Bonuses

1. Answer the following about the landmark 1993 album *Last Splash* by the Breeders.

1. On *Last Splash* the Breeders were led by sisters Kim and Kelley Deal. Kim Deal had previously been best known as the bassist and sometime singer of this seminal Boston-based band whose songs included "Monkey Gone To Heaven."

ANSWER: The **Pixies**

2. The title *Last Splash* is taken from a lyric on the album's second track. This lead single, with its famous Spike Jonze video and memorable bass line, became by far the Breeders' biggest hit.

ANSWER: Cannonball

3. *Last Splash* is the followup to this 1990 Breeders debut, which featured Tanya Donnelly of Throwing Muses and later of Belly, and contained a famous cover of the Beatles song *Happiness Is A Warm Gun*.

Answer: Pod

2. You think getting cancelled is tough, these TV evangelists lost their airtime the hard way in 2007, 5-10-20-30.

1. This leader of Thomas Road Baptist Church spent almost 40 years on the air with his *Old Time Gospel Hour*.

ANSWER: Dr. Jerry Falwell

2. His heart attack on Christmas Eve 2006 received scant attention against the deaths of James Brown and Gerald Ford. He was unable to return to *The Coral Ridge Hour*, or his lobbying project, the Center for Reclaiming America before his September death.

ANSWER: Dr. D. James Kennedy

3. While her television appearances dwindled down to an *Entertainment Tonight* death-watch in her final year, this songstress was once the female lead of *PTL* before appearing on *The Surreal Life*.

ANSWER: Tammy Faye <u>Bakker Messner</u> (accept either)

A dozen years before his September 2007 passing at age 85, this minister at Elvis Presley's funeral sold his *Cathedral of Tomorrow* ministry to still-active octogenarian Earnest Angley.
ANSWER: Rex <u>Humbard</u>

3. Who needs Broadway for theater when you've got the Knicks' drama? For ten points each:

1. This Knicks coach was named in a \$10 million lawsuit by former Madison Square Garden VP Anucha Brown Sanders, who said she was fired for rebuffing the Hall-of Famer's sexual advances. **ANSWER:** Isiah <u>Thomas</u>

2. The Brown Sanders lawsuit also included counter-testimony from an intern who claims to have had consensual sex with this Knick guard and "star" apparel designer.

ANSWER: Stephon Marbury

3. This Knicks owner has been vilified in the New York tabloids for his role in the Knicks downturn and for his lack of management savvy, having sunk the fortunes of the Knicks, Rangers, and WNBA Liberty, as well as electronics giant, The Wiz.

ANSWER: James Dolan

4. Holy second banana! Given the name of a sidekick, name the superhero.

ANSWER: The Human Torch (do not accept Johnny Storm, this was an earlier Human Torch)

5. Based on a description of a fictional film, name the real film in which it appears for ten points each:

1. Our protagonists appear in the background of a scene from $i_{\ell}^{1/2}$ Good Will Hunting 2: Hunting Season $i_{\ell}^{1/2}$ in this 2001 comedy.

ANSWER: Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back

2. Steve Martin and Eddie Murphy attempt to get Eddie Murphy (in a dual role) to exclaim the closing line of the film $\ddot{i}_{c}^{1/2}$ Chubby Rain $\ddot{i}_{c}^{1/2}$ in this 1999 film.

Answer: Bowfinger

3. The porn film \ddot{i}_{ℓ} ^{1/2}See You Next Wednesday \ddot{i}_{ℓ} ^{1/2} appears in the background of a scene where a lycanthrope bounds through Piccadilly Circus in this 1981 John Landis horror classic. **ANSWER:** An <u>American Werewolf in London</u>

6. Answer the following questions about the trend towards so-called "jukebox" musicals for the stated number of points.

1. [5] First, for 5 points, the musical that started the trend, still going strong in many cities, is this musical centered around a big wedding, built on several hit songs by ABBA.

ANSWER: Mamma Mia

2. [10] For 10 points, choreographer Twyla Tharp teamed up with Billy Joel to produce this musical based on some of his songs, including the title song.

ANSWER: Movin' Out

3. [15] For 15 points, "Smokey Joe's Cafe" is a revue comprised of 39 songs written by this legendary songwriting team behind such early rock hits as "Hound Dog," "Love Potion #9," "Jailhouse Rock," and "Stand By Me."

ANSWER: Jerry Lieber and Mike Stoller

7. Answer these questions about squirt guns for ten points each.

1. Currently owning the market is this brand, which uses compressed air reservoirs to create a powerful jet.

ANSWER: Super Soaker

2. Before Super Soaker, this company, which produced battery-powered squirt guns that resembled real guns like Uzis and AK-47s, dominated the market.

ANSWER: Entertech

3. Squirt guns are common props for this game, popular on college campuses, which involves a circle of people ordered to "murder" one another.

ANSWER: Killer or Assassins

8. For ten points each, name these short-lived casualties of the 2006-2007 season:

1. Intended to follow *Lost*, this show centering around a group of people held hostage during a bank robbery was taken off the air in November and cancelled a few months later.

ANSWER: The <u>Nine</u>

2. It took four episodes for NBC to decide to yank this Andy Richter vehicle.

ANSWER: Andy Barker, P.I.

3. The first new series to be cancelled by the new CW, this show tried to sell us on the premise of a family whose patriarch was played by ex-New Kid Donnie Wahlberg.

ANSWER: <u>Runaway</u>

9. Sometimes fictional characters get their names in unique ways. For 10 points each:

1. This character's name comes from an antiquated English word for "Bumblebee" as J.K. Rowling envisioned him humming while walking the halls of Hogwarts.

ANSWER: Albus (Percival Wulfric Brian) Dumbledore

2. Ian Fleming got the name of James Bond from this 1936 field guide, presumably something he

didn't do for Pussy Galore.

ANSWER: Birds of the West Indies

3. Gary in the television show *Early Edition* had this last name, possibly reflecting his daily choice of inconveniencing himself to keep bad things from happening or doing nothing and facing the consequences.

ANSWER: Hobson or Hobson's choice

10. One stock bonus is to name the country of origin of beers. 5-10-20-30, so instead name the country of origin for these vodkas on the same basis:

2. Newgrounds was the site where this New Jerseyan first posted his Numa Numa dance video to the O-Zone song "Dragostea din tei."

ANSWER: Gary Brolsma

3. One of Newgrounds' unofficial mascots, the one whose visage appears on the voting system, is this orange-haired kid who has to save his school from goth kids.

Answer: Pico

12. The most famous case of replacing one character with another and hoping the audience doesn't notice was, of course, on *Bewitched*, where they replaced the part of Darrin.

1. For five points each, name the two men who played Darrin, who also happened to share a first name.

ANSWER: Dick Sargent and Dick York

2. When star and title character Chad Lowe quit this short-lived 1980s show in a salary dispute, NBC brought in Ross Harris and the show's name was changed to *Under One Roof*. For ten points, name the character and you've named the show.

Answer: <u>Spencer</u>

3. For ten points, somewhat more successfully, this '90s program replaced Janet Hubert-Whitten with Daphne Maxwell Reid in the role of Aunt Vivian midway through its run.

ANSWER: The Fresh Prince of Bel Air

13. For ten points each, answer these questions about unique nations competing in international sports.

1. The Iroquois Nationals have competed internationally in this sport since 1990, and have finished no lower than fourth in the world championships.

ANSWER: lacrosse

2. This agglomeration of countries is one of the traditional powers in cricket. The host of the 2007 Cricket World Cup, each of its member nations hosted at least one match.

ANSWER: <u>West Indies</u> or <u>Windies</u>

3. In 1992, the constituent parts of the former Soviet Union competed at the Olympics and other international sporting events as the Unified Team representing this organization, which still functions on areas such as defense and economics.

ANSWER: Commonwealth of Independent States

14. Name the authors behind these pieces of horror fiction for ten points each.

1. Demon Seed, Intensity, Watchers

Answer: Dean Koontz

2. "Yours Truly, Jack the Ripper" and *Psycho*

ANSWER: Robert Bloch

3. Koko, The Throat, and In the Night Room

ANSWER: Peter Straub

15. For ten points each, name these Alison Krauss collaborators who are not Union Station:

1. Both Krauss' album *Hundred Miles or More* and his album *Mud on the Tires* include the duet *Whiskey Lullaby*.

Answer: Brad Paisley

2. Raising Sand is a 2007 collaborative album with this rock legend.

ANSWER: Robert Plant

3. One of Krauss' many Grammys came for the album *I Know Who Holds Tomorrow*, recorded with this bluegrass family who contributed the track "I Am Weary, Let Me Rest" to the *O Brother*, *Where Art Thou?* soundtrack.

ANSWER: Cox Family

16. Thankful award-winning actors and their associations, 5-10-20-30.

1. In thanking his partner of 24 years at the 2007 Tony Awards after winning for his work in *Curtains*, this actor, who originated the role of Sir Robin in *Spamalot*, confirmed what was fairly well-known in the TV industry.

ANSWER: David Hyde Pierce

2. This actress who won Tonys for *Doubt* and *The Heiress* thanked her partner by a pseudonym at the 2005 Tony Awards. She also played the mother of Matt Damon's character in *Ocean's Twelve*.

ANSWER: Cherry Jones

3. This actress, Jones"; $\frac{1}{2}$ s partner, did not have great success in 2007, playing devout-yet-OK-with-pre-marital-sex-Christian Harriet Hayes on the now-cancelled *Studio 60 on the Sunset Strip*.

ANSWER: Sarah Paulson

4. Pierce and Paulson played stylish yet apprehensive lovers to one another and best friends to the leads in this Peyton Reed homage to Doris Day-Rock Hudson comedies, the last film to feature Tony Randall.

Answer: *Down With Love*

17. For ten points each, name these TV shows that came back from the dead.

1. Almost a decade after this ABC romantic drama was cancelled, creator Rob Thomas is in discussions to bring it back to the network. Jeremy Piven and Paula Marshall would likely not reprise their roles as the man who thinks he's a god and his shrink.

Answer: <u>Cupid</u>

2. After ending in 1967, CBS brought this drama back in 2000, with Tim Daly reprising the role first played by David Janssen. It helped that there was a successful 1993 film version.

Answer: The Fugitive

3. Fan protest led UPN to bring back this series as a mid-season replacement for a final half-season after fans were left hanging by a season 3 ender that had supernatural cop Jim Ellison trying to revive his apparently drowned anthropologist friend and advisor Blair Sandburg.

ANSWER: The Sentinel

18. Tom Stoppardï; $\frac{1}{2}$ s *The Real Thing* has twice been staged on Broadway, in 1984 and 2000. Answer these questions about those productions for ten points each.

1. These acting heavyweights, who played husband and wife in *Reversal of Fortune*, both won Tonys for the 1984 production. Name them for 5 points each.

ANSWER: Glenn Close and Jeremy Irons

2. The 2000 production won Tonys for Stephen Dillane in Ironsï; $\frac{1}{2}$ role and this daughter of Rosemary Harris in Closeï; $\frac{1}{2}$ s. She played John Lennonï; $\frac{1}{2}$ s girlfriend in *Backbeat* and is best known for starring opposite Colin Firth in the BBCï; $\frac{1}{2}$ s 1995 production of *Pride and Prejudice*. **ANSWER:** Jennifer <u>Ehle</u>

3. This actress made Broadway history by simultaneously starring in *The Real Thing* and David Rabeï; $\frac{1}{2}$ s *Hurlyburly* for 9 months in 1984 and 1985. Youï; $\frac{1}{2}$ ll most likely know her better as Miranda Hobbes on *Sex and the City*.

ANSWER: Cynthia Nixon

19. You would be forgiven if you forgot about this year's Indianapolis 500, but you may want to try to remember if you want any points. For ten points each:

1. This Scotsman won the rain-shortened race with only 166 laps completed, though the sight of his dampened wife, Ashley Judd, climbing on his car after the win may have distracted you a bit. **ANSWER:** Dario <u>Franchitti</u>

2. This pole-sitter nearly didn't start the race as he had trouble getting his car started. The 2001 and 2002 winner, he led for 19 laps total before dancing home in third place.

ANSWER: Helio Castroneves

3. This fellow Brazilian led for the most laps - 83 - and would have won if the race was called at the first rain delay - but he wound up rear-ending Jacques Lazier and, needing a pit stop, finished 12th.

ANSWER: Tony Kanaan

20. It is initially found in the Ocean King's Temple and if it runs out, your health will too. For ten points each:

1. Name this title timepiece from a 2007 Nintendo DS game, the latest in *The Legend of Zelda* series.

ANSWER: Phantom Hourglass

2. The plot of *Phantom Hourglass* follows the events of this game in the *Zelda* series. **ANSWER:** *The Legend of Zelda: The <u>Wind Waker</u>*

3. Link and the fairy Ciela are joined on their journey by this pirate and namesake of the ship that

the party uses. ANSWER: Captain Linebeck

21. Does Warren Buffett control the world? Not yet, but Berkshire Hathaway certainly has some interesting subsidiaries. For ten points each,

1. Since 1996, Berkshire Hathaway has controlled this insurance giant based in Maryland and no longer catering only to government employees.

ANSWER: <u>GEICO</u> or <u>Government Employees Insurance Company</u>

2. Berkshire Hathaway acquired this restaurant franchise in 1998 that opened its first outlet in Joliet, Illinois in 1940. Buffett has yet to hire Mark Cuban as an operator, though.

ANSWER: Dairy Queen

3. Buffett pulled this Kentucky-based apparel company from bankruptcy in 2002. The company dates back to an 1851 deal in Providence, Rhode Island to market a cloth label with painted-on organic emblems.

ANSWER: Fruit of the Loom

22. Identify these famous record labels of the 1970s for 10 points each.

1. It has gone through country and hip-hop phases more recently, but this label, an imprint of Elektra since 1972, was founded by David Geffen to release Jackson Browne records and was known at its peak as the center of California session rock with a roster including The Eagles, Linda Ronstadt, and Warren Zevon.

ANSWER: <u>Asylum</u> Records

2. From 1973 to his 1982 death Neil Bogart headed up this label, named for a classic film, whose first signing was KISS but was mostly known for disco acts such as Donna Summer and the Village People.

ANSWER: Casablanca Records

3. Named in part for its home city, this R&B label owned by producers Kenneth Gamble and Leon Huff boasted such acts as the O'Jays, McFadden & Whitehead, and Harold Melvin & The Blue Notes. The label had an in-house studio band, MFSB, who provided the theme to *Soul Train*. **ANSWER:** Philadelphia International Records
