ANSWER: Madagascar

A six-week test at a movie theater of his technique had led to a 57.5% increase in popcorn sales and an 18.1% increase in Coke sales. For ten points, what do is the name given to Vicary's now-banned technique?

ANSWER: Subliminal advertising.

3. Harvard University celebrated its 350th Birthday with great fanfare in 1986. No other American University has yet to even reach 300. But in 1993, one will. For 10 points name this Virginia institution.

ANSWER: The College of William and Mary

4. Pencil and paper ready. The Cincinnati Reds, the oldest professional baseball team, began play in 1869 and turned 122 in 1991. For a quick ten points, in what year will the Florida Marlins turn 122?

ANSWER: (1993 + 122=) 2115

5. Its Ryukyu Kempo (*Ru-ku Kempo*) form originated on Okinawa in the eighth or ninth centuries, A.D., derived from the Mei Kata (*May Kahtah*) dance in which men from opposing villages paired together and struck each other as they danced and sang. For 10 points name this Martial Art.

ANSWER: Karate

6. Its five movements are subtitled: Awakening of happy feelings on arriving in the country; By the Brook; Peasants' merrymaking; The Storm; and Shepherds' song-- Happy and thankful feelings after the storm. For ten points name this Beethoven symphony.

ANSWER: Symphony No. 6 in F major or the Pastoral symphony.

7. For a quick ten points: Other than New York City, what was the last city to have its National and American league teams meet in the World Series?

ANSWER: St. Louis (in 1944)

8. Graphite has been known to go under this alias. Diamond may be an excellent example of a natural crystal, but the best glass crystal gets its luster from something else. It's also the stable end product of natural Uranium decay. For ten points name this element.

ANSWER: Lead

9. Pencil and paper ready. The escape velocity of a 10 kilogram mass from the Earth's gravity is 11.2 kilometers per second. For ten points and to the nearest tenth, in kilometers per second, what is the escape velocity of a 100 kilogram mass?

ANSWER: 11.2 Km/s (Accept from 11.1 to 11.3)
(Yes, it's a trick question. Escape velocity is independent of mass.)

10. He died *in testate* in a Miami hospital of cancer on May 21, 1981. As a result, his numerous heirs are still bickering over the division of his estate, which includes his profitable back catalog of albums like Catch a Fire, Natty Dread, and Uprising. For ten points name this legendary reggae artist.

ANSWER: Bob Marley

11. The fifth card in his hand was the two of spades. There is no record of whether he would have won the game. The certain thing is that when Jack McCall shot him in Deadwood on August 2, 1876, he was holding black aces and eights, since called the dead man's hand. For ten points name this unlucky poker player.

ANSWER: Wild Bill Hickock

12. Believe it or not there are actually some idiots out there who have nothing better to do than call the numbers they hear on TV or in the movies. For that reason it has been customary for the script to use a certain prefix when mentioning a telephone number, one which will connect the caller to information or directory assistance no matter where they call. For ten points, what are these three digits?

ANSWER: 555

13. Called by James Miller in his *Democracy Is In the Streets* "The Prophet of the Powerless", this maverick sociologist attacked the faceless, robotized society of the 1950's. For ten points, name this influential author of *The Causes of World War Three*; *Listen, Yankee*; *The New Men of Power*; *White Collar* and *The Power Elite*.

ANSWER: C. Wright Mills

14. He was a Baptist Missionary and Army intelligence officer killed by Chinese communists in northern Anhwei province on August 25, 1945. He was called the "First victim of the Cold War with Communism" by Robert H.W. Welch, Jr., who named his nascent anti-communist organization after this unfortunate man. For ten points, name him.

ANSWER: John Birch

15. W.C. Fields, Edgar Allen Poe, Janis Joplin, Modest Mussorgski, Nikita Kruschev, O. Henry, Dylan Thomas, Jim Thorpe, Ulysses S. Grant, Jack London and Dean Martin. For ten points, all at one time suffered from what debilitating disease?

ANSWER: Alcoholism (accept: Alcoholics)

16. In September 1991, nine months after his heroic feat, the Air Force confirmed that this pilot from Watersmeet, Michigan, was not the first Allied pilot to down an Iraqi as previously assumed, but was actually beaten to the punch by three other pilots in the Persian Gulf War: FTP name him.

ANSWER: Capt. Steven Tate

17. Tchaicovsky died of typhus after he drank water from it, Rasputin was tossed into it, and Peter the Great built a city on it. FTP name this short river that flows from Lake Ladoga into the Gulf of Finland, passing through St. Petersburg.

ANSWER: Neva

18. This bar, with a name similar to a West Philadelphia bar that is frequented by Penn students and recently had its liquor license revoked, was Ernest Hemingway's favorite haunt in Key West, Florida. FTP name it.

ANSWER: Sloppy Joe's

19. Finding the narrator in a desert, this character asked him to draw a sheep. The narrator was unable to satisfy him with his drawings so he finally drew a box with holes in it. The character imagined that a sheep was in the box and thus was pacified. Name, FTP, this title character of Antoine de Saint Exupéry's most celebrated book.

ANSWER: The Little Prince

20. Although John Hinckley called his attempted assassination of President Reagan in 1981 "one of the greatest offerings of love", the woman he was trying to impress was not flattered. FTP name this actress who has recently directed her first film, "Little Man Tate".

ANSWER: Jodi Foster

21. When Norma McCorvey was asked what she would say to her child if she saw him, she replied, "Come here and give your momma a great big hug", quite a change from what she had in mind in 1973. FTP, by what name is Ms. McCorvey better known?

ANSWER: Jane Roe (If *Roe v. Wade* is given, ask the player to specify which one)

22. This rare breed is the ancestor of more common breeds like the Labrador, Newfoundland, Poodle, and Irish Water Spaniel. An excellent swimmer, it was used for centuries by Portugese fisherman to retrieve lost nets and any fish that might have broken free, but nearly became extinct with the introduction of modern fishing technology. FTP name this breed, which has made a comeback and is now more numerous in the U.S. than Portugal.

ANSWER: Portugese Water Dog or Cao d'Agua

23. The company was named after his favorite snack and an early production model after his girlfriend. He was later forced out of the company and many are wondering what's Next for him. FTP who is this co-founder of Apple?

ANSWER: Steven Jobs

24. This actor once said that, "The hardest names to remember are also the hardest to forget". As far as memory goes, he's one to talk. Although he played the main character in a movie, he received only 17 lines, one of which he used several times in later films. Who, FTP, is this bulging Austrian?

ANSWER: Arnold Schwarzenegger

25. Dwight D. Eisenhower was not the first Ike to live in the White House. Earlier in the century a president had a tobacco-chewing ram named "Old Ike" as a pet. Name, FTP, this man who was our 28th president.

ANSWER: Woodrow Wilson

26. This word has nothing to do with astronomy. Its use originated when the Vikings put their *styr*, or rudder, on the right side of their boats. FTP name this direction, the opposite of port.

ANSWER: Starboard

27. After winning the 5,000 meter and 10,000 meters runs in the 1952 Olympics, this man was asked how he would like to spend the rest of his time in Helsinki. He replied that he would try the marathon, an event he had

- never run before. He ended up winning the race far ahead of the pack.
- FTP name this runner who practiced in heavy combat boots.

ANSWER: Emil Zatopek

28. In its loss to the catamaran *Stars & Stripes* in the 1988 America's Cup challenge, the yacht *New Zealand* raised a spinnaker with a warning printed on it, a clever response to the advertisement painted on the revolutionary hard sail of the *Stars & Stripes*. The ad belonged to one of the catamaran's biggest sponsors, Marlboro. FTP whose warning was it?

ANSWER: The Surgeon General's

29. CCR's "Suzy Q", Wagner's "Ride of the Valkyries", the Rolling Stones' "Satisfaction", and The Doors' "The End" can all, FTP, be heard during which Francis Ford Coppola film?

ANSWER: Apocalypse Now

30. For a quick ten points, how many presidents have worn glasses?

ANSWER: 41

1. This one's for all of you who sat through all of the Civil War on PBS. I won't ask you anything important like the causes of the Civil War or its lasting implications on American Domestic policy. Nope. For five points each, just tell me which battle came first.

Perhaps the preeminent historian of the American South of his generation, other works include: Reconstruction: America's Unfinished Revolution and Politics and Ideology in the Age of the Civil War. For 25 points, name him.

4. Hey, has everybody noticed that next year is 1992? Didn't that used to be significant? 1992, of course, is the year that the EEC has set as the target date for dropping trade barriers between members. With the decline of the Russian threat the EEC may surpass NATO in relative importance. To see how well you know who's who in the EEC and NATO, tell me whether the following countries are in just NATO, just the EEC or both, or neither. 5 points each.

a) United Kingdom

ANSWER: both

b) Turkey

c) Switzerland

10. 59 members of the Students for a Democratic Society drafted a manifesto for their fledgling organization in the town it was named for in June, 1962. The manifesto called for a strengthened, participatory democracy; immediate multilateral disarmament as well as human independence and a more humanistic society. The manifesto was an immediate sensation, becoming the bible of the New Left of the 1960's. For 30 points name this influential 63 page document whose principal author was Tom Hayden.

11. When asked why he never considered his sculptures complete he responded: "Its impossible to finish." The more a sculptor tries to finish, the more he has the feeling of needing to start over again. For this reason it is estimated that for existing example of his work, ten others were destroyed before they left his studio. For 30 points name this 20th century sculptor of *Spoon Woman*, *The Palace at 4 a.m.*, and *Woman Walking*.

b) *The Day of the Locust* was written by what writer, also the author of *Miss Lonelyhearts*.

ANSWER: Nathaneal West

13. She suffered from paralysis of the legs and right arm, she was mute, suffered from chronic headaches and poor vision. Her real name was Bertha Pappenheim, but in the interest of anonymity, Dr. Josef Breuer gave this "first patient of psychoanalysis" what pseudonym?

ANSWER: Anna O.

14. To emphasize his albums as a continuing work in progress, rather than as separate entities, Peter Gabriel released his first three albums titled just "Peter Gabriel". He broke Scott Crossfield's short-lived speed record of MACH 2.

ANSWER: Bell X-1A

He was forced to eject after attempting to establish an altitude record.

 - 20) It is best known for its shipwrecks and moose herds.
 - 10) It is found in Lake Superior, closer to Canada than the U.S.

ANSWER: Isle Royale
