1. Jacques Rossi wrote a handbook detailing his experiences with this system, the subject of the Vorkuta Uprising and the Kengir Uprising. This agency created the White Sea-Baltic Canal and operated the mines of the $(+)$ Kolyma region. Administered by the NKVD, this organization was compared to a vast (*) "archipelago" of individual islands by Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who documented the terrible conditions within it that led to fifteen million deaths. For 10 points, name this agency operating the forced labor camps of the Soviet Union.
ANSWER: the Gulag [or the Chief Administration of Corrective Labor Camps and Colonies; or Glavnoye upravleniye ispravityelno-trudovykh lagerey i koloniy; prompt on Soviet labor camps or equivalents]
2. This President was promoted to second lieutenant after the Battle of Antietam, and he won two terms as governor of his native state with the assistance of Mark ( + ) Hanna. This president was attacked in the de Lome letter. His Secretary of State, John Hay, referred to a conflict this president entered as "a ${ }^{(*)}$ splendid little war." That war was ended by the Treaty of Paris and secured the independence of Cuba. For 10 points, name this president who was assassinated by Leon (CHOL-gos) Czolgosz and oversaw the Spanish-American War.
ANSWER: William McKinley

3. The founder of this company attempted to lower shipping costs via the South Improvement Scheme. This company acquired Cheseborough Manufacturing, the creators of Vaseline, and a political cartoon shows a baby Theodore ( + ) Roosevelt wrestling with two snakes symbolizing this company. A series of articles published in McClure's magazine about this company was written by ${ }^{(*)}$ muckracker Ida Tarbell, and this company was broken up in 1911 in accordance with the Sherman Antitrust Act. For 10 points, name this company headed by John D. Rockafeller.
ANSWER: Standard Oil company
4. This ruler referred to his imprisonment as his time spent at "the University of Ham." He initially rose to power with the support of the Party of Order. This ruler received Nice and Savoy in exchange for forming an alliance in which he won the Battle of $(+)$ Solferino alongside the Sardinian forces of Victor Emmanuel II, expelling Austria from Italy. From 1850 to 1852, he served as president of the brief-lived (*) Second Republic. For 10 points, name this Emperor of France from 1852 to 1870 who was named for his uncle, another famous emperor.
ANSWER: Napoleon III [or Louis-Napoleon; prompt on Napoleon]
5. The Mandaeans believe that this man was the true Messiah. In Acts 19, followers of this man at Ephesus say they have never heard of the Holy Spirit. The Gospel of Matthew calls him an incarnation of (+) Elijah. This man's father Zechariah was unable to speak until Elizabeth gave birth to this figure. While subsisting on a diet of (*) locusts and honey, this person pointed out the "Lamb of God" who "takes away the sins of the world." Ffor 10 points, name this prophet, a cousin of Jesus whom Herod had beheaded, whose epithet refers to the ritual cleansing he performed.
ANSWER: John the Baptist [prompt on John]
6. This team lost the longest game in NFL history to the Dolphins in double overtime. As quarterback for this team, Len Dawson threw for one touchdown in a 35-10 loss to the Green Bay Packers in ( + ) Super Bowl I. Dawson and this team defeated a Minnesota Vikings team whose defense was nicknamed the 'Purple People Eaters'' in Super Bowl IV. Joe Montana retired after playing the 1994 season with $\left(^{*}\right)$ this team. For their roles in negotiating the (*) Paris Peace Accords that ended the Vietnam War, Le Duc Tho and this man were awarded Nobel Prizes. For 10 points, name this German-born Secretary of State under Presidents Nixon and Ford. ANSWER: Heinz Alfred "Henry" Kissinger

The formation of this country was precipitated by an electoral victory for the Awami League. Guerrilla leaders such as Zia ur-Rahman and the Kader Bahini student militants fought for this country's independence. Its first prime minister, killed in a 1975 coup, was Mujibur (+) Rahman. A 1991 cyclone killed 130,000 people here, and George Harrison organized a (*) concert for this country in 1971 in one of the first large benefit concerts. For 10 points, name this country that was formerly known as the province of East Pakistan until 1971.

This man praised youth as "not a time of life but a state of mind" in his "Day of Affirmation" speech delivered in South Africa. A photo of him shows him with busboy Juan Romero. Lyndon Johnson claimed this man asked Johnson three times to not accept the (+) vice presidential nomination in 1960. His support for Israel in the Six-Day War was given as the motive for his (*) assassination in the Ambassador Hotel by Sirhan Sirhan, which occurred shortly after he won the California Democratic primary in 1968. For 10 points, name this brother of John F. Kennedy.
ANSWER: Robert Francis Kennedy [or Bobby Kennedy; or RFK; prompt on Kennedy]
