1. This word comes from the Greek word for ignite, and it is the product of a solvolysis reaction between an alkyl halide and an alcohol. 3. Florida Southern College in Lakeland, Florida; the Johnson Wax office block in Racine, Wisconsin; the Guggenheim Museum of Art in New York City; the Robie House in Chicago; and the Imperial Hotel in Tokyo are, FTP, among the designs of what noted architect?

4. In his 20 s he worked aboard a French liner and lived in London, the United States, and France. In 1920, at the age of 30 , he was a founding member of the French Communist party. In the 1930s he lived mainly in Moscow and China, finally returning to his own country during World War II to fight first the Japanese and then the French. FTP, who was this first president of the republic of North Vietnam?

5. You must be at least 35 to become president of the United States, but a 23 year old was recently elected president of this San Francisco-based organization. FTP, Adam Werbach is the new president of what environmental group founded by John Muir?

ANSWER: the _SIERRA CLUB_
6. His one-act play "The Mid-Life Crisis of Dionysius," wherein the Greek god copes with turning 50, was included in his 1993 collection of short fictional pieces, "The Book of Guys." His other books include "We Are Still Married," "Leaving Home," and "Happy to Be Here." FTP, identify this radio personality and longtime host of "A Prairie Home Companion."

7. After a distinguished medical career, he was appointed master of Pembroke College, Oxford, in 1985. But his fame rests on what he did on the 6th of May 1954 in the space of 3 minutes, 59.4 seconds. FTP, identify this man, the first to break the four minute mile.

ANSWER: Roger _BANNISTER_
8. When molecules of this alkaloid absorb photons with frequencies in the UV range, the excited structures undergo radiactive decay. Almost insoluble in water, it dissolves readily in alcohol, and it makes tonic water glow under black light. FTP, identify this derivative of the Chinchona tree famed as a treatment for malaria.

ANSWER: _QUININE_
9. In religion he was a deist, as evidenced by his 1784 book "Reason, the Only Oracle of Man." An earlier book provided a narrative of his three years in British captivity. Before being captured at Montreal, however, he had helped the colonials to their first victory in the War of Independence by seizing Fort Ticonderoga. FTP, name this soldier whose chief cause was independence not so much from Great Britain as from New York and New Hampshire.

10. They were named after Liberty records executives AI Bennett and Si Warnoker and recording engineer Ted Keep. Their voices on television and in numerous records were supplied by songwriter Ross Bagdasarian. FTP, identify this high-pitched singing group managed by Bagdasarian's fictional alter-ego, David Seville.

ANSWER: (Alvin and) The _CHIPMUNKS_
11. The headquarters of the Medicine Bow National Forest, this city is the seat of Albany County. A nearby fort established in 1866 figures prominently in histories of the Overland Trail. FTP, identify this site of the University of Wyoming.

ANSWER: _LARAMIE_
12. In 1802, at the age of 32 , he stayed at a village near Vienna and produced a document not discovered until after his death, known as the "Heiligenstadt [HIGH-luh-gehn-shtahdt] Testament," in which he movingly described his increasingly serious deafness. FTP, who was this composer of the "Diabelli" Variations?

ANSWER: Ludwig van _BEETHOVEN_
13. Introduced in 1900, this value was created as a solution to the ultraviolet catastrophe of blackbody radiation. Named for the physicist who developed the idea of energy quantization, FTP, name this constant with a value of about 6.626 times 10 to the minus 34th Joules seconds.

ANSWER: _PLANCK'S_ Constant
14. Laurence M. Gould was his chief scientist and second-in-command, while Bernt Balchen was chief pilot, during his expedition of 1928-30. That was half a world away from his famous flight made in 1926 with Floyd Bennett. FTP, name this explorer and aviator, long believed to have been the first man to fly an airplane over both poles.

ANSWER: Richard Evelyn _BYRD_ [Host note: recent controversy has emerged over whether Byrd and Bennett actually turned back before reaching the North Pole in 1926]
15. A Hollywood "Love Goddess" of the 1940s, her pinup photo from "Life" magazine adorned the atomic bomb dropped on Bikini atoll. Among her six husbands were Victor Mature, Orson Welles, and Aly Kahn. FTP, identify this sizzling star of "Gilda" and "The Lady from Shanghai" and eventual victim of Alzheimer's disease.

ANSWER: Rita _HAYWORTH_, or Margarita Carmen _CANSINO_
16. It chronicles the life of its title character, who takes over the family farm after the suicide of her father, then works at a menial job in town, where she is seduced and abandoned with a child by the philandering Larry Donovan. Later, she returns to her brother's farm, marries Anton Cuzak, and achieves happiness. The story is seen through the eyes of a childhood friend, Jim Burden. FTP, identify this novel of Bohemian immigrants to the Nebraska frontier, authored by Willa Cather.

ANSWER: _MY ANTONIA_
17. She wasn't an Olympian, but she did break a women's record in 1996. The old record was held by Elena Kondakova. FTP, name this American biochemist who recently returned from 188 consecutive days in orbit aboard the Russian space station Mir.

ANSWER: Shannon _LUCID_
18. By her husband Asterius she bore a daughter, Crete. By Zeus, she bore three sons: Sarpedon, Rhadamanthys, and Minos. FTP, name this daughter of a Phoenician king carried from home by Zeus in the form of a white bull.

ANSWER: _EUROPA_
19. In the Old Testament, Ruth marries Boaz, but in the field of Anthropology she was only his student. FTP, what famous pupil of Franz Boas is remembered as the author of "The Chrysanthemum and the Sword" and "Patterns of Culture"?

ANSWER: Ruth _BENEDICT_
20. He was a Roman writer of the 2nd century who settled in Carthage. His great romance, the only complete Roman novel to have survived, is a satire on the vices of the age, especially those of the priesthood and of quacks. FTP, identify this author of "The Golden Ass."

ANSWER: Lucius _APULEIUS_
21. Its designer, a 27 year old Russian-American named Victor D. Brenner, used a photograph as his model. The "New York Times" editorialized against it, calling it "another ill-considered freak" of Teddy Roosevelt's will, and stating a preference for the old Indian Head. FTP, what is this common object introduced in 1909 to commemorate the centennial of its subject's birth?

ANSWER: _LINCOLN PENNY_ (or _LINCOLN_One_CENT_ Coin)
22. In humans, this organ has about 160,000 photosensors per square millimeter, while a hawk has about one million, making its vision about eight times sharper. Located near the attachment of the optic nerve to the retina, light from the center of the field of vision falls on, FTP, what area of the eye, the densest region of rods and cones on the retina.

23. In the 1940s she documented the forced relocation of Japanese-Americans from the West Coast and later covered the United Nations conference in San Francisco. But she is best remembered for earlier work, such as "The Migrant Mother," her portrait of a gaunt, impoverished housewife. FTP, identify this Farm Security Administration photographer.

24. It was invented by Kallinakos, a Hellenized Syrian, and probably saved Constantinople from being taken by Arabs in 678 and again in 717. The panic it induced was as effective as the actual damage it did in burning sailors and wooden ships. FTP, identify the two word name by which we remember this first known chemical warfare agent.

ANSWER: _GREEK FIRE_
25. Value Rent A Car, Inc. is a subsidiary company of this corporation, whose American headquarters is in Cypress, California, but whose international headquarters is in Tokyo. FTP, identify this Japanese automobile manufacturer whose plant in Normal, Illinois is the focus of a current lawsuit, the largest sexual harassment suit in history.

ANSWER: _MITSUBISHI_ Motors Corporation (also accept: Mitsubishi Motor Sales of America, Inc.)
26. Found in both fresh and marine environments, these protists are always symmetrical and can reproduce both sexually and asexually. Their chloroplasts contain carotenoids, giving them a yellow or brown color, and they often deposit silicon in their cell walls, leading to their diverse geometric shapes. FTP, name these members of Phylum Chrysophyta, whose name is suggestive of two basic units of matter.

27. Much of his poetry deals with the rural life of his childhood and with the political troubles that have kept his native land divided. Some of his works include "Field Work," "Wintering Out", and "The Haw Lantern." FTP, identify this Irish poet and winner of the 1995 Nobel Prize for literature.

28. Before the current system employing ping-pong balls, the NBA employed a simple coin flip to determine the first pick in its annual draft. The most momentous coin flip of them all may have been that of 1969, when the Phoenix Suns lost out to the Milwaukee Bucks for the right to draft, FTP, what dominating UCLA center?

ANSWER: Lew _ALCINDOR_ (also accept: Kareem _ABDUL-JABBAR_)
29. This city fell to guerilla forces in the spring of 1992. It was taken by Arabs in the 7th century, by Persians under Nadir Shah in 1738, and by British armies in 1839 and 1879. It succeeded Kandahar as national capital in 1773. FTP, identify this city strategically wedged between mountains commanding approaches to the Khyber Pass.

ANSWER: _KABUL_
30. This engineer designed the world's first four engine aircraft in 1913, and emigrated to the United States six years later. He then built several flying boats, including the "American Clipper," but is best remembered for his VS-300. FTP, identify this Kiev-born aeronautical engineer and inventor of the first working helicopter.

31. They can be dental, alveolar, bilabial, palatial, or velar, and are either stopped or fricative. FTP, what are these linguistic articulations of which in the Roman alphabet there are 21, and sometimes 20 ?

32. Hugh de Merville, William de Tracy, Reginald Fitzurse, and Richard le Breton were the four knights who were led to his murder by the king's impetuously voiced wish to be rid of "this turbulent priest." FTP, identify this victim of an 1170 homicide, who was canonized three years later.
