1. Only humans and armadillos are susceptible to it, and it is classified by its symptoms and histopathology into three classes. Killing too many of its bacilli too quickly causes systemic ENL reactions in patients, so cortosteroids as well as the drugs dapsone and clofazimine are used in treatment. FTP, identify this skin and nervous disease whose bacillus was first identified in 1874 by Gerhard Hansen.

2. Wellington described him as the most extraordinary compound of talent, wit, buffoonery, obstinacy, and good feelings. As a young man, he supported Catholic Emancipation, perhaps because he had secretly married the Catholic Maria Fitzherbert. In 1795, however, he divorced to marry Caroline of Brunswick, and when he became regent in 1811, he abandoned support for George Fox, instead embracing Lord Liverpools Tory government. FTP, identify this fourth Hanoverian monarch.

Answer: _George IV_

3. The Director of the National Anti-Pornography Office calls it the enemy of science, civilization, atheism, and dialectical materialism. Founded in 1992 by a government clerk, it claims 100 million members and combines Buddhism, Taoism, and qigong [CHEE-gong] breathing exercises. FTP, identify this religious movement founded by Li Hongzhi whose members are the victims of a recent crackdown by the Chinese government.

Answer: Falun Gong

4. A friend of Niccolo Paganini, he, himself, was a skilled violinist. He won the Prix de Rome for his _The Envoys from Agamemnon_, and throughout his life he led the neoclassical school by fusing the styles of Raphael and David. Well-known for his portraits including a popular canvas of the Duc dOrleans, he preferred to paint on mythological and historical themes. FTP, identify this artist of _Apotheosis of Homer_ and _Turkish Women at the Bath_.

Answer: Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres

5. Not coincidentally, he shares his name with the founder of the martial art Goju-ryu. A member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the 100th Battalion, he won the Congressional Medal of Honor for his service in the Pacific. He returned home, however, to find that his wife had died in an internment camp, and he only returned to Japan to visit his dying father and confront his enemy, Sato. FTP, identify this mentor to Daniel LaRusso, a character played by Pat Morita.

Answer: Mr. Miyagi (from The Karate Kid and its crappy sequels)

6. It was planned as part three of a trilogy whose parts were to discuss physical bodies, human nature, and bodies politic, respectively. Published in 1651 and dedicated to Francis Godolphin, it proposes that because life is solitary, poor, nasty, brutish, and short, individuals must surrender their liberty to a Sovereign who will provide protection. FTP, identify this treatise by Thomas Hobbes.

Answer: Leviathan

7. At the request of Horace Walpole, he wrote the _Ode on the Death of a Favorite Cat Drowned in a Tub of Goldfishes_ to honor Walpoles recently deceased kitty, Selima. Born in 1716, he spent most of his life at Cambridge, where he became a professor and, in 1754, wrote _The Progress of Poesy_. Three years later he was invited to become poet laureate, but he declined the position. FTP, identify this author most famous for his _Elegy Written on a Country Churchyard_.

Answer: Thomas _Gray_

8. It began on March 21, 1918 when German forces under General Ludendorff led a drive toward Amiens. The assault was successful at first until Ferdinand Foch took control of separate British, French, and American armies and halted the German advance on March 30. FTP, identify this battle also known as the Battle of Saint Quentin, which is the second of two World War I battles named for a river in northern France.

Answer: Battle of _Second Somme_ (Prompt on just _Somme_ or on _Michael Offensive)

9. Designed from 1967 to 1971, it is a compiled, structured language built upon ALGOL which simplifies syntax while adding data types and structures such as subranges, files, and sets. In the early 1980s, its author combined it and Modula 2 to create the Lilith workstation, but today its popularity is waning as programmers increasingly prefer object oriented programming languages. FTP, identify this computer language designed by Niklaus Wirth and named for a famous Frenchman.

Answer: Pascal

10. Perhaps its most famous performance was at the 1966 Bayreuth Festival with Wolfgang Windgassen and Birgit Nilsson in the title roles. It premiered in 1865, and its supporting roles include Brangane, a lady-in waiting, and Melot, an evil knight. In it, a knight of Cornwall sails to Ireland to bring home a wife for King Marke, but falls in love with her, and can never have her until their liebestod or love-death. FTP, identify this music drama by Richard Wagner.

Answer: Tristan Und Isolde

11. Only Louis XIV remembers this mans criminal past, but even then only after this man has driven Damis from his fathers home, ignored the temperate wisdom of Cleante, nearly ended the betrothal of Marrianne to Valere, tried to seduce Elmire, and persuaded Monsieur Loyal to arrest Orgon, his wealthy patron whom he has framed for treason and nearly cuckolded. FTP, identify this title religious hypocrite from a play by Moliere.

Answer: _Tartuffe_

12. Its important cities include Kamina and Likasi, and it is rich in copper, uranium, and other minerals. In 1977, it was invaded by Angolan rebels, but Belgian and French troops restored order in 1978. 18 years before, under the leadership of Moise Tshombe, it had seceded from the Democratic Republic of Congo, but was forcibly reunited with the country in 1963. FTP, identify this administrative region of the Democratic Republic of Congo with capital at Lubumbashi.

Answer: _Katanga_ or _Shaba_

13. All that is known of his life comes from his own writings and the letters which Pliny the Younger wrote him. He was born about 55 AD, and he became consul in 97 and then proconsul of Asia. His earliest known work is the _Dialogue on Orators_, and most of his writing criticizes the emperors and applauds military virtues, such as those possessed by his father-in-law, Agricola, who had led campaigns in Britain. FTP, identify this Roman historian, author of the Germania and the Annals.

Answer: Cornelius Tacitus

14. On his chest is the curl of hair, Shrivatsa, and around his neck he wears the auspicious jewel Kaustubha. He sleeps on the great serpent Sheesha and rides the half bird-half man, Gandara. His weapons include the sword, Nadaka, the bow, Sarnga, and a mace and discus which he won by defeating Indra. FTP, identify this Hindu deity who lives in Vaikuntha with his wife Lakshmi and has returned to Earth in the form of 9 avatars.

Answer: _Vishnu_

15. Written in 1958, it is its authors first novel, and is set in the village of Umuofia. It takes its title from the W. B. Yeats poem, _The Second Coming_, and its main character fears he will become like his father Unoka, a drunk and debtor, so to prove his manliness, he beats one of his wives during the Week of Peace, executes his adoptive son, Ikemefuna, and murders a white missionary. FTP, identify this novel about the insecure Ibo warrior Okonkwo written by Chinua Achebe.

Answer: _Things Fall Apart_

16. This sports first athlete to appear on the cover of _Sports Illustrated_ was Joe Alston. Taking its name from the Duke of Beauforts estate, its formal rules were adopted in 1905 after one player spurned tradition by removing his tuxedo jacket mid-game. It is played in a 40 by 20 foot rectangular court, and games go to 15 points for men and 11 for women. FTP, identify this sport, played with a light racket and shuttlecock.

Answer: _badminton_

17. Rarely, it is called Bunugula or Toliman. It is visible only from latitudes south of about 25 degrees. Its two brightest stars have respective apparent magnitudes -0.01 and 1.33 and orbit each other with a period of 80 years. Its C star, which is so faint that astronomers did not discover it until 1915, has apparent magnitude 11.05 and orbits its companions every million years. FTP, identify this star system also called Rigil Kent whose C star, Proxima, is the closest to our solar system.

Answer: Alpha Centauri

18. Written in both free and formal verse, it follows two soldiers, Jack Ellyat from Connecticut and Clay Wingate from Georgia. Jack fights at Bull Run and Gettysburg, is captured, but escapes and impregnates Melora Vilas who travels campground to campground to find him; Clay falls in love with war widow Lucy Weatherby, but returns home to marry Sally Dupre. FTP, identify this Pulitzer Prize-winning epic by Stephen Vincent Benet.

Answer: John Browns Body

19. In 1897, he was appointed to fill a vacant Senate seat, and a year later he won election to a full term. Born in 1837, he became a wholesale grocer, and began his career in politics by managing John Shermans unsuccessful bid for the Republican presidential nomination. Eight years later, he did secure the nomination for another protege of his, William McKinley. FTP, identify this political boss from Ohio, nicknamed Uncle Mark.

Answer: Marc(us) _Hanna_

20. In 1672, the Synod of Jerusalem confirmed it as central to the faith of the Orthodox Church. More than 450 years earlier at the Fourth Lateran Council, the Catholic Church had adopted it, and the Council of Trent reconfirmed its importance. Justified by Luke, Chapter 22 and Aristotelian theories of matter, it was most elaborately formulated by Thomas Aquinas. FTP, identify this dogma which says that, in the Eucharist, the bread and wine become the body and blood of Jesus.

Answer: transubstantiation

21. One is Korean War vet who goes insane after searching for Quality, is given electroshock therapy, and then takes a cross-country trip with his son. The other is an Athenian who wants to take a walk and memorize a speech by Lysias, but has to talk to Socrates about the soul instead.
