EXTRA TOSSUPS

- 1. Tommy Hinds helps the protagonist of this novel by giving him a job as a porter. After being fired from her job, one character in this novel stops trying to woo the violinist Tamoszius. The protagonist of this novel befriends Jack Duane while in jail and joins Mike Scully's gang. The protagonist of this novel converts to (*) socialism after seeing Antanas, his son, drowned in a mud puddle on a busy street. Phil Connor rapes Ona in this novel, whose protagonist moves to Packingtown from Lithuania to work in unkempt factories. For 10 points, name this muckraking novel about Jurgis Rudkus that exposed Chicago's meatpacking industry, by Upton Sinclair. ANSWER: *The Jungle* <NS>
- 2. In one study, Marco van Bommel induced a "reversal" of this phenomenon among members of the "salient condition" by highlighting the names of participants in red. An experiment regarding this phenomenon involved someone faking a seizure over an intercom. This phenomenon was observed after the toddler Wang Yue was hit by a truck, prompting China to institute (*) Good Samaritan Laws. The most famous demonstration of this effect occurred when onlookers failed to intervene in the public murder of Kitty Genovese. For 10 points, name this effect in which being part of a group makes an individual less likely to recognize or react to an emergency.

ANSWER: bystander effect <JA>

3. A piece for this many musicians is based on a Richard Dehmel poem in which a woman admits adultery to her lover. Arthur Honegger ("OWN-egg-air") and Darius Milhaud ("MEAL-owe") belonged to a group of this many musicians, the number of a symphony containing a "limping waltz," the (*) Pathetique Symphony. This number of musicians play in Schoenberg's Transfigured Night. In another symphony of this number, the flute represents a nightingale in the "Scene by a Brook" - that symphony concludes with a final movement "Shepherd's Song." For 10 points, identify this symphony number of Beethoven's Pastoral Symphony, the number of players in a sextet.

ANSWER: six [accept Les Six] <NS>

4. This man was aided by the Mingo chief Tanacharison at the Battle of Jumonville Glen and exclaimed "It's a fine fox chase my boys!" during the Battle of Princeton. This man declared that he had grown "almost blind in the service of my country" in a speech that ended the Newburgh Conspiracy, and he was the target of the (*) Conway Cabal. This man led 13,000 militiamen to put down the Whiskey Rebellion. This man routed Johann Rall's Hessian ("HESH-un") mercenaries to win the Battle of Trenton, and he established a camp at Valley Forge. For 10 points, name this commander-in chief of the Continental Army and first U.S. president. ANSWER: George Washington <GP>

EXTRA BONUSES

- 1. Answer the following about Biblical beheadings, for 10 points each:
- [10] In the Book of Samuel, this Philistine warrior is beheaded after David defeats him in single combat. His name is now sometimes used as a synonym for "giant."

ANSWER: Goliath

[10] This apostle was the first to be martyred after King Herod Agrippa had him decapitated with a sword. This son of Zebedee was the elder brother of St. John.

ANSWER: Saint <u>James the Great</u>er [accept <u>Santiago</u>; prompt on <u>James</u>; do NOT accept or prompt on "James the Lesser"]

[10] The mother of James the Greater shares her name with this other woman, a daughter of King Herod II. After performing the Dance of the Seven Veils, she asks that the head of John the Baptist be brought to her on a silver plate.

ANSWER: Salome <JA>

- 2. Works written for this instrument include the *French Overture* and *Italian Concerto*. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this Baroque instrument which uses a plectrum to produce its sound, distinguishing it from its modern counterpart. François Couperin wrote a manual about the "art" of playing this instrument.

ANSWER: harpsichord

[10] The sixth and final part of this collection of pieces has a unique orchestration including a harpsichord, two viole da gamba, a violone, and two violas, but no violins. The third part of this collection begins with the violins playing "G F-sharp G, D-C-D" and includes a famous Phrygian half-cadence in its second movement.

ANSWER: **Brandenburg** Concertos

[10] Like the French Overture and Italian Concerto, the Brandenburg Concertos were written by this German composer.

.ANSWER: Johann Sebastian Bach <AN>

- 3. At the beginning of this novel, the protagonist meets Rosemary Hoyt, a young Hollywood star of the film *Daddy's Girl*. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this novel about Nicole Warren and psychiatrist Dick Diver, inspired by the author's wife Zelda.

ANSWER: **Tender Is the Night**

[10] This character gazes at a green light at the end of a dock from his home at the end of another novel by the same author. This protégé of Dan Cody is shot by George Wilson in the town of West Egg.

ANSWER: <u>Jay Gatsby</u> [accept either underlined portion; accept *The Great <u>Gatsby</u>*]

[10] This author wrote *Tender Is the Night* and *The Great Gatsby*.

ANSWER: F. Scott <u>Fitzgerald</u> [or Francis Scott Key <u>Fitzgerald</u>] <NS>

- 4. In July 2018, notorious felon Shoko Asahara was executed along with six other members of this organization. For 10 points each:
- [10] Asahara was the leader of this Japanese religious cult, whose name means "supreme truth". This group was famously responsible for a series of March 1995 sarin gas attacks that injured over 5,000 people.

ANSWER: **Aum Shinrikyo** [accept **Aleph**]

[10] That 1995 incident featured five synchronized terrorist attacks that each took place in this type of location. In 2005, three suicide bombings took place in these locations in London that were part of a system known as "The Tube."

ANSWER: <u>subway</u> cars [accept <u>subway</u>s or <u>subway</u> lines or <u>subway</u> systems; accept <u>underground</u>; accept <u>trains</u> in place of "subways"; prompt on <u>stations</u> or <u>subway stations</u>]

[10] The 1995 sarin gas attacks took place in the subway system of this world capital, the most populous city on Earth.

ANSWER: <u>Tokyo</u> <JA>
