(Note to moderator: Euler is pronounced 'oiler'.) This question was first raised in a letter written by a man named Christian to Leonhard Euler in 1742 and is still unanswered. By what name do we call the question: Is every even integer the sum of two primes?

ANSWER: Goldbach (Conjecture)

3. Biology

What term comes from the Greek words for naked seed? Many of the plants it refers to are conifers. Identify this class of seed plants that are not angiosperms.

ANSWER: Gymnosperm(s) (or Gymnospermae)

4. United States History

It was signed into law in 1944, and over the years has caused an investment of billions of dollars. Which bill at first provided six benefits, the most famous of which is education and training? It gives help to veterans.

ANSWER: GI Bill (of Rights) (or Servicemen's Readjustment Act) (GI stands for Government Issue)

5. Pop Culture

She met her husband at one of his concerts, and they got engaged at the premiere of her HBO film Introducing Dorothy Dandridge. This followed her stormy marriage to David Justice. Identify this actress who caused a sensation by the way she accepted an Oscar this year for her performance in Monster's Ball.

ANSWER: (Halle) Berry

6. Technology

Give the general term. What are the Epson Perfection 636U, Visioneer OneTouch 7600USB, Umax Astra 2200, and Hewlett Packard 4200C? They are used to convert pictures into computer files.

ANSWER: Scanner(s) (prompt on ScanJet)

7. British Literature

In which novel do leaders have titles such as Arch-Community Songster of Canterbury, Director of Predestination, and Director of Hatcheries and Conditioning? Most people wear clothes that identify them as being in a particular caste, and they revere Henry Ford. Identify this 1932 anti-utopian novel by Aldous Huxley.

ANSWER: Brave New World

8. Calculus (30 Seconds)

Find the area between the line y=2x+3 and the x-axis between x=0 and x=5.

ANSWER: 40

9. Language Arts

What ten-letter word beginning with the letter P is a synonym for unimaginative or commonplace? It comes from the Latin word for going on foot, and it is commonly used to describe a person who does so.

ANSWER: Pedestrian

10. Chemistry (30 Seconds)

Giving your answer to two significant figures, what is the pH of a solution if the hydrogen ion concentration is two times ten to the negative eighth moles per liter [2 x 10⁻⁸ moles/L]? As a hint, the common log of two is very close to 0.3.

ANSWER: 7.7

11. World History

Though it took place far from Europe, which war pitted British outlanders against Dutch farmers? The Dutch began fighting with victories at Ladysmith, Kimberley, and Mafeking, but British reinforcements eventually turned the tide. The British eventually controlled the towns of Bloemfontein and Pretoria. Identify this British victory in 1902 in what is now South Africa.

ANSWER: Boer (War)

12. Music

(Note to moderator: No singing, please. Nothing personal.) Which creature is brought strings and sealing wax and other fancy stuff by Little Jackie Paper? He lived by the sea and frolicked in the autumn mist in a land called Hannah-Lee. His song was written by Leonard Lipton and Peter Yarrow and was performed by Peter, Paul, and Mary.

ANSWER: Puff (The Magic Dragon)

13. United States Literature

Which short story begins, "True!--nervous--very, very dreadfully nervous I had been and am; but why will you say that I am mad?" The narrator is obsessed with one eye of an old man, so he kills the man. Identify this story by Edgar Allan Poe.

ANSWER: (The) Tell-Tale Heart

14. Physics (10 Seconds)

What are bound together by gluons? They bond with their antiparticles to form mesons. More importantly, three of them bond together to form hadrons, which in turn form almost all matter. Identify these subatomic particles that have charges of +2/3 or -1/3 compared to protons. They are classified as charmed, strange, up, down, top, or bottom.

ANSWER: Quark(s)

15. Current Events

When the Taliban originally took control of Afghanistan, who gave them fifty thousand dollars and weapons? In return, they promised to appoint him as their envoy to the United Nations. After this promise fell through, he organized Taliban opposition, and the Taliban retaliated by killing his father. Name the current leader of Afghanistan.

ANSWER: (Hamid) Karzai

16. Geometry/Trigonometry (30 Seconds)

Find the cosine of either acute angle inside the following isosceles trapezoid. The bases of the trapezoid are ten centimeters and twenty centimeters, and the height of the trapezoid is twelve centimeters.

ANSWER: 5/13

17. Religion/Mythology

What objects hold a parchment scroll with verses four through nine from the sixth chapter and verses thirteen through twenty-one of the eleventh chapter of Deuteronomy? A word meaning Almighty is supposed to be visible on the outside. These objects are meant to remind Jews of their obligations and are nailed to doorposts.

ANSWER: Mezuzah(s) (accept alternative pronunciations of the last syllable, prompt on doorpost)

18. Astronomy/Earth Science/Geography

Which province has been the largest source of oil in Canada? Most of it is plains, though tourists are often drawn to the Rocky Mountains in its Southwest corner. Identify this province that contains Medicine Hat, Red Deer, Lethbridge, Edmonton, and Calgary. It was named after Queen Victoria's daughter.

ANSWER: Alberta

19. Nonfiction

Which Scotsman wrote <u>The Theory of Moral Sentiments</u> in 1759? He is best known for the idea of the invisible hand, which he explained in <u>An inquiry into the nature and causes of the Wealth of Nations</u>.

ANSWER: (Adam) Smith

20. Art/Architecture

What was created between 200 and 100 BC and was found on the island of Melos in 1820? It probably is supposed to represent Aphrodite, but that is not the name commonly given to this sculpture. Identify this famous work currently located in the Louvre, except for the arms.

ANSWER: Venus de Milo

TIEBREAKERS

(Note to moderator: 'Cation' is pronounced cat-i-on, with a long i. 'Anion' is pronounced an-i-on, also with a long i.) This common term refers to an ionic compound consisting of a cation from a base and and an anion from an acid. Some kinds can be prescribed for medicinal purposes, though most people try to reduce it in their diet in order to remain healthy. Identify this four-letter word that often consists of an alkali metal combined with chlorine.

ANSWER: Salt
