B5. (30 points)

He was born in Hungary in 1922. During the Second World War, he was active in the Resistance; afterwards, he was active in the Hungarian Communist Party. In 1947 he was made a Secretary in the Ministry of Education, and became responsible for the democratic reform of Hungarian higher education. This caused his imprisonment for almost four years. However, he was not fundamentally a politician or activist, but a scientist and scholar. He translated for Renyi and was much influenced by Polya. Fleeing Hungary in 1956 at 34, he took a doctoral degree in philosophy at Cambridge. From 1969 to 1974 he was a Professor of Logic at the London School of Economics. For 30 points, name this philosopher of science who originated the concept of the scientific research program as a paradigm for the advance of science, synthesizing the ideas of Popper and Kuhn.

B6. (30 points)

Name this man after the first clue for 30 points, the second for 20, or the last for 10.

1. He was born in New Zealand, but left in 1895, when he went to Cambridge at the young age of 24 to work with J.J. Thomson. After a period at McGill University he returned to Manchester and then to Cambridge.
2. Upon his return to Cambridge, he succeeded Thomson at the Cavendish Laboratory, where he continued to study radioactivity and atomic structure. Later in his life (in 1931) he was made a Baron.
3. He discovered alpha, beta, and gamma radiation, correctly identifying each. He was the first to show that the atom had a nucleus and he carried out the first nuclear reactions. He also identified and named the proton. In 1908 he was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics.

Answer: Ernest RUTHERFORD

Name this artistic movement after the first clue for 30 points, the second for 20, or the last for 10.

1. This is generally recognized as the first major avant-garde movement in 20th-century painting, and came about as a reaction to the academic style. It was influenced by the works of two wild and crazy guys, Gauguin and Van Gogh.
2. It was characterized by intense use of pure, brilliant color, often rapid brushwork, and somewhat flatly painted surfaces. The subject matter tended to be landscapes, still lifes, and figure compositions, sometimes portraits.
3. Among its members were Henri Matisse, Albert Marquet, Georges Rouault,



~~Maurice de Vlaminck, Andr Derain, A.C. Friesz, Georges Braque, Raoul Dufy, and Kees van Dongen. These artists exhibited together in the Salon d'Automne of 1905, at which they were dubbed "fauves," meaning "wild beasts," because of their use of brilliant color, and in the Salon des Independants of 1906.~~

1. This title describes the efforts by the Church of England to restore the ideals of the earlier church, caused by a decline in religious interest and the development of liberal theology. Its main influence was in the ritual life of the church.

2. This leader of the Oxford Movement was ordained in the Anglican Church in 1824. In 1841 he wrote Tract 90, showing that the Thirty-Nine Articles of the Church of England were consistent with Roman Catholicism, and began to question his own Anglicanism. He became a Roman Catholic in 1845, was ordained and received a doctorate of divinity in Rome, and established a branch of the Oratorians in Birmingham. He was later rector of the Catholic University of Dublin. Though attacked by Cardinal Henry Manning and the Ultramontanes on the doctrine of papal infallibility, he was created cardinal by Leo XIII in 1879. Who is he?

A lawyer, he was the first French Canadian to lead a federal party. Throughout his career, he propounded religious reconciliation and national unity. Name this and head of the Liberal party prime minister of Canada from 1896 to 1911.
