Delaware Winter Invitational, 2010 Animal Planet packet by Mark Pellegrini Tossups

1) In 1844, Friedrich Bessel discovered that it is actually a binary system, and Walter Sydney Adams later determined that the companion is a white dwarf, the first white dwarf to be discovered. With Procyon ["Pro-see-yon"] and Betelgeuse, this star forms the Winter Triangle. Several ancient cultures believed that the rising of this star marked the start of summer. With a apparent magnitude of -1.46 ["minus one point four six"], it is the brightest star in the night sky. This is for ten points what star also known as the dog star?

ANSWER: Sirius A (Accept Canicula or Aschere or Alpha Canis Majoris; accept the dog star before it is mentioned in the question)

2) This fourteen movement work is scored for 11 pieces, including a xylophone and glass harmonica. After the work's debut performance by the Societe de la Trompette, the composer decided he hated the piece, and suppressed performances of it, giving only one private one for his close friend, Franz Liszt. The first movement, *Introduction and Royal March of the Lion*, is followed by *Hens and Cocks, Wild Asses*, and *Tortoises*. Only one movement from this piece, *the Swan*, was published in the composer's lifetime. This is for ten points what suite by Camille Saint-Saens ["San sahn"]?

ANSWER: The Carnival of the Animals or Le Carnaval des Animaux

- 3) He was so touchy about his baldness that he made it punishable by death to look down at him from a high place. He summoned Ptolemy of Mauretania to Rome, and then had him executed, sparking the Berber revolt. Although initially popular with the masses, after the death of his sister Drusilla, he became cruel and later, crazy. Instead of finishing the Roman conquest of Britain, he ordered his troops to collect sea shells, and allegedly tried to appoint his horse Incitatus ["In-sih-tah-tus"] as consul. This is for ten points what Roman Emperor who succeeded Tiberius, whose name comes from the miniature uniform he wore as a child? ANSWER: Caligula (Accept: Gaius Caesar Augustus Germanicus)
- 4) In *The Philosophy of Composition*, this poem's author described the careful planning that went into this poem's creation. Originally sold to *The American Review* for \$9, the titular character of is described as "shorn and shaven" as it rests on a bust of Athena. Meanwhile, the unnamed narrator of the poem struggles with his conflicting desires to both forget and cherish the memory of his lost love, Lenore. This is for ten points what poem about a bird by Edgar Allen Poe?

**ANSWER: The Raven** 

5) It included observations that the speaker's wife did not own a mink coat, and that unlike his opponent the speaker did not inherit great wealth. This speech was given to defuse a scandal involving a slush fund created by Murray Chotiner for the speaker. The speaker, who was running for a second term as Vice President, denied that he had personally profited from his office, except for a dog he insisted on keeping. This is for ten points what September 23, 1952 speech by Richard Nixon named for that cocker spaniel?

ANSWER: Checkers speech

6) Fort Hall Indian Reservation, Massacre Rocks State Park, and Swan Falls Dam can all be found on its banks. It rises in Two Oceans Plateau and flows 1,040 miles westward to Pasco, Washington, where it flows into another river. American Falls, CJ Strike, Browlee, and Hells Caynon are some of the dams on this river, which forms most of the Oregon-Idaho border. This is for ten points what tributary of the Colombia river?

ANSWER: **Snake** River

7) Dorothy Hodgkin first deduced the structure of this complex organic molecule, which contains a tetrapyrrole ring system called a corrin ring. Robert Woodward and Albert Eschenmoser were able to produce it artificially in 1973 in a synthesis involving nearly 100 steps. George Whipple discovered that dogs could be cured of a certain disease by feeding them liver, leading George Minot and William Murphy to isolate this vitamin for the first time. Unusual for an organic molecule in that it contains cobalt, this is for ten points what vitamin whose deficiency causes pernicious anemia?

ANSWER: Vitamin **B-12** (Accept: cyano-cobalamin)

8) His last act was to grant mercy to his killer, Pierre Basile, who shot him with a crossbow bolt during the siege of Chalus castle. This third son of Henry II was captured by Leopold of Austria and ransomed for 150,000 marks, which was raised by his mother, Eleanor of Aquitaine. After briefly returning to England to set his brother John straight, he campaigned in France against Phillip II, who had fought at his side during the Third Crusade. This is for ten points what King of England who fought against Saladin?

ANSWER: <u>Richard the Lionheart</u> or <u>Richard I</u> or <u>Richard Coeur de Lion</u> or <u>Oc et No</u> or <u>Melek-Ric</u>

- 9) Certain details in this painting, such as Morro Castle in the upper-right corner, show that this painting was based on engravings from Peter Canot. Two young men in white shirts reach out for the titular character, who is floating on his back looking up at them. That figure later grew up to be Lord Mayor of London and a Baronet, despite his missing leg. Depicting an event that took place in Havana harbor in 1749, this is for ten points what painting by John Singleton Copley showing a 14-year-old boy being attacked by a shark? ANSWER: Brook Watson and the Shark
- 10) Minor characters in this novel include Minimus, Pinkeye, and Mr. Whymper, who acts as an intermediary between inhabitants of the titular location and the outside world. During the Battle of the Cowshed, the windmill is destroyed, although Mr. Jones fails to regain control of the titular location. Its guiding principles are summarized in the Seven Commandments, but these are later modified by Squealer to permit sleeping in beds and drinking alcohol. An allegory to the Russian Revolution, this is for ten points what 1945 novel by George Orwell? ANSWER: Animal Farm
- 11) In 2009, Hall P. Beck published an article identifying the subject of this experiment as Douglass Merritte. This experiment was reported in the Journal of Experimental

**Psychology in an article titled** *Conditioned Emotional Reactions*. The 11-month old son of a wet nurse at Harriet Lane home for Invalid Children was exposed to a rat and then to a loud noise. The baby learned to cry when the rat was shown, demonstrating classical conditioning. This is for ten points what 1924 psychological experiment conducted by John B. Watson? ANSWER: **Little Albert** experiment

- 12) His teeth are inscribed with runes, and in art he is often depicted with a snake between his legs. He can travel through the sky, across water, or into Hel, which is where Hermoor takes him in a failed attempt to rescue Baldur. In order to prevent the walls of Asgard from being built, Loki transformed himself into a mare, but got knocked up and gave birth to this mythological figure. Son of Svadilfari, this is for ten points what eight-legged horse of Odin? ANSWER: Sleipnir
- 13) At the age of fifteen, this author quit his job and moved to San Francisco to become the "Prince of the Oyster Pirates." In 1900, he published the short story collection *The Son of the Wolf*, which he followed up with a novel about Humphrey van Weyden and other survivors of a ferry sinking who are rescued by the brutal captain Wolf Larsen. This author of *The Sea Wolf* is, for ten points, what writer best known for *White Fang* and *The Call of the Wild*? ANSWER: Jack **London**
- 14) Eugene Wigner extended it by adding a friend who acts as an intermediary, describing the result to the titular person when he returns to the lab. This thought experiment was put forth as a macroscopic demonstration of the seemingly impossible concept of eigenstate presented by the Copenhagen interpretation. Further analysis of this thought experiment gave rise to the concept of quantum entanglement. Put forth by its namesake Austrian physicist, this is for ten points what thought experiment involving a box, a flask of hydrocyanic acid, and a namesake feline?

ANSWER: Schrodinger's cat

15) In 2000, Robert Prescott's team confirmed that remains in the River Roach are from this ship, which was originally a Cherokee Class brig. Its first captain, Pringle Stokes, killed himself while on board, leading some to think the ship cursed. Afterward, under command of Robert FitzRoy, this ship left England to circumnavigate the world. This is for ten points what ship that sailed to the Galapagos islands carrying Charles Darwin?

ANSWER: HMS Beagle

16) This author wrote *Cynegeticus*, a book about hunting, and *Oeconomicus*, which describes household management and agriculture. He also authored *Hipparchicus*, a howto for cavalry tactics, and *On Horsemanship*, where he explained the selection, care, and training of horses, leading some people to claim he was the original horse whisperer. During the Peloponesian war he served in the Athenian cavalry, while in his youth he joined the Ten Thousand in Cyrus the Younger's expedition against Artaxerves II. This is for ten points what author of the *Anabasis* and the *History of the Peloponnesian War*?

ANSWER: Xenophon

17) She is the titular character of a 2007 graphic novel by Nick Abadzis. In 2002, it was revealed that she died from overheating and stress, and not suffocation as was commonly thought. She was adopted off the streets and named Kudryavka ["Could-ree-ahv-kuh"], but that name proved too hard for foreigners to pronounce so it was changed. Dubbed Muttnik by the American press, her body disintegrated on April 14, 1958 along with the rest of Sputnik II. This, is for ten points, what dog who became the first animal in space?

ANSWER: Laika

18) He began his criminal career with the attempted assassination of Joseph Sieff, but made international headlines two years later when he led a six man team that took over sixty hostages at OPEC's headquarters in Vienna. In 1994, while undergoing an operation in Sudan, he was arrested by French intelligence. He got his nickname from a headline in the Guardian, based on the fact that he owned a certain novel by Frederick Forsyth. Currently incarcerated in Clairvaux Prison, this is for ten points what terrorist named for the book *The Day of the Jackal*?

ANSWER: <u>Carlos the Jackal</u> (Accept: Ilich Ramírez <u>Sánchez</u>; accept <u>The Jackal</u> until it is mentioned in the question)

- 19) This character, originally created for the Sega Genesis, has appeared in two sequels, "Codename Robocod" and "Operation Starfish", all of which were published by Electronic Arts. All three games are puzzle-solvers where this titular character goes up against Dr. Maybe, and has to survive levels such as "License to Bubble", "A View to Spill" and "Leak and Let Die". This is for ten points what James Bond homage, a tuxedo wearing gold fish? ANSWER: James Pond
- 20) The story of this figure's birth is told in Judges chapter 13. In one story, this son Manoah is attacked by a lion and tears it apart with his bare hands. In another story, this last biblical judge slays one thousand Philistines using a donkey's jawbone. He is eventually captured and blinded, but before he can be sacrificed to Dagon, he collapses the Philistine temple on his captors and himself. This is for ten points what husband of Delilah whose strength came from his long hair?

ANSWER: Samson

21) His novel *The Marriage of Heaven and Hell* contains "Seventy Proverbs from Hell" and prophesies of the end of all oppression. His books of poetry include *The Book of Thel* and *Jerusalem*, both of which he illustrated himself. An accomplished painter, he was commissioned to paint over 100 biblical scenes, including *Ancient of Days*, *The Lovers' Whirlwind*, and *The Great Red Dragon Cycle*. Author of *Songs of Innocence and of Experience*, this is for ten points what British engraver, painter, and poet, whose best known poems are "The Lamb" and "The Tyger?"

ANSWER: William Blake

22) During this period in the fossil record, dogs and bears developed hyper-carnivorous features, to fill an empty ecological niche. Its cause is not known, although one theory is that decreasing temperatures caused North American forests to evolve into savannas,

making it difficult for the titular family of animals to hunt. This period ended when North America was recolonized by surviving populations in Asia descended from Pseudaelurus. Lasting from 25 to 17 million years ago, this is for ten points what paleontological period during which most felines went extinct?

ANSWER: Cat gap
