TOSSUPS:

1. **Virginia Tech lost to this team in the last Black Coaches Association Football Classic. In a game against this team, Aaron Rodgers tied the NCAA record for most consecutive completed passes. In their first defensive series in an Orange Bowl, this team conceded a touchdown scored by Travis Wilson. On the next drive, Dominique Byrd caught a one-handed touchdown pass for this team that began a streak of 28 unanswered points.** (\*) Oklahoma lost 55-19 to this team in the 2005 BCS National Championship Game. The BCS vacated that National Championship won by this team after the imposition of sanctions for improper gifts given to Reggie Bush. Matt Leinart won the Heisman Trophy as the quarterback of, for 10 points, what Pac-12 football team?

ANSWER: the USC Trojans [accept either underlined part; accept the 2004 USC Trojans; accept University of Southern California for "USC"]

2. **Mike Zigomanis played part of the 2010 season professionally in this country before being signed by the Toronto Maple Leafs. The Leafs used their first-round picks in the 2014 and 2017 NHL drafts to select players born in this country. One Toronto defenseman from this country was inducted into the (\*) Hall of Fame in 1996; that defenseman leads the Leafs in all-time assists. A Leafs forward from this country scored his 500th career goal on a shorthanded overtime slapshot against Calgary in 2006. That player from this country captained the Leafs from 1997 to 2008. For 10 points, name this country whose national team has featured Börje ("bor-yuh") Salming, William Nylander, and Mats Sundin.**

ANSWER: Sweden [or the Kingdom of Sweden; or Sverige]

3. **Joe Rantz won a gold medal at these Olympic Games on an eight-man rowing team from the University of Washington. In the high jump at these Olympics, Ibolya Csák ("Chahk") defeated 16-year-old Dorothy Odam in a jump-off. Toni Merkens was fined instead of being disqualified after committing a foul in the sprint cycling final at these Olympics. Marty Glickman and Sam (\*) Stoller were controversially replaced on the American 4x100 ("4 by 100-metre") relay team at these Olympics. Luz Long supposedly helped a long jump competitor qualify at these Olympics by advising him to jump early; that athlete won the long jump at these Olympics. For 10 points, name these Olympic Games where Jesse Owens won four gold medals.**

ANSWER: the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games [or Games of the XI Olympiad; accept the 1936 Summer Olympics; prompt on the 1936 Olympics; do not prompt on or accept references to the "1936 Winter Olympics"]

4. **One player who usually plays this position earned the loss as a pitcher in the 2019 game where Vince Velasquez recorded an outfield assist. In the 2020 NLCS, a person who plays this position hit his first career home run while his team trailed the Dodgers 15-0. Another player at this position made the game-ending catch in the tenth inning of a 14-12 game between the Yankees and the Twins in 2019. In 2017, a person who plays this position hit home runs in (\*) five consecutive World Series games, earning him that year's World Series MVP. That athlete who plays this position signed a six-year contract with the Blue Jays ahead of the 2021 season. For 10 points, name this position played by George Springer and Mike Trout.**

ANSWER: center fielder [accept CF; prompt on outfielder; prompt on OF]

5. **Manuel Orantes beat this player to win his only career Grand Slam final. This athlete called David Littlefield "a bum" after Littlefield called a ball out in a tie-break against Aaron Krickstein at the U.S. Open. This athlete defeated Ken Rosewall in Rosewall's last Grand Slam final and Ilie Nastase partnered with this player to win his only U.S. Open doubles title. In 1976, (\*) Bjorn Borg lost a third set tie-break 11-9 ("eleven nine") to this player in the U.S. Open Final. This athlete beat Paul Haarhuis ("HARR-hooss") in the quarterfinals of the 1991 U.S. Open at the age of thirty-nine. For 10 points, name this five-time U.S. Open singles champion whose contentious rivalry with John McEnroe ("MACK-en-row") came to a head at two Wimbledon finals.**

ANSWER: Jimmy Connors [prompt on Jimbo]

6. Jenna Mohr and Annette Sagen were among the plaintiffs in a lawsuit brought against the Vancouver Olympic Organizing Committee concerning Olympic eligibility in this sport. The “Harry Potter” of this sport won two gold medals at the Vancouver Olympics. At the 1998 Olympics, Kazuyoshi Funaki became the first person to receive a (\*) perfect style score at the Olympics in the history of this sport. Scores in this sport are calculated relative to a K-point and Andreas Dascher helped develop this sport’s “classic” style. That technique in this sport was supplanted by a technique pioneered by Jan Boklov often called the “V”. The Nordic combined event is made up of cross-country skiing and, for 10 points, what other sport?

ANSWER: ski jumping [accept the ski jump; do not prompt on or accept “ski flying”]

7. In a game between the Stars and this team, one announcer said “Matty Niskanen’s not gonna be such a pretty little boy anymore”. Though his name isn’t on the Stanley Cup, Sheriff Shane Hnidy (“NY-dee”) played three playoff games during this team’s run to one of its Stanley Cup victories. In an interview on Hockey Night in Canada, Mark Recchi announced (\*) his retirement live after winning the Stanley Cup with this team. Another member of this team received a major penalty but no additional suspension on a play that concussed Max Pacioretty. That player, who held the record for hardest slap shot for eight years, won his only Stanley Cup with this team. For 10 points, name this NHL team captained for many years by Zdeno Chara.

ANSWER: the Boston Bruins [accept either underlined part]

8. The only non-PAT (“non P-A-T”) scoring play in the first half of this game was a 13-yard touchdown pass to James Jett. In the fourth quarter of this game, one quarterback led a 67-yard drive that included a throw bobbled by David Patten, but caught by Jermaine Wiggins. That drive concluded with a 6-yard rushing touchdown from New England’s quarterback that cut their deficit to 3. An incomplete pass from (\*) Rich Gannon to Jerry Rice gave the Patriots one last drive to tie this game at 13. Adam Vinateiri made a 45-yard field goal in the snow to tie this game and drilled a 23-yarder to win it in overtime. For 10 points, name this game in which a fourth quarter fumble call on a sack of Tom Brady was overturned and deemed an incomplete pass, much to the dismay of Raiders fans.

ANSWER: the Tuck Rule Game [accept 2002 Playoff game between the Oakland Raiders and New England Patriots; accept Raiders for “Oakland”; accept Patriots for “New England”; accept Divisional Round game for “Playoff Game”; accept Snow Bowl 2; prompt on “The Snow Bowl” with “between which two teams?”]

9. The Portland Trailblazers selected this player from the San Diego Rockets in the 1970 NBA expansion draft and traded him to the Lakers where he guarded Jerry West during practice. As a coach, this man feuded with Phil Jackson and led the Knicks to a finals appearance in 1994. This head coach filed a trademark for the word “three-peat” after winning the (\*) 1988 finals, though his team would be swept by the Pistons the following year. As a team president, this man traded Avery Bradley to the Rockets to acquire Victor Oladipo. In 2010, this team president traded for Chris Bosh to complete his team’s “Big Three”. For 10 points, name this coach of the “showtime” Lakers and current president of the Miami Heat.

ANSWER: Pat Riley

10. Fans of this team used the Green Weenie to jinx its opponents. That jinx was created by this team’s broadcaster Bob Prince, who used the phrase “Chicken on the Hill” when this team’s first baseman hit home runs. In the first MLB game with a black manager, Gene Baker managed this team after the ejection of Danny Murtaugh. This team took the lead in one World Series Game 7 on a three-run home run hit by (\*) Hal Smith. This team rallied behind the song “We Are Family” to win another World Series with a first baseman sometimes called “pops”. This team beat the Yankees in the 1960 World Series on a walk-off home run hit by Bill Mazeroski. For 10 points, name this team that won the 1971 World Series with Willie Stargell (“STAR-jull”) and Roberto Clemente (“kluh-MEN-tee”).

ANSWER: the Pittsburgh Pirates [accept either underlined part]

11. **A penalty scored by this player against Rochdale in the 2017-2018 FA Cup was disallowed after this player was deemed to have feinted (“fainted”) in the run-up. In a 2019 match against Everton, Andre Gómes sustained an ankle injury on a slide tackle committed by this player. This player scored braces against Stoke City and Middlesbrough in September of 2016, leading this player to win (\*) Premier League Player of the Month. In a match against Burnley, this player dribbled past seven opposing players to score a goal later awarded the 2020 Puskas Award. This player set a Premier League record with Harry Kane for most goals and assists between two players in a season. For 10 points, name this Tottenham winger who also plays for the South Korean national team.**

ANSWER: Son Heung-min [or Heung-min Son]

12. **One coach left this team after Kevin Feterik was named its starting quarterback by his father, the team owner. Jeff Garcia won the MVP award for a game won by this team on a Mark McLoughlin field goal. In another game won by this team, an illegal block committed by Taylor Reed nullified a Brandon Banks punt return late in the fourth quarter. This team’s placekicker Rene Paredes has made all 11 of his career Grey (\*) Cup field goals. At the 2018 Grey Cup, Dave Dickenson coached this team to victory against the Ottawa RedBlacks. Bo Levi Mitchell led this team’s offense at the 2014 and 2018 Grey Cups. For 10 points, give this CFL team named after a summer festival in its hometown.**

ANSWER: the Calgary Stampeders [accept either underlined part]

13. **One athlete stepped in a hole, twisting their ankle, the day before tying the world record in this event at the 1960 Olympics. Another athlete danced to the song “Tighten Up” before breaking the world record in this event. The first person to retain the Olympic title in this event was that other athlete, Wyomia Tyus. In a photo finish at the 1996 Olympics, Marlene Ottey lost this race to (\*) Gail Devers. In 2016, the first-ever Olympic threepeat in this race was prevented by the gold medal win of Elaine Thompson-Herah. A positive cannabis test prevented Sha’Carri Richardson from participating in this race at the Tokyo Olympics in 2021. For 10 points, name this race whose world record has been held since 1988 by Florence Griffith-Joyner.**

ANSWER: the Women’s 100-meter dash [accept obvious equivalents; prompt on partial answers]

14. **After a failed “mandatory experiment” conducted by the FIH in 2013, rules were changed so that this action resulted in a long corner. Newcastle was relegated from the Premier League in 2010 after one instance of this action performed by Damien Duff. In a match against Grenada, Barbados qualified for the 1994 Caribbean cup after (\*) their defender, Terry Sealey, performed this action. Andres Escobar’s performance of this action in a 1994 World Cup match between the United States and Colombia is often linked to his murder. In a game against the Calgary Flames, Steve Smith accomplished this feat in Game 7 of a 1986 playoff series lost by the Edmonton Oilers. For 10 points, name this feat in which a player puts a ball or puck into the net they are defending.**

ANSWER: scoring an own goal [accept scoring a self-goal; accept descriptions of scoring on your own net; accept playing the ball behind the goal line until “Newcastle”]

15. **In a game between this country and Fiji, Savenaca Rawaca made his international debut in the 15-a-side game. In 2003, this country beat Russia to qualify for its first ever World cup. This country’s best result at a World cup came in 2015, beating Tonga and Namibia to finish third in their pool. This country has won the Rugby Europe International Championship 12 times in the past 15 years, finishing second the other three years to (\*) Romania. The top try scorer for this country is Mamuka Gorgodze (“gor-got-zay”). Rugby’s similarity to this country’s folk sport lelo burti has led this country’s rugby team to sometimes be called the Lelos. For 10 points, name this country whose national rugby team plays their home games at Mikheil Meskhi (“mi-KALE MESS-key”) Stadium in Tbilisi (“tuh-BLEE-SEE”).**

ANSWER: Georgia

16. **Andrew Bogut injured this body part in 2015 while attempting to block a K.J. McDaniels dunk. In Game 2 of a playoff series against the Trailblazers, Torey Craig received a standing ovation when he returned to the court after injuring this body part. Marcin Gortat injured this body part in a 2011 game by colliding with Steve Nash. While driving to the hoop against (\*) Serge Ibaka, LeBron James injured this body part in 2014. A Dwyane Wade foul at the 2012 All-Star Game caused Kobe Bryant to fracture this body part. Rip Hamilton wore what he called his “superman cape” to protect this body part, which he broke three times in his career. LeBron James was asked to wear a clear mask instead of a black one to protect himself after breaking, for 10 points, what body part?**

ANSWER: nose

17. **Defenseman Eric Desjardins scored a hat trick in Game 2 of this playoff series by tying the game on a power play goal and scoring the overtime winner. John LeClair scored back-to-back overtime goals in the third and fourth games of this series, giving the eventual victors of this series ten consecutive overtime playoff wins. Jacques Demers caused a critical penalty to be called in this series by asking for (\*) Marty McSorely’s stick curvature to be measured. Kirk Muller scored the winning goal of this series in Wayne Gretzky’s last Finals appearance. Patrick Roy (“wa”) won his second Conn Smythe Trophy after, for 10 points, what series in which the Montreal Canadiens beat the Los Angeles Kings?**

ANSWER: 1992-1993 Stanley Cup Finals [accept equivalent mentioning the year such as the 1992-1993 NHL Finals; do not prompt on or accept “the 1992 Stanley Cup Finals”]

18. **In 2015, Alexis Sanchez scored a goal using this technique to give his nation their first ever Copa America title. In a semi-final at the 2000 Euros, Francesco Totti scored a goal using this move to help his team beat the Netherlands. Zinedine Zidane scored a goal using this technique that hit the top crossbar before bouncing into the net in the 2006 (\*) World Cup final. Messi’s 700th career goal was scored using this move. This technique is named after a Czech player who used it to score in the 1976 UEFA European Championship Final against West Germany. For 10 points, name this penalty kick technique that sees the kicker lightly tapping the ball straight at the net, counting on the goalkeeper to commit to diving either left or right.**

ANSWER: a Panenka [accept Il cucchiaino, the spoon, cavadinha, little dig, penal picado, or poked penalty kick before “Czech player”]

19. **One Yankee with this last name hit the final home run ever hit at the original Yankee Stadium. After A.J. Burnett intentionally walked David Murphy, another player with this last name hit the go-ahead home run in Game 4 of the 2010 ALCS. That player became the first person to not score a run for his own solo homer when Emmanuel Burriss pinch ran for him in 2008. Aaron (\*) Heilman gave up a two-run homer to a third baseball player with this last name in Game 7 of the 2006 NLCS. That player with nine Gold Gloves gifted his brother two packages of cheese crackers before a 2014 regular season game between the Rays and Cardinals. For 10 points, give this last name shared by major league catchers José, Bengie, and Yadier (“YA-dee-AIR”).**

ANSWER: Molina (“mo-LEE-nuh”) [accept the Molina brothers; accept Yadier Molina; accept Bengie Molina; accept José Molina]

20. **Sonny Boswell was one of six players on this team signed by the Chicago Studebaker Flyers to replace players drafted into the Second World War. Ermer Robinson made the winning shot in a game between this team and the Minneapolis Lakers. One newspaper headline following that game was “Mikan (“MIKE-uhn”) cooks Tatum’s Goose”, referring to the poor performance of this team’s center Goose Tatum. The New Jersey Reds beat this team after “Red” (\*) Klotz made a three-pointer and the last shot of the game was missed by Meadowlark Lemon. Before being drafted by the Philadelphia Warriors, Wilt Chamberlain played the 1958-59 season with this team. For 10 points, name this team whose signature song is a whistled rendition of “Sweet Georgia Brown”.**

ANSWER: the Harlem Globetrotters [accept either underlined part]

1. The U.S. Women's National Team has won this annual invitational in four of the six years that it has been held. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this four-team round-robin soccer tournament, hosted in the spring by the United States. This tournament is accompanied by a namesake "summit", a speakers series dedicated to Women's empowerment.

ANSWER: the **SheBelieves Cup**

[10] This golden boot winner at the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup is the all-time goals leader at the SheBelieves Cup. Along with Alex Morgan and Carli Lloyd, this player co-captained the U.S. Women's National Team from 2018 to 2020.

ANSWER: Megan **Rapinoe**

[10] The 2021 SheBelieves Cup was held in this American city. Marta has played since 2017 for an NWSL team from this city nicknamed the Pride.

ANSWER: **Orlando**, Florida

2. In 1984, the NBA copied an idea from the ABA and held its first ever slam dunk contest. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this Suns power forward who won the inaugural dunk contest. In the 2018 NBA dunk contest, this player's son wore an old Phoenix jersey and performed a cradle dunk to imitate this player's winning dunk from 1984.

ANSWER: Larry **Nance Sr.**

[10] The 1985 NBA dunk contest was won by this Hawks superstar, nicknamed the human highlight reel. This player ended the 1985 contest with a two-handed windmill dunk to beat Michael Jordan in the final.

ANSWER: Jacques Dominique **Wilkins**

[10] In 1986, this point guard beat his teammate Dominique Wilkins in the final to win the dunk contest. Listed at 5 foot 6, this player, who couldn't palm a basketball, is the shortest player to ever win the NBA dunk contest.

ANSWER: Spud **Webb** [or Anthony **Webb**]

3. This person was suspended from fighting in the UFC after testing positive for banned substances following his victory over Daniel Cormier. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this fighter who held the UFC light heavyweight championship from 2011 to 2015 and again from 2018 to 2020. In 2020, this fighter voluntarily vacated that title amid pay disputes with the UFC.

ANSWER: Jon **Jones** [or Jonathan Dwight **Jones**]

[10] Jones defeated this Swedish fighter with a TKO in the third round to reclaim his light heavyweight title. In 2013, this fighter controversially lost to Jones at UFC 165 in a unanimous decision.

ANSWER: Alexander **Gustafsson**

[10] Jones' only UFC loss came in 2009 in a fight against this person. Jones was disqualified in that fight for illegal elbow strikes to this fighter's head.

ANSWER: Matt **Hamill**

4. Chuck Thompson was forced to do a radio play-by-play call during plays in this drive after fans at the site of this drive accidentally disconnected a television power cable. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this drive that ended with a Paul Ameche touchdown scored from the 1-yard line. Offensive end Jim Mutscheller caught a floating 6-yard pass on 2nd and Goal during this drive.

ANSWER: The overtime **game-winning drive** of "**The Greatest Game Ever Played**" [accept the overtime **game-winning drive** of the **1958 NFL Championship Game**]

[10] This Baltimore Colt led the overtime game-winning drive in "The Greatest Game Ever Played". This quarterback nicknamed the Golden Arm won NFL MVP Awards in 1958 and 1959.

ANSWER: Johnny **Unitas** [accept **Johnny U**]

[10] This Hall of Fame Colts receiver caught 12 passes thrown by Unitas in "The Greatest Game Ever Played". The Colts organization retired the number 82 for this six-time Pro Bowler.

ANSWER: Raymond **Berry**

5. This NHL team played their home games at the Cow Palace from 1991 to 1993. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this team which was captained by Doug Wilson during their Cow Palace years. This team set the record for most losses in an NHL season with 71 in the '92-'93 season.

ANSWER: the **San Jose Sharks**

[10] After moving to the San Jose Arena, the Sharks hosted the 1997 All-Star Game where this Sharks winger scored two goals in 8 seconds. This player was drafted first overall by the Nordiques in the 1990 NHL Draft and traded to San Jose in 1995.

ANSWER: Owen **Nolan**

[10] This player took over as Sharks captain in the 2003-2004 season and is the franchise leader in goals and points. Along with assistant captain Joe Thornton, this player led the Sharks to the best record in the NHL in 2008-09.

ANSWER: Patrick **Marleau**

6. The postponed start of the 2020 MLB season introduced many new fans to the bat-flipping world of the Korean Baseball Organization. For 10 points each, answer some questions about former KBO pitchers in the MLB.

[10] This former Hanwha Eagles pitcher won the KBO MVP award in 2006. This pitcher finished top 3 in Cy Young voting in 2019 and 2020, pitching for the Dodgers and Blue Jays respectively.

ANSWER: Hyun-Jin **Ryu** [or **Ryu** Hyun-Jin]

[10] This former SK Wyverns lefty won the KBO MVP award in 2008. This St. Louis Cardinal made his MLB debut in 2020, starting eight games and recording one save while pitching to a 1.62 ("one six two") earned run average.

ANSWER: Kwang-Hyun **Kim** [or **Kim** Kwang-Hyun]

[10] This former Mets prospect led the KBO in strikeout percentage with the Doosan Bears in 2020. He signed with the Mariners in 2020 and led the team in wins in 2021.

ANSWER: Chris **Flexen**

7. After playing one season with Arsenal, this player made the move to Serie A in 2019. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this Armenian midfielder that was part of a disastrous 2018 swap deal with Alexis Sanchez. As a member of Borussia Dortmund, this player won Bundesliga's Player's Player of the Season in 2016.

ANSWER: Henrikh **Mkhitaryan** ("mi-kuh-TAR-ee-uhn")

[10] Mkhitaryan has spoken out about his dislike of the nickname "Mickey", a name supposedly given to him by this manager during his time at Dortmund. Under this manager, Mainz 05 played its first season in top-tier football since 1962.

ANSWER: Jürgen **Klopp**

[10] Klopp expressed his unhappiness that Mario Götze announced his intended departure from Dortmund just before the second leg of this tie. Dortmund won this tie 4-3 ("four three") on aggregate with Robert Lewandowski scoring all four goals in the first leg.

ANSWER: the 2012-**2013** UEFA **Champions League semi**-final against Real Madrid [or the 2012-**2013** UEFA **Champions League** semi-final tie **against Real Madrid**; prompt on UEFA **Champions League semi**-final with "In what year?"]

8. One rider nicknamed “The Cannibal” was awarded this object at the end of all but four stages of the 1970 Tour de France. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this object, first awarded in 1919. This award is given to the cyclist who leads the general classification at the end of each stage of the Tour de France.

ANSWER: yellow jersey [or maillot jaune; accept yellow shirt]

[10] This jersey is given to the Tour de France cyclist who earns the most points for reaching mountain summits first. At the end of the Tour, this jersey is awarded to the rider who claims the title of “King of the Mountains”. A description is acceptable.

ANSWER: white jersey with red polka dots [or maillot à pois rouges; accept descriptions which mention red dots; prompt on polka dots or equivalents with “What colour?”]

[10] This cyclist has won the most red polka dot jerseys, accumulating seven King of the Mountains titles. This rider was given a nine-month ban by the Swiss cycling federation for his involvement in the Festina affair.

ANSWER: Richard Virenque

9. Answer some questions about the final of the 2010 NCAA Men’s College Basketball tournament. For 10 points each:

[10] This school won the 2010 National championship game. Coached by Mike Krzyzewski (“shuh-sheff-skee”), this school held a very contentious rivalry with the University of Maryland before Maryland moved to the Big Ten.

ANSWER: Duke University [accept the Duke Blue Devils]

[10] Duke won the game after a last-second Hail Mary was missed by this Butler Bulldog. Despite an abysmal 2-11 (“2 for 11”) from the field, this player led Butler in scoring with 12 points for the game.

ANSWER: Gordon Hayward

[10] On the play before Hayward’s Hail Mary, this Duke Center intentionally missed a free throw at the instruction of Coach K. This player led Duke in rebounds per game during the 2009-2010 season.

ANSWER: Brian Zoubek

10. At the 1932 Olympics in Lake Placid, Eddie Eagan took home an Olympic gold medal in this sport, becoming the second person to-date to have won a gold medal at both the summer and winter Olympics. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this winter sport in which Eagan won gold 12 years after winning an Olympic gold medal in boxing. At the 1932 Winter Olympics, soccer player Louis Van Hege (“HAY-guh”) competed in this sport on a track now named for Mt. Van Hoevenberg.

ANSWER: bobsleigh [accept bobsled; do not prompt on or accept “luge” or “skeleton”]

[10] Perhaps a more memorable bobsleigh moment came in 1988 when Dudley Stokes and Michael White made this country’s Olympic bobsleigh debut. This fan-favourite team failed to finish their final run in the four-man event.

ANSWER: Jamaica

[10] This linebacker won two NFL Championships with the Cleveland Browns as a player before winning four NFL titles as head coach of the Steelers. After a 1985 game against Denver, Gary Anderson lashed out at this coach for Pittsburgh’s poor play on special teams.

ANSWER: Chuck Noll [or Charles Noll]

[10] This linebacker led the Vikings in tackles en route to making the 1994 Pro Bowl. This linebackers coach for the Super Bowl-winning 2000 Ravens currently serves as defensive coordinator of the Washington Football Team.

ANSWER: Jack Del Rio Jr.

[10] As a linebacker for the Bills, this coach won the 1979 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year Award. Sean Payton succeeded this coach as head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

ANSWER: Jim Haslett [or James Haslett]

12. The 1994 iteration of this event was marred by the tragic deaths of Roland Ratzenberger and Ayrton Senna. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this Grand Prix that was featured on the F1 calendar between 1981 and 2006. This Grand Prix named after a European microstate was held at the Autodromo Enzo e Dino Ferrari.

ANSWER: San Marino Grand Prix

[10] Despite its name, the San Marino Grand Prix was held in this Italian city. This city's circuit returned to the F1 calendar in 2020 with the addition of the Emilia Romagna Grand Prix.

ANSWER: Imola

[10] Prior to his death at Imola, Roland Ratzenberger drove for this Formula 1 team. Andrea Montermini replaced Ratzenberger on this team during its 1994 season whose other drivers included David Brabham.

ANSWER: Simtek

13. Answer some questions about NHL moustaches. For 10 points each:

[10] In 1988, this fan-favourite forward won the first ever King Clancy Memorial Trophy. The next year, this red-moustachioed co-captain of the Flames won his only Stanley Cup before retiring.

ANSWER: Lanny McDonald

[10] McDonald expressed support for this Flames forward who unveiled a Lanny-esque moustache ahead of the 2019 playoffs. This former fourth overall pick is the youngest player in Flames history to score a hat trick.

ANSWER: Sam Bennett

[10] This Leafs winger nicknamed "The Nose" scored the Stanley Cup winning goal off his backside in 1963. This man's "Mr Pringles"-esque handlebars were so popular that he became a Schick razors spokesman upon retirement.

ANSWER: Eddie Shack

14. It seems like the people who vote for the Heisman trophy forget that defensive players can win it too. Name these defensive players that have been on the Heisman shortlist. For 10 points each:

[10] In 1997, this cornerback and punt returner became the only primarily defensive player to win the Heisman Trophy. While at Michigan in '97, this player made a toe-tapping one-handed interception against Michigan State.

ANSWER: Charles Woodson

[10] In 2012, this Notre Dame linebacker finished second in Heisman voting to Johnny Manziel. The San Diego Chargers selected this player in the second round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

ANSWER: Manti Te'o

[10] Starting at Stanford as a fullback, this linebacker received three first place votes in the race for the 2010 Heisman trophy. This inaugural winner of the Paul Hornung Award was drafted by Cleveland in the fourth round.

ANSWER: Owen Marecic

15. In 2008, a non-skating John Tavares ("tuh-VAR-es") scored his 597th career goal in a game against the New York Titans to become this league's all-time leading scorer. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this league won most recently by the Calgary Roughnecks in 2019. The Georgia Swarm, Saskatchewan Rush, and San Diego Seals all play in this league.

ANSWER: the National Lacrosse League [accept the NLL]

[10] Tavares is the current head coach of this NLL franchise which lost to Calgary in the 2019 NLL Championship. Tavares played his whole NLL career with this team.

ANSWER: the Buffalo Bandits [accept either underlined part]

[10] In 2008, the Bandits won the NLL championship over this team led in scoring by Dan Dawson. This team captained by Pat Jones wound up making the final in 2008 despite a 6-10 ("six and ten") regular season record.

ANSWER: the Portland LumberJax [accept either underlined part]

16. Answer some questions about the history of great Dodgers pitching. For 10 points each:

[10] These two pitchers have each won three Cy Young awards and an MVP with the Dodgers. One of these pitchers threw a no-hitter every year from 1962 to 1965 and the other threw a no-hitter in his 2014 season.

ANSWER: Sandy **Koufax** (“KOH-fax”) and Clayton **Kershaw** [accept in either order]

[10] This man is the only Dodgers pitcher not named Koufax or Kershaw to win the MVP and Cy Young in the same season, doing so in 1956. This pitcher played two seasons for the Newark Eagles as a teenager before joining the Dodgers and winning the NL Rookie of the Year award in 1949.

ANSWER: Don **Newcombe**

[10] This pitcher is the Dodgers all-time leader in wins and strikeouts. He pitched with Koufax and Don Drysdale in his 1966 rookie season and spent 16 years of his Hall of Fame career with the Dodgers before retiring in 1988.

ANSWER: Don **Sutton**

<Baseball, JW>

17. In 2005, this receiver won the “triple crown”, leading the NFL in receptions, receiving yards, and receiving touchdowns. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this player who scored the game-winning touchdown in a double overtime game during the 2004 NFL playoffs. This hothead was suspended after an altercation with teammate Anthony Bright that sent Bright to the hospital.

ANSWER: Steve **Smith Sr.** [prompt on Steve Smith]

[10] Steve Smith Sr. leads this NFL franchise in career receiving yards. This team lost to the Patriots in Super Bowl XXXVIII (“38”).

ANSWER: the **Carolina Panthers** [accept either underlined part]

[10] In Super Bowl XXXVIII (“38”), this Carolina Panther caught the longest touchdown pass in Super Bowl history. This player holds the second most career receiving yards in Panthers history.

ANSWER: Muhsin **Muhammad** [prompt on “Moose”, accept Marvin **Campbell**]

18. This forward won back-to-back NBA MVP awards in 2019 and 2020. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this NBA Defensive Player of the Year who, in 2020, led the Bucks to the first seed in the Eastern Conference. His incredible athletic ability has earned him the nickname “the Greek Freak”.

ANSWER: **Thanasis** Antetokounmpo [prompt on Antetokounmpo]

[10] Giannis and Thanasis played for this Athens basketball club before joining the NBA. In 2013, the brothers led this team to third place in the Greek A2 league.

ANSWER: **EFAO Zografou** Basketball Club [accept **Filathlitikos** Basketball Club]

19. After one player on this country’s National Team received a red card, the violent reaction of fans forced this country to play its last “home” game of the 2006 Men’s World Cup qualifying stage behind closed doors in Thailand. For 10 points each:

[10] This country is the only country that has played against North Korea in both of North Korea’s Men’s World Cup appearances. This country beat North Korea in the quarterfinals of the 1966 FIFA World Cup and in the group stage of the 2010 World Cup.

ANSWER: **Portugal**

[10] This midfielder was the only player to score a brace against North Korea at the 2010 World Cup. At that tournament, this player was also Portugal’s top goalscorer.

ANSWER: **Tiago** Mendes [prompt on Mendes]

20. Answer some questions about pursuit cycling at the Olympics. For 10 points each:

[10] In Women's team pursuit cycling, a team has this number of riders. In Men's team pursuit cycling, a team's time is determined by when this numbered rider crosses the finish line.

ANSWER: **three** [accept **third**]

[10] An individual pursuit race was one of the six races in this multi-race cycling event at the 2012 and 2016 summer Olympics. For the 2020 Olympics, a tempo race was added to this event and the individual pursuit race, among other things, was eliminated.

ANSWER: **omnium**

[10] This American finished second to Laura Trott in the Women's omnium at both the 2012 and 2016 Olympic Games. In 2018, Chloé Dygert broke the 3000-metre individual pursuit world record held by this cyclist.

ANSWER: Sarah **Hammer**
