Perhaps he is best known for his Madonna with the Long Neck. FTP, name this man whose name literally means "little John from Parma."

This work resulted in Arrhenius' prediction that electrolyte solutions resulted from a separation into ions. He also worked on the laws of chemical dynamics and osmotic pressure. For his contributions to chemistry, he was awarded a Nobel Prize. FTP, name the first Nobel laureate in chemistry.
