## Tossups:

1. One battle at this site featured a victory by the mercenary Nicholas Graf of Salm over Grand Vizier Ibrahim Pasha, came three years after the decisive Ottoman victory at Mohacs that finished the independent Kingdom of Hungary. A second battle at this city featured the defeat of Kara Mustafa Pasha at the hands of the Holy League after a great charge led by the Winged Hussars--the largest cavalry charge in history-under the Polish king Jan III Sobieski. Attacked in 1529 by Suleiman the Magnificent and again in 1683, FTP name this central European Hapsburg capital that dominated trade routes from the eastern Mediterranean to western Europe.

ANSWER: Vienna (or Wien)
2. One hack for this video game allows players to unlock Billy Mays as a costume for one character and the final boss for the single-player game is a Blue humanoid called Tabuu, the embodiment of "Subspace." New stages added to this game include New Pork City, Pictochat, and Frigate Orpheon, but it retains classic stages from previous versions like Jungle Japes, Big Blue, and Final Destination. This title saw the addition of third-party characters like Solid Snake and Sonic the Hedgehog to the classic Nintendo lineup of characters like Fox, Link, Samus, and Kirby. FTP name this Nintendo Wii title that features an all-star cast of characters trying to knock each other off of cliffs, the third iteration of the Super Smash Brothers series.

3. This dimensionless quantity is of tremendous utility in all forms of chemistry because it assists analysis of dipoles and bond polarity and can be calculated on one of several scales, including ones by Sanderson, Allen, Allred-Rochow, Mulliken, and Pauling. This quantity is not, strictly speaking, a property of free atoms, but rather of atoms in molecules, where it is affected in particular by oxidation state. Its free element analogue is electron affinity. This quantity increases going up and to the right in the periodic table, peaking with fluorine, whose value of this quantity is 4.0 . FTP, name this quantity that reflects the ability of atoms to attract electron density.

A structure of his in Japan was one of the few to survive a 1923 earthquake. Along with the Imperial Hotel in Tokyo, this architect designed a residence for his friend Edgar J. Kauffmann in Pennsylvania, dubbed Fallingwater. A disciple of Louis Sullivan, one of this man's last projects was the Guggenheim museum in New York. FTP, identify this American architect associated with Chicago, who designed numerous Robie and Prairie houses.

ANSWER: Frank Lloyd Wright
5. At the end of one scene in this work the title character declares, "Shine out, fair sun, till I have bought a glass, / That I may see my shadow as I pass." Anne Neville marries the title character, despite his having killing her husband and his father. And other characters he dispatches include King Edward and the Duke of Clarence. Opening with the lines: "Now is the winter of our discontent, / Made glorious summer by this son of York." FTP name this Shakespearean tragedy about a king who would give his "kingdom for a horse" as he dies on Bosworth Field.

ANSWER: Richard III
6. As a young man he fought in the Netherlands for the Spaniards against the Dutch Revolt. This man was recruited by Robert Catesby to carry out the action he is most memorable for. His target was a monarch who had earlier been targeted by the Bye and Main Plots. This man prepared barrels of gunpowder in an undercroft beneath Westminster in preparation for detonating them during the State Opening of Parliament on 5 November 1605. FTP, name this would-be assassin of James I of England whose participation in the Gunpowder Plot is remembered in annual celebrations and $V$ for Vendetta.

ANSWER: Guy Fawkes (or Guido Fawkes)
7. In Siberian mythology, the creator-god Kutkh took the form of one of these creatures, and Brahma was incarnated as one of them. In China, one of these is a solar deity thought to inhabit the sun, and they are messengers of the sun-god Helios in Greek myth. The Morrigan often took the shape of this creature in Celtic myth, while both the aborigines and the indigenous tribes of the American Pacific Northwest claim that this creature brought fire to mankind. Claude Lévi-Strauss claims that together with the coyote, this creature is seen as a bridge with the afterlife due to its role as a scavenger, and according to the Quran, they taught men how to bury the dead. For ten points, name these birds exemplified in Norse myth by Odin's servants Huginn and Muninn.

ANSWER: Ravens
8. Carolus Linnaeus' original taxonomy of living organisms divided this group of animals into two categories: worms and insects. However, as this group encompasses $95 \%$ of the kingdom Animalia, more divisions including Rotifera, Nemertea, Cnidaria, and Arthropoda having since been created. Members of this group have only one copy of the Hox genes and are found in all animal subpylums except the Craniata subpylum of Chordata. FTP, name this category of animals that have no backbone.

## ANSWER: invertebrates

9. An ancient sect of this religion worshiped a creator deity named Zurvan and had a strong effect on Manichaeism. The head deity of this religion is aided by beings called Yazatas, the greatest of which are the Amesha Spentas. According to its scripture, the Avesta, these beings oppose the evil daevas, who help the god of darkness, Angra Mainyu. Although its adherents in Iran are persecuted today, this faith is kept alive by the Parsis of India, and it is still strongly associated with fire worship. For ten points, name this ancient Persian religion which worships Ahura Mazda and is named after its prophet, Zarathustra.

ANSWER: Zoroastrianism or Mazdaism
10. Christina Rossetti wrote a poem set during this event called "The Round Tower at Jhansi." Rani Lakshmibai, the queen of Jhansi, became a symbol of this event, died during the battle for Gwalior Fort. Disputes between soldiers and their commanders over the pork or beef fat used to grease rifle cartridges may have helped initiate this conflict. FTP, name this Indian rebellion against the British Raj, which started in 1857.

ANSWER: Sepoy Rebellion (accept First Indian War for Independence, Great Rebellion, Indian Mutiny, or Rebellion of 1857 or equivalents)
11. One novel by this author that contains elements of a murder mystery, sees the African-American Lucas Beauchamp accused of murdering local white man, Vinson Gowrie. Besides writing Intruder in the Dust, he also introduced Horace Benbow and Temple Drake in Sanctuary and the enigmatic Joe Christmas in Light in August. But he is most famous for a novel that chronicles the Bundren family's attempt to bury their matriarch in Jefferson and one that portrays the fall of the Compson family through the eyes of the suicidal Quentin and the mentally challenged Benjy. FTP, this is what Southern writer of As I Lay Dying and The Sound and the Fury?

ANSWER: William Faulkner
12. The equation of motion of these systems can be solved from a second order homogenous differential equation, and they can be used to characterize more complicated systems through Fourier analysis. One example is an LC circuit, which consists of an inductor and a capacitor. Unlike the damped and driven varieties of these, the motion of these is always perfectly periodic, and in LC circuits the angular frequency is given by one over the square root of the inductance times the capacitance. FTP, name these systems in which energy is conserved and whose motion can be described in terms of a sine function, such as a pendulum or spring.

ANSWER: simple harmonic oscillators (accept equivalents of oscillator, prompt on "harmonic oscillator," accept "damped harmonic oscillator" before "LC")
13. Near the beginning of this poem, the narrator tries to see far enough to where an object "bent in the undergrowth". And in the final stanza of this poem, the narrator remarks that "ages and ages hence", he will

FTP, this is what poem by Robert Frost that begins: "Two roads diverged in a yellow wood"?

14. One theorem named for this man can be rewritten to give a theorem of Gibbs that gives the number of degrees of freedom of a mixture of different phases. With Lagrange, this man gives his name to the central equation of the calculus of variations. He lends his name to the formula that states that e to the i times pi equals negative 1. He also names a modification of Fermat's Little Theorem which uses his Totient function, which gives the number of integers less than and coprime to the given input integer. He created the field of graph theory by solving the Bridges of Koningsberg problem. FTP, name this Swiss mathematician.

ANSWER: Leonard Euler
15. This movement reached its peak during a meeting chaired over by Frances Willard, leader of the WCTU. That meeting, held in Omaha, Nebraska, became this party's platform. In this party's most successful year at the ballot box, James B Weaver won over a million votes and four states. Emerging out of the Farmer's alliance, one of this party's goals was realized with the passage of the seventeenth amendment. This party was short lived, though, in large part thanks to the Cross of Gold speech. Merging with William Jennings Bryan and the Democrats for the election of 1896, FTP, identify this party that advocated free silver, direct election of senators, the abolition of national banks, and government control of railroads.

16. This author wrote about the strained marriage of Janine and Marcel in "The Adulterous Woman", which appears with such stories as "The Silent Men" and "The Growing Stone" in his collection, The Exile Kingdom. One novel by this author sees Father Paneloux blame the citizens of Oran for an epidemic that his struck them, while another contains the trial of a man who shot "The Arab" which focuses on the fact that he did not cry at his mother's funeral, Meursault. FTP, this is what author of The Plague and The Stranger, a French-Algerian Existentialist?

ANSWER: Albert Camus
17. The movements "Manny's Gym" and "Hail, Bop," appear in John Adams's composition in this genre, entitled "Century Rolls." Bartók didn't live to orchestrate the last seventeen bars of his third of these. One by Ravel opens with a whip crack and is often known as the one "in G." The middle movement of Beethoven's fourth essay in this genre is often associated with Orpheus and the Furies. Mozart's ninth is an E-flat major work known as the "Jeunehomme," while another of these E-flat is Beethoven's fifth and last. A famous one in C minor opens with a series of bell-like tolls in the solo part. For 10 points, identify this type of piece, examples of which include Rachmaninoff's second in C minor and Beethoven's "Emperor," written for orchestra and a certain keyboard instrument.
