TOSSUP 1

TOSSUP 2
It was not shown in the U.S., but this event received the second-largest worldwide television audience in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics. At the 1988 Seoul Olympics, it was the first event to sell out. Popular in east Asia, it was invented in the 1850 s by British officers in India, though it was later named after an English estate. For 10 points, name this racquet sport.

TOSSUP 3
It actually means a jelly doughnut, and in a famous gaffe, President John F . Kennedy announced that he was one of these in a well-known speech in Germany in 1961. For ten points, what is this term that in a different grammatical context also means a resident of a certain German city?

(Note: "Ich bin Berliner" means "I am a Berliner"
"Ich bin ein Berliner" means "I am a jelly doughnu=")

TOSSUP 4
He wrote a treatise on music, _De Institutione Musica_, that was a standard text until the Renaissance. Indeed, he saw himself as the schoolmaster of the West, planning to translate all of Plato and Aristotle into Latin, and to follow this with "a restoration of their ideas into a singie harmony". Unfortunately he didn't get very far before being executed by Emperor Theodoric. For 10 points, name this philosopher best known for a work written in prison, _The Consolation of Philosophy_.

TOSSUP 11
He was born in what's now Romania, grew up in what are now the Ukraine and Slovakia, and studied in Budapest. In his final years, he lived in New York, where he worked on transcribing Serbian and Croatian folk melodies. For ten points, name this Hungarian composer known for combining eastern European folk elements with a modern, atonal style.

TOSSUP 12
Jacques was the first to publish a paper using polar coordinates, and Jean was the actual discoverer of L'Hopital's rule as well as of the calculus of variations. Nicolaus first noted the St. Petersburg paradox in probability theory, while Daniel may be best known today for his law of hydrodynamics. For 10 points, name this illustrious family of Swiss mathematicians.

He won't reveal how much he is getting paid for his contract to develop a new sneaker for the Tretorn sporting-goods company, and meanwhile, his parents live lavishly in a large house complete with tennis court. For 10 points name this retired Swedish tennis star.

TOSSUP 16
This term was coined in 1925 by Robert Link of Rochester, New York, and described fringed ornaments, neckerchief slides, and other leather objects made by Boy Scouts. During the Great Depression, aldermen in New York City discovered that 8 city employees were being paid to teach people on relief how to make them. The resulting mini-scandal brought a new word into the American political lexicon. For ten points, give the term now used generally for a wasteful government project.

TOSSUP 17
Queen Elizabeth II is not the only monarch to reign over part of the western hemisphere. For ten points, identify the other monarch who reigns over the Caribbean islands of Bonaire, Aruba and Curacao, and who was crowned Queen of the Netherlands in 1980.

For 10 points name this cartoon character last seen in "Who Framed Roger Rabbit?".
