Eventually he settled in Spain where his mannerist paintings such as *Toledo in a Storm* and *The Burial of Count Orgaz* look hauntingly modern for a late 16th century painter. For 10 points, name him.

El Greco

T3. This economics term comes from the Latin for "all other things being equal."
