Round #7--Tossups

1. He was born Aleksei Peshkov and adopted a nom-de-plume that means "the bitter." His first play, one about a middle-class household with a petty tyrant at its head, had several English titles, including The Smug Citizens, The Petty Bourgeois, The Philistines, and The Courageous One. For 10 points--name the playwright who later wrote The Lower Depths.

MAXIM GORKY

2. In the Book of Mark, "seven demons went out of her." She waited by the cross until the crucifixion was over, standing by until the body was wrapped in linen cloth and placed in the garden sepulcher of Joseph of Arimathea. For 10 points--name the woman who found the tomb empty the next morning.

MARY MAGDALEN

3. A Reagan administration spokesman dismissed the idea as "a joke," but the National Organization of Women consider it a necessary tool in the effort to combat sex discrimination. The concept is used to determine the salary based on the requirements of a job, compared to other jobs. For 10 points--what is this concept called?

COMPARABLE WORTH

4. His real first name is Antoine. From 1949 to 1962, he recorded 23 songs which have sold at least a million records each. Most of those songs he co-wrote with Dave Bartholomew. For 10 points--name the rock pioneer who sang "My Blue Heaven," "I'm Walking," and "Ain't That a Shame."

5. On January 23, 1964, the State of South Dakota became the thirty-eighth State to ratify the 24th Amendment to the Constitution. For 10 points--what does the amendment outlaw?

6. He won the Oscar for Best Supporting Actor three times--for Come and Get It in 1936, for Kentucky in 1938, and for The Westerner in 1940--but he is probably best known as one of "The Real McCoys." For 10 points--name him.

7. For the past few years, Carl Lewis has been on the trail of one of the most remarkable records in sports--trying to beat the "superjump." For 10 points--who jumped 29 feet, 2 and one-half inches in the long jump at the Mexico City Olympics of 1968?

(HOST: Beamon's jump was 20 inches longer than the previous record)

8. Its name comes from the Greek word for "land snail," which aptly describes its shape. It translates sound vibrations into nerve impulses. For 10 points--name this structure essential for hearing.

9. "A Saturday afternoon in November was approaching the time of twilight and the vast tract of unenclosed wild known as Egdon Heath embrowned itself moment by moment." This is the opening sentence--for 10 points--of what Thomas Hardy novel?

- X10. Last October, the United States and Canada accepted as binding a World Court decision in a dispute over territorial waters off the shores of New England and Nova Scotia. The decision divided a prime fishing area between the two countries. For 10 points--name the region that was in dispute.

- X11. He was the great-grandson of John Adams, the grandson of John Quincy Adams, and the son of Charles Francis Adams. He gained reknown as a historian who wrote Mont-Saint-Michel and Chartres <moh sah mee-SHEL>. For 10 points--what's the full name of this person, best known for his book about his "education"?

12. It hit Key West, crossed the Florida peninsula and passed over New York City in June of 1972, killing 117 people and causing over three billion dollars damage. For 10 points--what was the name of this rare June hurricane, the most expensive in history?

13. He led the Greeks to victory in the Trojan War. On his return home, he was killed by Aegisthus <ee-JIS-tus> and Clytemnestra <klih-tem-NES-trah>, the latter being his wife. For 10 points--name this king of Mycenae.

14. Originally it was to be called "Victory," but the fourth space shuttle to be operational is now known by a different name. For 10 points--what?

15. He won it in 1941 on Whirlaway and in 1948 on Citation. For 10 points--name the only jockey to win two Triple Crowns.

16. It occurs naturally in three forms--white, red, and black. The white form burns spontaneously when it is exposed to air. For 10 points--name this nonmetallic element.

17. It was begun in 504 BC. When work was finished on it in 1327 AD, it extended over eleven hundred miles from Beijing to Hangchow. It is still in use today, though some sections have fallen into disuse. For 10 points--what is it?

THE GRAND CANAL

18. The square root of a positive number is real. The square root of a negative number is imaginary. For 10 points--what kind of number is the result of adding a real number to an imaginary number?

19. Beta Picoris, a star in the constellation Pictor 50 light-years from earth, has aroused great scientific interest since last October. For 10 points--why?

20. It was a long-running Broadway play. It was on television twice, and recently it was rewritten for another try at Broadway. For 10 points--what play by Neil Simon recently featured an all-woman cast?

21. In 1918 the "Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes" was proclaimed an independent country with Peter I of Serbia as king. In 1929--for 10 points--the country's name was changed to what?

22. Although they have a common border, Sweden and Finland--for the most part--are separated by a body of water which is an extension of the Baltic Sea. For 10 points--what body of water?

23. His first record, a paeon <PEE-un> to his babysitter, hit #1 when he was only 15 years old. In the following three years he had five other million-selling records before hitting a 15-year-long dry spell. For 10 points--what singer/composer sang "Puppy Love" and "You Are My Destiny"?

- 20 24. Despite its name, it is actually a kind of lizard common along the Mississippi River and on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean south of Virginia. For 10 points--name this animal which gets its name from its easily detachable tail.

25. It started in 1741 and ended in 1748 with the Treaty of Aix-la-Chappelle <eh lah shah-PEL>. The conflict pitted the Netherlands, Saxony, Austria, Russia, and England and her colonies against France and Bavaria. For 10 points--name the war known in North America as "King William's War."

1. 30 POINT BONUS

One of the landmark cases settled by the Supreme Court in 1984 involved the issue of ownership of the right to broadcast college sporting events on television. The High Court ruled that the NCAA cannot have exclusive control over televising college football games. For 15 points each--name the two universities who brought the suit against the NCAA.
