1. It was not practiced in the early Christian church, but gradually became common by the sixth century and is probably derived from Moses' advocacy of support for the Levites. Both the Council of Tours in 567 and the Second Council of Macon in 585 recommended that it become church policy, which it soon did. It was, however, declared illegal by Pope Gregory VII, due to abuse. What was this practice, officially abolished in France in 1789?

TITHING

2. She worked for a time as a reporter for the Arizona Republic, but she was to find her calling in television. As a young public television producer, she co-founded the revolutionary children's program "Sesame Street" as well as the Children's Television Workshop. Name this innovative educator and outstanding executive.

3. This illustrator makes a habit of extensive research on the subjects he draws, leading to detailed illustrations of everything from ships to subways. A professor at the Rhode Island School of Design, he has written and illustrated such books as Cathedral, which tells the story of the construction of a 13th century cathedral, and The Way Things Work, which uses a woolly mammoth to demonstrate the principles of physics. For ten points, can you name this artist?

3. This 1948 Hitchcock film was Hitchcock's first in color. Based on the Leopold-Loeb murder case, it involves two students who host a party after murdering a classmate. FTP, name this film that gave the illusion of being filmed in one continuous shot.

4. For a quick ten points, give the word, derived from the Greek for "to arrange", which describes the subsystem of a grammar which deals with the position, order, and function of words and longer units in sentences, clauses, and phrases.

SYNTAX

5. The state of war between the U.S. and Germany was declared at an end, and a peace treaty with Germany was signed in Berlin. Edith Hull published the Sheik, which was later made into a movie starring Rudolph Valentino. John Dos Passos

wrote Three Soldiers, and Booth Tarkington published Alice Adams. The first Miss America was crowned, and in the first World Series radio broadcast, the New York Giants beat the New York Yankees. FTP, can you name the year?

6. Scientists have been beginning to notice that mass extinctions have an unexplained periodicity of about 26 million years. In trying to explain this phenomenon, it has been hypothesized that the Sun has a companion star in a highly elliptical orbit with a periodicity of 26 million years that causes havoc on Earth. He was able to produce about 1300 books bearing his many pseudonyms by writing detailed plot outlines and hiring other authors to do the actual writing. FTP, can you name the man who was responsible for the creation of such popular children's series as Nancy Drew, the Hardy Boys, and Tom Swift?

8. Established in 1867 in Washington, D.C., by Oliver Hudson Kelley, it was conceived as a social and educational organization dedicated to the relief of rural poverty and apathy. Formally known as the Order of the Patrons of Husbandry, this secret, ritualistic organization has approximately 7800 units, concentrated in the Northeast. What is this oldest general farm organization in the U.S.?

9. In the first half of the twentieth century, architects of the International Style envisioned futuristic cities of glass and steel. Only one city in the West has ever been built from scratch along such a design. Finished in 1960, this city was designed by Lucio Costa and Oscar Niemeyer in a sparsely-populated, remote plateau 1200 km inland. FTP, name this national capital.

~~10. The last words of his life were: "Who,-who,-who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" These words reflect the piety and strength of a man whose name through time has become a epithet of disgust in the African-American community. Who is this famous literary character, the creation of Harriet Beecher Stowe?~~

UNCLE TOM

- 10 ~~11~~. Her 1992 novel, Certain Women, tells the story of an old actor whose life and family parallel those of the Biblical King David. She received much acclaim for her autobiographical Two Part Invention, which chronicles her long marriage to actor Hugh Franklin, but she is probably best known for her children's books, including the Newberry Award winning A Wrinkle in Time. FTP, can you name this author?

- 11 ~~12~~. "She gets mad when the mailman is late with her welfare check; that is how dependent she is." Harsh words, especially when one considers that the speaker is talking about his own sister. But, despite his rude comments, Emma Mae Martin stood at her brother's side during his own period of difficulties. Name Ms. Martin's brother, the 106th justice of the Supreme Court.

CARNEGIE MELLON

- 12 ~~13~~. Since he left no diaries or writings, little is known about this German painter, largely ignored for centuries after his death in 1528. Even his name is a sobriquet given later by the art critic Joachim von Sandrart. His 19th century rediscovery was mainly initiated by Joris Karl Huysmans, who emphasized the powerfully expressive elements found in his personal fusion of Renaissance and Gothic art. Most of his works are altarpieces, including "The Mocking of Christ," and "The Meeting of St. Erasmus and St. Martin," and his masterpiece for St. Anthony's Monastery at Isenheim, "The Crucifixion". FTP, name him.

Mathis GRÜNEWALD

- 13 ~~14~~ ~~15~~. She was born in Garrard County, Kentucky, in 1846. As a girl she was sickly, but became stronger as she grew older, making it easier to wield an axe. She espoused such causes as equal rights for women, housing for the homeless, and sex education for the young, but she is best remembered for her enthusiastic and violent war against alcohol. Can you name, for ten points, this American temperance activist?

- 14 ~~Mr.~~ Feuris, a huge wolf; Midgard, the serpent that encircles the Earth; and Hel, the black-and-blue goddess of death, are three of his children. He is tied up forever with a serpent's venom dripping in his face, and his major sin (among many) was killing the sun-god Balder. However, on Ragnarok, he will return to Earth. Who is this Norse god of fire, destruction, evil, and mischief?

The major physical features of this country include the 24,000 foot mountains of Kula Kangri and Chomo Lari. Its major industry is handicrafts. One government agent exists to conduct foreign trade; he lives in Calcutta, India. What is this "forbidden" kingdom, the capital of which is Thimphu?
