6. Suppose you live in the year 2525 and that the inhabitants of the overcrowded Earth have taken to colonizing both above and below the surface. If you like to throw your weight around, then for ten points, would you have the most weight on the surface, 20 miles below the surface, or 40 miles above the surface?

8. The novel is a psychological study of the provincial young Julian Sorel. The story is deliberately over-romantic and satirizes the social order under the Bourbon restoration. For ten points, name this most celebrated novel of Stendhal.

9. Two married couples go out together for an evening drive. They go to a drive-in horror movie and then get ribs at a drive-in restaurant. At evening's end, one of the husbands tries and fails to put the cat out for the night, inadvertently locking himself out. For ten points, this describes the title sequences of what classic animated TV series?

10. It's a nitrogen-containing polysaccharide (but what isn't?) related to cellulose. Its name comes from an ancient Greek tunic, which is appropriate considering its function in the arthropods that contain it. For ten points, name this primary constituent in the exoskeletons of insects and arachnids.

11. Its value is computed as an index of ten European currencies, and it has been traded internationally for several years. For ten points, what is the appropriate three-letter name of this European Currency Unit?

12. This Roman poet was born in Sulmo in 43 B.C. It is believed that his erotic poem "The Art of Love" landed him in hot water with Augustus, who exiled him to Tomi, an outpost on the Black Sea. For ten points name this man best known as the author of Metamorphoses.

13. His blonde stars have been blackmailed, kidnapped, handcuffed to strange men, poisoned, nearly asphyxiated, nearly strangled, nearly thrown from a train, actually thrown from a steeple, dangled off Mount Rushmore, attacked by birds, and stabbed in the shower. For ten points, who was this British-American director?

14. A cow eats grass contaminated with this creature's eggs and becomes the first host. Then a human eats undercooked infected beef and serves as the second host. 15. In Matthew 16:23, Christ was angry with one of his disciples. He said, "Get thee behind me, Satan: thou art an offense unto me: for thou savorest not the things that be of God, but those that be of men." For ten points, just who was Jesus lecturing?

16. He played baseball for the Cubs and Dodgers and basketball for the Boston Celtics, and a current Minnesota Timberwolf is named after him. He left sports in the 40s to become an actor, and he appeared in a number of films before becoming a TV star in "The Rifleman". For ten points, name this man who died last Tuesday.

(Note: Timberwolf Chuck Connors Person is nicknamed "The Rifleman")

17. This physicist proposed his famous principle in 1925. Simply stated, he asserted that no two electrons can occupy the same quantum state in an atom; his theory is consequently called the exclusion principle. For ten points, name this Austrian-American Nobel laureate.

18. This African nation's soccer team made a surprisingly strong showing at the 1990 World Cup in Italy. Under the leadership of the flamboyant Roger Milla, the "Indomitable Lions" shocked Argentina 1-0 in the first game of the tournament and advanced to the quarterfinals before being eliminated by England. For ten points, name this country which has its capital at Yaoundé.

19. He was an Indian scout, sheriff, and US marshal while building a reputation as the one of the best gunmen in the Kansas territory. He joined Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show but soon quit and tried to make a career as a gambler. He met his end playing poker, holding what is now known as the "dead man's hand", and is buried in Deadwood, South Dakota. For ten points, name him.

20. In the movie, the bridge on the river Kwai was built thanks to Alec Guinness and blown up by William Holden, but this question is about the real-life bridge. For ten points, what two capital cities were to be linked by the railroad line which crossed the bridge?

22. We've all heard it many times, and it was composed for the 1901 coronation of Edward VII by Sir Edward Elgar. For ten points, what is this piece known in America as a graduation march?

23. On January 3, 1993, two noteworthy U.S. Senators will be sworn in. One is the first Native American elected to the senate in fifty years, and the other is the first African American woman ever to be elected or appointed. For ten points, name both these new senators, representing Colorado and Illinois.

24. It began in 1844 in Iran, and its international headquarters are located in Haifa, Israel. This religion teaches that all religions of the world are in agreement, each revealing the will of God for a particular time and place in history. For ten points, what is this all-embracing faith founded by a man named Baha'ulla (bah-HAH-ool-AH)?

25. By only a few months, he was the first U.S. president to be older than his predecessor, but if there had been no electoral college he wouldn't have been. For ten points, name this Tennessean who tried to become our sixth president but wound up being our seventh.

1. 25 point bonus: Let's get off to a fast start. For five points each, place these major Chinese dynasties in chronological order: Tang, Ming, Han, Mongol, and Manchu.
