1. This book was published in Britain in 1962, but was not published in its entirety in the U.S. until 1988. It was made into an X-rated movie that is one of the most talked about movies of all time. Its four major characters are Alex, Pete, Georgy, and Dim, Dim being really dim, and they hang out at the Korova Milkbar. For 10 points, what is this novel by Anthony Burgess?

Ans: A Clockwork Orange

2. Rodin sculpts Victor Hugo, H.G. Wells' The Invisible Man is published, Gustav Mahler becomes conductor of Vienna Opera, J.J. Thomson discovers the electron, Queen Victoria celebrates her Diamond Jubilee, and McKinley is inaugurated. FTP, name this year.

Ans: 1897

3. His fictional works include 6 novels, one novella and one short-story collection. Stories in the collection include "The Emperor," "There Are No Snakes in Ireland," and "Absolute Privilege." Some of the major characters from his books are Cat Shannon, Claude Lebel, Captain Roschmann, and Charles Calthrop. For 10 points, name this bestselling author of "The Shepherd," The Fourth Protocol, and The Odessa File.

Ans: Frederick Forsyth

4. Some of the men involved in this endeavour were M. Hopkins, C. Crocker, General Grenville Dodge, Oaks Ames, Schuyler Colfax, and Leland Stanford. It was completed on May 10, 1869 at Promontory, Utah. For 10 points, name this project.

Ans: The First Transcontinental Railroad

5. This scientific instrument was invented by the 17th century British scholar William Oughtred (OUT-red), who also introduced the symbol for multiplication. The worlds largest manufacturers of the instrument were Keuffel (KEW-fel) and the Esser company, who made the last of their Log-Log Duplex Decitrig model in 1976 and

donated it to the Smithsonian. This instrument was made obsolete in the mid-1970's by advances in electronics technology. For 10 points, name it.

Ans: Slide Rule

6. This phrase has become a convenient general term for government policies that seek short term solutions to public unrest. The phrase was first used by Roman writers to criticize the declining heroism of Romans after the Roman republic ceased to exist and the Roman Empire began. The government was keeping the people happy by distributing free food and staging huge spectacles. For 10 points, what is this phrase?

Ans: Bread and Circuses

7. Cloud-to-ground lightning begins as a flow of electrons from the middle of the cloud that rushes to the base. This discharge of electrons proceeds towards the ground in a series of steps. Each discharge covers about 50 to 100 meters, then stops for about 50 microseconds or so. FTP, what is this usually invisible precursor to the return stroke known as?

Ans: A Stepped Leader

8. This statesman of ancient Greece tried to unite the country under the leadership of his own city of Athens. His rule is sometimes known as the Golden Age of Greece. Many magnificent buildings, including the Parthenon, were built under his administration. For 10 points, name this famous Athenian?

Ans: Pericles

9. As Jesse Helms and his conservative cohorts continue their assault on the National Endowment for the Arts, more and more artists' works are coming under fire. Many observers feel that a certain California performance artist will become this year's Robert Mapplethorpe for the far-right. Over the years, she has used her body to represent her attitude toward men's treatment of women, to the extent of abusing herself onstage. FTP, who is this artist?

10. As masters, you all should know that in 1945 Korea was divided at the 38th parallel with the north occupied by Soviet troops and the south occupied by American and United Nations troops. Kim Il-Sung was president in the north, but this man was the less heralded president in South Korea. FTP, name him.

Ans. Syngman Rhee

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11. In 1972, George McGovern snuck up on the other democratic candidates and won his party's nomination. His slim chances of upsetting the Nixon juggernaut, however, were ruined when it was revealed that McGovern's original running-mate had undergone shock therapy. FTP, name him.

Ans. Thomas Eagleton

12. He probably got much of the material for his writing from his grandparents, who raised him because his parents were too poor to care for all of their 12 children. His grandfather told about life when he was an army colonel, and his grandmother told of ancestors and their ghosts. Also, the realities of his native Colombia included dictatorships, civil wars, and banana companies, all of which figure prominently in his writing. His first story, "Leaf Storm" was published when he was 19, but he is probably best known for his masterpiece One Hundred Years of Solitude. FTP, name this writer, winner of the 1982 Nobel Prize for Literature.

13. She was the only legitimate daughter of Lord Byron. She was a colleague of Charles Babbage, and is recognised as perhaps the first computer programmer. FTP, name this computing countess.

14. In the early 1820s, one French critic attacked this painter's work as the vision of a "Chinaman wandering through the ruins of Athens," because of his differences with the Royal Academy's adherence to the classicism of Poussin. His flat style is evident in such paintings as Oedipus and the Sphinx and Grande Odalisque. His earlier critics became his champions, however, when Eugene Delacroix became an even greater threat to classicism. FTP, name this painter, the rival of Delacroix and painter of The Comtesse d'Haussonville and Valpinçon Bather.

Ans. Dominique Ingres

15. Jean Sibellius' symphonies and other orchestral pieces often took their themes from this work. Published in 1835, it has been of enormous importance in creating and sustaining Finland's national

self-awareness in times of crisis. FTP, name this epic poem by Elias Lonnrot.

Ans. Kalevala

16. On April 11, 1962, the New York Mets gave up their first run. Not surprisingly, they gave it away on an error as this pitcher walked in the St. Louis Cardinals' Bill White. Name this pitcher, who went on to fame as a pitching coach and managed 1989's National League Pennant winner.

Ans. Roger Craig

17. From 1714 until 1830, kings named George ruled England for over 100 consecutive years. For a quick ten points, name the other royal given name to hold the English throne for more than a century.

Ans. Edward (I, II, and III: 1272-1377)

18. His autobiography was published in 1894, for the purpose of vindicating himself with such claims as "I swear before God that I never shot a man except in self-defense." Not very believable from a man who had 40 notches on his pistols and spent 16 years in jail for murder. This well-known outlaw was shot to death in El Paso while rolling dice, but he is perhaps better known today from a Time/Life Books commercial, in which we are told that he was so mean that he once shot a man just for snoring. FTP, name this criminal.

Ans: John Wesley Hardin

19. This American social psychologist has done quite a bit of research into group behavior, obedience, and conformity to peer pressure, with often disturbing results. In his most famous experiment, he had subjects administer increasingly strong shocks to confederates that the subjects believed to be learners. Each time the "learner" gave a wrong answer, an authority figure would tell the subject to administer a higher shock. FTP, name this psychologist, whose experiments have led to harsh questioning of the ethics of experimentation on humans.

Ans: Stanley Milgram

20. She was a daughter of Poseidon and Gaea. A fig tree grew near her center, to which Odysseus clung during one of his adventures. Guarding the Straits of Messina with the monstrous Scylla, she took the form of a giant whirlpool. FTP, name this Greek mythological figure.

Ans. Charybdis

21. The first one was Thomas Ewing. Others have included Cecil Andrus, Walter Hickel, Albert Fall, & James Watt. FTP, what is this Cabinet position?

Ans. Secretary of the Interior

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The 1<sup>st</sup> important recorded act of his occurred in 463 B.C., when he helped prosecute Cimon on a charge of bribery. He succeeded Ephialtes as leader of Athens and during his reign the Parthenon was built. FTP name him  
Ans. Pericles

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His father served as sec. of agriculture under Presidents Harding & Coolidge. His own experiments with higher yielding corn strains resulted in major advances in plant genetics. Originally a Republican, he switched parties in 1928 & was rewarded with the post of Sec. of Agriculture under FDR. FTP name this man who was later FDR's veep.
