When the actual temperature gradient in a star becomes more negative than than the adiabatic temperature gradient, this method of energy transport becomes predominant. It is marked by macroscopic mass motions, and is the method of heat transport in a pot of boiling water. For ten points, name it.

ANSWER: Convection

3) Tabasco, Chihuahua, Puebla, Jalisco, Veracruz, Nuevo Leon, Oaxaca (Wa-ha-ca), Sonora, and Baja California Sur all share a common geographical distinction. For ten points, name it.

ANSWER: They are all states of Mexico

4) It is based upon the principles of simplicity, honesty, courage, and justice. It originated in or about the 12th Century A.D., but despite its age it has remained a potent force within the upper class of modern Japan. Name this traditional honor code of the samurai warrior.

ANSWER: Bushido

5) Frederick A.C. Muhlenberg was the first to hold this position. Champ Clark held it for the most years consecutively, while Henry Clay held the overall longevity record until it was usurped by Sam Rayburn. Name this position currently held by Washington's Tom Foley.

ANSWER: Speaker of the House of Representatives

But literally hundreds of students in India attempted suicide in this manner to call attention to their opposition to Prime Minister V. P. ANSWER: 8th

9) The field was wide open in the race for governor. But it narrowed when Lieut. Gov. Evelyn Murphy failed in her attention-grabbing palace coup, leaving the race between two men, one of the establishment, and the other representing the outsiders. The rising tide of anti-incumbency in America helped the outsider over the top in the Democratic primary, despite his ability to insult all major ethnic and special interest groups. Name this winner of the Democratic primary in Massachusetts, the president of Boston University.

ANSWER: John Silber

10) Founded by Wertheimer, Koffka, and Kohler, this school of psychology held that when the brain receives stimuli from the outside, it adds on information to help in the interpretation. For instance, the same musical notes are perceived differently when played different ways, i.e. the whole is greater than the sum of its parts. For ten points, give the name of this school, based on the German word for "whole".

ANSWER: Gestalt Psychology

This quote, taken from Adolf Hitler's "Mein Kampf", mysteriously appeared on the eve of Yom Kippur on the masthead of this conservative weekly, or so the editor would have you believe. Name this dampus vanguard of the Conservative movement, supported by wealthy Republicans nationwide.

ANSWER: "The Dartmouth Review"

Second, he began public life as Theodore Roosevelt's appointee for the job of U.S. attorney in southern New York. He continued as Secretary of War for Taft, and Secretary of State for Hoover. <stop>

Third, he is best known as Franklin Roosevelt's Secretary of War, for the years 1940-45, a post in which he became intimately acquainted with the development of the atomic bomb, "the most terrible weapon ever known in human history." He was of the position that the U.S., Britain, and the Soviet Union should into an open, colloborative relationship to forestall a nuclear arms race.
