The music video for this song, which is the title track of a 2016 album that also features "That's What I Like," depicts its singer in a hat bearing Roman (*) numerals. Shouts of "keep up!" punctuate this song, which Robbie Daw of *Idolator* described as "pick[ing] up where 'Uptown Funk' left off." For 10 points, name this 2016 hit that invites "players" to "put your pinky rings up to the moon" and declares the title concept is "in the air"; a song by Bruno Mars. ANSWER: 24K Magic ["twenty-four-karat magic"] <Vopava>
- 3. In one appearance, this character uses a magic helmet to become the star of the TV show *The Silver Zephyr*. In a soccer-themed series, this character can use a "belly blast" attack. A game subtitled "Six Golden Coins" marked the first appearance of this avid (*) garlic enthusiast, who is the namesake of a series featuring the characters Ashley and 9-Volt and requires the playing of numerous "microgames." A zig-zagging moustache and yellow and purple clothes are sported by, for 10 points, what rival of Mario? ANSWER: Wario <Nelson>
- 4. In 2007, this NFL team was briefly coached by Emmitt Thomas following the abrupt resignation of current Louisville coach Bobby Petrino. The Broncos' John Elway's final game came against this team in 1999, which was the first of their two Super Bowl appearances. Beginning in 2017, this team will play in the (*) "pinwheel"-roofed Mercedes-Benz Stadium. 5. One character with this surname claims to have been naked his entire sophomore year of college and suffers a heart attack while teaching an economics class. That man's granddaughter, who also has this surname, dated Logan Huntzberger while at (*) Yale and was the valedictorian of Chilton Academy. Another character with this surname marries diner-owner Luke Danes at the end of a 2016 TV revival subtitled "A Year in the Life." For 10 points, give this surname of Rory and Lorelai, a mother and daughter who are a TV series' namesake "Girls."

ANSWER: Gilmore [accept Gilmore Girls] <Nelson>

- 6. This word precedes "The Story of Us" in the title of a 2012 History Channel documentary series. An arguably ill-advised 2016 tweet by Jeb Bush depicted a photo of a handgun captioned only with this word, which also names a rock band that recorded "A Horse with (*) No Name." This word describes where "I like to be" in a namesake song from West Side Story. In summer 2016, a St. Louis-based brewer announced a temporary change of the name of Budweiser to, for 10 points, what word derived from an explorer named Vespucci? ANSWER: America [do not accept or prompt on "Murica" or similar] <Nelson>
- 7. In a song based on a poem dedicated to this person, Bon Iver [bohn ee-VAIR] sings "I'm building a still to slow down the time." The song "Lost in the World" is about this person, who appears in the video for a song which claims "maybe we can make it to Christmas" and "I don't remember where we first met." This subject of "Hit it First" by (*) Ray J is seen on a motorcycle in the music video to "Bound 2." Many songs on the album *The Life of Pablo* reference this mother of the interestingly named Saint and North. For 10 points, name this reality TV star and wife of Kanye West.

ANSWER: <u>Kim Kardashian</u>-West [accept <u>Kim</u>berly Noel <u>Kardashian</u>-West; prompt on "Kardashian"] <Golden>

- 8. The first six season premieres of this show all featured unconventional projects directed by Mike Ruiz. Courtney Act's shade-throwing on this show prompted the season six winner Bianca del Rio to remark "Not today, Satan, not today." Backstage footage from this series is shown in the web series (*) *Untucked*. Performers at risk for elimination on this series are given the command "Lip-sync for your life!" For 10 points, name this competition show airing on Logo, which is hosted by RuPaul [roo-"Paul"] and depicts female impersonators. ANSWER: RuPaul's <u>Drag Race</u> < Vopava>
- 9. After using this object, a young boy becomes trapped in a picture within his own bedroom. A "terribly frightening" dragon created with the help of this object was tasked with guarding an apple tree. While out on a walk, this object was also used to (*) create the moon, which then always accompanied it. Crockett Johnson created this colorful object, whose user goes to bed after using it to tuck himself in. For 10 points, name this child's writing device used to create the world around its wielder, a four-year-old named Harold.

 ANSWER: Harold's <u>purple crayon</u> [accept <u>Harold and the Purple Crayon</u>; prompt on "crayon"] <Nelson>
- 10. The friendship between this man and photographer Dennis Stock is recounted in the 2015 film *Life*, in which Dane DeHaan plays this man. Nick Adams had to partly dub this actor's mumbly dialog as Jett Rink for the film (*) *Giant*. This actor owned a Porsche 500 Spyder nicknamed "Little Bastard" that he died in while speeding on a California highway at just age 24. This actor wore a red leather jacket and yelled "You're tearing me apart!" as Jim Stark in *Rebel Without a Cause*. For 10 points, name this eternally cool movie star of the 1950s. ANSWER: James **Dean** <Vopava>

11. Former IndyCar world champion Dan Wheldon died during a race in this U.S. city. A college football bowl game held in and named for this city was won in 2016 by San Diego State and takes place at Sam Boyd Stadium. This city's Thomas and Mack Center is home to the bulk of the NBA's Summer (*) League. This city is home to a collegiate team known as the Runnin' Rebels, and its T-Mobile Arena will be the home of the Golden Knights, an NHL expansion team in 2017. For 10 points, name this city that hosts championship boxing matches at venues like the MGM Grand.

ANSWER: Las **Vegas** <Nelson>

- 12. Josh Levison is this kind of non-human in the North American version of *Being Human*. While working at a restaurant dressed as one of these beings, Titus finds that people treat him better in the first season of *Unbreakable Kimmy Schmidt*. Tracy Morgan's character on 30 Rock sings a ridiculous song about holding a bar mitzvah for these (*) creatures, examples of which include Scott McCall and Derek Hale on a series currently airing on MTV. For 10 points, name these supernatural creatures who, on that MTV series, are also teens. ANSWER: werewolf or werewolves ["wolf" or "Teen Wolf"] <Vopava>
- 13. Ron Perranoski led the majors in this statistic in 1969, the first year it was officially recorded. Journalist Bradford Doolittle, a critic of this statistic, claimed it was the only example of a "statistic creating a job." The melodies of many songs by Gogol Bordello are played on this (*) keyboard instrument, which joins the banjo on the opening lick of the Dropkick Murphys' "I'm Shipping Up to Boston." The breakdown solo in Kongos' "Come With Me Now" is played on, for 10 points, what instrument central to zydeco and polka music? ANSWER: accordion [accept squeeze box before it is mentioned] <Vopava>
- 15. In 2013 a British TV network filed suit against this game's publisher over the third word in the game's title; that lawsuit was deemed "secret stupid legal nonsense" by this game's creator, Sean Murray. The Atlas contacts this game's protagonist, who is known only as the (*) Traveler; that character discovers races like the Vy'keen and the Korvax, and gathers materials while trying to reach the center of the galaxy. This band's latest album has a lead single that declares, "Honey, I love you, that's all she wrote." This band included (*) "Ophelia" on their 2016 album *Cleopatra* and hit it big with a track that proclaims "I belong with you, you belong with me, you're my sweetheart." For 10 points, name this folk band that sings the infectious hit "Ho Hey."

ANSWER: The Lumineers <Vopava>

1. On this show, J.D. Salinger created a game show hosted by the dog Mr. Peanutbutter. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this animated TV show whose title character, voiced by Will Arnett, starred in a 1990s sitcom but has since become washed up.

ANSWER: BoJack Horseman

[10] BoJack Horseman airs on this online streaming service whose other original programming includes House of Cards and Orange is the New Black.

ANSWER: Netflix

[10] Will Arnett also stars in this other Netflix show as Chip, a recovering alcoholic who dispenses advice to people in Venice Beach.

ANSWER: Flaked < Golden>

2. Wikipedia has a remarkably long article on Major League Baseball records that are considered unbreakable, and they aren't kidding. For 10 points each:

[10] Perhaps the most out-of-reach record of them all is the one for wins by a pitcher, which is held this namesake of baseball's top pitching award. This man won an astonishing 511 games.

ANSWER: Cy **Young** [or Denton True **Young**]

[10] Chief Wilson set a record by hitting of 36 of this type of hit in 1912; since then, no one has hit more than 26.

ANSWER: **triple**s

[10] Cal Ripken Jr. holds the likely unbeatable record for consecutive games played, having not missed a game for a span of over 16 seasons. Within five percent, give the number of games in his streak.

ANSWER: $\underline{2,632}$ [accept answers between $\underline{2,501}$ and $\underline{2,763}$] <Nelson>

3. Hillary Clinton's 2016 presidential campaign was peppered with moments of incredible awkwardness. For 10 points each:

[10] After her acceptance speech, Clinton had a way-too-euphoric reaction to these objects at the 2016 Democratic National Convention.

ANSWER: **balloon**s [accept clear equivalents like the **balloon drop** at the DNC]

[10] Clinton's not-so-smooth attempts to connect with youth voters included asking Twitter followers to describe their student loan debt in this absurd manner.

ANSWER: with **emoji**s [accept **in 3 emojis or less** or answers very similar to that]

[10] In a supremely uncomfortable September 2016 interview between Clinton and this hip-hop singer of "Not Gon' Cry," the latter sang the Bruce Springsteen song "American Skin" while Hillary awkwardly sat and watched.

ANSWER: Mary J. <u>Blige</u> [or Mary Jane <u>Blige</u>] <Vopava>

4. For 10 points each, name these films that feature grizzled old prospectors:

[10] The prospector Yukon Cornelius helps the title character flee to the Island of Misfit Toys in this classic holiday TV special that first aired in 1964.

ANSWER: Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer

[10] The nefarious Stinky Pete tries to force his companions to go through with a trip to a Japanese museum in this 1999 animated sequel.

ANSWER: <u>Toy Story 2</u> [do not accept or prompt on "Toy Story" or "Toy Story 3"]

[10] In this 1948 classic, a disgruntled prospector played by Walter Huston teams up with two other men, including one played by Humphrey Bogart, to search for gold in the title region of Mexico

ANSWER: The <u>Treasure of the Sierra Madre</u> <Nelson>

5. Despite being crowned as king, this character opts to go home after concluding that he misses his parents. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this character, who finds himself in another world after being sent to bed without his supper in *Where the Wild Things Are*.

ANSWER: Max

[10] Max is sent to bed for causing havoc around his home while wearing one of these unusual articles of clothing.

ANSWER: **wolf costume** or **wolf suit** [accept reasonably similar answers that mention a "wolf"; prompt on "costume"]

[10] Both the film version of *Where the Wild Things Are*, and a documentary about Maurice Sendak, were directed by this man, a longtime music video director whose films include *Being John Malkovich* and *Adaptation*.

ANSWER: Spike **Jonze** ["jones"] [or Adam **Spiegel**] <Nelson>

6. In his youth, this NBA player performed live as a dancer in his native New York. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this point guard, who often shares a backcourt with Nicolas Batum [nic-o-lah bah-TOOM] and collegiate teammate Jeremy Lamb.

ANSWER: Kemba [Hudley] Walker

[10] Kemba Walker is a key player for this NBA team, which was formed as the Bobcats in 2004 after a different team with this name moved two years earlier.

ANSWER: Charlotte Hornets [accept either]

[10] Walker's reputation for hitting clutch shots goes back to his days with this collegiate team, with whom he won the 2011 national championship; this school may be more known for its women's team.

ANSWER: University of **Connecticut** [or **UConn**] <Nelson>

- 7. At the start of this game, a bell rings in the Kingdom of Lothric, foretelling the close of the Age of Fire. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this 2016 video game; it is the latest release in a punishingly-tough series whose players help kindle the First Flame at waypoints called bonfires.

ANSWER: **Dark Souls III** [do not accept or prompt on partial answers]

[10] Players who are killed in *Dark Souls* games don't experience a typical "Game Over" screen, but are instead greeted with this blunt two-word message.

ANSWER: YOU DIED

[10] *Dark Souls III* was published by a Japanese company created from the merger of toy company Bandai [BAN-dye] and this longtime video game giant that created *Galaxian* and *Pac-Man*.

ANSWER: <u>Namco</u>, Ltd. [accept <u>Bandai Namco</u> Entertainment or <u>Namco Bandai</u> Entertainment] < Vopava>

- 8. The title location of this album is referenced in a line that describes when a "band you're in starts playing different tunes." For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this seminal album by Pink Floyd, which includes the songs "Time" and "Brain Damage."

ANSWER: The Dark Side of the Moon

[10] *The Dark Side of the Moon* coincidentally syncs up astonishingly well with this 1939 film. People who believe the sync is intentional, who are wrong, claim the prism on the album's cover represents this film's change from black and white to color.

ANSWER: The Wizard of Oz

[10] This song from *The Dark Side of the Moon*, which samples interviews conducted by the band, begins in part by noting "Get a good job with good pay and you're okay."

ANSWER: Money < Nelson>

- 9. For 10 points each, name these As Seen On TV products whose commercials are comedic gold:
- [10] A woman's life and finances are left in utter ruin because she can't answer the phone *and* wear a blanket at the same time in the ad for this robe-blanket hybrid, which has sold over 20 million units.

ANSWER: **Snuggie**

[10] Vince Offer, an aggressively cool bro in a headset, screamed at viewers to buy this towel that can hold 10 times its weight in liquid.

ANSWER: ShamWow

[10] An infomercial for this "versatile personal countertop magician" follows a cast of weird, unrelated adults who all wake up in the same fancy house wanting breakfast, which raises numerous questions.

ANSWER: Magic Bullet <Vopava>

10. Before hitting it big, this musician played drums in his brother's German deathcore band Dioramic. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this Russian-born mononymous DJ and producer, whose hits include the Hayley Williams collaboration "Stay the Night."

ANSWER: **Zedd** [or Anton **Zaslavski**]

[10] Zedd is a featured artist on this Ariana Grande hit, in which she notes "this is the part when I" make the title action.

ANSWER: Break Free

[10] This singer and actress, whose early singles include "Love Myself," collaborated with Zedd on her song "Starving."

ANSWER: Hailee **Steinfeld** <Nelson>

11. This man has used the phrase "protecting the shield" to describe his sometimes dubious efforts to maintain football's integrity. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this man, the commissioner of the NFL.

ANSWER: Roger [Stokoe] Goodell [guh-DELL]

[10] Roger Goodell has generated controversy over his questionable handling of the league's research into concussions, as well as the link between concussions and this degenerative condition.

ANSWER: <u>CTE</u> [or <u>chronic traumatic encephalopathy</u>]

[10] Goodell instituted a player conduct policy, due in part to the high number of arrests of this team's players, including the now deceased Chris Henry. In 2006 this team's players accumulated more arrests than wins.

ANSWER: Cincinnati Bengals [accept either] < Nelson>

12. In 2017 TMZ released a video showing a German Shepherd being forcibly dunked into rushing water for a scene in this movie. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this 2017 tearjerker about the four different reincarnations of a canine's soul.

ANSWER: A Dog's Purpose

[10] *A Dog's Purpose* was described as a "manipulative" story that "whacks your emotions like a piñata" by Peter Travers, who has been the resident film critic for this magazine since 1989.

ANSWER: Rolling Stone

[10] The dog in *A Dog's Purpose* is voiced by Josh Gad, who also portrayed Olaf in this inescapable 2013 Disney film.

ANSWER: Frozen < Vopava>

- 13. Early episodes of this series touch on the awkward fact that the protagonist's son Leo is a small-time drug dealer. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this series, which begins with an explosion at the U.S. Capitol that kills the President, his cabinet and much of congress.

ANSWER: Designated Survivor

[10] *Designated Survivor* stars this actor as the HUD secretary who becomes President. He previously starred as counterterrorist extraordinaire Jack Bauer on 24.

ANSWER: Keifer <u>Sutherland</u> [or *deep breath* Kiefer William Frederick Dempsey George Rufus <u>Sutherland</u>]

[10] This Asian actress, who uses just her last initial for professional purposes, co-stars in *Designated Survivor* as an FBI agent investigating the Capitol attack.

ANSWER: Maggie **Q** [Or Margaret Denise **Quigley**] <Nelson>

14. For 10 points each, answer the following about mockumentary filmmaker Christopher Guest:

[10] Among Guest's best works is this film based on a fictional kennel club, in which numerous dogs and their ridiculous owners compete for the title award.

ANSWER: **Best in Show**

[10] Guest co-wrote and starred as Nigel Tufnel in a mockumentary about this fake rock band, which makes liberal use of umlauts and has amplifiers that "go to 11."

ANSWER: **Spinal Tap** [accept **This is Spinal Tap**]

[10] Guest's latest film, which was released in 2016, centers on these characters. A *Last Week Tonight* segment about these characters introduced one named "Clever Otis the GDP Predicting Horse."

ANSWER: **mascot**s [or **Mascots**] <Nelson>

15. For 10 points each, answer the following about songs that were banned by the BBC:

[10] The BBC has banned multiple songs by this band, including "A Day in the Life" and "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds," for their not particularly subtle drug references.

ANSWER: The Beatles

[10] This song by The Who was banned because the BBC felt the line "Why don't you all f-f-fade away" was offensive to people who stutter. In this song, the band sings they are "talkin' bout" the title people.

ANSWER: My Generation

[10] This duo sang "Ebony Eyes", which was deemed too upsetting because it concerns a man whose fiancee dies in a plane crash. They are more famous for songs like "Bye Bye Love" and "Wake Up Little Susie."

ANSWER: The **Everly Brothers** [accept **Don and Phil Everly**] <Golden>

16. Now that it's the 2010s, it's become trendy for stuff from the 1990s to come back and be cool again. For 10 points each:

[10] The elastic variety of this accessory worn around the neck has seen a major comeback, which People magazine credited in part to actress Cara Delevingne [del-eh-veen].

ANSWER: choker

[10] This clear beverage, which was sold in the early 1990s as a caffeine-free cola alternative, was brought back multiple times in the 2010s by the parent company Yum! Brands.

ANSWER: Crystal Pepsi [accept Crystal From Pepsi]

[10] This breakfast cereal, whose pieces look like small slices of bread, also made a glorious comeback. It shares two of its three words with another, inferior cereal.

ANSWER: French Toast Crunch < Nelson>

17. The "chopped and screwed" technique was developed by DJ Screw in this U.S. city. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this southern city, home to the Geto Boys and Scarface. The rappers Pimp C and Bun B were from Port Arthur near this city.

ANSWER: **Houston**, Texas

[10] Pimp C and Bun B comprised the group UGK, who collaborated on "International Players Anthem (I Choose You)" with this other hip-hop duo. Consisting of Big Boi and Andre 3000, they're more famous for songs such as "Ms. Jackson" and "Hey Ya!."

ANSWER: **OutKast**

[10] Lee and Patrick's relationship is strained by Patrick's wish to use his dead father's money to repair this inherited and beloved possession, which Lee wants Patrick to sell.

ANSWER: **boat** [accept more descriptive answers like **fishing boat** or **commercial boat**; accept answers referencing the **boat**'s **motor**] <Vopava>

19. The U.S.'s Karch Kiraly [kih-RYE] is the only athlete to win Olympic gold medals in multiple forms of this sport. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this sport, in which most possessions consist of a bump, a set, and a spike.

ANSWER: volleyball [accept beach volleyball]

[10] In all forms of volleyball, this statistic is defined as any hit to the opposing side, usually a spike, that directly results in a point being scored.

ANSWER: kills

[10] While beach volleyball is almost always played by teams of two, indoor volleyball is played with this many players on the court per team.
