However, in Paris she sleeps with Geronte, an old lecher. When Des Grieux comes to take her away, she waits to take from jewels, and Geronte has them arrested and sent to Louisiana. FTP, name this Puccini opera.

- 2. In a medium bowl, mix sugar and egg yolks. In a saucepan, bring cream and vanilla to a boil. Add cream to egg yolk and sugar mixture, mix well. Put mixture in a ramekin of any size, place in a 9 by 13-inch baking pan, and fill with water\* until it reaches 1/2 up the side of the ramekin. Bake at a preheated 325 degree F oven for approximately 40 to 45 minutes. Then get out your handy-dandy chef torch and scorch the top the desert. FTP, you now have what scrumptious desert whose name means burnt cream.

- 3. He graduated with a degree in canon law about 1495, and practiced medicine briefly before becoming a monk. Offered control of the Cathederal of Fraunbourg, he accepted and divided his day into thirds, between religious activity, charity, and astronomy. This last activity was most fruitful, as he was able to devise a more accurate calander, and make careful observations of the stars. FTP name this revolutionary who determined that the sun was the center of the universe. COPERNICUS Nicolaus
- 4. In 1973, he served as a delegate to the UN General Assembly. His only previous political experience came in 1965, when he ran as a Conservative candidate for mayor\* of New York. The author of the Blackford Oakes spy novel series, Up from Liberalism, and God and Man at Yale, he hosted the interview program Firing Line for several decades. FTP, name this founder of National Review.

A: William F. Buckley Jr.

- 5. Membership is for life; out of a thousand applicants, only six or seven new members are chosen each year. Founded in 1947 in New York by Cheryl Crawford, Robert Lewis, and\* Elia Kazan, it was directed until 1982 by Lee Strasberg. The leading American center for the teaching of the Stanislavsky method, its most famous graduate is Marlon Brando. FTP, name this drama school. A: Actors Studio
- 6. It takes place in the town square, between the post office and the bank, between ten o'clock and noon on \*June 27th. It is conducted by Mr. Summers, who comes to the square carrying a black wooden box, followed by Mr. Graves, the postmaster, who carries a three-legged stool. The Hutchinson family won, though the only member who claimed the prize was Tessie. FTP, name this Shirley Jackson short-story which ends with Tessie being stoned.

7. They were organized into three unequal divisions: the cemaat, balukhalkim and segban, and were commanded by an aga. Originally made up of kidnapped Christian youths from the Balkans,\* they were forced into celibacy. At first highly respected for their military prowess, by the time of the Auspicious Incident, the 1826 action in which they were all killed by Sultan Mahmoud II, they had declined into decadance. FTP, name this Ottoman military force.

8. At the end of the novel the holder of this post is Donald Farfrae, who marries the woman his

Predecessor thought was his daughter. However, it turns out that Elizabeth-Jane\* is actually the

daughter of Susan and the sailor Newson. Michael Henchard gives up drink after selling his wife and daughter for five guineas, though after he loses his job he drinks himself to death. FTP, name this Thomas Hardy novel about the leader of a provincial town.

- A: The Mayor of Casterbridge
- 9. In 1895, he was made Regius Professor of History at Cambridge by Lord Rosebery; thirty-one years after he had left the Commons. Studying under the German Catholic historian Dollinger,\* he succeeded Newman as editor of the Rambler, though he was forced to resign due to papal criticism. He was unable to finish his projected "History of Liberty" series. FTP, name this author of the famed aphorism "Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely." A: Lord Acton
- 10. Invented about 1745 in the city whose name it bears, it is now considered obsolete because it can hardly pierce the micro-farad barrier that became standard in the 20th Century. Consisting of two sheets of foil, one connected by a wire or rod to a source of electricity, and separated by a glass bottle or jar, FTP name this early capacitor named for a Dutch city. LEYDEN JAR (accept leyden bottle)
- 11. Mr. Ford hears of the plot from Nym and Pistol, and disguises himself as Mr. Brook, because he does not trust Mrs.\* Ford. Mr. Brook then goes to Falstaff and asks him to help in his attempt to seduce Mrs. Ford. Falstaff is after both Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Page, because they have ready access to money, which he needs for his career as a drunken rake. In the end, all is revealed, and Falstaff is pardoned. FTP, name this Shakesperean comedy.
- A: The Merry Wives of Windsor

FTP, name this archangel.

- 12. He excommunicated King John because he refused to name Stephen Langton Archbishop of Canterbury. Involved in the struggle over the accession to the throne of the Holy Roman Empire in the early thirteenth century,\* he excommunicated Otto after Otto attempted to take over Sicily, recognizing instead Frederick II. FTP, name this pope who launched both the Albegensian and Fourth Crusades.

  A: Innocent III
- Mentioned in the Koran only three times, his feast day is September 29. The only member of his club who can speak Syrian and Chaldee, according to the Talmud he destroyed Sennacherib's army. He gave the sacred laws\* of the Koran to Muhammad, and also announced the birth of John the Baptist to Zacharias and Jesus to Mary.

A: Gabriel

14. After his death by drowning in the Gulf of Mexico in 1932, the poetry collection Key West: An Island Sheaf was published posthumously. Awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship to write in Mexico,\* he produced The Broken Tower but little else. His first major work, White Buildings, contained "At Melville's Tomb." FTP, name this American poet of The Bridge.

A: Hart Crane

- 15. The son of a Polish emigre and his Italian wife, he moved to Paris and fell in love with Annie Playden, because of whom he wrote the Song of the Poorly Loved. With Picasso, he wrote the 1913 book\* Cubist Painters. Wounded in World War I, he drew on that experience to write The Poet Assassinated and Calligrames. FTP, name this author who's Les Mamalles de Tiresias first used the word "surrealism." A: Guilliaume Appolinaire
- 16. Napoleon named his horse after this battle; victory was assured after General Kellerman's cavalry retreat. Earlier, Napoleon had been in a bad position because General Melas,\* the Austrian commander, had attacked him while his force was separated. By 3pm the French were retreating, but Melas did not press the attack, allowing reinforcements, led by Desaix, to come and defeat the Austrians. FTP, name this climatic battle of the War of the 2nd Coalition. A: Marengo
- 17. Set in the town of Titipu, it means "exalted gate." "Three little maids from school we are" is sung by Peep-Bo, Pitti-Sing, and Yum-Yum.\* Yum-Yum being the beloved of Nanki-Poo. He is in danger of being executed by Ko-Ko, the Lord High Executioner, who dislikes the sight of blood. Nanki Poo avoids being executed and marries Yum Yum. FTP, name this Gilbert and Sullivan operetta about Japan. A: The Mikado
- 18. They form only cations in solution and are characterized by having incompletely filled d subshells. Approximately fifty in number, they are\* more electronegative than the alkali metals and tend to form coordination complexes with Lewis bases, making them essential in many industries and biological systems. FTP, identify this group of elements that make up the middle of the periodic table.

A: transition metals

19. An 1860 graduate of the Harvard Divinity School, he was forced to leave his pulpit in Brewster, Massachusettes, in 1866 because of allegations of pedophilia. Moving to New York, he became a patron of the Newsboys Lodging House,\* where the boys lived the sort of success he preached in his many books, such as Ragged Dick and Tattered Tom. FTP, name this author who preached success through hard work.
