For 10 points--they all died as a result of what occurrence?

For 10 points--several players on the basketball team were accused of what?

15. If an assembly line can manufacture 150 automobiles in a six-day week--for 10 points--how many days would it take three equally efficient assembly lines to produce 600 cars?

8 DAYS

(HOST: The assembly line averages 25 cars per day, three lines 75)

16. His father's name was Terah. He was the father of Ishmael and Isaac. For 10 points--what was his name?

ABRAHAM or ABRAM

17. TASS is the official news service of the Soviet Union. For 10 points-- what is the name of the official news service of Poland?

PAP

18. A beam of light...a chemical reaction...a pendulum...or an electrical transformer? For 10 points--which of these would obey Snell's Law?

A BEAM OF LIGHT or THE FIRST ONE

(HOST: Snell's Law accounts for the bending of light at surfaces of dense media)

19. With his first partner he co-wrote Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar, and Evita <ay-VEE-ta>. Last year he teamed up with two former members of ABBA to produce Chess. For 10 points--name him.

BURETTE

24. When his first major sculpture was unveiled in 1878, critics accused him of taking a cast of the model's body. The statue was life-size and considered too realistic to be true. For 10 points--name the sculptor who carved The Age of Bronze.

AUGUSTE RODIN

25. Not only was he a noteworthy head of state--he did not fare badly as a missionary, having converted all the lands he conquered to Christianity. This region included modern-day France, Belgium, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Poland, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, the Netherlands, and northern Italy. For 10 points--name the person proclaimed head of the Holy Roman Empire for defending Pope Leo III.
