It happens out of revenge for the death of $\left(^{*}\right)$ Patroclus, and the victim's body is dragged around by a chariot, saddening his wife, Andromache and his father, King Priam, who pays a ransom. For 10 points, name this event from the Iliad when a heroic Trojan prince is slain by the nearly invulnerable Achilles. ANSWER: death of Hector [or answers like the Hector-Achilles fight]
