Bonuses

1. For ten points each, name these TV series with recurring professional wrestler appearances:

1. Chris Jericho has been a contributor to this VH-1 series whose recurring segments have included "The Sizzler," "Five Good Reasons," and "Doug Benson: Pop Culture Bachelor." **ANSWER:** *Best Week Ever*

2. Former WWE Diva Stacy Keibler made a couple of appearances as Lindsay, the fiancee of the title actor's father-in-law, Dr. Vic Palmero.

ANSWER: <u>George Lopez</u> (accept "The George Lopez Show")

3. Big Van Vader appeared as the father of Frankie the Enforcer, a bully at John Adams High. **ANSWER:** <u>Boy Meets World</u>

2. Identify these failed hand-held video game systems for ten points each.

1. Game Boy co-designer Gunpei Yokoi tragically died in a car crash just over a year after resigning from Nintendo due to the failure of this system that projected 3D images in red and black and was shunned due to eye strain in players, among other reasons

ANSWER: Virtual Boy

2. This Atari handheld predated the Game Gear to be the first hand-held with a color screen, but even with the ability to link up to 17 other systems, it was slaughtered in sales by Nintendo's Game Boy.

Answer: Atari Lynx

3. While the Lynx may have jumped ahead of the curve with a color screen, Tiger took a step back when they released this system with a monochrome screen in 1997. It still had several unique features, including a touch-screen and, as the name would indicate, the ability to connect to the Internet through an exclusive ISP using an add-on cartridge.

3. Identify these teams of filmmaking brothers for ten points each.

1. They worked on the scripts of *The Invasion* and *V for Vendetta*, but the upcoming *Speed Racer* film will be their first directorial work since *The Matrix* trilogy.

ANSWER: Larry and Andy Wachowski

2. These brothers, who made a splash with *Menace II Society*, haveni; ¹/₂t directed a feature since 2001's *From Hell*.

ANSWER: Albert and Allen Hughes

3. This pair directed *American Pie* and *About a Boy* before apparently splitting up, cinematically speaking.

ANSWER: Chris and Paul Weitz

4. They started a tradition that, unfortunately, has resulted in too many shoulda-been-outtakes reaching our ears. Identify these classic double albums of the 1960s for ten points each.

1. The first known double rock album was this signature 1966 offering by Bob Dylan with tracks including *Just Like A Woman* and *I Want You*.

ANSWER: Blonde on Blonde

2. Two months after *Blonde on Blonde* Frank Zappa & the Mothers of Invention released their debut album -- 4 sides of pop satires, protest tunes, and avant-garde weirdness. A decade and change later, the band Chic would use this two-word phrase as a call to the dance floor in one of their disco classics.

ANSWER: Freak Out!

3. The final Jimi Hendrix Experience album, featuring his version of *All Along The Watchtower* as well as *Crosstown Traffic*, it later lent its name to a New York studio Hendrix created but sadly never got to use.

ANSWER: Electric Ladyland

5. Given a description, identify the following cocktails with something superficial in common, for ten points each.

1. A quarter fluid ounce of Bailey's is layered with a half ounce of amaretto and topped with whipped cream. To drink it, one must pick it up with the mouth and tilt the head back to drink it.

Answer: <u>Blow Job</u>

2. Usually served on the rocks or as a shooter, the IBA specified ingredients for this treat is 1 part Cointreau, 1 part Bailey's Irish Cream and 1 part Grand Marnier.

ANSWER: Orgasm

3. Although this is a general term for a multi-layered drink, an example of a recipe for one is half ounce layers of grenadine, yellow chartreuse, creme de Yvette, green creme de menthe, green chartreuse and brandy, and for heaven's sake, don't mix it.

ANSWER: Pousse cafe [poos ka-FAY]

6. For ten points each, name these highly-drafted running backs who went nowhere in the NFL:

1. This Penn State running back missed his first season with a torn ACL after the Bengals took

him first overall in '95.

ANSWER: Ki-Jana Carter

2. A torn ACL cost this player almost half of his rookie season. The Bears shocked experts by taking him fifth in 1998.

ANSWER: Curtis Enis

3. This second-generation NFL player was drafted third out of the University of Miami by his father's former team, the Houston Oilers, in 1987. He amassed 1,195 rushing yards over six seasons.

ANSWER: Alonso Highsmith

7. It includes the short stories collected in *The Past Through Tomorrow* and was continued in the novel *Time Enough for Love*. For ten points each:

1. Name this collection of related stories dealing with the next few centuries of humanity which was nominated in 1966 for the Hugo Award for Best All-Time Series.

ANSWER: Future History

2. Name the author of the Future History series as well as *Stranger in a Strange Land*. **ANSWER:** Robert <u>Heinlein</u>

3. Several organizations in the series are named for this entrepreneur who appears in the novel *To Sail Beyond the Sunset*. He first appeared in the short story "Requiem" where he dies fulfilling his dream to go to the Moon and is the title character of "The Man Who Sold the Moon". **ANSWER:** D(elos) D(avid) Harriman

8. For ten points each, name these people who played adults in the film *Cruel Intentions*.

1. Ryan Phillippe's character, Sebastian, tries to seduce Reese Witherspoon's character while she is staying with Sebastian's aunt, played by this veteran actress who won an Oscar for playing Nurse Ratched.

ANSWER: Louise Fletcher

2. This Tony Award-winning actress played the mother of Selma Blair's character. She won an Emmy as Maryanne on *Cybill*.

ANSWER: Christine Baranski

3. The film opens with Sebastian seeing a therapist played by this actress, whose 10 Emmy nominations include work on *Love, Sidney, Sisters*, and *Huff*. She was cast partly because she had appeared in *Dangerous Liaisons*.

ANSWER: Swoosie Kurtz

9. For ten points each, name the cartoon whose title characters are or were named:

- 1. Bubbles, Blossom, and Buttercup
- Answer: The Powerpuff Girls
- 2. Modo, Throttle, and Vinnie
- Answer: <u>Biker Mice from Mars</u>
- 3. Ren, Ioz [EYE-oz], and Tula

ANSWER: The Pirates of <u>Dark Water</u>

10. Successful films turned unsuccessful TV shows; a phenomenon as common as weeds. For ten points each, name these shows from the 1990 mini-peak of this phenomenon.

1. Nascent Brat Pack members starred in the 1983 film adaptation of a young adult novel; Fox had less success in 1990 with their version, starring a bunch of nobodies, though the cast did feature Billy Bob Thornton.

ANSWER: The <u>Outsiders</u>

2. The 1988 Mike Nichols film garnered 5 Oscar nominations; the NBC series replaced Melanie Griffith with Sandra Bullock and the other stars with nobody... and lasted a dozen episodes.

Answer: <u>Working Girl</u>

3. Not to be left out, CBS took a 1989 John Candy vehicle and replaced Candy with Kevin Meaney. Results were predictable, but it did make it a full season, unlike the other two answers. **ANSWER:** <u>Uncle Buck</u>

11. For ten points each, name these Tony Award winners for Best Musical.

1. In 2006, "The Color Purple" and "The Wedding Singer" lost the award to this musical about the lives of The Four Seasons.

ANSWER: Jersey Boys

2. In 1958, "West Side Story" lost the award to this musical with music and lyrics by Meredith Wilson and a book by Wilson and Franklin Lacey.

ANSWER: The Music Man

3. This was the first winner for Best Musical in 1949 and was responsible for the only Tony Awards won by musician and lyricist Cole Porter.

ANSWER: Kiss Me, Kate

12. For ten points each, name these coaches who are finalists for the Basketball Hall of Fame class of 2007:

1. After amassing 429 wins in 19 seasons at Mississippi, he led the Houston Comets to WNBA titles in the franchise's first four seasons.

ANSWER: Van Chancellor

2. He was the first man to lead four different schools to the NCAA tournament, including Creighton and Arkansas.

ANSWER: Eddie Sutton [The other two schools are Kentucky and Oklahoma State.]

3. He made the NCAA tournament in all but one of his 15 seasons at Kansas before returning to coach his alma mater North Carolina.

ANSWER: Roy Williams

13. Identify the following infomercial personalities who are not Ron Popeil from descriptions, for ten points each.

1. Inventor and proponent of neuroassociative conditioning, this motivational speaker's programs include "Get the Edge!" and "Unlimited Power: the new Science of Personal Achievement". **ANSWER:** Tony <u>Robbins</u> (or Anthony J. <u>Mahavorick</u>)

2. "America's Personal Trainer", one of his more memorable infomercials made the claim that users of his Gazelle Glider could burn up to 1000 Calories per hour.

ANSWER: Tony Little

3. His sales-pitching career began on the Atlantic City Boardwalk selling "Washmatik" portable washing devices, and he has since advertised other cleaning products such as Kaboom!, Orange Glo and Oxiclean.

Answer: Billy Mays

14. Answer questions about 2007 movies mentioned in a "Small Town News" bit from the *Late Show with David Letterman* for ten points each.

1. Kevin Costner played against type in this underperforming late spring release as a schizophrenic serial killer. Dane Cook gets killed in it, so that should qualify it as a comedy.

ANSWER: Mr. Brooks

2. Harold Ramis played a happily expectant grandfather and Joanna Kerns played a hesitant expectant grandmother in this summer 2007 hit that featured the Apatow girls as expectant cousins. **ANSWER:** <u>Knocked Up</u>

3. Despite the mega-watt smiles of Emma Roberts and Tate Donovan, this movie based on a classic detective character was beaten 9 to 1 at the box office by the Silver Surfer for the June 17th

weekend.

Answer: <u>Nancy Drew</u>

15. Name these card games that are primarily seen in literature and old tv shows and movies for ten points each.

1. A partners tricktaking game that uses a full deck, it is still played in Britain. The winning side scores 1 point for every hand above 6 that they take. The "Long" version is played to 9 points and is usually played with honours.

ANSWER: Whist

2. This game is played with a 48-card deck of cards from 9 to ace. Cards are traded between teammates to create melds, including the title meld of a jack of spades and a queen of diamonds. Afterwards, tricks are taken.

ANSWER: Pinochle

3. Played on a layout called a bank, this simple gambling game, a favorite of Doc Holliday, involved betting on which card would appear next.

Answer: Faro

16. For ten points each, name these fusions of jazz and rap:

1. Consisting of Butterfly, Doodlebug, and Ladybug, this act released the 1993 album *Reachin' (A New Refutation of Time and Space)* which included the single "Rebirth of Slick (Cool Like Dat)". **ANSWER:** <u>Digable Planets</u>

2. This act made use of jazz samples and a guest spot by bassist Ron Carter in its influential 1991 alternative hip hop album *The Low End Theory*.

ANSWER: A Tribe Called Quest

3. Taking its name from a pseudonym used by Cannonball Adderley, this Branford Marsalis project has included the talents of singer Frank McComb and rapper 50 Styles: the Unknown Soldier.

ANSWER: Buckshot LeFonque

17. In figure skating, this is done when the skater, on a straight or bent leg, spins while holding the other leg at hip level in an arabesque position, paralell to the ice. FPTE:

1. Give the animal name for this type of spin.

ANSWER: Camel

2. The flying camel spin, where a jump from the forward outside edge leads to a back camel, is also named for this 1948 and 1952 Olympics gold medalist in men's singles, who is credited with

its invention.

ANSWER: Dick Button

3. A camel in which the torso and free leg face upwards rather than towards the ice is known as this sort of camel.

ANSWER: layover

18. Identify these films that feature the Hoover Dam for ten points each.

1. Clark Griswold is forced to climb the dam after accidentally causing a leak in it in this 1997 National Lampoon film.

ANSWER: National Lampoon's Vegas Vacation

2. The dam was destroyed in this 1978 feature following a missile attack on the San Andreas Fault. However, it was rebuilt when the lead character turned back time.

ANSWER: <u>Superman</u>: The Movie

3. Both the Allspark and Megatron were kept in a secret base under the Hoover Dam in this summer 2007 release.

ANSWER: <u>Transformers</u> (do not accept "Transformers: The Movie")

19. As much as we didn't want to write about Nickelback, answer these questions about Nickelback for 10 points each.

1. This is the name of Nickelback's fifth and most recent album, which has sold 9 million copies worldwide and has remained on the Billboard Top 200 continuously for 2 years, spawning the singles *Photograph*, *If Everyone Cared*, and *Far Away*.

ANSWER: All The Right Reasons

2. The ubiquitous song *Rockstar* features spoken word voiceovers by Billy Gibbons, lead singer and guitarist for this veteran blues-rock outfit.

Answer: <u>ZZ Top</u>

3. Nickelback, along with Kid Rock, performed a 2003 cover of this Elton John number that serves as an occasional theme song for *Hockey Night In Canada* and was featured in *Charlie's Angels : Full Throttle*.

ANSWER: Saturday Night's Alright (For Fighting)

20. Boy, that FedEx Cup sure made golf exciting. For ten points each:

1. Name the golfer who won the inaugural FedEx Cup, winning by more than 12,000 points over Steve Stricker.

ANSWER: Eldrick "Tiger" Woods

2. Woods won the inaugural event even though he skipped this tournament, held at Westchester Country Club in August, the first playoff event for the Cup.

ANSWER: The Barclays

3. This event, typically the final one on the PGA schedule, was moved up from its usual November date to September to act as the final event in the Cup playoffs. It still only hosts 30 players, but now based on FedEx Cup points rather than position on the year's money list.

ANSWER: The Tour Championship

21. Name these authors who have written screenplays on a 15-10 basis:

1. For fifteen points, he wrote *Game 6*, which starred Michael Keaton as a man obsessed with the 1986 World Series.

For ten points, he is best known as the author of *Underworld*, *Libra*, and *White Noise*. **ANSWER:** Don DeLillo

2. For fifteen points, his non-Oscar winning screenplays include *The Stepford Wives*, *Misery*, and *Hearts in Atlantis*.

For ten points, this Academy Award winner for *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* and *All the President's Men* wrote the screenplays for his own novels *Magic*, "Marathon Man, *and* The Princess Bride*.

ANSWER: William Goldman

22. It's not the size of your endowment that matters, it's what you do with it. [Pause] for ten points each, name these colleges with large endowments.

1. Fall enrollment in 2007 was the largest nationwide at this Big 10 school with the 27th largest endowment.

ANSWER: The Ohio State University

2. This Texas school, the second smallest to play Division 1-A football, has the 19th largest endowment in the U.S., giving it the second highest endowment per student in 1-A.

ANSWER: William Marsh Rice University

3. This Division 1-A school founded in 1891 had the third largest endowment of any school in 2006 behind Harvard and Yale.

ANSWER: Leland Stanford Junior University
