Tossups

1. This player batted .508 in his senior year of high school for the Kalamazoo Central Giants and was slated to attend the University of Michigan on a scholarship. Instead, he was drafted sixth overall in 1992 after being passed over by teams like the Astros, who took Phil Nevin with the first pick. He filled in for Tony Fernadez for 15 games in 1995, (*) and in his first full season in 1996, he achieved a .314 batting average with 10 home runs and 78 RBIs en route to becoming American League Rookie of the Year. His other awards include three consecutive Golden Gloves between 2004 and 2006 and, in one instance, he hit a home run at 12:04am on November 1, 2001 which garnered him the nickname Mr. November. For 10 points, name this shortstop and captain of the New York Yankees.

ANSWER: Derek **Jeter**

2. During this event, a "Club 231" – named after a piece of legislation that led to several imprisonments – was formed, generating concern from the ruling party that an opposition group would rise out of it. The Club of Committed Non-Party Members, or KAN, did attempt to form political opposition during this period, but it was quashed after 6 months by the (*) Soviets. The *Liternarni noviny* periodical published an essay titled "2000 Words" to rally public support during this time, and telegrams revealed that Brezhnev thought the media would soon return to Soviet support. In 1989, it was revealed that the Soviet Army actually had an invitation to end this in August. For 10 points, name this period in 1968 where Alexander Dubcek tried to offer "socialism with a human face".

ANSWER: **Prague Spring**

3. [Moderator: Do not say "Prospero." The character is actually called "Prospera."]

Set to play Prospera in an upcoming movie of *The Tempest*, this actor's best roles include forcing Michael
Gambon's character to eat human flesh at gunpoint, as well as unveiling the ultimate answer, "42." This actor
from *The Cook, The Thief, His Wife, and Her Lover*, who got to voice Deep Thought in the *Hitchhiker's Guide*movie, was revealed to be Clive Owen's (*) mother and also the murderer at the end of *Gosford Park*. In her bestknown role, getting her car stuck in a ditch led to sharing a quiet moment with a giant stag, and she asked Michael
Sheen's character, "Have we shown you how to start a nuclear war yet?" For ten points, name this *Prime Suspect* veteran
who played Leo Tolstoy's wife in *The Last Station*, who won Best Actress for playing the title role in *The Queen*.

ANSWER: Helen Mirren

4. This work mentions "the broken jaw of our lost kingdoms," and quotes the Lord's Prayer by repeating the line, "For thine is the kingdom." Its fourth section begins, "The eyes are not here," and its second section begins, "Eyes I dare not meet in dreams." It quotes constantly from Julius Caesar, The Divine Comedy, and (*) Heart of Darkness, and the line, "Headpiece filled with straw," is one of its many references to Guy Fawkes Day. The title characters are "quiet and meaningless / As wind in the dry grass," and it parodies a children's rhyme, beginning with the line, "Here we go 'round the prickly pear." For ten points, name this T.S. Eliot poem where the world ends "Not with a bang but a whimper."

ANSWER: "The Hollow Men"

5. Her non-television roles include the adult female protagonist in the music video for Dashboard Confessional's Stolen while her first television role was as Jewel, the daughter of pornography magnate Larry Goldman, on the American drama Skins. She wed Italian prince Tao Rispoli in June 2003 and the next year she was cast as bisexual character (*) Alex Kelly, the love interest of Marisa Cooper on The O.C. After another acting stint as dinerowner Jenny Reilly on the short-lived The Black Donnellys, she debuted in her current role as an employment applicant that outlasts Amber Vokalis for a position at Princeton-Plainsboro Teaching Hospital despite being known only by her applicant number. For ten points, name this actress who plays Remy "Thirteen" Hadley on House.

ANSWER: Olivia Wilde

6. This work's author receives frequent visits from an old settler who "keeps himself more secret than Goffe or Whalley," and who is believed dead by most people. Near the end of this world, the author quotes Ovid's Metamorphoses where cosmos is created from chaos, and asks for a new Champollion to come help him decipher a leaf from God. The author disparages a new telegraph line by claiming that (*) Maine and Texas may have "nothing important to communicate," and he claims that food, shelter, clothing, and fuel are the four "necessaries" of life. "Solitude," "Spring," and "Economy" are chapters in, for ten points, what book that talks endlessly about birds and the weather, a chronicle of two years spent at the titular pond, by Henry David Thoreau.

ANSWER: Walden; or, Life in the Woods

7. The latest expansion for this game introduces a luck-based "wheel of fortune" while another recent expansion adds a dexterity mechanic by introducing a catapult. Changes from the first edition of this game include those made to the scoring of farms as well as an increase in the value of pennants in cities from one point to two. The follower pieces in this game, called (*) meeples, were originally offered in five colours, but the *Inns and Cathedrals* expansion introduced grey pieces to allow for six player games. Players in this game score points by placing their meeples in structures such as cloisters, roads and cities which are added to the board each turn via the placement of tiles. Named after a French city noted for its walls, this is, for ten points, what Rio Grande game and winner of the 2001 Spiel des Jahres?

ANSWER: Carcassonne

8. New Delhi's Qutub Minar is the tallest one made out of brick while French architect Michel Pinseau designed the overall tallest one, which adorns a structure in Casablanca named after King Hassan II. The latter, unsurprisingly designed in the Andalusian or Moroccan style, is singular and square and shares the more typical (*) onion-shaped crown of other styles. In contrast, the Iraqi and Turkish styles of these objects feature conical crowns and can be found adorning structures in places such as Wangen Bei Olten, Switzerland, where a recent referendum banned their construction. Consisting of a base, shaft and gallery, these are, for ten points, which tall, tower-like features commonly found in the designs of Islamic mosques?

ANSWER: Minarets

9. The now defunct Boomselection.info was a renowned source for finding these tracks, as is its successor [this]town.com. Stars On 45 was one of the earliest groups to perform them, and artists known for creating them today include Ludachrist, Milkman and Girl Talk. David Archuleta frequently includes one of these in his live performances as a nod to a (*) controversial performance on American Idol that led to producers having to pay additional licensing fees for the use of Sean Kingston's Beautiful Girls. Recently, San Francisco's DJ Earworm has gained prominence for a set of these tracks entitled the United State Of Pop which features the top twenty five songs from the Billboard Year-End Chart. For 10 points, name this these tracks created by combining fragments of other tracks.

ANSWER: Mashups [accept bootlegs before "[this]town.com"]

10. In an artificial membrane, this letter is used to designate the ratio between the path length of a permeating particle and the membrane thickness, but it tends to be a "fudge factor" around 3. In particle physics, this letter denotes a lepton that is more than 3000 times heavier than an electron and can decay to a hadron, while another use of this letter is for a value equal to the inverse of the decay constant – the (*) mean lifetime of a decaying particle. In fluid mechanics, a property denoted with this Greek letter is the product of velocity and viscosity – the shear stress. Also used for the rotational analogue of force, for 10 points, name this Greek letter used in physics to denote tortuosity, torque, the time constant, and other properties starting with "T".

ANSWER: tau

11. His debut for his current club included scoring three goals in a Champions' League drubbing of Fenerbahce (fenair-baa-che). At his previous team, he scored a goal while still 16, but the risk of relegation prompted him to transfer in 2004 from (*) Everton following a successful showing at Euro 2004, where he became the youngest player to score in the competition, netting twice against Switzerland. In group qualifying for the 2010 World Cup, he tallied nine goals to lead England to the top of their group. Almost as famous for his hot temper as his goal-scoring prowess, for 10 points, name this Manchester United striker, who wears the number ten for his club.

ANSWER: Wayne Rooney

12. This disorder was first named by Moritz Tramer in 1934 and a 1980 paper by Torey Hayden entitled Classification of this disorder distinguished four types including symbiotic and reactive, the latter of which names cases of this caused by traumatic events. This disorder's name was changed in 1994 to clear up misconceptions on (*) choice, and treatments for this disorder include exposure to increasingly direct forms of communication. Hayden's study of the speech-phobic type of this disorder mentions a girl who repeats phrases such as "hoke-day-da," a so-called "magic spell" to prevent herself from saying "bad things" to the wrong people. For 10 points, name this social disorder in which a person, otherwise capable of speech, fails to or chooses not to speak in specific circumstances.

ANSWER: Selective Mutism [accept Elective Mutism before "1994"; prompt on mutism]

13. The creators of this show are members of a band called The Solids, whose song *Hey Beautiful* serves as the show's theme. One episode of this show sees its main character invent a sensory-deprivation device in order to avoid learning the result of the Super Bowl, while a more recent episode sees him teach a class on how to date his exgirlfriend, a character whose former career was responsible for the fictional music videos (*) *Sandcastles In The Sand* and *Let's Go To The Mall*. The latter video led to the resolution of a bet that caused Jason Segel's character to create the website www.slapcountdown.com after he won the right to slap Neil Patrick Harris' character at five times of his choosing. For ten points, name this show which revolves around architect Ted Mosby telling the titular story to his children.

ANSWER: How I Met Your Mother

14. The paper that first published the name of this technique used it for detecting the products of murine leukemia, after those products were binded to markered staphylococcus. Its common name was published by Neal Burnette, but this technique was used to detect synthenases in an earlier study by (*) George Stark. In combination with ELISA, this technique is used for confirmation in the HIV test, based on detecting GAG, POL, and ENV that have been separated by an electric current. Also known as a protein immunoblot, this procedure consists of gel electrophoresis, transfer to a membrane, and detection of antibodies that bind to the target protein. For 10 points, name this technique for detecting proteins that is contrasted with the "Southern" blot for DNA detection.

ANSWER: western blot

15. In one scene in this film, the protagonist asks a character about his political views but that character does not hear him as he is too busy talking to his children Benito and Adolf. The first half of this film focuses on the protagonist's attempts to woo the schoolteacher Dora which ends at her engagement when he whisks her away on a (*) horse that has been spray-painted green. In the second half of this film, the protagonist makes up an elaborate game, with a tank as first prize, to shield his son Joshua from the reality of life in a concentration camp. For ten points, name his 1997 Best Foreign Film, directed by and starring Roberto Begnini.

ANSWER: *La vita è bella* [or *Life Is Beautiful*]

16. A character in one of this man's works is frightened when she sees a hawk killing an eagle, the morning after she had a nightmare about of two beautiful women yoked to a cart, one of whom broke free and injured her son. Pericles served as choregos for that play by this man, wherein the ghost of Queen Atossa's husband appears at (*) Susa to blame their son's arrogance for the fact that he and the title characters lost a huge battle at sea. This man also wrote a play where one character has an emblem of Lady Justice on his shield, where the approach of the Achaians is announced by the chorus of women, and which ends with two brothers doing battle at the final gate of the titular city. The inventor of the "deuteragonist," or second actor, name, for ten points, this "father of tragedy" who fictionalized the Battle of Salamis in *The Persians* and wrote about Polyneices and Eteocles in *Seven Against Thebes*.

ANSWER: Aeschylus

17. This album's cover has been parodied several times, including for the 1980 UK compilation album *The Moonlight Tapes*, and the original LP contained a set of cutouts including fake mustaches and badges. Ranked #1 in 2003 on *Rolling Stone*'s list of the 500 Greatest Albums of All Time, side two of this album begins with the Indian-inspired (*) *Within You Without You* while side one begins with the title track in which the artists note that "you're such a lovely audience" and "we'd love to take you home." Despite having no tracks released as singles, this album includes many of the band's greatest hits such as *A Day In the Life, When I'm Sixty-Four*, and *Lucy In The Sky With Diamonds*. For 10 points, name this 8th studio album by The Beatles, which featured Ringo Starr as Billy Shears, the leader of the fictious title group.

ANSWER: Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band [be lenient and accept close equivalents]

18. In 2008, a proposed piece of legislation from this country, known colloiquially as "Section 92", would have made it legal to cut off internet connections if there was an accusation of copyright infringement, sparking outcry from web users around the world. The Crimes Act of this nation, which originally criminalized homosexuality, was modified to ban spanking, leading to a 2009 referendum where 87% of the population believed a "smack" should be legal. In 2006, this nation's (*) sign language was made an official language, adding to English and an aboriginal language made official in 1987. The first modern polity to give women the vote, for 10 points, identify this Pacific nation whose most famous piece of legislation is likely the 1840 Treaty of Waitangi between British colonists and the Maori.

ANSWER: New Zealand or Aotearoa

19. One spinoff of this gaming franchise includes minigames such as Snore War, where players aim to be the last one awake, and Sushi-Go-Round, where players attempt to eat as much money's worth of sushi as possible while avoiding wasabi bombs. Other spinoffs from this franchise include Trozei, a Tetris-style puzzle game, and an N64 photography-based game called (*) Snap. The original version of this game focused on its protagonist capturing the titular creatures in order to earn eight gym badges before challenging the Elite Four and eventually his rival Gary Oak, all while fending off the dastardly deeds of the evil Team Rocket. For ten points, name this franchise that recently saw the release of its HeartGold and SoulSilver editions and spawned a television series revolving around Ash Ketchum and his pet Pikachu.

ANSWER: **Pokemon** [or **Pocket Monsters**]

20. Note: location and title required. One holder of this position was pressured by a group called the "Bucktails", who opposed a president of a canal board from holding this office. That man, DeWitt Clinton, was the nephew of the first person to hold this position, George Clinton, who arranged several land deals with the Indians after the (*) Sullivan Expedition. During William Seward's brief time in this position, he helped reform women's prisons and opposed the anti-immigration measures planned by his state's largest port. Future presidents who held this position included Van Buren, Cleveland, and both Roosevelts. For 10 points, name this office that Eliot Spitzer resigned from after a prostitution scandal, a position currently held by David Paterson in Albany.
ANSWER: Governor of New York

21. This thinker's discovery of four different verb tenses led him to complain that Homer ordering the Muses to sing was inappropriate language to use in prayer. He found that every idea could have an argument both for it and against it, and he claimed to (*) teach people how to "make the weaker argument the stronger." He wrote the laws of the colony of Thurii, and his book *Concerning the Gods* showed enough agnosticism to get him permanently exiled from Athens. For ten points, name this pre-eminent Sophist, who claimed that, "Man is the measure of all things," and who shares his name with a Platonic dialogue about the possibility of teaching virtue at a school.

ANSWER: Protagoras

Bonuses

1. Evidence of early human civilization was found at the archaeological site of Gortyn, found here. For 10 points each: [10] Name this island that also had the city of Phaistos and its port of Malata.

ANSWER: Crete

[10] Originating in Crete during the Bronze Age, what civilization dominated there until a disaster devastated the island during the second millennium BCE?

ANSWER: Minoan

[10] The capital of Minoan culture was this city near modern-day Heraklion. The discovery of its ruins is credited to Arthur Evans, who also saw samples of Linear B script here.

ANSWER: Knossos

2. For ten points each, answer the following questions about potential new homes of NBA super-duperstar LeBron James:

[10] On July 1, 2010, LeBron becomes a free agent. Many have speculated that GM Donnie Walsh has been clearing cap space so that LeBron might join this team, which possesses the largest media market in the country.

ANSWER: New York Knicks [accept either]

[10] Another possible destination for LeBron is this team, recently purchased by the richest man in Russia, which may relocate to Brooklyn.

ANSWER: <u>New Jersey Nets</u> [accept either]

[10] Although a long-shot, this team is one of the few that has enough salary cap space to lure James into a local rivalry with Kobe Bryant.

ANSWER: Los Angeles Clippers [prompt on Los Angeles]

3. He described what would become his most famous work as "trivial" and "a piece for orchestra without music." For ten points each:

[10] Name this French composer best known for his one movement orchestral ballet *Bolero*.

ANSWER: Maurice Ravel

[10] Aside from the familiar opening flute solo, *Bolero* is known for its repeating percussion rhythm of eighth notes and triplets of sixteenth notes played by this instrument.

ANSWER: **Snare** drum [prompt on drum]

[10] Ravel's other well-known works include this solo piano composition dedicated to sewing machine heiress Winnaretta Singer, who was more than likely its namesake royalty despite being very-much alive at the time.

ANSWER: Pavane Pour Une Infante Défunte [or Pavane For A Dead Princess]

4. Its cover art features a cake being supported by a record-changer spindle which has the album playing on it underneath. For ten points each:

[10] Name this 8th studio album by The Rolling Stones, whose title track is a rather filthy example of the sex,drugs and rock and roll lifestyle of the late 60s.

ANSWER: Let it Bleed

[10] This last track off *Let It Bleed* was the only single to be released from the album. It's lyrics include a portion where the song is being sung to "Mr. Jimmy" in a Chelsea drug store and notes that, despite the title statement, "sometimes you just might find you get what you need."

ANSWER: You Can't Always Get What You Want

[10] Also on *Let It* Bleed is this first track that also titles a documentary about the Rolling Stones' notorious Altamont Speedway concert. The lyrics speak of seeking protection from a storm that is "threat'ning my very life today."

ANSWER: Gimme Shelter

5. This novel begins, "riverrun, past Eve and Adam's," which continues exactly from where this novel's final sentence is interrupted. For ten points,

[10] Name this circular mess of multi-lingual puns on death and rebirth, completed seventeen years after *Ulysses*.

ANSWER: Finnegan's Wake (prompt on Work in Progress)

[10] This hero of Finnegan's Wake is the husband of Anna Livia Plurabelle, and is probably a symbol for the city of Dublin. ANSWER: Humphrey Chimpden **Earwicker** (accept **H.C.E.**, **Here Comes Everybody**, or anything else with those intials)

[10] This husband of Nora and brother of Stanislaus wrote *Finnegan's Wake* at a time when he was not actually living in Dublin.

ANSWER: James Augustine Aloysius Joyce

- 6. For ten points each, answer the following questions about movies that were released yesterday.
- [10] This movie stars Ben Stiller as a man with a lot of time on his hands. The song "All My Friends" by LCD Soundsystem was playing pretty loudly in this movie's trailer.

ANSWER: Greenberg

[10] This movie, starring John Cusack and Craig Robinson tells the story of four guys who travel to a ski resort in the 1980's using the title device.

ANSWER: *Hot Tub Time Machine*

[10] This cartoon set in Viking times tells the story of Hiccup, who learns to fly around on the back of his new pet, Toothless. Craig Ferguson voices a Viking with a Scottish accent.

ANSWER: How to Train Your Dragon

7. For ten points each, answer these questions from thermodynamics:

[10] This state function, often denoted U, represents the sum of all chemical, vibrational, and other energies in a system.

ANSWER: Internal energy

[10] The statement that the change in internal energy is equal to the net heat and work added to a system describes what law of thermodynamics?

ANSWER: first law or conservation of energy

[10] The first law of thermodynamics can demonstrate that for an ideal isochoric ["eye-so-core-ick"] process, this quantity is equal to the change in internal energy.

ANSWER: **heat** or dQ

8. On an episode of Family Guy, Peter is forced to choose between watching Ricki Lake and this show. For ten points each:

[10] Name this show that stars Kelsey Grammer as the titular radio psychiatrist at KACL in Seattle, a spinoff of Cheers.

ANSWER: Frasier

[10] The cast of *Frasier* includes this actor, who plays Frasier's brother Niles Crane, a role which won him four Emmys for Best Supporting Actor.

ANSWER: David Hyde Pierce

[10] In addition to playing Frasier Crane on *Frasier* and *Cheers*, Grammer received an Emmy nomination for a guest spot as Frasier Crane on this sitcom that revolves around brothers Joe and Brian Hackett and their Nantucket-based airline.

ANSWER: Wings

- 9. Answer these questions pertaining to legal degrees for ten points each:
- [10] Also called a Bachelor of Laws, this is the traditional degree awarded to law students in Canada. Unlike the British degree of the same name, Canadians do not begin study towards this degree directly out of high school.

ANSWER: L.L.B. [or Legum Baccalaureus]

[10] This three year professional doctorate is the one commonly offered in the United States. Canadian schools have begun to offer it, though many American jurisdictions fail to recognize this version due to its emphasis on Canadian law.

ANSWER: **J**uris **D**octor

[10] To increase the universality of the Canadian J.D., several pairs of Canadian and American law schools now offer joint L.L.B./J.D. programs, including this University's Osgoode Hall Law School which partnered with NYU Law in 2005.

ANSWER: York University

- 10. Answer some questions about the love interests of everyone's favourite rotund plumber Mario for ten points each:
- [10] The most well-known of Mario's love interests is this princess who always seems to be in another castle. This pink-loving princess is a playable character in *Super Mario Bros. 2*, where she has the power to temporarily levitate.

ANSWER: Princess Peach [or Princess Toadstool]

[10] Mario seems to have a thing for royalty, as the Game Boy title *Super Mario Land* sees Mario attempt to rescue this princess of Sarasaland. Unlike Princess Peach, she is usually depicted with brown hair and a yellow and orange dress.

ANSWER: Princess **Daisy**

[10] Not all of Mario's love interests are princesses, you know. In *Donkey Kong*, Mario set out to rescue this woman also known as Lady, who would throw items like umbrellas for Mario to catch as Donkey Kong tried to pelt him with barrels.

ANSWER: **Pauline**

11. For ten points each, identify the following probabilistic distributions.

[10] What special case of the normal distribution is centred at mean zero and has variance of one?

ANSWER: standard normal distribution

[10] What name is given to a distribution where all points within a given space have the same probability and all points outside have probability zero?

ANSWER: uniform distribution

[10] What distribution is represented with a positive exponential distribution when lower than the mean, and a negative exponential when higher than the mean? It is continuous except at the mean.

ANSWER: **Laplace** distribution

12. Answer the following about rappers of the last decade for ten points each:

[10] This most well-known member of the St. Lunatics is known for using hooks based on schoolyard songs, such as in the line "I'm going down down baby yo street in a Range Rover" from his solo debut *Country Grammar*.

ANSWER: Nelly [or Cornell Haynes, Jr.]

[10] This rapper is perhaps as well known for being the cousin of rapper Calvin Broadus as he is for his collaborations on tracks like 50 Cent's 21 Questions and the heavily censored Shake That by Eminem.

ANSWER: Nate Dogg [or Nathaniel Hale]

[10] This female rapper's latest album *Persona* is, shall we say, different from what she's most recognized for these days, namely roles in musical films such as Mama Morton in 2002's *Chicago* and Motormouth Maybelle in 2007's *Hairspray*.

ANSWER: Queen Latifah [or Dana Owens]

13. It is the subject of the beginning of Acts chapter 9. For ten points each:

[10] Name this event wherein a certain Pharisee from Tarsus receives a message from God accompanied by a flash of light that left him blinded for three days.

ANSWER: The **conversion** of **Paul** [or **Saul**; accept clear-knowledge equivalents]

[10] Paul was headed to this city when he was converted by God. As he had done before, his objective in the trip to this city was to "enter the synagogue looking for people of 'the way."

ANSWER: Damascus

[10] Upon entering Damascus, Paul was greeted by this man, who God informed of Paul's arrival. When the two met, this man placed his hands on Paul and cured his blindness.

ANSWER: Ananias

14. Some of this company's games include *Rebel Assault* and *LOOM*. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this software developer that used the SCUMM game engine for several adventure games in the 1990s.

ANSWER: LucasArts

[10] This early LucasArts game stars Guybrush Threepwood as a pirate who uses root beer to defeat the ghost LeChuck. It spawned several sequels.

ANSWER: Secret of Monkey Island [but not Curse of or Escape from Monkey Island]

[10] In one scene in *Monkey Island*, Guybrush is thrown underwater while chained to a statue. He drowns unless you perform what simple, but unrealistic, action?

ANSWER: <u>pick up</u> the statue and carry it [accept equivalents, but not "push" or "pull"]

15. For 10 points each, answer the following questions about the Yuan dynasty:

[10] Travelling through Asia, Niccolo and Maffeo Polo, father and uncle to Marco, met which leader who asked them to become his envoys to the pope?

ANSWER: Kublai Khan [prompt on Khan]

[10] Kublai Khan took power after defeating this leader of the Mongols, his brother. He himself had succeeded his brother Mongke in 1260.

ANSWER: **Ariq Boke** or **Arigh Bukha** [both names required]

[10] Kublai Khan's second attempt at an invasion of Japan was lost after a typhoon, or *kamikaze*, destroyed the Yuan fleet in this strait near the island of Kyushu.

ANSWER: Tsushima

16. For ten points, identify the following violations you might get called for in volleyball:

[10] What would you get called for if you palm the ball upwards through sustained contact?

ANSWER: <u>lift</u>ing

[10] What error can be committed either by stepping over the backline when serving or over the centre line at any point in play?

ANSWER: foot fault

[10] The former foot fault also falls under what broader category that includes failing to clear the net when initiating attack? ANSWER: **service error** [prompt on service fault]

[10] Of the three, what former academic is the only one to actually lead the party into an election?

ANSWER: Stephane Dion

[10] Also a former academic, what leader famously said "Mr. Harper, your time is up" in 2009?

ANSWER: Michael Ignatieff

[10] Serving for only a few months, who was appointed interim leader of the Liberal Party immediately following Paul Martin's resignation?

ANSWER: Bill Graham

18. You know that movie Spice World? Answer these questions about the movie Spice World.

[10] This actor plays "Poirot" in a dream sequence where he finds Emma innocent of a murder even though she is holding a gun. Also he plays a Vicodin-popping doctor on the Fox Network.

ANSWER: Hugh Laurie

[10] This actor plays the girls' bus driver in *Spice World*. He played the delivery boy Eddie in *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* and the overweight Bob in *Fight Club*.

ANSWER: Meat Loaf (or Michael Lee Aday, or Marvin Lee Aday)

[10] This actor plays an annoying documentary filmmaker in *Spice World*. His other jobs have included appearing as Nightcrawler in the second X-Men movie and playing the emcee in *Cabaret* on Broadway.

ANSWER: Alan Cumming

19. This character has studied law, medicine, philosophy, and theology, but nothing excites him until he sees Gretchen leaving the cathedral. For ten points each:

[10] Name this killer of Valentine who can't answer the question, "How do you feel about religion?"

ANSWER: Faust (do not accept "Doctor Faustus")

[10] Thirty years before Goethe's *Faust*, this other German planned a never-finished Faust play with a happy ending. He tried to demonstrate the equality of Christianity, Islam, and Judaism in *Nathan the Wise*.

ANSWER: Gotthold Ephraim Lessing

[10] This other German wrote *Doktor Faustus* about the composer Adrian Leverkuhn, and he wrote *Lotte in Weimar* about the character from Goethe's *Sorrows of Young Werther*. He's most famous for *Death in Venice*.

ANSWER: Thomas Mann

20. A new twist for the 2009-10 season of this show is that contestants must get all the money they originally asked for. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this CBC reality show in which Canadian entrepreneurs make a sales pitch to five wealthy investors.

ANSWER: **Dragon's Den**

[10] This sour individual on *Dragon's Den* is usually the one who tells a pitchman how awful their idea is. He also appears on daily shows on BNN and CBC News Network, and has a set of high-commission but high-profile mutual funds.

ANSWER: Kevin O'Leary [he's referred to often enough as "Kevin", so accept it]

[10] This CBC news anchor hosts *Dragon's Den*. Last year, she also hosted a program about start-up small businesses called *Fortune Hunters*.

ANSWER: Dianne Buckner

21. For ten points each, answer the following questions on the sociology of work:

[10] Originating after the discovery of the assembly line, a system requiring mass consumption and mass production was named for which American inventor?

ANSWER: Henry Ford

[10] In Europe, Fordism is thought to have arisen after which theory and system of scientific management based on maximizing worker efficiency was instituted?

ANSWER: Taylorism

[10] Taylorism is based heavily on this principle, which while popular among economists leads to consequent de-skilling and dehumanisation of the workplace?

ANSWER: Division of labor
