8. Surely we all know about the massive, prehistoric beasts known as dinosaurs. They included Tyrannosaurus Rex, the Pterodactyl, and the tiny Nanotyrannus. Many of us learned about the mighty Brontosaurus, but alas, that is his name no more. For 10 pts, what is the more proper name for the brontosaurus?

11. This scientist was born in Como, Italy in 1745. His discovery of the decomposition of water by an electrical current laid the foundations of electrochemistry. For 10 pts, name this scientist who won fame as the inventor of the electrical battery.

12. At the end of World War I, the Treaty of Versailles was signed. Most of the provisions of the treaty were compromises that came nearer the desires of France and Great Britain than those of Woodrow Wilson and the US. Many people, however, expected that this peace treaty would be based upon a famous speech given by Wilson in 1918. For 10 pts, what was the name of this famous speech, which laid out a specific number of postwar goals held by Wilson?

13. This French composer was born in 1835. At the age of 13, he entered the Paris Conservatory and became a famous pianist and organist. In his piece, "Carnival of Animals," he uses the instruments to describe the elephant, lion, swan, and other animals. But his best-known composition is probably the opera "Samson and Delilah." For 10 pts, name him.

Camille Saint-Saens

14. This future statesman was governor of New York from 1839 to 1842. He then became a United States Senator in 1849. He served as US Secretary of State during the Civil War, and was wounded by an accomplice of John Wilkes Booth on the night of Lincoln's assassination. For 10 pts, name this man who bought a large piece of land from Russia.

William Henry Seward

15. This American poet was born in Haverhill, Massachusetts. In his early career, his poems called for the abolition of slavery. Some of his anti-slavery works include "The Moral Warfare" and "Ichabod." He describes the people and customs of Quaker life in his masterpiece, "Snowbound." For 10 points, name this poet who is often called the "Quaker Poet."

16. Bob Welch of the A's came close last year, winning 27 games en route to the Cy Young Award. But no man has accomplished a 30 win season since this former Tiger great. For 10 pts, name this last pitcher in either league to win 30 games in a season.

Denny McLain

17. This man own England's Daily Mirror, the New York Daily News, and has acquired Macmillan, the US's 2nd largest publishing house. Rupert Murdoch's arch rival, for 10 pts, name this publishing magnate.

18. During the recent Track and Field World Championships in Tokyo, an American long jumper leaped a record 29 feet, 4 1/2 inches, breaking the record Bob Beamon set in 1968. For 10 pts, name this athlete.

19. Many people would assume that William Shatner's career began with Star Trek, but he made his first start with "Nightmare at 20,000 Feet" on, for 10 pts, what classic television program created by Rod Serling?

20. A Harvard dropout in 1975, he is now the second most wealthy man in America as rated by Forbes Magazine. He's noted for his Lear jet and proclaimed bachelorhood. For 10 pts, name this Chairman of Microsoft Corporation.

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21. The name's the same. The name of a musical work by Rimsky-Korsakov and the daughter of the Grand Vizier who spun tales for 1001 nights to postpone her execution. For 10 pts, name this woman.

22. At the opening of the Panama Canal, this US Secretary of State invited many foreign navies to attend the ceremony, including Switzerland's. They would have come if they had a navy! For 10 pts, name this 3-time presidential candidate.

23. After William the Conqueror died, he was succeeded by his son William Rufus. But William was not his oldest son, but 2nd oldest. He was decisively defeated in his bid for the English crown by his younger brother Henry at the battle of Tinchebray. For 10 pts, name this oldest son of William I who was Duke of Normandy, but never became king of England.

24. The new name for its capital city is Bishkek, a return to the historical name, which itself had been changed to Frunze in honor of a Soviet Revolutionary. For 10 pts, name this Central Asian Republic.

25. Members of the species *Lactrodectus mactans* have venom 15 times as toxic as that of a prairie rattlesnake. However, since it produces such a tiny amount of venom, only 1 in 100 untreated bite victims actually die, although many suffer convulsions, shock, and paralysis from its neurotoxin. For 10 pts, what is the common name of the species of spider, common in the Southeast and found in every US state except Alaska?

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
