An armed attack from Bechvanaland to the Transvaal, its aim was to help the Vitlanders to overthrow Kruger's government; however, its failure caused Cecil Rhodes to resign as prime minister of Cape Colony and worsened Anglo-Boer relations, helping to bring on the Boer War. FTP, name this event whose leader went on to become prime minister of Cape Colony in 1904.

6. A valley southwest of Jerusalem where children sacrifices were burned to the Ammonite god Moloch, it later served as a garbage dump site. FTP, name this term used in the Greek translation of the New Testament as hell.

Some of his theories prefigured socialism, and his concept of the nation as a manifestation of divine order, combined with his fanatical patriotism, stimulated German nationalism. FTP name this author-philosopher who lived from 1762 to 1814.

Johann Gottlieb Fichte

11. Originally meaning the senior servant, it was the term given to the person who managed the estate of a feudal lord and represented his interests in court. Modern devotees of the Society for Creative Anachronism also know the head of their "shires" by this term. FTP, what is it?

Seneschal

12. Built in the 1970's and designed by the Italian-English architects Renzo Piano and Richard Rogers, it is perhaps the most distinctive-looking museum in the world. FTP, name this skeleton-like building named for a president of the country in which it is located.

This cat is also believed to be the sacred cat of ancient Egypt.
