1. 3. Polyneices gathers six Greek war leaders and assaults this city ruled by his brother Eteocles in an Aeschylus play in part because of a curse on their father. For ten points, name this city, previously ruled by Oedipus.

4. While "ER" might mean "Emergency Room" to doctors and TV-watchers, to students of cellular biology, it instead abbreviates, for ten points, what cellular membrane system involved in the synthesis of proteins and lipids?

ANSWER: \_ENDOPLASMIC RETICULUM\_

5. Darn, shoot, frig -- these words are formed by changing a few of the sounds in an obscenity to make it more socially acceptable. This process is not unique to English. For ten points, in linguistic jargon, the type of word thus deformed has what name, which more generally refers to a socially forbidden practice?

ANSWER: \_TABOO\_ (accept taboo deformation)

6. The term "skid row" originated in this city. It was used to describe the path that forested logs would take as they were rolled down the city's steep hills on their way to lumber mills on Puget Sound and Lake Washington. For ten points, name this city, which is also known for its airplanes, salmon, progressive politics, and alternative bands.

Lee and his soldiers at Stone Mountain in Georgia. For ten points, name the sculptor who created the gigantic heads of four presidents at Mount Rushmore.

9. After NYU Law School and policy-making for the Department of Defense, he joined a DC law firm and was assigned to a client which was also concerned with bombs, blitzes and field position: the NFL. For ten points, name this man who, legal counsel to NFL Commisioner Peter Rozelle for more than 20 years, succeeded Rozelle in the commissioner's office, where he serves today.

10. Luxury shops in Mexico selling this food staple have recently been allowed to exceed government price controls. The standard price is 19 cents for a pack of 40, but shops lacking access to government-subsidized corn have been allowed to sell for as high as 36 cents a pack. Citizens have praised the whiter, smoother, tastier product that the more expensive shops produce. For ten points, name this 3000-year-old food.

For ten points, what book tells the story of this 60,000-mile-long safari through the world's oceans?

15. According to an apocryphal story, there is no Nobel Prize in Mathematics because this man had an affair with Nobel's wife. For ten points, name this Swedish mathematician.

16. The grandson of Solkar and son of Skon, his career included the treaty of Alpha Cygnus IX and the Coridan admission to the Federation. At the end of his career, he negotiated a historic treaty with the Legarans despite suffering from Bendii Syndrome, which necessitated a mind-meld with Jean-Luc Picard. For ten points, name this father of Spock.

17. He collected pictures of almost every president from John Quincy Adams to William McKinley. Samuel Morse taught him to take daguerreotypes, and he opened three studios by 1854. For ten points, name this photographer, who was bankrupted by his efforts to photograph the Civil War.

18. In its generalized form, it states that if f is a function from a finite set X to a finite set Y, for any positive integer k, if the order of X is greater than k times the order of y, then there exists a p in Y such that p is the image of at least k+1 distinct elements of X. For ten points, name this principle, first stated by Dirichlet, which also states that if n objects are to be placed in n-1 boxes, then 2 objects must be placed in 1 box.

19. After hosting the vice-presidential debate in early October, this Florida city was back in the news a few weeks later. Police officer Jim Knight fatally shot 18-year-old Tyron Lewis after Lewis supposedly tried to run Knight over in a routine traffic stop and a massive riot broke out. For ten points, name this city which shared its name with a major Russian city until 1914 and again since 1991.

20. She may have been originally a Cretan goddess of fertility. Regarded as a virgin, she demanded chastity from her female attendants and even her male devotees, such as Hippolytus. For ten points, who was this winner of the first Nobel Prize in Chemistry?

24. A pass between the cliffs of Mount Oeta and the Malic Gulf, it was an entrance into Greece from the north. In 480 BC the Persian king Xerxes was nearly thwarted by a much smaller Spartan army here, but a Greek turncoat led Xerxes's army around a poorly defended path to the rear of the Greek position. For ten points, in what battle of the Persian Wars were Leonidas and the Spartans thoroughly annihilated despite fighting bravely?

ANSWER: \_THERMOPYLAE\_

25. Also known as the "Falling Eagle" and the "Harp Star", this star is the fifth brightest in the sky and the brightest in the summer triangle. For ten points, name the brightest star in the constellation Lyra, which in twelve thousand years will be the next north pole star.

26. It involved fasting and prayer and was an essential part of the initiation into adulthood. In some versions, the youth would search for an object resembling an animal, or an animal that behaved in a significant way. In the most common form, an animal would take the youth on a journey and teach him songs. For ten points, name this Native American tradition in which a youth sought out his guardian spirit.
