1. For ten points each, name these Dallas-Fort Worth-area sports venues:

1. The AFL's Desperados, the NHL's Stars, and the NBA's Mavericks share this replacement for Reunion Arena.

ANSWER: American Airlines Center

2. This Fort Worth golf course first hosted its namesake tournament in 1946, making it the longest-running PGA event still held at its original site. Rory Sabbatini won a three-way playoff there over Jim Furyk and Bernhard Langer in 2007, the first year it has been sponsored by Crowne Plaza Hotels.

ANSWER: Colonial Country Club

3. FC Dallas plays its home games in this soccer-only stadium.

ANSWER: Pizza Hut Park

2. Identify the female director given a partial filmography 5-10-20-30.

1. *Near Dark; Blue Steel; Strange Days*

ANSWER: Kathryn Bigelow

2. *Fast Times at Ridgemont High; Look Who's Talking; Clueless*

ANSWER: Amy Heckerling

3. *Big; Awakenings; A League of Their Own*

ANSWER: Penny Marshall

4. *The Virgin Suicides; Lost in Translation; Marie Antoinette*

ANSWER: Sofia Coppola

3. After a remix and inclusion on its credited artist's album Shock Value, and an airing and live performance of it on So You Think You Can Dance, it reached number 3 on the US charts. For ten points each:

1. Name this song, whose lyrics note that while the person being sung to has said that they are sorry, the singer says it's too late to do this.

ANSWER: Apologize

2. The song is credited to this artist, better known as an R&B and hip hop producer, who added a new beat to the song as well as some vocal backing. It's the third single from *Shock Value*, following "The Way I Are."

ANSWER: Timbaland or Timothy Mosley

3. The bulk of the song was actually recorded by this Colorado band, a MySpace favorite. The lead vocals on the song are those of front man Ryan Tedder.

ANSWER: One Republic

4. *Rolling Stone* controversial steamy dude covers in the news for ten points each

1. Music blogs denounced *Rolling Stone's* use of this teen idol pulling on his t-shirt on its August 23, 2007 cover as selling out. His appearance in *Hairspray* helped the movie to a \$29 million gross during its first weekend.

ANSWER: Zac Ephron

2. The *Rolling Stone* fan base freaked out in 1972 when this "I Woke Up in Love This Morning" teen idol and TV star went shirtless and his treasure trail was exposed in the cover shot.

ANSWER: David Cassidy

3. Although more controversial than steamy, this 40-year-old rocker's naked body appeared with his clothed wife on the cover of the January 22, 1981 edition, eight weeks after his death.

ANSWER: John Lennon

5. Identify these boxers from the turn of the 20th century for ten points each:

1. The last of the bare-knuckle brawlers, this Boston-based fighter is recognized as the first modern heavyweight champion of the world.

ANSWER: John L. Sullivan

2. The subject of Ken Burns' 2005 documentary, *Unforgivable Blackness*, he defeated Tommy Burns in 1908 to become the first African-American heavyweight champion.

ANSWER: Jack Johnson

3. This champion, the first to relinquish the title, retired undefeated in 1905 only to un-retire five years later to face Johnson in 15-round losing effort.

ANSWER: James J. Jeffries

6. Sure, you could just use Google or Yahoo as your default search engine, but we here at TRASH believe in search engine affirmative action. Name these other options, for ten points each.

1. K.T. Tunstall and the Hubble telescope have been used in ads promoting this search engine that no longer features a butler.

ANSWER: ask. com

2. This is the new name for MSN search, which as of July 2006 ran a distant third to Yahoo and Google.

ANSWER: Live Search or search.live.com

3. A former Infoseek employee created this search engine in 2000, which features a rocket ship on its home page and suggests related keywords to your searches.

4. Despite playing Tom Jeter's girlfriend, this actress who played Dawn on the BBC version of *The Office*, received scant airtime during the "K&R" crisis.

ANSWER: Lucy Davis

8. Answer the following about one of the most successful platform games of all-time for ten points each.

1. Credited with successfully taking the series into the 3D realm, this early N64 game featured the protagonist collecting stars in an attempt to open up new portions of the castle and rescue the princess.

ANSWER: Super Mario 64

2. One of the easter eggs in *Super Mario 64* comes after Mario has collected every star in the game. Mario can then get to the top of the castle to find this dinosaur introduced to the Mario series in *Super Mario World*.

ANSWER: Yoshi

3. In order to collect a couple of the secret stars in the game, Mario has to catch this golden bunny rabbit lurking in the basement whose name comes from the division of Silicon Graphics that made the N64 processor.

ANSWER: MIPS

9. Answer questions about the work of *auteur* Kenny Ortega for ten points each.

1. Ortega has been at the helm of two TV movies with this name and is attached to direct a third installment of this franchise for a Disney theatrical release, pending script approval.

2. HSM is finally putting money back in the Mouse's coffers, after Ortega was at the helm of this 1992 Disney live-action theatrical musical that star Christian Bale includes on his list of movies he would rather forget. It failed to recoup one-fifth of its \$15 million budget at the box office.

ANSWER: Newsies

3. Although Ortega did choreograph hits like *Dirty Dancing* and *Ferris Beuller's Day Off*, he is also credited for Francis Ford Coppola's flop *One From the Heart* and this 1980 camp classic starring Gene Kelly and Olivia Newton-John directed by crap-maker turned muckraker Robert Greenwald.

ANSWER: Xanadu

10. Given either a description of the history behind a soft drink's name or the rumors surrounding it, name it, for ten points each.

1. Some people speculate that C. L. Grigg named this soda after lots of lucky craps throws or the last card in a poker game, while others suggest the name comes from the number of original ingredients.

ANSWER: 7-Up

2. Apparently Charles Alderton's boss Wade Morrison had a soft spot for this physician's daughter, and named this beverage after him.

ANSWER: Dr Pepper

3. It's possible that the name originates from a Native American word meaning either wintergreen or dark water, although there is a similar Algonquin word that means "medicine."

ANSWER: Moxie

11. In episode of Quantum Leap, Sam suggests that he change a song about a pig from "Sooeey Piggy!" to "Piggy Sooeey!".

1. [5] For five points, name this music icon known for his black horn-rimmed glasses as well as songs such as "Peggy Sue", "Words of Love" and "That'll Be the Day."

ANSWER: Buddy Holly

2. [5,5] Holly, along with Richie Valens and the Big Bopper, died in a famous plane crash in, for five points each, this month of this year, known thanks to Don McLean as "the day the music died."

ANSWER: February 1959

3. [5] Following the deaths of Holly and company, this friend of Holly wrote the song "Three Stars" in tribute, although it was released after his own tragic death. He is better remembered for songs such as "Summertime Blues."

ANSWER: Eddie Cochran

4. [5,5] In the Richie Valens biopic *La Bamba* Holly and Cochran were played by two 1980s singer-songwriters. One had hits with *Something's Gonna Happen* and *Someday, Someway* while the other is best known as the bandleader of both the Stray Cats and his namesake swing-revival "orchestra."

ANSWER: Marshall Crenshaw and Brian Setzer

12. For ten points each, name these active players who are closest to breaking some major league baseball career records.

1. This Yankees right hander is less than 160 wins away from surpassing Cy Young's mark of 511 wins.

ANSWER: Roger Clemens

2. When Steve Finley was released by the Rockies, it left this Indians outfielder as the active leader in triples. He ended the season with 116, well off Sam Crawford's mark of 306.

ANSWER: Kenny Lofton

3. A back injury is the most immediate thing standing between this Arizona Diamondbacks leftie getting the 21 hit batsmen he'd need to surpass Walter Johnson's mark of 203.

ANSWER: Randy Johnson

13. For ten points each, name these TV pooches:

1. His doghouse was supposedly a make-out spot for some of the actors on *The Brady Bunch*.

ANSWER: Tiger

2. Jed Clampett owned this bloodhound.

ANSWER: Duke

3. This loyal golden retriever of Punky Brewster was named after an NBC executive.

ANSWER: Brandon [Named after Brandon Tartikoff, then-president of the network]

14. In July 2006, Indiana was discovered to lead the nation in potential "terrorist targets" in a Homeland Security database. Name these tourist sites that might be on the list, for ten points each.

1. In Peru you can visit the International Hall of Fame for this, purchased from Sarasota in 1981 and whose inductees include Annie Oakley and Emmett Kelly.

ANSWER: International Circus Hall of Fame

2. For \$3 you can attend the United States Vice Presidential Museum in Huntington that's run by the Center named for this native son Vice President.

ANSWER: J. Danforth Quayle

3. Holiday World and Splashin' Safari is among the attractions in this Christmas-themed Southern Indiana town whose natives include Denver Broncos quarterback Jay Cutler.

ANSWER: Santa Claus, Indiana

1. This bestselling game involves up to four players trying to develop towns and cities on resource hexes on a large island.

ANSWER: Settlers of Catan

2. In Settlers of Catan, a roll of this number on the dice causes the dreaded Robber Baron to descend on an opponent's hex and steal their goods.

ANSWER: Seven

3. This development card allows the person who plays it to select two goods of their choice.

ANSWER: Year of Plenty

17. For ten points each, name these songs by the Indigo Girls:

1. From their eponymous album, this track was the duo's highest charting song on the Billboard Hot 100, peaking at #52.

ANSWER: "Closer to Fine"

2. From the album *Rites of Passage*, this song invokes the "resting soul" of this historical "king of insight" whose "head was on the block" and whose crime was "looking up the truth".

ANSWER: "Galileo"

3. This song off of *Swamp Ophelia* reminisces about "the time when I came so close to you / Sent me skipping my class and running from school / And I bought you that ring 'cause I never was cool."

ANSWER: "Least Complicated"

18. Their members have included the likes of Isamot Kol, Soranik Natu, G'nort, Ch'p and Kilowog. For ten points each:

1. Identify this group of heroes entrusted by the Guardians of the Universe to protect the 3600 sectors with their power rings.

ANSWER: Green Lantern Corps [if you're feeling nice accept Green Lanterns]

2. The Guardians of the Universe and Green Lantern Corps operate from this planet where the Main Power Battery is located.

ANSWER: Oa

3. Following the decimation of the Corps by Parallax and its rebuilding, the transformation of this Green Lantern, John Stewart's successor, into Ion during the "One Year Later" crossover event left the Corps a little lacking in experienced veterans.

ANSWER: Bank One Corporation

2. Prior to its purchase by Bank of America in 2006, this Delaware based bank was the world's largest independent credit card issuer and was known for affinity cards including many universities.

ANSWER: MBNA American Bank, N.A. (or Maryland Bank, National Association)

3. This company merged with Axa Financial in July 2004, 36 years after the Tommy James & the Shondells used their name to create a memorable song.

ANSWER: Mutual of New York or MONY

20. For ten points each, name these Italian film composers.

1. This Italian scored six films for Sergio Leone, including *Once Upon at Time in America*, and five for Dario Argento, but he didn't receive his first Oscar nomination until 1986' *The Mission*. RZA's score for *Kill Bill* is an imitation of his style.

ANSWER: Ennio Morricone

2. This American of Italian ancestry has composed music for several David Lynch projects, ranging from *Blue Velvet* to *Twin Peaks* to *Mulholland Dr.*.

ANSWER: Angelo Badalamenti

3. A frequent collaborator of Federico Fellini, this Italian may be best known in the US for the love theme from *Romeo and Juliet* and his music for *The Godfather*.

ANSWER: Nino Rota

21. Final Jeopardy is for wimps. For ten points each, name these other game show finales:

1. On *American Gladiators*, the leading contestant got a head start on this obstacle course.

ANSWER: The Eliminator

2. At the end of *GUTS*, kids had to climb this mountain while hitting buzzers on the way up.

ANSWER: Aggro Crag or Mega Crag or Super Aggro Crag

3. This mad dash through the grocery store ended *Supermarket Sweep*.

ANSWER: Big Sweep

22. For ten points each, name these schools coached by Coach K's former charges:

1. After a gig at Virginia Commonwealth, Jeff Capel III replaced Kelvin Sampson at this Big 12 school.

ANSWER: University of Oklahoma

2. In 2007, Tommy Amaker was named head coach at this New England school.

ANSWER: Harvard University

3. A former player at West Point under Mike Krzyzewski, Neil Dougherty has led this school to

four losing seasons in its last five.

ANSWER: Texas Christian University or TCU
