## Tossups

1. Derogatively called Wiedertäufer (vee-der-TOY-fer) by theologians like Zwingli and considered heretics by Luther, this movement can be traced to the Zwickau prophets and Jan Matthys and John of : Leiden. King Ferdinand declared drowning, cynically called a third baptism, to be the method of execution for them. Thomas Muentzer and others of this group started a rebellion in Münster to form a stronghold for, FTP, what group that emphasized re-baptism for adults?

Answer: Anabaptism or Anabaptists
2. It is possible to form one of these edges in the absence of gravity, such as when light is shone in the direction of uniformly accelerated particles, because the light is never able to reach the particles. To a stationary observer, as an object approaches it, redshift tends towards infinity, and the object begins to approach it infinitesimally slowly. The observer will, in finite time, receive the last photon of electromagnetic energy from the object but will never see the object pass through it. FTP, name this astrophysical object that is found at the Schwarzschild radius, the apparent surface of a black hole.

Answer: Event Horizon (prompt on 'black hole' before it is read)
3. It was supposed to have been divided into 12 books, although its author died shortly after the 7 th book was started. The good Una and the evil queen Duessa represent a battle between Protestantism and Catholicism, and the Redcrosse Knight represents Saint George. Gloriana, based on Queen Elizabeth, is the titular character of, FTP, what 1596 epic poem by Edmund Spenser?

Answer: The Faerie Queen
4. In this movie, General Buck Turgidson and President Merkin Muffley attempt to resolve the chaos created by the insane General Jack K. Ripper. Based on Peter George's work Red Alert, one of the most memorable scenes is when the titular character repeatedly and mistakenly calls the President "Mein Führer." Slim Pickens portrays Major King Kong, the pilot of the B-52 airplane designated to carry out Plan R, which is to destroy Russian targets with nuclear weapons. FTP, name this 1964 Cold War satiric film by Stanley Kubrick.

Answer: Dr. Strangelove or How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb
5. One of them proposed the Assembly laws Lex Sempronia agraria, which confiscated all lands that exceeded a 320 acre limit from citizens and redistributed it. He accomplished this by sidestepping the Senate for a vote via the Popular Assembly, and by using violence against a tribune. Both of them also proposed changing of Roman citizenship laws, further land reforms, and other populist reforms. FTP, name these $2^{\text {nd }}$ century BC siblings, Tiberius and Gaius, who were murdered by order of the Roman Senate.

Answer: Tiberius Sempronius and Gaius Sempronius Gracchus OR the Gracchi brothers
6. It remained only sparsely populated until many British loyalists were expelled from the United States following the American Revolution. Andros Island produces most of the country's fresh water supply due to its springs; it is also the nation's largest island. Its climate is largely dominated by the Gulf Stream and it was heavily damaged by Hurricane Andrew. Consisting of 5000 square miles of land over 700 islands, FTP, name this nation off the southeast coast of Florida, home to the cities of Bimini, Freeport, and its capital, Nassau.

Answer: The Commonwealth of the Bahamas
7. Pencil and paper ready. Calculate the hypotenuse of the right triangle with the legs of length $x$ and $y$ where $x$ and $y$ are given by the simultaneous linear equations: $2 x-3 y=9$ and $5 x-11 y=5$. You have fifteen seconds.

Answer: 13 units
8. Owned by Wayne Weaver, they made a surprise run to the 1997 AFC championship after they pulled an upset against the Broncos. Under the leadership of their first coach, Tom Coughlin, players such as James Stewart, Tony Boselli, and Mark Brunell had much success through 1999, after which the team suffered a decline that ended last season, when they finished 12-4 but lost to the Patriots in a wild card playoff game. Now led by Fred Taylor and David Garrard in place of the injured Byron Leftwich, FTP name this Florida-based NFL team.

Answer: Jacksonville Jaguars (accept either answer)
9. One protagonist of this work sabotages the relationship of the other main character with Allie Cone, who is later killed by the latter out of jealousy. Chamcha, a voiceover specialist, and Farishta, a Bollywood movie star, are on a flight to England when the plane explodes, but the protagonists are magically transported to the ground unharmed. Farishta assumes the personality of the Archangel Gibreel, and Chamcha becomes a satyr, who later evolves into a devil. Visions interspersed in the novel include stories of an Imam and a controversial retelling of the life of Muhammed. FTP, name this novel that resulted in a fatwa against its author, Salman Rushdie.

Answer: The Satanic Verses
10. It was precipitated by William Cosby, as governor of New York, illegally seizing land, inflating his salary, and stripping the salaries of others. Many citizens became infuriated, and William Smith and James Alexander began to anonymously satire Cosby in several caustic editorials in the New York Weekly Journal. Because of this incident, the term "Philadelphia lawyer" has entered the English language, as Alexander Hamilton successfully won a court case when Cosby brought libel and sedition charges against the namesake publisher of the journal. FTP name this landmark 1734 court case regarding the freedom of press.

Answer: The James Peter Zenger Case or Trial (accept other equivalents)
11. This theory was originally proposed in 1954 by Ernst Mayr. It says that in large interbreeding populations, new and possibly advantageous mutations are diluted by the sheer size of the population, but when small segments of the population find themselves on the periphery of the environment, new challenges will amplify these natural changes. Opposed to phyletic gradualism, FTP, name this evolutionary theory that posits periods of rapid evolution interspersed between periods of little adaptation, first laid out by Niles Eldredge and Stephen Jay Gould.

Answer: Punctuated Equilibrium
12. After briefly attending Julliard, he dropped out to work under Charlie Parker, with whom he participated in many of Parker's bebop masterpieces. Early albums such as Sketches of Spain and Mile's Ahead feature him playing flugelhorn instead of his more trademark trumpet, and his album Bitches Brew became his first Gold Album and one in which he began experimenting with jazz-rock fusion styles. "Freddy Freeloader" was perhaps the most famous song of, FTP, this legendary jazz trumpeter known for the album Kind of Blue.

Answer: Miles Dewey Davis III
13. This character, a lawyer who recently became a bank manager, offers a job to Mrs. Linde early in work in which he appears. To pay for the Italian trip during this character's recovery, his wife lied about receiving the money from her father and actually forged her father's signature to obtain a loan from Krogstad. The conflict arises when this man seeks to fire Krogstad, not for immorality, but his overly familiar behavior, and the truth about the money is revealed. FTP, name this Henrik Ibsen character who gets walked out on, the husband of Nora in the play A Doll's House.

Answer: Torvald Helmer
14. This principle was first studied by Thorndike observing cats escape from puzzle-like cages, which led to his Law of Effect. Extinction refers to the lack of any consequence according to this principle, and factors like satiation and immediacy can influence the desired responses to positive or negative reinforcement or punishment. B.F. Skinner also studied this procedure with his namesake boxes. Defined as the use of consequences to modify behavior, FTP, identify this form of psychological conditioning opposed to the Pavlovian, or classical kind.

Answer: Operant Conditioning or Instrumental Conditioning or Instrumental Learning (do not accept 'Classical Conditioning'; prompt on 'Conditioning')
15. During this period, large amounts of land were distributed to poor farmer families and soldiers by the Hongwu Emperor. This dynasty was founded by Zhu Yuanzhang, who rebelled against the Mongol rulers to establish the last ethnically Han-ruled dynasty of China, during which Zheng He's naval fleet made notable voyages from 1405-33. FTP, name this dynasty that built the current Great Wall of China and ruled from 1368 to 1644 , when it was replaced by the Qing [ching] Dynasty.

Answer: Míng Dynasty
16. According to the Skaldskaparmal, this item was created by the brothers Sindri and Brokk using a pig's skin, Odin's ring, gold, iron, and blood, all combined in a forge. In one poem, it is stolen by a giant Thrymr, who demands a fair maiden goddess as ransom. At the scheduled wedding banquet the goddess is revealed to be this item's owner, who subsequently uses it to smash Thrymr. FTP, name this famous weapon in Norse myth that creates lightning when thrown and belongs to the god of Thunder.

Answer: Mjolnir (M-YOLE-ner) or Thor's hammer (accept reasonable equivalents)
17. This region was originally located on Chickasaw land that, prior to the Civil War, consisted of several large plantations such as those of Louis Granier, McCaslin, and Colonel Sartoris. It is bounded by the Tallahatchie River and its namesake river, with the county seat at Jefferson. Among its famous residents are the neurotic and necrophiliac Emily, the terminally ill Addie Bundren, the naive college student Temple Drake, and the mentally retarded Benji Compson. FTP, name this fictional county in Mississippi that is the locale for many stories by William Faulkner.

Answer: Yoknapatawpha county (pronounced "yok'na-pa-TAW-pha," accept close pronunciations)
18. The Sackur-Tetrode equation gives the entropy for one of these substances, and there are generally considered to be three types: the quantum Fermi, quantum Bose, and the classical Maxwell-Boltzmann variety. The Boltzmann distribution gives the probability distribution for the velocity or energy of their particles. When the expression for their internal energy is divided by the constant C sub V , a pressurevolume relationship for them is established to give their namesake law: P times V equals N times R times T. FTP, name this hypothetical substance that behaves more perfectly than a real gas.

## Answer: Ideal Gases

19. In works such as The Concept of Anxiety and Practice in Christianity, he occasionally wrote seemingly contradictory statements. His early works railed against the overemphasis of rationality and Hegelism, against which he argued for a more subjective definition of truth in works such as Concluding Unscientific Postscript. The author of a work about Abraham's willingness to sacrifice Isaac, Fear and Trembling, FTP name this Christian existentialist philosopher, the Danish author of Either/Or.

Answer: Søren Aabye Kierkegaard
20. This man was briefly the chair of the $9-11$ commission, resigning in December 2002 after only a month, and Christopher Hitchens has written a book denouncing his "crimes." He pursued friendly relations with Yahya Khan of Pakistan and Jorge Videla of Argentina, and more famously with Pinochet in Chile, but is best known for engineering SALT and improving U.S. relations with China. Perhaps the only high ranking official not linked with Watergate, FTP identify this Secretary of State under Richard Nixon, with a famous German accent.

Answer: Henry Kissinger
21. Before their move to Malta, this island was home to the Knights of St. John. During the Peloponnesian war, this island's three largest cities combined, and in 305 B.C. the Diodoch Demetrios Poliorketes built the Helepolis, a 105 ton siege tower, to capture its main city. It was sacked by Cassius in 42 B.C, although a 227 B.C. earthquake had already destroyed its most famous object. FTP identify this Greek island on which, with the scrap metal from the Helepolis, a famous colossus was built.

Answer: Rhodes

Set to choir and orchestra, Vivaldi also composed music for this piece named for the beginning of the doxology of the Roman Catholic Mass.

In this class of compounds, a hydroxyl group, or OH , is bonded to a carbon chain. They are denoted with the suffix -ol, such as ethanol.
