6. She swam the Strait of Gibraltar and the Bosphorus and was the first to swim the Catalina Channel. FTP, who was this American distance swimmer who was the first woman to swim the English Channel in both directions? (Florence Chadwick)
7. "Blood and Sand" and "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" were major films of the 20's starring Rudolph Valentino. FTP, what Spanish politician wrote both of the novels on which these films were based? (Vicente Blasco Ibanez)
8. Norway's second-largest city, it is a major manufacturing center today and in medieval times was a member of the Hanseatic League. FTP, what is this seaport on By Fjord? (Bergen)
9. It has a range of 3.5 octaves, but irrational key placement and unstable pitch make it difficult to play. It has 20-22 keys, 8 holes, a double reed and consists of an 8-foot conical tube bent double. FTP, what is this woodwind instrument? (bassoon)
10. "Black Rain" starred Michael Douglas. FTP, what poem contains the line "Black rain, and fire, and hail, will burst: O hear!" (Ode to the West Wind by Shelley)
11. For a quick 10 points, what 3 nations border on Paraguay? (Bolivia, Brazil and Argentina)

12. Over 2 million Union soldiers died in the Civil War. FTP, within 1,000, how many U.S. soldiers died in battle in the War of 1812? (2,260 - accept 1,260 to 3,260)
13. Its capital is now known as Nuuk. Its technically correct name is Kalaallit Nunaat. FTP, what is this island the capital of which was formerly called Godthaab? (Greenland)
14. It is found mainly in Scotland, Arkansas and Arizona, and one of its ores is celestite. The element is produced by reduction of the oxide with aluminum. It resembles calcium physically and chemically. Its radio-active isotope is produced in nuclear fallout. FTP, what is this element with Atomic No. 28? (strontium)
15. They are medium-sized, omnivorous, burrowing mammals of the weasel family Mustelidae. There are six genera in Eurasia, North America and Indonesia. Three of these genera, Meles, Taxidea and Melogale, have distinctive black and white facial masks. FTP, identify these nocturnal creatures. (Badgers)
16. It is the name of a region in Southern Ghana, and of the people who live there. From the 17th century to 1902, it identified a powerful confederacy of small kingdoms. 18. She was the first woman appointed full professor at Princeton. In "The Origins of Totalitarianism," she traced nazism and communism back to 19th-century anti-Semitism and imperialism. FTP, name this German-born political philosopher best known for her controversial "Eichmann in Jerusalem." (Hannah Arendt)
19. Goethe wrote "Faust," and Marlowe wrote "Doctor Faustus." FTP, what was the name of the operatic version of the Faust legend by Arrigo Boito? (Mefistofele)
20. This measure was proposed in December 1860 in an attempt to prevent the Civil War. Slavery was to be abolished north of 36° 30', and protected south of the line, with the domestic slave trade to be freed of all restrictions. FTP, what was this compromise, named for the sponsoring senator? (Crittenden Compromise)
21. St. Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland and St. George of England. FTP, who is the patron saint of France? (Saint Denis)

22. "She walks in Beauty, like the night, Of cloudless climes and starry skies; and all that's best of dark and bright." FTP, what English poet wrote these lines? (Lord Byron)
23. Using Aristotelian logic, he deduced that God was the logical uncaused cause and the prime reason for order in the universe. FTP, who was this theologian who attempted to reconcile faith with reason in his Summa Theologica? (Thomas Aquinas)
