One member of this group was married to Toussaint Charbonneau and helped obtain horses from a chieftain of the Shoshone. Notable members of this group included the slave York and the interpreter Sacagawea. For 10 points, name this party which explored the extent of the Louisiana Purchase.

The Compton form of this process is inelastic, while the Raman form of it is elastic. The Rayleigh form of it partially explains why the sky is blue. The priests in this system are called either (\*) houngan or mambo, depending on gender. Its chief god is Bondye (BOHND-yay). Other deities in this religion are called loa (LOW-uh) and include Samedi and Legba. For 10 points, name this syncretic religion, often associated with Haiti and a certain kind of doll.

This poet of "A Supermarket in California" and "Sunflower Sutra" wrote a work that begins "Strange now to think of you, gone without corsets and eyes" called (\*) *Kaddish*. His most famous poem represents industrialized America with the god Moloch and describes "angel headed hipsters." For 10 points, name this American beat poet most famous for *Howl*.

12. This leader was targeted by Colonel Bastien Thiry (BASS-tea-EN THEER-ree), of the OAS. He wrote the *Army of the Future* and later saw his ideas about mechanized warfare used by an enemy which broke through the Ardennes (ARE-den) Forest. As president, he unilaterally withdrew his country from (\*) NATO command and came to power a second time after the dissolution of the Fourth Republic, though he is best known for first coming to power after Operation Overlord and the fall of Vichy. For 10 points, name this leader of the Free French in World War II.

15. The addition of this compound to alkenes creates a Crigee intermediate that then resolves to two carbonyls. This compound forms a dark blue liquid and possesses a foul odor. In contrast to the other common allotrope of its constituent element, this substance is diamagnetic and contains one double and one single bond. The (\*) photochemical reactions of this compound with CFCs deplete it, diminishing its ability to prevent harmful ultraviolet rays from reaching the lower atmosphere. For 10 points, name this compound with formula O3.

21. Studying this phylum outside of Paris inspired Jean-Baptiste Lamarck's theory of evolution of acquired traits. The anatomy of this phylum contains a dorsal body wall that can excrete a calcium carbonate protective layer. In addition to a "mantle," all organisms in this phylum contain a structure that facilitates motility, called a (\*) "foot." The "bivalve" organisms of this phylum typically excrete shells. For 10 points, name this largest marine animal phylum that contains classes of gastropods and cephalopods, and whose members include squids and clams.

[10] Name this philosophical dialogue, which suggests that philosopher-kings should rule the title polity.

ANSWER: *Republic* [or: *Politeia*]

[10] This Greek thinker produced many dialogues that depict the teaching of Socrates, including the *Republic*.

ANSWER: Plato [or: Aristocles ]

[10] This other Platonic dialogue, during which Socrates drinks hemlock and dies, concerns death and the soul.

ANSWER: **Phaedo**

- [10] Name this semi-permeable outer covering of a cell.

ANSWER: cell **membrane** [or **plasma membrane**]

[10] The cell membrane can be modeled as a "bilayer" of these organic compounds, which have a hydrophilic "head" and a hydrophobic "tail."

ANSWER: phospholipids

[10] Ions and other large molecules that cannot get through the cell membrane are imported and exported via this form of passive transport, which requires an ion channel or transporter protein.

ANSWER: **facilitated diffusion** [do not prompt on or accept "diffusion"]

[10] *The Potato Eaters* was a work by this Dutch artist, who cut off part of his ear around the same time that he completed his *The Starry Night*.

ANSWER: Vincent van Gogh

[10] In June 1890, van Gogh painted two version of a work showing this French physician holding a foxglove plant.

- [10] A layer of dielectric separates two plates of conducting material in this fundamental circuit element.

ANSWER: capacitor

[10] When a dielectric material is exposed to an electric field, charge separation results in this quantity, defined as the dipole moment per unit volume, being nonzero.

ANSWER: electric polarization

[10] The electric field of a dipole is proportional to this power of the distance from the dipole.

ANSWER: **-3** [or **negative third**]

[10] In this other Dumas novel, Edmond Dantes escapes from the Chateau D'if after being wrongly accused of being a spy.

ANSWER: The Count of Monte Cristo [or Le Comte de Monte-Cristo]

- 9. This year saw figures such as Louis Kossuth rise in power and the creation of a handful of constitutions. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this tumultuous year in Europe in which revolutions of all sorts swept across the continent.

**ANSWER: 1848** 

[10] This "Citizen King" of France who ruled over the July Monarchy abdicated in favor of his son in 1848, but instead Napoleon III eventually came to power.

ANSWER: Louis-Philippe

[10] The earlier July Revolution in 1830 had removed this king from power in favor of Louis-Philippe.

ANSWER: Charles X of France [prompt on Charles]

- 10. These curves are linear if the two goods plotted on the x and y axes are perfect substitutes. For 10 points each:
- [10] Give these curves that display, given a certain budget amount, combinations of goods for which a buyer has no preference for one combination over another.

[10] Indifference curves display the combinations of goods that have equal values for this quantity, which measures the amount of satisfaction a buyer gains from purchasing an item.

ANSWER: utility

[10] The paradox of value states that although water has a higher total utility than these precious objects, water also has a lower price than these objects. The labor theory of value "solved" this paradox by claiming that utility and price were not necessarily related to each other.

[10] Daphne is one example of this type of nymph, known for living in trees. Other examples included the Epimelides, who lived in apple and other fruit trees.

- [10] This bagatelle in A minor is often considered to have been written for a pupil the composer wished to marry.

[10] This composer of *Fur Elise* and the *Sonata Pathetique* used the C-minor key for his 5th symphony, which he opened with what is described as the sound of fate knocking at the door.

ANSWER: Ludwig van **Beethoven** 

[10] This Beethoven opera sees the titular character revealed to be Leonore, as she rescues her husband Florestan from a Spanish prison.

[10] Like Carson McCullers, this author is often described as "Southern Gothic." He depicted the residents of Yoknapatawpha County in "A Rose for Emily" and *The Sound and the Fury*.

ANSWER: William Cuthbert Faulkner

- 17. The Lux-Flood model describes them as oxide ion acceptors. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name these species than in the Brønsted-Lowry definition are proton donators.

ANSWER: acid

[10] This man names a model of acids and bases in which acids are electron pair donors.

ANSWER: Gilbert Netwon Lewis

[10] This term is used to describe acids that are stronger than 100% sulfuric acid.

- 20. Name these poems by Edgar Allan Poe, for 10 points each.
- [10] This poem which takes place "upon a midnight dreary," is noted for its repeated use of the word "nevermore."

ANSWER: "The Raven"

[10] This poem bemoans the death of the narrator's lover, the titular woman who lived in a "kingdom by the sea."

ANSWER: "Annabel Lee"

[10] This poem also bemoans the death of a beautiful woman. The narrator recalls how the title character died "in the ghoul-haunted woodland of Weir."

ANSWER: "Ulalume"

21. These objects can be "varicose" and appear purple if they are swollen or twisted. For 10 points each:

[10] Name these blood vessels that carry blood back to the heart.

ANSWER: <u>vein</u>s

[10] This is the only vein in the body that carries oxygenated blood. As the name implies, it carries blood back from the lungs.

ANSWER: **pulmonary** vein

[10] These "internal" and "external" of these veins carry blood from the brain and head and meet the subclavian vein. Venous pressure is often measured here to diagnose congestive heart failure.

ANSWER: **jugular** veins
