FTP, give the last name of this husband and wife research team, who published "Motion Study" in 1911.

Born at his family's estate, Yasnaya Polyana, this soldier, schoolmaster, libertine, moralist, and champion of the common man turned to the written word as his chief avenue for exploring the meaning of life. Some works were based on his experiences as a soldier in the Crimean War. FTP, name his man who died in the home of a train master, whose most famous work is an epic with over 500 characters.

A: Leo TOLSTOI

5

He abandoned his law career in 1878 to study experimental techniques in measuring reasoning ability and other higher mental processes. Director of the Sorbonne from 1895 to 1911, he founded

L'Annie Psychologique, the first French journal devoted to psychology. FTP, name this French psychologist who, along with Theodore Simon, developed highly influential scales for the measurement of intelligence in children.

A: Alfred BINET

While attending the Leipzig Conservatory, he suffered a severe attack of pleurisy from which he never really recovered. He married his cousin in 1867, and between 1867 and 1901 he wrote ten collections of "Lyric Pieces," which reveal the native folk tradition of his compositions. Today there is a yearly competition solely for playing his Piano Concerto in A Minor. FTP, name this composer, a founder of the Norwegian nationalist school of music and composer of "String"

A: Edvard GRIEG

Quartet in G Major" and "Peer Gvnt."

Modern species of animals in this phylum contain three distinct body zones: a head foot, a visceral mass, and a mantle. A characteristic organ is the radula, which can scrape off algae for food and in some species, and can be used in combat. FTP, name this animal, whose three modern classes are the bivalves, gastropods, and cephalopods. A: MOLLUSKs or MOLLUSCA

10

Born and raised in St. Louis, she married at 19 and settled down in Cloutieville in the bayou, the setting of many of her stories. Her first novel, "At Fault," was published in 1890. FTP, name this woman, whose attitudes toward Catholicism were partly responsible for her lack of writing and publishing after "The Awakening" in 1899. A: Kate CHOPIN

The rules governing them are found in a book called the Enchiridion (en-keer-id-ee-on). They come in two varieties: partial and plenary. They are often granted for the recitation of certain prayers. FTP, name these items which Martin Luther accused the Catholic Church of selling in his 95 Theses.

This 17th-century amateur scientist studied blood cells, teeth scrapings, muscle fibers and stagnant matter. Somewhat ahead of his time, he opposed the notion that living things could arise from dead matter. FTP, name this Dutch father of microbiology, who used lenses with magnifying powers up to 270 diameters.

A: Anton von LEEUWENHOEK (LAY ven hoke)

This river flows northeast for nearly 3000 miles and empties into the Arctic Ocean. Along its middle course, it flows through a region inhabited by the Yakuts. Gold is mined along two of this river's chief branches. FTP, name this river, the chief waterway for a large chunk of eastern Siberia.

A: LENA river

14 Its premiere was held in DuBois, Pennsylvania, at 19 miles away the theater closest to the town where it was set. This 1993 film, shot mostly in Illinois, was a romantic comedy describing a Pittsburgh news team's very long assignment to an annual festival. FTP, name this film, in which Chris Elliott, Andie MacDowell, and Bill Murray spend some time in Punxsutawney.

Despite harsh opposition from more conservative legislators from the western part of this country, a strict gun control law was passed. In 1995 the government officially announced a tougher stance on immigration. This country voluntarily divested itself of nuclear weapons, passed a gay rights law, and has recently resumed foreign aid to Cuba. The three instrumentalists in this band first played together backing Donovan on the single "Hurdy Gurdy Man." All were session musicians, one working as a producer and arranger, another as a guitarist on records by the Kinks and the Who. In fact, Keith Moon gave them their moniker, which, come to think of it, sounds much cooler than "The New Yardbirds." FTP identify this British foursome, who broke up in 1980 after the death of drummer John Bonham.

A: LED ZEPPELIN

17

As consul in 107 BCE, he broke the Roman tradition that armies should only be recruited from men from the five classes of centuries, and was able to assemble a dedicated army to subdue Jugurtha, King of Numidia. FTP, name this general, champion of the populares, mentor of Caesar, and rival of Sulla.

A: Gaius MARIUS

18

He worked at the Royal Observatory in Paris from 1672 to 1679, but later returned to his native country, where he held a professorship in astronomy until his death in 1710. He noticed that the intervals between successive eclipses were shorter when Jupiter and the earth moved closer together, and longer when they moved apart. He attributed this difference to light travel times, and while his estimate of the speed of light was short by a third, he laid the foundations for further study on the velocity of light. FTP, name this Danish astronomer who is not Tycho Brahe.

A: Ole or Olaus ROMER

19

A rarity amongst his contemporaries, this artist was formally educated. He suffered from Alzheimer's and was an alcoholic in his later years. He often used woman as centerpieces in his paintings, and like Warhol, a favorite subject was Marilyn Monroe. FTP, name

this man, who along with Jackson Pollock and Mark Rothko, formed the "New York School" and who recented passed away at age 92.

A: Willem DE KOONING

20

During WWII, this woman and a collaborator developed and patented a system to prevent the US's radio-controlled torpedoes from being jammed by the Germans--a system later utilized by everything from military radios to cordless phones. She is better known, however, for the work she did in her "day job." FTP, name this originator of "spread-spectrum" or "frequency-hopping" technology, who also starred in such films as "Ecstasy," "Samson and Delilah," and "Ziegfield Girl."

A: Hedy LAMARR

21

This country population is 85% European descent and the nation consists of 2 large mountainous islands and numerous scattered smaller islands. A wide variety of vegetables, cereals, and fruits are produced in the Canterbury Plain, the chief farming region. FTP, name this nation located 1500 miles east-southeast of Australia. A: NEW ZEALAND

22

Born in 1865, he has brought excitement and realism into the realm of English storytelling through short stories, poems and travelogues. He covered the Boer War and World War I for English papers and wrote stories and verses for children. FTP, name this man who, late in life, embarked upon a scintillating autobiography, "Something of Myself," which was published posthumously, known for his Just-so Stories.

A: Rudyard KIPLING

23

He is now a law professor at Virginia, the third party he attempted to found in his home state having faltered. He first made his name as a fair-minded moderate Republican sitting on the Watergate Committee before moving on to the Senate. He blames his own party for his loss to Democrat Joseph Lieberman in 1988. As governor, he became unpopular when he championed a state income tax. FTP, identify this third-party former governor of Connecticut. A: Lowell P. WEICKER

2. Paraguyan dictator Francisco Solano Lopez had no idea what he was getting into when in 1863 he decided to meddle in a civil war in Uruguay. Things got worse when he decided to demand the right to place troops in Argentina for his invasion of the Mato Grosso. The result was that in 1865, Brazil, Argentina, and Uruguay all declared war on Parguay. As a result, let's just say that Paraguay is a lot smaller then it used to be. FTP identify this 19th Century South American war, sometimes known simply as the Paraguayan War. A: War of the TRIPLE ALLIANCE (prompt on Paraguayan War for an early buzz)

A summa cum laude graduate of Macalester College in 1968, he was almost immediately drafted into the army to serve in the Vietnam War. Although he was opposed to the war, he received a Purple Heart earned in action near My Lai. His novel "If I Die in a Combat Zone, Box Me Up and Ship Me Home" is a memoir of a soldier in combat. FTP, name this author, whose most famous novel, "Going After Cacciato," won the National Book Award in 1979. A: William Timothy O'BRIEN

26

Originally published in four separate parts, the first three were each composed in about ten days and appeared in 1883 and 1884, but there was no public edition of the fourth part until 1892. In the book, the main character is 30 years old when he leaves his home for the mountains. FTP, name this book, one of Nietzsche's most popular. A: THUS SPOKE (SPAKE) ZARATHUSTRA or ALZO SPRACH ZARATHUSTRA

Freud was one of his students, and his use of hypnosis in an attempt to discover the basis for hysteria stimulated Freud's interest in the psychological origins of neuroses. Another name for neurogenic arthropathy bears his name.

A: Jean-Martin CHARCOT

Freud's closest friend, it is believed that Freud's belief in human bisexuality, his idea of erotogenic zones on the body, and his imputation of sexuality to infants may well have begun development through their friendship.

Wilhelm FLIESS
