Name this Wellesley grad who, along with Sam Donaldson, is a regular on *This Week*. [Cokie **Roberts**]
- 2. After graduating from Enloe High School, he spent two years at Chowan College, where he led the Braves to the 1984 NJCAA basketball Final Four, and then transferred to NC State, playing for Jim Valvano. In 1986, he was drafted by the Seattle Supersonics, where he played for his entire 12-year career. A defensive specialist, he led the NBA in steals in 1993-94 and holds Sonics team records for both assists and steals. Known as "Mr. Sonic," name this man who coached the Sonics for five years before moving this season to Portland to lead the Trail Blazers. [Nate McMillan]
