### Toss Up Round, Round Three

1. His first cousin Louis was the first ever music teacher at Saint Mary's. In the 1840s, this Romantic composer toyed with producing opera based on *The Tempest* but rejected it as a nonviable project. This would have been held as a companion piece to his overture and music for another magic-based Shakespearean play, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. FTP, identify this German musician, perhaps most famous for the "Wedding March." [Felix **Mendelssohn**]
2. He played himself for three episodes of NBC's *Passions*, but he probably wasn't cast because he led the Crimson Tide to back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances in the "Big Dance," nor was he cast for winning two Alabama state basketball titles as a center for Andalusia High. His celebrity comes from a career of clutch plays, particularly deadly three-pointers in the playoffs. Only the second player ever to win NBA titles with three different teams, he has collected six championships (so far) with the Houston Rockets, Los Angeles Lakers, and San Antonio Spurs. FTP, name this man, whom Shaquille O'Neal dubbed "Big Shot Bob." [Robert **Horry**]
3. The daughter of Hyperion and Perseis, she married a prince of Colchis, whom she then murdered in order to take over his kingdom, only to be expelled by her subjects, relocating to the island of Aeaëa. Celebrated for her expertise with magic, herbs, and potions, she was traditionally known for using her skills for evil purposes. Although she has faced Wonder Woman as an adversary, she is best known for using her magic against Odysseus, who fathered a child with her. Name this sorceress, who turned Odysseus' men into swine. [**Circe**]
4. The only real country visited as part of *Gulliver's Travels*, this archipelago of 145,882 square miles currently has a population of more than 127 million people. Legend attributes creation of this nation to the sun goddess, from whom all emperors have descended, including Jimmu, the first to ascend the throne, in 660 BCE, a tradition of official doctrine until 1945. Name this nation, currently led by Junichiro Koizumi, which has its capital at Tokyo. [**Japan**]
5. In 1986, thirty-three years after his death outside the White Horse Tavern in New York, his long-lost screenplay for *The Doctor and the Devils* was brought to the screen. He is better known, however, for his poetry, including "Fern Hill" and "Do not go gentle into that good night." FTP, name this man, regarded as Wales' finest poet. [Dylan **Thomas**]
6. Possibly a model of a temple, it disappeared after the fall of Jerusalem in 586 BCE. It was placed in the Holy of Holies in Solomon's Temple. A wooden chest overlaid with gold, its contents were believed to be the stone tablets of the Ten Commandments. God's presence was believed to dwell in it when he communicated with Israel. FTP, name this item sound by Indiana Jones in his first film. [The **Ark of the Covenant**]
7. This geologic period was marked by the beginning of coral reef building and the appearance of numerous eurypterid crustaceans. The first land animals, scorpion-like creatures, and the first land plants, developed during this period. FTP, name this third period of the Paleozoic Era, immediately preceding the Devonian. [**Silurian**]

8. The Creation, Fire and Flames, Steeplechase Park, Luna Park, Dreamland, Eskimo Village, Midget City, and the Infant Incubator were all eventually part of this area, first discovered on Sept. 1, 1609 by Henry Hudson. It became an extravagant playground in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century and is famous as the first place to sell hot dogs. Name this area of New York that inspired a work by Lawrence Ferlinghetti. [**Coney Island**]
9. With an endorsement from Conan O'Brien, Tarja Halonen was reelected last month as President of this country, which is bound by the Baltic Sea to the Southwest and the Gulf of Bothnia to the West. A country of thousands of lakes and islands, a quarter of its territory lies above the Arctic Circle. FTP, name this Nordic nation with its capital at Helsinki. [**Finland**]
10. On the children's science-fiction show *Mentors*, he is the only historical figure to appear twice. Using Planck's ideas, he established quantum theory, using it to describe photoelectric effects. This theoretical physicist developed several concepts central to the study of the physics of the universe and won the 1921 Nobel Prize for Physics. FTP, name this espouser of the Theory of Relativity. [Albert **Einstein**]
