Answer: Frances Fitzgerald

2. Baseball players Danny Gardella, Mike Toolson, and Curt Flood are all associated--for 10 points--with the drive to remove this feature from professional baseball contracts.

Answer: Reserve Clause (Do not accept free agency)

3. John W. Davis, Charles Evans Hughes, Robert Jackson, Archibald Cox, Thurgood Marshall, Robert Bork, and Charles Fried. All of these men at one time or another held the same job, often referred to as the Tenth Justice. For ten points--name it.

Answer: Solicitor General

4. Webster's describes it--quite simply--as 'unspeakably wicked.' For ten points--spell NEFARIOUS.

5. He won the Grammy for male pop vocalist twice, in 1969 with "Everybody's Talkin'" and in 1972 for "Without You." He is also noted for writing and performing the soundtrack for the children's TV special, "The Point." For 10 points--name him.

6. Enrique Camarena Salazar, Aldo Moro, William Niehaus, Patty Hearst, and Charles A. Lindberg Jr., were all--for ten points--what?

Answer: Kidnapped

7. This town in the eastern United States, where one can stand in three states at the same time, is better known as the site of an 1859 raid by abolitionist John Brown. For ten points--identify this West Virginia town.

Answer: Harpers Ferry

8. Just your typical billionaire, he tried to send Christmas presents to Vietnam POWs, and later helped to rescue several of his employees trapped in Iran. Name--for ten points--the founder of Electronic Data Systems and one of the subjects of Ken Follett's On Wings of Eagles.

Answer: H. Ross Perot

9. James Bond has come into the modern age with acquisition of a Saab 900 APC Turbo, or so this author would have you believe. Name--for ten points--the man who has continued the Ian Fleming tradition in books such as Icebreaker and For Special Services.

Answer: John Gardner

10. After she was transported into the states of Michigan and Wisconsin, along with several territories, she sued for her freedom, arguing that she should no longer be considered a slave. For ten points--name this woman who some people feel is responsible, along with her husband, for the Civil War.

Answer: Harriet Scott

11. A "Born In The USA" man working for the Japanese? Yes it's true, now that Bruce Springsteen's record company, CBS, has been sold to a Japanese conglomerate. For ten points--name this company who now owns the rights to Springsteen and the Walkman.

Answer: Sony

12. What name is given--for ten points--to the point at the center of a black hole at which all of its mass is theoretically located.

Answer: Singularity

13. Hamlet, King Lear, and Richard III are roles that have been admirably brought to life by actors such as Sir Laurence Olivier. But--for ten points--for whom did Shakespeare originally create these characters.

Answer: Richard Burbage

14. His father played Alan Brady on the "Dick Van Dyke Show." Like his dad, he was an actor, but has more recently become the successful director of such films as "This Is Spinal Tap" and "The Sure Thing." For ten points--give the first and last names of this director and former meathead.

Answer: Rob Reiner

15. A well known British economist, he ran the British Coal Board for over 20 years, but is probably better known as the author of Small is Beautiful. For ten points--name this now deceased practitioner of people economics.

Answer: E.F. Schumacher

16. This Pulitzer Prize winning journalist most recently penned "The Target Is Destroyed" about the shooting down of KAL flight 007. Yet, he is better known for his best selling biography of Henry Kissinger "The Price Of Power." For ten points--name this New York Times reporter.

Answer: Seymour Hersh

Answer: J.P. Richardson or the Big Bopper

22. Anyone can make use of a video cassette recorder to create a library of taped TV shows. But, in the early days of television, live broadcasts could only be saved by a process which essentially was a transferral of the TV image to motion picture film. For ten points--what name is given to such filmed recordings.

Answer: Kinescope

23. The Chevrolet Corvette, Lincoln Town Car, Plymouth Gran Fury, and Ford's Thunderbird and Mustang are among the few remaining American car makes that share an engineering feature which until the 1970s was the industry standard. For ten points--what is this feature still sought after by some driving enthusiasts and found primarily in sports cars.

Answer: Rear (Wheel) Drive

24. After his first album bombed, he moved to Los Angeles and worked in a piano bar, performing under the name of Bill Martin. A song based on his experiences later become the basis for his first top 40 hit. Name--for 10 points--this singer/songwriter who has recorded such hit albums as The Bridge and The Stranger.


Answer: Billy Joel
