Answer: Campbell

BONUS 13

Name these things you need to watch if you are pregnant. Ten points each.

A. This vitamin is essential for cell division, and it's especially important that you get enough of it while you're pregnant, because a deficiency can cause birth defects such as spina bifida and anencephaly.

Answer: folic acid or folate

C. Carboxylic acids react with alcohols to form what kind of organic compound?

Answer: esters

BONUS 19

For 10 points each, name these comedies by Aristophanes.

A. The title character convinces the women of Greece to withhold sexual privileges from their husbands in order to force them to negotiate an end to the Peloponnesian War.

Answer: Lysistrata

B. Strepsiades, an elderly farmer, enrolls his son Pheidippides in Socrates' school, the Thinkery, in hopes that he'll learn specious arguments to get out of paying debts, but instead, the son ends up learning how to argue with his father, who burns down the school in disgust.

Answer: The <u>Clouds</u> (or <u>Nephelai</u>)

C. Philocleon is addicted to serving on juries, a paid activity in Athens, which his son Bdelycleon looks on with disgust. The son persuades the father to hold trials at home, resulting in an acquittal, unusual for him, of the family dog for stealing cheese.

C. Taking over from a teacher who has committed suicide, an Algerian immigrant starts work at an elementary school in Montreal, and his own tragedies become revealed in this 2011 film.

Answer: Monsieur Lazhar

BONUS 21

Give the titles of these books beloved by libertarians. Ten points each.

A. Written by Friedrich Hayek, it warns of the danger of tyranny that inevitably results from government control of economic decision-making through central planning.

Answer: The Road to Serfdom

B. Henry Hazlitt's book is summarized by the author in one sentence: "The art of economics consists in looking not merely at the immediate but at the longer effects of any act or policy; it consists in tracing the consequences of that policy not merely for one group but for all groups."

Answer: Economics in One Lesson

C. In this work, Robert Nozick argues that governments should be "limited to the narrow functions of protection against force, theft, fraud, enforcement of contracts, and so on", and that anything else is an unjustified violation of property rights.

Answer: Anarchy, State, and Utopia
