

1. One of the most caustic and nasty men of the Victorian era, he dropped out of West Point in 1854 and moved to England. In 1877, he painted a number of Japanese landscapes of which Ruskin was critical. He sued Ruskin for slander, won, but was bankrupted. For 10 pts. identify this painter.

ANS. James Whistler

2. Born in Africa, she came to America at eight. She began writing poetry at 13, using Alexander Pope and Thomas Gray as models. For 10 pts. identify this poet best known for her "To the University of Cambridge in New England" and "To the King's Most Excellent Majesty."

ANS. Phyllis Wheatley

3. He envisioned a man who could compose a sonnet, wrestle, sing a song, ride expertly, solve difficult math problems, and speak and write eloquently. For 10 pts. name this 16th century Italian who defined the Renaissance man in his The Courtier.

ANS. Baldassare Castiglione

4. Occuring throughout the world in rock strata from the Cretaceous to the Pleistocene periods, it is resin exuded by certain trees and other plants, and contains preserved insects, flowers and leaves trapped before the resin had hardened. For 10 pts. name it.

ANS. Amber

5. As assistant attorney general, he prosecuted several major American companies for violation of antitrust laws. From 1940-41, he was Attorney General and in 1941, he became an associate justice of the Supreme Court. For 10 pts. identify this jurist, best known as chief U.S. prosecutor in the Nuremburg trials.

ANS. Robert Jackson

6. The word literally means art-person, but most are adept only in the art of conversation. When they marry, they retire from the profession. For 10 pts. what is this Japanese class of women?

ANS. Geisha

7. Written in eleven volumes, it is narrated by Lusus, a licentious young man who tricks a maid into stealing a magic potion which was to turn him into a owl but instead makes him an ass. For 10 pts. name this Latin novel by Apuleius.

ANS. The Golden Ass (ACC: Metamorphoses)

8. After his death, one of his eyes, still preserved at the University of Manchester, was removed and opened so the fluid could be examined. This was done to test his theory that tinted fluid within the eye caused color blindness. For 10 pts. name this scientist who, in 1803, formed the basic ideas of atomic theory.

ANS. John Dalton

9. He received his unusual name from the mountain near where his father was wounded in the Battle of Atlanta. He became famous in 1907 when he fined Standard Oil \$29 million. In 1920, he became commissioner of baseball. For 10 pts. name him.

ANS. Kennesaw Mountain Landis

10. During their 1,000 year history only 18 violated their vows of celibacy. Started by Aeneas, girls came to the cult between ages six and ten, trained for 10 years, then were priestesses for 30 years. For 10 pts., name these priestesses of Vesta who guarded and renewed the flame.

ANS. Vestal Virgins or Vestales

11. With Thomas Nash he wrote The Isle of Dogs which resulted in a brief jail term and the temporary closing of London theatres. He would again be jailed a year later, this time for killing a man in a duel. For 10 pts. name this dramatist who penned The Alchemist.

ANS. Ben Jonson

12. He became convinced that the Anglo-Saxon race was the highest point of evolution in fulfillment of a divine plan and that his aim was to secure its predominance. As a result, he formed De Beers Consolidated Mines to make money to extend the British empire through the world. For 10 pts. who was this South African statesman?

ANS. Cecil John Rhodes

13. It is a dimensionless unit, the ratio of two linear measurements, and equal to 57.3 degrees. For 10 pts. what is this unit of measurement for angles in a 2-dimensional plane?

ANS. Radian

14. Elizabeth was a Quaker English prison reformer who worked to improve the conditions of women in Newgate prison; Roger was an English art critic and painter who championed modern French art; Northrop is a Canadian literary critic; and Christopher is an English dramatist who penned The Lady's Not for Burning. For 10 pts., what common last name do these all share?

ANS. Fry

15. Geographically, it is the area on the northern margin of the west and central African savannas where annual rainfall is 20 inches or less. It is noted for its short grass, suitable for cattle herding. For 10 pts. identify this area, now seriously overpopulated and suffering from famine.

ANS. The Sahel

16. It originated in the initiation practice of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity whereby new pledges would walk in lockstep three steps forward and two back. Now it is the subject of film, articles, and a popular event on college campuses. For 10 pts. what is this elaborate ritual usually connected with black fraternities?

ANS. Stepping

17. Lined with sensitive cells that bear tiny hairs, it is filled with endolymphs and surrounded by perilymph. Coil shaped in mammals and resembling a snail shell, it transforms sound waves into nerve impulses. For 10 pts. name this part of the inner ear.

ANS. Cochlea

18. This city was extensively excavated by Sir Leonard Woolley. Among the finds there was a small gold statuette of a goat caught in a thorn bush reminiscent of the ram sacrificed in place of Isaac, appropriate since it was the birthplace of Abraham. For 10 pts. name this Sumerian city.

ANS. Ur

19. First championed in the U.S. by Andrew Sarris, this theory was first articulated in a 1954 article by Francois Truffaut in which he argued that films ultimately bear the artistic stamp of the director. For 10 pts. name this film theory.

ANS. Auteur

20. Kidnapped in 1614, he was carried to Europe by an English sea captain who hoped to sell him as a slave. He escaped four years later, made his way home only to discover his tribe had been wiped out in an epidemic of 1616-17. For 10 pts. identify this Indian who befriended the Pilgrims.

ANS. Squanto

21. The 1st were issued in the 8th century BC and have usually been made of gold, silver, copper, and bronze. They probably began in China as smaller representations of axheads. For 10 pts. what are they?

1. BONUS 30 PTS.

Identify these pioneers of African independence, 10 pts. each.

1. The first prime minister of the Republic of the Congo, he was an important Pan-African theorist. In 1961, he was arrested by forces at Mobutu and died mysteriously.

ANS. Patrice Lumumba

2. A trained anthropologist, he led the Mau Mau and then Kenya.

ANS. Jomo Kenyatta

3. Though he became a world hero by his efforts to gain independence for the Gold Coast, after becoming president of Ghana, he grew increasingly dictatorial and was ousted in 1966.

ANS. Kwame Nkrumah

2. BONUS 30 PTS.

Identify these poets of the early Soviet period, 15 pts. each.

1. Already a major poet of the Futurist movement, his I (1913) and A Cloud of Troysers were fit for being shouted from a platform. When the Revolution occurred, his Ode to the Revolution and 150,000,000 greeted it. In 1930, depressed over the increase in bureaucracy, he shot himself.

ANS. Vladimir Mayakovsky

2. He married Isadora Duncan in 1922, and he was considered a Russian Imagist poet. In 1925, he hanged himself, slashed his wrists, and wrote a farewell poem with his blood.

1. The molecular heat of a solid compound is the sum of the atomic heats of its constituents. ANS. Joule's Law or Woestyn's or Kopp's
2. Gases diffuse at rates that are inversely proportional to the square roots of their densities. ANS. Graham's Law of Gaseous Diffusion
3. The mass of a gas dissolved by a given volume of liquid at constant temperature is proportional to the gas provided that chemical combination does not occur.

Given a definition of a term in economics, identify it, 10 pt each

1. An extremely short-term corporate IOU, due in 270 days or less.

ANS. Commercial Paper

2. Debt securities that sell at relatively low prices because of the low credit rating of their issuers, they pay significantly higher yields, however.

ANS. Junk Bonds

3. An unsecured long-term debt obligation backed only by the general credit of the issuing corporation.

ANS. Debenture

1. Louis XVIII ruled under this 1814 liberal constitution which really allowed only about 100,000 of the wealthy to vote for deputies. Charles X repudiated it in the failed coup of 1830. ANS. Constitutional Charter
2. The attempt of Charles X to return to the Old Order was characterized by the passage of these ordinances which controlled the press, dissolved the newly elected chamber of deputies, and reduced the electorate. ANS. July Ordinances
3. Charles failed, abdicated, and this citizen king was proclaimed king of France. ANS. Louis-Philippe

Identify the play, 30-20-10.

1. It is the longest extant Greek play.
2. In it Euripides tells the later life of Oedipus up to going into exile with Antigone.
3. It is his treatment of Seven Against Thebes.
