, he has the "swagger of a champion." "In a different world," suggests the narrator, it would all be good," but "no way" is she ever gonna fall for him. The artist's first song to top the Hot 100 since her debut single, helped along by a racy video featuring the nude artist in a sauna room, it was written and produced by Atlanta production team The Outsiderys. The first track and first single from the album *Circus*, in which the title character is told "Boy don't try to front; I know just, just what you are," this is, for ten points, what 2008 smash hit for Britney Spears?

Answer: Womanizer

21. The main characters bemoan their state with other unemployed workers in "Penniless Bums" before a gang has to "Tear the Town Apart" to find them, though they make it out incognito. Jerry lets Ms. Kane know that he's a "forty with a wee cup" in "We Could Be Close;" all while Daphne continues to get into character. After the band in favorably compares the weather in Miami to that in the Midwest in "Sun On My Face," the Floridian millionaires, led by Osgood Fielding, Jr. remind us that "even naughty old men need love" in "November Song." Starring Jerry as Daphne and Joe as Josephine, two musicians hiding out from Spat's gang with an all-girl band after witnessing the St. Valentine's Day Massacre, name, for ten points, this musical adapted from *Some Like It Hot*.

Answer: Sugar

#### Bonuses

1. Name these webcomics that have stuck around for ten years or more for ten points each.

1. Celebrating its 10th anniversary on April 9 was this strip featuring Gabriel and Tycho Brahe riffing on video games, created by Mike Kraulik and Jerry Holkins.  
Answer: Penny Arcade
2. This Pete Abrams creation features the galactic adventures of nerdy Torg, his murderous rabbit companion Bun-Bun, and their friends.  
Answer: Sluggy Freelance
3. Featuring tons of Linux jokes and a walking pile of debris called the Dust Puppy, this strip focusing on a Canadian ISP is drawn by JD Frazer, aka "Illiad".  
Answer: User Friendly

2. For ten points each, name these woeful 2008 college football teams.

1. This WAC team last won more than three games in 2002... when it won four. The team joined the WAC after stints as an independent and in the Sun Belt conference. Alums include Chris Cooley and Merlin Olsen.  
Answer: Utah State University
2. This Mountain West team ranked dead last in points scored in 2008 with 152, hampered by only having the 115th best passing game in the country. They did manage four wins on the season, including a 13-7 win over Tennessee that pretty much summed up the Vols' season.  
Answer: Wyoming
3. This team was the BCS conferences standard bearer for woeful, going 0-12. They missed an upset in the second week of the season due to a bogus celebration penalty on QB Jake Locker, which resulted in a PAT try from 35 yards, which BYU blocked to escape with a 28-27 win.  
Answer: University of Washington

3. The only thing that can adequately make an outfit fancier is a top hat. For ten points each:

1. Billy Gibbons proclaims in this song that he doesn't need to wear his top hat because of the size of his fat wallet.  
Answer: "Sharp Dressed Man"
2. This personification of England, much like America's Uncle Sam, wears a top hat and was created by Dr. Arbuthnot in 1712.  
Answer: John Bull
3. In the Pixar short *Presto*, we find magician Presto DiGiotagione struggling with his magic top hat and this rascally rabbit, who eventually saves his partner from doom.  
Answer: Alec Azam

4. "Emergo," "Percepto," and "Illusion-O" were interactive gimmicks he designed for *House on Haunted Hill*, *The Tingler*, and *13 Ghosts*, respectively. For ten points each:

1. Name this filmmaker and master showman who also gave out life insurance policies if anyone died of fright during *Macabre* and set up a "Coward's Corner" for patrons who left during the 45-second "fright break" at the climax of *Homicidal*.  
Answer: William Castle
2. Castle got a chance to produce a more legit film with this 1968 horror classic directed by Roman Polanski. He also appears in it as a man standing outside a phone booth who frightens the main character.  
Answer: Rosemary's Baby
3. Castle was the basis for a film promoter portrayed by John Goodman in this 1993 Joe Dante period piece set against the backdrop of the Cuban Missile Crisis.  
Answer: Matinee

5. It takes an entire bonus to detail who's being dissed by Tupac Shakur on one of the most notorious salvos in the '90s bicoastal rap wars, 1995's "Hit 'Em Up." So here it is; identify the targets based on clues for ten points each.

1. The main target is of course former friend Notorious B.I.G.. Perhaps the most tasteless thing in the track occurs near the beginning, where he alleges that he had sex with this singer, Biggie's wife and future widow.  
Answer: Faith Evans
2. The phrase "take money," uttered in the background throughout the track, mocks the hit "Get Money," by this Biggie-associated crew that launched the career of Lil' Kim, who is also called out by name as a cokehead on "Hit 'Em Up."  
Answer: Junior M.A.F.I.A.
3. Another major target of "Hit 'Em Up" is Sean "Puffy" Combs, now known as Diddy, and everyone associated with his record label, which then included Biggie and Junior M.A.F.I.A. "If you wanna be down with [them]" Tupac says during the spoken outro, "then fuck you too."  
Answer: Bad Boy Records

6. It took years of trying for HBO to get an acclaimed and popular original series. Identify the following less successful efforts that predate the likes of *The Sopranos* and *Curb Your Enthusiasm*, for ten points each.

1. One of HBO's first attempts at an original show, it ran from 1984 to 1991 and centered around a football franchise, the California Bulls, owned by Delta Burke. The cast infamously included O.J. Simpson and his Bronco driver Al Cowlings.  
Answer: 1st & Ten
2. Running from 1996 to 2002, this sitcom, a frequent whipping boy of ESPN's Bill Simmons and *Entertainment Weekly* magazine, starred Robert Wuhl as the title sports agent.  
Answer: Arli\$\$
3. This racy-for-its time sitcom centered around the fantasies and realities of publishing editor Martin Tupper, played by Brian Benben, and also featured Wendie Malick and Michael McKean. It ran from 1990 to 1996 on HBO, while a watered-down version aired on FOX for one season.  
Answer: Dream On

9. You may not recognize Frank Welker's face, but odds are more than likely you've heard his voice. For ten points each:

1. In animation, Welker provided the voice work for the Big Giant Black and Dark Monster, Nibbles and a Stray Dog in an episode of *South Park* in which this band investigates a Groovy Pirate Ghost Mystery.

Answer: Korn

2. Welker's voice can be heard voicing the Devil, the menacing Easter Bunny and Station in this 1991 sequel in which Joss Ackland's Chuck De Nomolos seeks to undo history.

Answer: Bill & Ted's Bogus Journey

3. Welker also provided the voices of Blob, Ickybob Clay, Lockjaw Pooch and the Zappa Yow Yow Boyz in this Nintendo 64 fighting game from Interplay.

Answer: ClayFighter 63 1/3

10. Answer the following about a card game and its variants.

1. The most popular card game in America in the late 19th century, it's a 4-player trick-taking game played with a 24 card deck; the jack of the trump suit becomes the highest card.

Answer: Euchre

2. Invented and patented by the US Playing Card company in 1904, this euchre variant uses 43 cards, including the joker, and involves bidding among partners, including a possible misere or nullo bid.

Answer: 500

3. A hybrid of 500 exists with this game, a non-partner trick-taking game whose goal is to take exactly the number of tricks bid, without going higher or lower.

Answer: Oh Hell!

11. We still don't know who the title *How I Met Your Mother* refers to. Name these actresses who can probably be rejected as candidates for ten points each.

1. This former child star and cheerleader for mathematics education played Trudy, who, along with her sorority sister Rachel, may or may not have had a threesome with Ted. It is doubtful that Kevin Arnold would have approved.

Answer: Danica McKellar

2. Ted fared no better than John Dorian with this actress, who played the dermatologist Stella. Although she accepted Ted's marriage proposal, she ended up leaving him at the altar to go back to her ex.

Answer: Sarah Chalke

3. This actress, whose lookalike sister Kimberly plays Dana on *According to Jim* and is married to Brad Paisley, portrayed "cupcake girl" Victoria, who breaks up with Ted after she hears from Robin that Ted plans to break up with her.

Answer: Ashley Williams (prompt on partial answer)

12. Nashville is full of angry drunks, even when Wynonna is on the wagon. For ten points, given lyrics, identify the classic country songs. If you need the original artist, you'll get five.

1. [10] 10 points: "Each night I leave the bar room when it's over, Not feeling any pain at closing time, But tonight your memory found me much too sober, I can't drink enough to keep you off my mind."

2. [10] 10 points: "I was drunk the day my mom got outta prison. And I went to pick her up in the rain. But before I could get to the station in my pickup truck/ She got runned over by a damned old train."

[5] 5 points: David Allan Coe

Answer: You Never Even Called me By My Name

3. [10] "Last night I dreamed that I passed from the scene, And I went to a place so sublime, Aw, the water was clear and tasted like beer, Then they turned it all into wine."

[5] 5 points: Tom T. Hall

Answer: I Like Beer

13. Samuel Beckett wrote *Krapp's Last Tape* specifically for him. For ten points each, name these other credits of Patrick Magee.

1. Magee played Mr. Alexander, the wheelchair-bound writer who torments his wife's rapist, in this 1971 Stanley Kubrick film.  
Answer: A Clockwork Orange
2. Magee wryly describes a victim of Rorke's Drift as a "dead paperhanger" while playing a military surgeon in this classic British war film set in Africa.  
Answer: Zulu
3. Magee and Ian Richardson held forth as advocates of body and mind, respectively, in this 1964 Peter Brook-directed film of a Peter Weiss play set in an asylum at Charenton. Glenda Jackson made her film debut in the role of Charlotte Corday.  
Answer: Marat/Sade or The Persecution and Assassination of Jean-Paul Marat as Performed by the Inmates of the Asylum at Charenton Under the Direction of the Marquis de Sade

14. Toys and litigation, for ten points each

1. Pending appeal, this toy line of "girls with a passion for fashion" will be discontinued after the decision in a December 2008 court case.  
Answer: Bratz
2. Bratz" parent company, this Los Angeles-based company burst onto the toy scene in 2001 and also produces Baby Born, Little Tikes, and Rescue Pets.  
Answer: MGA Entertainment
3. This company brought suit against MGA on grounds that the Bratz line was created by former employee Carter Bryant while still under the employ of this toy manufacturing giant.  
Answer: Mattel

15. The first great media feud of 2009 was the war of words between *The Daily Show's* Jon Stewart and cable-news channel CNBC. For ten points each:

1. Things really came to a head on March 12 when this host of *Mad Money* and best-known CNBC personality went *mano-a-mano* with Stewart on *The Daily Show*.  
Answer: Jim Cramer
2. However, Cramer was not the main initial target of Stewart's wrath. Stewart initially took issue with an on-air rant by this CNBC personality. His comments about bailing out "loser" homeowners broadcast live from the Chicago Mercantile Exchange trading floor made him a cult hero to libertarian conservatives but prompted a 8-minute Daily Show montage of past wrongheaded cheerleading of the finance industry by Cramer and other CNBC talking heads.  
Answer: Rick Santelli
3. After Stewart's evisceration of a somewhat contrite Cramer, this CEO of NBC Universal went on the air to call Stewart's criticisms of Cramer and CNBC "unfair" and "out of line."  
Answer: Jeff Zucker

16. They were good enough to get the ball regularly, but not good enough to win. For ten points each, name these 20 game losers.

1. This Tigers pitcher became the first pitcher in 23 years to lose 20 games in a season, going 9-21 in 2003.  
Answer: Mike Maroth
