- 1. Günter Wächtershäuser proposed that this process occurred via catalyzation by iron. One step of this process probably occurred during the Eoarchean Era and may have been the development of protobionts, and self-replicating, catalytic ribozymes may have started this process. Alexander Oparin and J.B.S. Haldane theorized that this process occurred after ultraviolet radiation and lightning reduced simple molecules into organic compounds. That hypothesis of this process was demonstrated in the abiotic synthesis of amino acids shown by Stanley Miller and Harold Urey. For 10 points, name this process that may have occurred in the "primordial soup" of early Earth. ANSWER: abiogenesis [or origin of life on Earth; accept obvious equivalents like the "appearance of first living cells"; prompt on "life" or equivalents]
- 2. This man painted the victorious General Eliott on horseback commanding the rescue of Spanish sailors. This artist of *The Defeat of the Floating Batteries at Gibraltar* painted a pink-collared subject seated at a table with a water glass. That painting portrays his half-brother Henry Pelham holding a gold chain attached to the title animal, *Boy with a Squirrel*. The subject of another painting by this artist wears a green vest and holds a silver teapot. A different work by this man is set in Havana harbor and depicts two men on a boat while a boy in the water struggles to evade the title predator. For 10 points, name this portraitist of *Paul Revere* who created *Watson and the Shark*. ANSWER: John Singleton **Copley**
- 3. This man was the father of Euneus by Hypsipyle, the Queen of Lemnos, and later accidentally killed Cyzicus and gave him a grand funeral. At the advice of Phineus, he sent a dove through the Symplegades. He died after he was struck by a rotting piece of wood, and he lost a sandal in the River Anavros. This man murdered Apsyrtus and was absolved of that crime by Circe. His bride-to-be, the princess of Corinth, was burned to death by a cursed dress. Aeëtes had him plow a field with fire-breathing oxen and sow that field with dragon teeth, which he succeeded in doing with help from Medea. For 10 points, name this leader of the Argonauts who recovered the Golden Fleece. ANSWER: Jason [or Iásōn]
- 4. Palladium is a substance of this type in the Heck reaction, and one named for Raney consists of powdered nickel. An industrial process that produces ammonia uses one of these substances consisting of iron, and these substances can be poisoned when species bind to them chemically to block their active sites. The addition of these substances does not affect the value of a reaction's equilibrium constant, and they are contrasted with inhibitors, which may reduce these substances' activity. These substances in biology are called enzymes, and they work by lowering activation energy. For 10 points, name these chemical species that speed up a reaction but are not themselves consumed.

ANSWER: catalysts [do not accept or prompt on "enzymes"]

- 5. One composer from this country created the virtuosic *Zigeunerweisen* for violin and orchestra. A work set in this country features a Ritual Fire Dance, and in another work set in this country, a magistrate imprisons a miller so he can sleep with his wife. Those ballets are *Love, the Magician* and *The Three Cornered Hat*. The French composer Édouard Lalo wrote a *Symphonie* for violin and orchestra using themes from this country, and an opera set in this country includes the Habanera chorus and depicts Don José's murder of the title gypsy girl, Carmen. For 10 points, name this home country of Pablo de Sarasate, Manuel de Falla, and the composer of the Tango in D, Isaac Albéniz. ANSWER: Kingdom of **Spain** [or *Reino de España*; accept Republic of **Spain** or *República Española*; accept First **Spanish** Republic or *Primera República Española*; accept Second **Spanish** Republic or *Segunda República Española*; accept **Spanish** State or *Estado Español*]
- 6. These figures were only able to realize that a certain man was dead after his staff was gnawed from under his arm, causing the corpse of that man, Solomon, to fall to the ground. The seventy-second sura of the Qur'an is named for these beings, and reciting the Throne Verse supposedly wards off these entities. Shaytan was said to have taken the form of one when he refused to bow to Adam. One class of these figures is *ifrit*, while "constant companion" group of them are known as *qarin*. For 10 points, name these creatures from Arabic tradition which are said to be composed of smokeless fire, one of which was summoned by Aladdin by rubbing a lamp.

ANSWER: jinns [or djinns; or genies; or *al-jinnī*]

7. Elizabeth Tyler and Edgar Clarke were publicists for this organization, which supported Bibb Graves for governor of Alabama. This organization almost collapsed after its leader D.C. Stephenson was convicted for murder, and it supported William McAdoo for President in the 1924 Democratic convention. The *Prescript* of this organization was developed by George Gordon, and William Simmons revived this organization after the production of D.W. Griffith's film *The Birth of a Nation*. Its first Grand Wizard was Nathan Bedford Forrest. For 10 points, name this white supremacist organization that burned crosses at rallies and whose members wore white robes and hoods. ANSWER: **Ku Klux Klan** [or the **Klan**; or the "**Hooded Order**" before "hoods"]

- 8. Five bassoons represent the final prayers of five village elders near the end of this work. The composer placed grace notes in the opening melody to imitate natural breaks in human voices. At the beginning of this work's premiere, one audience member called for someone to get a dentist after seeing the initial positions of the dancers. This work's last bass notes spell out the word "dead" as the central character's neck snaps and she is sacrificed. Part one of this work is titled "The Adoration of the Earth" and begins with a bassoon solo at an unrecognizably high register. For 10 points, name this ballet by Igor Stravinsky that caused a riot at its premiere.

 ANSWER: *The Rite of Spring* [or *Le Sacre du printemps*; or *Vesna svyashchennaya*]
- 9. These particles are captured in the s-process of asymptotic giant branch stars. The namesake activation analysis of these particles determines the identity and quantity of elements in a sample. The beta decay of these spin one-half baryons results in the emission of a proton, an electron, and an antineutrino. Nuclear power plants use these particles to bombard uranium-235 and induce a chain reaction. These particles consist of an up quark and two down quarks, and they were discovered by James Chadwick. The number of these particles in an atom determines its isotope. For 10 points, name these chargeless particles that are found together with protons in the nucleus.

 ANSWER: neutrons
- 10. This color describes the mouth of "a beaker full of the warm South" in "Ode to a Nightingale." A woman whose fingernail becomes this color after she crushes a creature representing "Our marriage bed" is scolded in John Donne's "The Flea." In Byron's "The Destruction of Sennacherib," the attacking Assyrian cohorts gleam in gold and this color. Shug Avery travels with Germaine after leaving Celie in a novel titled after this color, and "America the Beautiful" describes "mountain majesties" of this color "above the fruited plains." For 10 points, name this color after which Alice Walker named a novel and whose symbolic associations include royalty and wine. ANSWER: **purple** [do not prompt on or accept similar colors]
- 11. An experiment that exposed *E. coli* to the T1 bacteriophage proved that selection did not give rise to these entities; that experiment was named for Luria and Delbruck. *Salmonella typhimurium* is exposed to histidine-free environments to measure a substance's ability to cause these in the Ames test. Wobble base pairing can prevent some of these from resulting in changes in amino acid sequences. Insertion or deletion of nucleotides may cause the "frameshift" type, while sickle-cell anemia results from the "point" type. Carcinogens are particularly potent at causing these. For 10 points, name these changes that occur in the nucleotide sequence of a genome.

 ANSWER: mutations [accept word forms; accept "mutants" before "changes"]
- 12. Along the River during the Qingming Festival was originally painted in this dynasty, whose first emperor took power in a coup at Chenqiao. After much of the imperial family was captured in the Jingkang Incident, this dynasty moved its capital from present-day Kaifeng to Hangzhou. Cheng Yi and Zhu Xi founded Neo-Confucianism during this dynasty, during which movable type printing was invented. This dynasty was the first to use gunpowder for warfare and allied with the Mongols against the Jurchen Jin Dynasty but was later defeated by Kublai Khan. For 10 points, name this Chinese dynasty that followed the Tang and preceded the Yuan.

 ANSWER: Song Dynasty [or Song Chao; accept Northern Song Dynasty or Bei Song Chao; accept Southern Song

ANSWER: <u>Song</u> Dynasty [or <u>Song</u> Chao; accept Northern <u>Song</u> Dynasty or <u>Bei Song</u> Chao; accept Southern <u>Song</u> Dynasty or <u>Nan Song</u> Chao]

13. The Twin Peaks and Sunset Tunnels are two major transit arteries in this city, and the Civil War-era Fort Point lies in the north of this city. The Hunter's Point Naval Shipyard is located in the southeast of this city. The Farallon Islands, though lying thirty miles to the west of this city, are still officially part of it. Coit Tower is located on Telegraph Hill in this city, and Portsmouth Square is at the center of this city's Chinatown. Ghirardelli Square and Pier 39 are located on this city's Fisherman's Wharf. The only mobile National Historic Landmark in the United States is this city's cable car system. For 10 points, name this California city that is the location of the Golden Gate Bridge.

ANSWER: City and County of San Francisco

- 14. The narrator of one of this man's poems declares that "[she's] still climbin" although life "ain't been no crystal stair." In another poem, this poet writes that "[he] is the darker brother" but will "eat well, and grow strong." This poet of "Mother to Son" and "I, Too, Sing America" describes hearing a man sing "Ain't got nobody in this world" before he "stopped playing and went to bed" in a work that titles his collection *The Weary Blues*. In another poem, this man states that he "bathed in the Euphrates" and that "[his] soul has grown deep like" the title bodies of water. For 10 points, name this poet of the Harlem Renaissance who wrote "The Negro Speaks of Rivers." ANSWER: James Mercer Langston **Hughes**
- 15. In the aftermath of this event, the "Warrior Bishop" Henry le Despenser defeated troops of one faction at the Battle of North Walsham. This event resulted in the burning of the Savoy Palace and occurred following a meeting with the sitting monarch at Mile End. The Earl of Arundel was appointed Chancellor after the execution of Simon Sudbury during this event, which ended at Smithfield after William Walworth, the Lord Mayor of London, killed its leader. The perpetrators of this rebellion rose up from Kent and Essex after a new poll tax was announced by John of Gaunt. For 10 points, name this uprising of poor citizens led by Wat Tyler and crushed by Richard II. ANSWER: Peasants' Revolt [or The Great Rising; or Wat Tyler's Rebellion until "Wat Tyler"; accept any obvious equivalents of "revolt" in the answer line]
- 16. A controversy regarding this film was whether or not a man in a sauna was a male shopkeeper's husband or son-in-law. In one scene, the king and queen seek help from a group of trolls to heal their daughter. In one song, that daughter claims "we used to be best buddies, but now we're not." In another song from this movie, the protagonist declares that "the cold never bothered [her] anyway." The protagonist of this movie banishes Prince Hans and creates a cloud that prevents Olaf from melting. For 10 points, name this movie featuring the songs "Do You Want to Build a Snowman?" and "Let It Go" that details Kristoff and Anna's pursuit of Elsa after she unleashes a snowstorm in Arendelle.

ANSWER: Frozen

- 17. In one work, this man described how boys in a certain society were disciplined by their uncles, rather than their fathers, leading this man to observe that power, rather than sexual jealousy, is the cause of the Oedipus Complex in that culture. In the last chapter of one work, this man recorded spells used in growing gardens in *Coral Gardens and their Magic*. In another work, this man described how red shell necklaces and white shell armbands are traded in different directions. That work analyzes the Trobriand Islanders' exchange of the Kula ring. For 10 points, name this author of *Sex and Repression in Savage Society* and *Argonauts of the Western Pacific*, a Polish-born anthropologist. ANSWER: Bronisław Kasper **Malinowski**
- 18. In one work by this author, the protagonist meets his Aunt Augusta for the first time in fifty years and then learns of Woodsworth, her lover from Sierra Leone. In another work, this man wrote of Beatrice Severn, the secretary of the main character who was a retailer of vacuum cleaners before becoming a secret agent. A novel by him centers on the affair between Sarah Miles and Maurice Bendrix, and another focuses on the journalist Thomas Fowler. Another work by this author of *Our Man in Havana* describes the travels of a whiskey priest in Mexico. For ten points, name this British author of *The Power and the Glory, The End of the Affair*, and *The Quiet American*. ANSWER: Henry Graham **Greene**

19. The cession of Kosovo to Serbia severely hampered Ismail Qemali's efforts to form a provisional government for this country in Vlora, which was also the proposed site of a Soviet submarine base that this country's communist dictator refused to build. In the fifteenth century, Skanderbeg defended the region that would become this nation from incursions by the Ottomans. One dictator from this country used the *Sigurimi* police to control his population and built seven hundred thousand bunkers in case of invasion. In this country, Fan Noli led the June Revolution in opposition to King Zog. For 10 points, name this Balkan country which Enver Hoxha once ruled from capital city Tirana.

ANSWER: Republic of <u>Albania</u> [or *Republika e <u>Shqipërisë</u>*; accept Provisional Government of <u>Albania</u> or *Qeveria e Përkohshme e <u>Shqipërisë</u>*; accept <u>Albania</u>n Republic or *Republika Shqiptare*; accept <u>Albania</u>n Kingdom or *Mbretnija <u>Shqiptare</u>* or *Mbretëria <u>Shqiptare</u>*; accept People's Socialist Republic of <u>Albania</u> or *Republika Popullore Socialiste e <u>Shqipërisë</u>*]

20. In this book, Madame Schachter repeatedly screams that she has seen fire until her fellow passengers beat and kill her. At the opening of this novel, the protagonist discusses the Kabbalah with the synagogue's caretaker, Moshe the Beadle. While on a "death march" away from Gleiwitz, the main character watches his father, Shlomo, die in his sleep. Earlier, the protagonist's family is forced out of the Sighet ghetto and sent to Auschwitz. While in a concentration camp, the protagonist constantly asks himself "Where is God now?" Narrated by Eliezer, for 10 points, name this first book in a trilogy including *Dawn* and *Day*, a Holocaust memoir by Elie Wiesel. ANSWER: *Night* [or *La Nuit*; or *Un di Velt Hot Geshvign*; or *And the World Remained Silent*]

TB. A captured helmet originally belonging to a member of this people was found in Olympia, after it was said to have been taken following this civilization's defeat at the hands of Hiero of Syracuse. The Sarcophagus of the Spouses is a product of this civilization, and a history of this civilization as well as a dictionary of its language was written by the last person known to be able to read this culture's language, the emperor Claudius. Tarchun and Tyrrhenus founded this civilization's league of twelve cities, and Tarquin the Proud, the last king of Rome, was descended from this culture. For 10 points, name this ancient Italian civilization that preceded the Romans. ANSWER: **Etruscans** [or *Etruria*]

Packet 12: Bonuses

1. Name some artists who depicted the Last Supper, for 10 points each.

[10] This artist painted a fresco of the Last Supper in the church of Santa Maria delle Grazie in Milan. His depiction of the Last Supper portrays a calm Jesus sitting at the center of a table while the disciples actively speak amongst themselves.

ANSWER: **Leonardo** di ser Piero **da Vinci** [accept either underlined name]

[10] This man's *Last Supper* sets the table diagonally and depicts swirling spirits around the title scene. Other works by this artist include the *St. Mark Cycle* and *The Origin of the Milky Way*.

ANSWER: Tintoretto [or Jacopo Comin; or Jacopo Robusti]

[10] In this Flemish Baroque painter's *Last Supper*, Judas turns to look at the viewer while a dog gnaws a bone beneath the table. He painted full-figured men fighting the title animals in *Hippopotamus and Crocodile Hunt*.

ANSWER: Peter Paul Rubens

2. Answer some questions about war in mythology, for 10 points each.

[10] These female Norse shield-maidens choose fallen warriors to take to Valhalla. Members of this group carry mead and food to Odin and the *einherjar*.

ANSWER: valkyries [or valkyrja]

[10] This Greek warrior society fought under Achilles at the Siege of Troy, and gets its name, meaning "ant-people," from their ancestor Eurymedusa, who was seduced by Zeus while he was in the form of an ant.

ANSWER: **Myrmidon**s [or *Myrmidones*]

[10] Polynices led an army against his brother Eteocles in this city after Eteocles refused to give up the throne. Cadmus founded this city after following a cow and sowing dragon teeth into the ground.

ANSWER: **Thebes** [or *Thēbas*; accept Seven against **Thebes** or *Hepta epi Thēbas*]

3. As of September 2013, this literary prize has been open to all English-language authors published in the United Kingdom. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this prize that historically honored the year's best novel written by an author from a Commonwealth nation, Ireland, or Zimbabwe. Two-time winning authors include J.M. Coetzee, Peter Carey, and Hilary Mantel. ANSWER: Man **Booker** Prize for Fiction

[10] This short story author of "The Ransom of Red Chief" names an annual award given to the top twenty short stories written in English and published in the United States or Canada.

ANSWER: **O. Henry** [or William Sydney **Porter**; accept **O. Henry** Award or **O. Henry** Prize; prompt on "**Henry**"] [10] This literary prize has been awarded by the Swedish Academy since 1901. Its most recent winner is Canadian short story author Alice Munro.

ANSWER: **Nobel** Prize in Literature [or **Nobel** priset i litteratur]

4. This work's title figure is called *Imperatrix Mundi*, or "Empress of the World." For 10 points each:

[10] Name this Latin poem whose musical setting opens and closes Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana*. It laments the oppressive nature of fate, whose wheel is portrayed in the first few pages of *Carmina Burana*.

ANSWER: O Fortuna

[10] This Gregorian chant once used in musical settings of the Requiem Mass describes a terrifying Last Judgment. It was also quoted in Franz Liszt's *Totentanz*.

ANSWER: Dies Irae [or "Day of Wrath"]

[10] This Austrian composer used the Latin hymn *Veni Creator Spiritus* to begin his "Symphony of a Thousand." His other works include the "Resurrection" and "Tragic" symphonies, as well as *The Song of the Earth*.

ANSWER: Gustav Mahler

- 5. It contains a legal section known as the *Halakha*. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this work, whose second section is the Gemara. It is a major rabbinical text of Judaism.

ANSWER: Talmud [or Shas]

[10] This first part of the Talmud was written down by Rabbi Yehuda HaNasi and consists of oral law. Those who helped write it down were known as the *Tannaim*.

ANSWER: Mishnah

[10] The Talmud is sometimes called the "oral" version of this set of texts, contrasted with the "written" version, which consists of the first five books of the Old Testament and is the first portion of the Tanakh.

ANSWER: **Torah** [or **Pentateuch**]

6. This play begins with a conversation between the valet Jean and the cook Christine. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this play in which the title character attempts to escape with Jean and open a hotel near Lake Como. In the end, her plans are foiled and she commits suicide using a razor blade.

ANSWER: Miss Julie [or Fröken Julie]

[10] *Miss Julie* was written by this playwright, who also wrote *A Dream Play*. He described the vengeful Jacob Hummel in *The Ghost Sonata*.

ANSWER: Johan August Strindberg

[10] August Strindberg was from this country with capital Stockholm. This country was also the home of Selma Lagerlöf, author of *The Wonderful Adventures of Nils*.

ANSWER: Kingdom of <u>Sweden</u> [or *Konungariket <u>Sverige</u>*; prompt on "United Kingdoms of Sweden and Norway" or "Förenade konungarikena Sverige och Norge" or the "Union between Sweden and Norway" or "Svensk-norska unionen"]

7. The title object of this painting appears amid pale hues in the left background and towers above a steamboat spewing smoke. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this painting that depicts a retired sailing ship, distinguished for its service at the Battle of Trafalgar, being towed in at sunset to be converted into scrap.

ANSWER: The Fighting Temeraire tugged to her last berth to be broken up, 1838

[10] This British Romantic artist painted *The Fighting Temeraire* and *The Battle of Trafalgar*. His painting *The Slave Ship* depicts a departing vessel throwing dying slaves overboard into a raging sea.

ANSWER: Joseph Mallord William Turner

[10] In this highly atmospheric painting by Turner, a small rabbit hops away frantically as a locomotive emerges out of heavy mist and fog and barrels across the modern Maidenhead Bridge.

ANSWER: Rain, Steam and Speed – The Great Western Railway

8. Vega has a value of zero for this quantity. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this measure of star brightness. The absolute type of this quantity measures how bright a star would appear from ten parsecs, while the apparent type measures how bright a star appears from Earth.

ANSWER: **magnitude** [or absolute **magnitude**; or apparent **magnitude**]

[10] Absolute magnitude is plotted against either spectral type or surface temperature in this diagram, developed by its two namesake astronomers, which shows most stars along its main sequence.

ANSWER: **Hertzsprung–Russell** diagram [or **H–R** diagram; or **HR**D]

[10] These stars lying on a namesake branch on an H–R diagram have degenerate cores unable to support hydrogen fusion. The Sun will eventually become a star of this type before dying as a white dwarf.

ANSWER: red giant

9. For 10 points each, answer the following concerning labor history in the United States.

[10] Events such as the Colorado Coal Wars and the Battle of Blair Mountain are examples of this action taken in which workers usually demand higher wages. They often involve work stoppages and picketing.

ANSWER: labor **strike** [or workers' **strike**; accept obvious equivalents]

[10] This type of strike involves workers occupying their workplace, refusing to work or leave and physically preventing their employers from replacing them with strikebreakers.

ANSWER: **sitdown** strike [or **sit-in** strike]

[10] This 1947 act allows the President to end a strike if he finds it dangerous to the public and prohibits government employees from striking. Ronald Reagan used it to end a 1981 strike by air-traffic controllers.

ANSWER: Taft-Hartley Act [or Labor Management Relations Act of 1947]

- 10. This man questions humans' right to control the universe as they do. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this French skeptic who emphasized the use of free judgment and asked, "What do I know?" in one of his *Essais*.

ANSWER: Michel Eyquem de Montaigne

[10] This man wrote *An Essay Concerning Human Understanding*, in which he argued that at birth, the mind is a blank slate, only to be filled with knowledge through experience. This man also wrote *Two Treatises on Government*.

ANSWER: John Locke

[10] This man wrote An Essay on Man, in which he argued that man should stay in his place in the universe. He also wrote An Essay on Criticism, in which he criticizes bad literary critics.

ANSWER: Alexander Pope

- 11. Charles-Augustin de Coulomb developed a law that governs this phenomenon's dry form. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this physical force that counteracts motion. This force has a namesake coefficient and comes in static and kinetic varieties.

ANSWER: frictional force

[10] For an object on an inclined plane, the frictional force is directly proportional to the normal force, whose magnitude is calculated as the weight of the sliding object times this function of the angle of incline.

ANSWER: cosine

[10] This French scientist formulated two laws governing friction. The first states that the frictional force is proportional to the applied load, and the second states that it is independent of the apparent area of contact.

ANSWER: Guillaume **Amontons**

- 12. This character blows on a conch shell to attract the attention of other boys on an island. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this fair-haired character who becomes the first chief of a group of stranded boys. This character loses support when his red-haired rival, Jack, assumes control and attempts to find and destroy him.

ANSWER: Ralph

[10] Ralph is a character in this novel, which describes a plane crash over a deserted island, leaving many young boys stranded and forcing them to fend for themselves.

ANSWER: Lord of the Flies

[10] William Golding, author of *Lord of the Flies*, included his novels *Rites of Passage* and *Fire Down Below* in this trilogy, which follows the life of Edmund Talbot.

ANSWER: To the Ends of the Earth

- 13. This man was the first to resign from his highest office since Gregory XII. For 10 points each:
- [10] Name this pope who resigned in February 2013 due to the fact that his "strengths [were] no longer suited to an adequate exercise of the Petrine Ministry."

ANSWER: **Benedict XVI** [or Joseph Aloisius **Ratzinger**; prompt on "**Benedict**"]

- [10] Pope Francis, successor to Benedict XVI, was the first person from this Order to be elected to the papacy, and members of this order swear a vow of special obedience to the Pope. This order was founded by Ignatius of Loyola. ANSWER: **Society of Jesus** [or the **Jesuits**; or **Societas Jesu**]
- [10] This canonized pope was the last before Pope Benedict to resign voluntarily. He did so in protest over the corruption in the Roman Curia after 5 months of occupying the office in 1294. In 2009, Pope Benedict laid his pallium on this man's tomb.

ANSWER: St. <u>Celestine V</u> [or <u>Pietro di Morrone</u>; or <u>Peter Morrone</u>; prompt on "Saint <u>Celestine</u>"; do not accept or prompt on "Peter" or "Pietro"]

14. For 10 points each, name the following about Canadian Arctic geography.

[10] With capital at Whitehorse, this is Canada's smallest federal territory. Its Klondike region was the site of an 1897 Gold Rush.

ANSWER: **Yukon** Territory

[10] This is the longest and largest river system in Canada, although it only flows through the country's Northwest Territories. Starting at the Great Slave Lake, it empties into the Arctic Ocean near the Kendall Island Bird Sanctuary.

ANSWER: **Mackenzie** River [or **Deh-Cho**]

[10] This large body of water lies north of Alaska, the Yukon, and the Northwest Territories. The MacKenzie River empties into this body, whose petroleum reserves are now easier to access as a result of climate change.

ANSWER: Beaufort Sea

15. This molecule's common name serves as the namesake of a class of compounds that consist only of boron and hydrogen. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this compound with the chemical formula BH₃.

ANSWER: borane [or trihydroboron; or borine; accept boron trihydride]

[10] Because the hydrogens in borane draw electron density away from the boron atom, borane is one of these substances, which accept electron pairs from an electron donor.

ANSWER: Lewis acid [prompt on "acid"]

[10] Boron often violates this rule because it achieves stability with only six valence electrons. Similarly, hydrogen violates this rule because it bonds to achieve two valence electrons, rather than this rule's namesake number.

ANSWER: octet rule

16. After her aunt dies, the protagonist of this work receives ten thousand dollars and pays off her debts before committing suicide. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this novel that follows the tragedy of Lily Bart, who rejects her true love Lawrence Seldon and descends into poverty after Bertha Dorset destroys her reputation.

ANSWER: The House of Mirth

[10] In addition to writing *The House of Mirth*, this American author described Newland Archer and Ellen Olenska's affair in her novel *The Age of Innocence*.

ANSWER: Edith Wharton

[10] This novel by Edith Wharton depicts an affair between the title character and his maid, Mattie Silver. In an attempt to die together during a sledding accident, however, Mattie ends up paralyzed.

ANSWER: Ethan Frome

17. Name the following historical Mesoamerican civilizations, for 10 points each.

[10] This people's preclassic capital was Mirador, and they were ruled by the *kuhul ajaw*, mystical kings who claimed to be divine. They mysteriously disappeared after their capital Tikal collapsed.

ANSWER: Mayans

[10] Itzcoatl allied this civilization with the Texcocans and and Tacubans, and its feudalistic economy was based in Tenochtitlan. Spanish troops led by Hernan Cortés launched an offensive against this civilization from Veracruz.

ANSWER: Aztecs

[10] This other Mesoamerican culture was seen as the predecessor to the Aztecs. It had its capital at Tula and a name meaning "reed people".

ANSWER: Toltecs

18. This phenomenon can come in allopatric, peripatric, sympatric, and parapatric forms. For 10 points each:

[10] Name this process by which portions of a population become unable to breed with other members of that population, causing the formation of a new species.

ANSWER: speciation

[10] This process occurs when a small number of individuals breaks off from a parent population and establishes a new isolated population of their own, causing a dramatic shift in allele frequencies.

ANSWER: **founder effect**

[10] This phenomenon occurs by random chance when allele frequencies in populations change over time to either increase or decrease genetic variation.

ANSWER: genetic drift [prompt on "drift"]

- 19. Name the following about recent South Carolina politics, for 10 points each.
- [10] This object was first hoisted atop the state capitol in 1961 but was moved to a ground-level memorial in 2000 after controversy. Supporters of this claim it's a demonstration of Southern pride, as opposed to a support of slavery. ANSWER: **flag** of the **Confederate** States of America [or **Confederate flag**; or **flag of the Confederacy**; or **flag of the CSA**; prompt on "**flag**"; prompt on "**Stars and Bars**"]
- [10] This former governor was forced to resign in 2011 after allegations of marital infidelity with a mistress in Argentina arose. He later won a special election in 2013 for a seat in the House of Representatives. ANSWER: Marshall Clement "Mark" **Sanford**, Jr.
- [10] This person, the first female governor of the state, succeeded Sanford. A staunch supporter of the Tea Party, she is the second Indian American governor to be elected in the United States.

ANSWER: Nimrata Nikki Randhawa Haley

- 20. For 10 points each, answer the following questions about conferences held during World War II.
- [10] This conference issued a declaration urging the unconditional surrender of Japan. This conference resulted in the Allied Control Commission, which was tasked with dividing postwar Germany into four zones of occupation. ANSWER: **Potsdam** Conference [or **Berlin** Conference of the Three Heads of Government of the USSR, USA and UK; prompt on "**TERMINAL** Conference"]
- [10] Russia was promised Port Arthur, the Sakhalin Islands and the Kuril Islands and promised to enter the Pacific Theater at this last conference attended by FDR, held in a Soviet resort town.

ANSWER: <u>Yalta</u> Conference [or <u>Crimea</u> Conference; or ARGONAUT and <u>MAGNETO</u>; prompt on "<u>ARGONAUT</u> Conference"; do not prompt on or accept "Malta Conference" or "ARGONAUT and CRICKET"] [10] During this conference in the capital city of Iran, Stalin promised FDR that he would ensure free elections regarding the entrances of Latvia, Lithuania, and Estonia into the Soviet Union.

ANSWER: <u>Tehran</u> Conference [or <u>EUREKA</u> Conference]
