#### Toss-Ups

1. In 2005 he was the top-ranked player on the Outback Champion Series, which is operated by InsideOut Sport & Entertainment, which he helped found. At the other end of his career, he won the Orange Bowl junior tournament in 1986 and 1987. His best year was 1992, where he won two Grand Slam tournaments, was on the US team that won the Davis Cup, and had a 25 match winning streak, all of which added up to him ending the year ranked number one. He'd add two more Grand Slam titles, giving him two Australian and French Opens each. He made the US Open final in 1991 but lost to Stefan Edberg, and the Wimbledon final in 1993, losing to Pete Sampras. Name, for ten points, this all-surface threat known for his red hair and omnipresent baseball hat.

Answer: Jim Courier

2. This man has scored four films, including *The Week That Girl Died* and the Eriq La Salle-directed *Psalms from the Underground* and *Rebound*, as well as the PBS documentary series *Black Westerners*. He also released several jazz albums, including *Shadow Prophets* and *Spirit Talk*. He played Paul Wolf in a 2000 episode of *V.I.P* and played himself in the Christmas episode of *Studio 60 on the Sunset Strip*. Named the world's sexiest vegetarian male by PETA in 2007, he is best known for replacing Branford Marsalis in a role that sees him support Philadelphia sports teams and be the butt of jokes implying homosexuality and marijuana use. For ten points, name this bandleader of *The Tonight Show with Jay Leno*.

Answer: Kevin Eubanks

3. The lyrics of this song reference the rise of hard drugs in the counterculture, referring to a character named "Sweet Jane" who lost her sparkle. They also expresses exasperation about a real-life New Orleans drug bust, in addition to referring to travels to places such as Buffalo and Dallas over a mid-tempo shuffle beat. Declared a National Treasure by the Library of Congress in 1997, it's the closing track and lead single from the 1971 album American Beauty. For ten points name this song famously featuring the line "What a long strange trip it's been," perhaps the signature song of the Grateful Dead.

Answer: Truckin'

4. The episode of *Father Ted* featuring Fintan Stack shares its name with this movie. Inspired by "Kids Killing Kids," a 1987 *Village Voice* article by screenwriter Barry Michael Cooper, it features the director as Detective Stone and a young Chris Rock as Pookie, an undercover informant who works at "The Carter." At the end, after Kareem Akbar is set up to take the fall, a *deus ex machina* comes in the form of an old man who says, "Your soul is required in hell!" before killing Nino Brown outside a courthouse. Scotty Appleton infiltrates the Cash Money Brothers in, for ten points, what first feature directed by Mario Van Peebles, starring Wesley Snipes as a drug kingpin and Ice-T as the undercover cop who brings him down?

Answer: New Jack City

5. Originally adapted from a Phil Stong novel and written for a film version, it was finally adapted for the stage half a century later. Taking place in the late summer of 1946, Dave miller, a neighbor, bets the patriarch of the main family \$5 that something will go wrong for at least one of them over the course of the next three days. Father Abel is concerned over the prospects of Blue Boy, whilst Melissa fusses over her mincemeat. Margie and Wayne, however, are more concerned with romance; though Harry continually asks Margie to marry him, she falls for newsman Pat Gilbert after sharing "Isn't It Kinda Fun?" and she expresses her feelings in "It Might As Well Be Spring." For ten points, name this Rodgers and Hammerstein musical in which the Frake family set out for Des Moines Iowa for the titular event.

Answer: State Fair

6. [AUDIO] TWO ANSWERS REQUIRED. For ten points each, name the Grammy-winning song from the '80s and the artist performing it: [Track #64]

Answer: "Don't Stand So Close to Me" by the Police

7. Foods from this land include Ding Ding Mac-Mood (or pig snout), the dessert bibibobacas, and eel wrapped in grape leaves. Although a picture of a cow is featured on its currency, sheep-herding is its number one occupation. For ten points, name this small Mediterranean island which was the pre-Chicago home for "Cousin Balki" Bartokomous of *Perfect Strangers*.

Answer: Mypos

8. It was given to attendees of the opening keynote at the 2009 Game Developer's Conference. Activities in this game include mixing up the ingredients of romance in the Love Lab, helping a monk eat dumplings, and participating in the mating ritual of a fictional lizard. Another level is an attempt to join The Dazzles while yet another level features a performance of "Thrilling! Is This Love?," during which the phrase "I Suppose" indicates that the player should perform three taps followed by a flick. Scratching a record on a turntable and keeping in sync with a glee club are among the other activities performed in, for ten points, what Nintendo DS music game?

Answer: Rhythm Heaven (accept Rhythm Tengoku Gold, do not prompt on Rhythm Tengoku)

9. This man co-starred with Alan Thicke as two buddies at a Club Med-run Colorado ski resort in *Copper Mountain* and played a teenage virgin pursued by a Lauren Hutton-portrayed vampire in *Once Bitten*. Francis Coppola cast him as a nerd who becomes a dentist in *Peggy Sue Got Married*, and he was murdered rock star Johnny Squares in *The Dead Pool* and the "red alien," Wiploc, in *Earth Girls Are Easy*. Aside from a cameo as the adult Joe Wentworth in *Simon Birch*, he has played almost exclusively lead roles since his breakout performances as Lloyd Christmas and Stanley Ipkiss. For ten points, name this Canadian cut-up who attempted serious drama as Peter Appleton in *The Majestic* and Walter Sparrow in *The Number 23* but will always be Ace Ventura.

Answer: Jim Carrey

10. Opening in 1875, it served as a replacement for venues such as Oakland and Woodlawn. Named after the two men who leased land to their nephew, Colonel Meriwether Lewis Clark, its features include Pierre Bellocq's mural of almost 100 champions and the Twin Spires of the grandstand. It has an 80-foot-wide, one-mile-long main track. 1875 saw the debut of the Oaks, the Clark Handicap, and its signature event. For ten points, name this home of the Kentucky Derby.

Answer: Churchill Downs

11. This song's lyrics detail a night on the town rolling around on Pirelli tires and making it rain at the club with the speaker's "Benjamin Frank-a-lins." In spite of such simple subject matter, it set the record for most digital downloads during the first week of sales With a over 600,000 downloads. Its video is slightly more unique, featuring both a spinning platform and disco ball in reference to the video of the song it samples. The first single off of the album *R.O.O.T.S.*, it features the singer Kesha singing along with its chorus. For ten points, name this recent number one hit for Flo Rida that takes a sample and its name from the Dead or Alive song about spinning a record.

Answer: "Right Round"

12. This variety is still indicated by six remaining letters on the label of the Warhol work *Small Torn Campbell's Soup Can* that sold at auction in 2006 to SunAmerica founder Eli Broad for over \$11 million. The origins of this soup come from the harsh winter at Valley Forge during the Revolutionary War, with a mess captain tasked to make something palatable from the scraps available including beef tripe and root vegetables. Marketed only in certain areas of the country including its native eastern Pennsylvania, name, for ten points, this soup that sounds like the high-pitched ladies from the Monty Python skits or the singular version of Gwyneth Paltrow's character in *Iron Man*.

Answer: Philadelphia Pepper Pot

13. This woman won a Tony as the pregnant Tonya in *King Hedley II*. She can be heard as the offscreen voice of a parole board member in *Ocean's Eleven*; Steven Soderbergh had previously cast her in small roles in *Out of Sight* and *Traffic* and she worked with George Clooney again in a cameo as the CIA Chairwoman in *Syriana*. She played the maid Sybil in *Far from Heaven*, 50 Cent's grandma in *Get Rich or Die Tryin'*, and Fantasia's mother in *Life Is Not a Fairytale*, but her most memorable maternal character argues that Sister Aloysius should leave Father Flynn alone. For ten points, name this actress whose lone scene as Mrs. Miller got her an Oscar nomination for *Doubt*.

Answer: Viola Davis

14. This comic was a dominating Little League pitcher in Houston but decided to dedicate himself to learning routines by Richard Pryor and Woody Allen as a teen. During the height of Rick Astley's popularity in the late 1980's, this comedian ridiculed Astley's pop stylings and the "wussification of rock" by contrasting it against Jimi Hendrix's *1/2 Voodoo Child*. On January 30, 2009 this comedian's mother appeared on the *Late Show with David Letterman* to watch and comment on a standup routine cut from the program fifteen years earlier, ostensibly for a line about pro-life protesters needing to join hands and block the cemetery. For ten points, name this late comedian who released the comedy discs *Dangerous* and *Relentless* before passing in February 1994.

Answer: Bill Hicks

15. Most of the middle part of the career of this British-born blonde actress involved made-for-TV movies like *Deadly Betrayal* and *Shadows of Desire*. A teen model on the short-lived soap *Paper Dolls*, her filmography includes several tongue-in-cheek sendups of the sort of *femme fatale* she often plays on TV; examples include *Code Name: The Cleaner* and *Beverly Hills Ninja*. First gaining fame for playing a romantic rival to her own mother, she proved popular enough with viewers that Paige Matheson was made a regular role on *Knots Landing*. Long rumored to have wanted off her current show, her latest character may or may not have been electrocuted during a car accident. Involved in a controversial 2004 comedic sketch before a game on *Monday Night Football* that featured her dropping a towel in front of Terrell Owens. For ten points name this actress best known for portraying serial divorcee Edie Britt on *Desperate Housewives*.

Answer: Nicolette Sheridan

16. Formed back in 1980, they have scored eight Top 40 hits, including "Boys In Town" and "Pleasure And Pain," in their native Australia but are internationally best remembered for their self-titled 1991 album, which included the minor modern rock hit "Make Out Alright." Said to be working on their first album since 1996's *Underworld*, they have had a revolving cast built around guitarist Mark McEntee and singer Christina Amphlett. A young Michael Bay directed the sexually-charged video of their biggest hit, now also associated with Austin Powers short-circuiting fembots. For ten points, name this band best known for their notorious ode to female masturbation, "I Touch Myself."

Answer: The DiVinyls

17. They had won an all-time best 73 games the previous year, but opened the season by giving an expansion team their first ever win. 10 games behind the Cubs in mid-August, they won 27 of their last 37 to finish with an even 100 wins. A relatively weak offense, despite above-average seasons from second baseman Ken Boswell and outfielders Cleon Jones and Tommie Agee, they were keyed by pitchers, including relief aces Ron Taylor and Tug McGraw and starters Gary Gentry and Jerry Koosman. Also featuring a young Nolan Ryan, this is for ten points, what team, led by 25-game winner Tom Seaver, who swept the Atlanta Braves in the inaugural National League Championship Series, then stunned the heavily favored Orioles in 5 games, bringing the World Series trophy to Queens?

Answer: 1969 New York Mets

18. This upcoming show was to include 23-year-old Brian Magee, the Internet casting winner. It is rumored that Magee was removed from the show prior to filming due to his straight-edge lifestyle, which would likely be incompatible with the host's. The host's MySpace page once featured a topless picture of herself making an obscene gesture while holding a bottle of Jack Daniels next to a table that appears have several lines of cocaine. Magee's departure will make it easier on other contestants such as Weasel, Cable Guy, Chi Chi, 12-pack, and Dropout to win the final prize. The show's host, a former bass player for the band Seraphim Shock, is famous for drinking, stumbling, forgetting the words to the national anthem, having a famous uncle, and being jilted by a famous rock star. 1. Answer the following about the various side projects that members of R.E.M. have been involved in over the years for ten points each.

1. This singer-songwriter enlisted the three-fourths of R.E.M. to be his backing band on his 1987 album Sentimental Hygiene. They also recorded a set of covers together, including one of Prince's song "Raspberry Beret," that was eventually released in 1990 under the name Hindu Love Gods.

Answer: Warren Zevon Guitarist Peter Buck toured in 2006 with The Venus 3, a side project led by this singer-songwriter, who first gained fame as the leader of the Soft Boys in the early '80s and whose solo songs include "Balloon Man" and "My Wife And My Dead Wife."

2. Answer: Robyn Hitchcock Singer Michael Stipe co-wrote "I'll Give You My Skin" with this folk duo, consisting of Amy Ray and Emily Sillers, who also played a role in the Athens music scene that spawned R.E.M.
3. Answer: The Indigo Girls

2. For ten points each, answer these questions about the travesty that was the tied All Star Game of 2002.

1. The National League took a 4-0 lead through three, with two of the runs coming from a two run homer by this man, who was robbed of a possible home run in the first inning by a leaping Torii Hunter.

2. This then-Indians' shortstop's triple in the eighth inning tied the game at its eventual 7-7 deadlock.

3. There was no MVP named, ironic given that 2002 was the first year that the award was named for this Hall of Famer, who had passed away four days before the game.

Answer: Midnight Sun

6. For ten points each, name these fictional plays-within-a-film.

1. In Woody Allen's *Bullets Over Broadway*, John Cusack plays an author surrogate who casts a mobster's girlfriend in order to get financial backing for this play.  
Answer: God of Our Fathers
2. Max Bialystock and Leo Bloom plan to defraud investors with this musical in *The Producers*.  
Answer: Springtime for Hitler: A Gay Romp With Eva and Adolf at Berchtesgaden
3. In a 1982 film based on an Ira Levin stage thriller, Christopher Reeve sends Michael Caine a copy of this play, setting in motion a fiendishly clever murder plot. Its name also titles the film it appears in.

Answer: Moonlight
3. This Spike series starred rapper Kirk Jones, also known as Sticky Fingaz of Onyx, and was supposed to be in continuity with a film trilogy.

1. [5,5] These final two tracks of Pink Floyd's Dark Side of the Moon are so associated with each other that many radio listeners don't even know they are listed as different songs and may think they collectively serve as the album's title track.

2. [5,5] The first two tracks of Queen's album News of the World were the two halves of a double A-sided single where and are nearly always played back-to-back on the radio.  
Answer: We Will Rock You and We Are The Champions
3. [10] Classic rock stations with deep catalogs will occasionally play the first three tracks from this 1974 debut album of Robert Palmer - a version of Little Feat's "Sailin' Shoes," Palmer's own "Hey Julia," and the title cut, an Allen Toussaint song.

Luckily for him, he got far more exposure for his touchdown grab late in Super Bowl XLIII [43] that helped win him the Super Bowl MVP Award.

2. In September 2008 this two-time Pro Bowl tight end for the Redskins made the mistake of posting a photo of himself reading a page of the Redskins playbook while unclothed, not realizing his genitalia were visible in the photo.

4. [5] Edward Lionheart's helpful daughter, Edwina, is played by this star of *The Avengers* who won a 1994 Tony as Medea. Her daughter, Rachael Stirling, played Edwina in a 2005 stage adaptation of *Theater of Blood*.
