1. Phyllis Tickle, William Powell, Humphrey Bogart, George Gallup, Vincent Price, the Delany Sisters, Madeleine L'Engle, Barry Goldwater, Robin Williams, Phillips Brooks, Ann B. Davis, Clement Clark Moore, Presidents George H.W. Bush and Pierce, Robert E. Lee, Bishop Gene Robinson, W. H. Auden after 1939, and Daniel Webster on *The Book of Daniel* are all members of this Christian denomination, the founders of Saint Mary's School and the American branch of the Anglican Communion. [**Episcopal Church, USA** or **Episcopalians** (accept comparable equivalents, but do not accept Anglican Church)]
2. Its predecessor was invented in the late 17th century—called a “chalumeau,” it had a range of only 1.5 octaves. Johann Christoph Denner added a “speaker” or “register” key to the chalumeau, which in turn became this modern instrument that functions on twelfths, unlike all other woodwinds, which are on an octave system. Famous performers and teachers of this instrument include: Stadler, a friend of Mozart's; Klose, co-adapter of the Boehm system of fingering; Rose, composer of two books of etudes; Stoltzman, who performed with pianist Emanuel Ax at UNC-Chapel Hill last year; and Goodman, a jazz musician. Name this woodwind most commonly pitched in B flat. [**Clarinet**]
3. Black Coffee is 5.0, Human Blood is 7.35, Lemon Juice is 2.3, and Milk of Magnesia is 10.5 on this logarithmic scale which determines a solution's “potential of hydrogen,” thus determining the relative acidity or alkalinity of solutions. Name this scale used in chemistry classes. [**PH Scale**]
4. Paris Hilton says this is her favorite novel, while the Modern Library Association ranked it the number two novel of the twentieth century. It details the friction between new and old money on East and West Egg, depicting the drama of Tom Buchanan's crumbling marriage, as Tom has an affair with Myrtle while Tom's wife Daisy reignites an old affair. Narrated by Nick Carraway, FTP, name this Jazz Age novel, written by F. Scott Fitzgerald. [**The Great Gatsby**]
5. It is the name of the lost spaceship sought by Commander Adams in *Forbidden Planet*, the name of the antidote to the Chimera virus in *Mission: Impossible 2*, a species of Paleozoic snail, the first planet discovered around a sun-like star outside of the solar system, the name of the English ship on which Napoleon surrendered after the Battle of Waterloo, and the grandson of Sisyphus who conquered the Amazons and flew Pegasus to the heavens. FTP, give the common name. [**Bellerophon**]
6. It encompassed twenty-seven acres, and despite a walled perimeter, it was primarily open, as barracks were never constructed, so prisoners were left exposed to the elements. At its most crowded, it held over 30,000 men, who were subject to attacks from marauding gangs as well as the chief abuses of Superintendent Wirz, the only man executed by the US after the Civil War. FTP, name this infamous Confederate prison camp in Georgia. [**Andersonville**]
7. It is the only Turkish landmark to appear in *SimCity* and *Civilization IV*. A noteworthy example of Byzantine architecture, it was dedicated to the glory of God in 537 but was renamed and rededicated as a mosque by Ottoman Turks after

Constantinople was captured in 1453. In 1935, it was converted into a museum. FTP, name this fourth largest cathedral in the world, once known as Justinian's Basilica, a Greek Orthodox church known as The Church of the Holy Wisdom. [**Hagia Sophia**]

8. A third generation author, he worked at both *The Washington Post* and *Newsweek* before spending two years as a speechwriter for President Johnson, penning several speeches about the Vietnam War. His most famous novel came after leaving LBJ's administration, when he began researching marine life and sharks. Although he was most proud of his conservation work, his fame rested on his 1974 novel *Jaws*. FTP, name this author. [Peter **Benchley**]
9. Embargoed goods, Stocks & Other Securities, government IDs and licenses, lock-picking devices, recalled items without proof of repair, drugs & drug paraphernalia, alcohol, firearms, fireworks, stolen property, surveillance equipment, tobacco, counterfeit items, bootlegged videos & DVDs, current issues of catalogs, Cable TV Descramblers, animals, family members, a human soul, organs, children, a young woman's virginity, and a senior class' school are, FTP, some of the items prohibited to be sold on what internet auction site?
