# TOSS-UPS

2. Two executives at Liberty Records--Simon Waronker and Al Bennett-- and a recording engineer, Ted Keep, lent their names for the "stars" of the 1958 hit record by songwriter and performer David Seville. FTP, what was the name of the singing group?

3. Marriet Tubman, the leader of the underground railroad, dies. D.H.Lawrence writes Sons and Lovers. An important American exhibition of art is held in the New York City Armory. The Sixteenth Amendment is ratified, and the Federal Reserve System is established. FTP, in what year?

In his visits to England, he was greatly influenced by the oratorios of Handel, and wrote two oratorios, *The Creation* and *The Seasons*. FTP, identify this muscial composer known for his "Surprise," "London," "Clock," and "Farewell" symphonies.

Franz Josef Haydn

6. George Clinton, George Dallas, William King and Levi Morton are among the former holders of the office whose first occupant described as follows: "My country has in its wisdom contrived for me the most insignificant office that ever the invention of mankind contrived or the imagination conceived." 10. She had her first Broadway success in Cole Porter's 1938 "Leave It to Me," and played Peter Pan in the 1954 movie. Climbing every artistic mountain, she starred in such musicals as "South Pacific" and "The Sound of Music." FTP, name this actress who passed away in 1991.

Mary Martin

11. Its manufacturers include Hummingbird and Tom Kuhn, who is reputed to make the best ones out of aircraft aluminum, although he also produces wooden ones. It was introduced in America in 1920s from the Phillipines and probably originated in China. FTP, name this product, the most well-known of which are plastic ones made by the Flambeau Corporation under the brand name Duncan.

Yo-yo

12. Written for his son Zafar, his latest novel *Haroun and the Sea of Stories* is the tale of boy's journey to restore his father's lost power of storytelling. FTP, name this author, who has continued to tell stories despite the *fatwa* placed on him by the Ayatollah Khomeini for the alleged blasphemies in his novel, *The Satanic Verses*.

Salman Rushdie

13. Suspects have included some eminent 19th century figures such as Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. The most recently determined culprit, Charles Dawson, may have been responsible for altering the course of paleontology for decades. The Piltdown hoax

14. This school in Alabama was created by an act of the state legislature in 1881. It was opened by Booker T. Washington and initially reflected his belief that blacks should primarily concentrate on manual skills. FTP, name this college, which designated a national historic landmark by Congress in 1974.

Tuskegee Institute

15. At seven feet and 300 pounds, she starred in two films and a TV series produced by Ivan

Tors. She has been played by Mitzi, Suzy and Cathy, and her favorite foods are mullets and butterfish. FTP, who was this famous aquatic animal star of the 1960's.

Flipper

16. The least prominent of the three sisters of Zeus, this goddess presided over the hearth and home. Often a sacred fire was kept burning for her, as in Rome, where six virgins were assigned to the task. FTP, give the Greek or Roman name for this goddess.

Vesta or Hestia

17. In 1956, he and two other physicists were awarded the Nobel prize for the invention of the transistor. In 1972, he became the only person to recieve the prize twice in the same field, this time for his development, along with Cooper and Schrieffer, of the BCS theory to explain superconductivity.

John Bardeen

18. This non-Indo-European language is the only surviving representative of the languages spoken in south-western Europe before the region was Romanized. FTP, name this language, spoken by only 700,000 people, most of whom live in a narrow area of about 3,900 square miles in Spain and France.

Basque

19. Along with D.W. Griffith, Charlie Chaplin, and Douglas Fairbanks, this actress co-founded United Artists. Married to Fairbanks, she was the star of the silent screen, and appeared in popular films as *The Poor Little Rich Girl* and *Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm*. FTP, name this woman who became "America's Sweetheart."

Mary Pickford

20. This faith emphasizes the unity of all religious teachings and religious tolerance. It was founded in Iran by Mirza Huasayn'Ali Nuri in 1863 and is mercilessly persecuted there today. FTP, name this religion, whose founder took the name Baha'Ullah.

Baha'i or Bahai'ism

21. This Russian politician was one of Stalin's followers, and remained loyal even when his wife was arrested and exiled under Stalin's order in the 1930's. He became People's Commissar of Foreign Affairs, and along with Ribbentrop, he signed the infamous 1939 Soviet-Nazi Non-Aggression Pact. His name is most often associated with a type of incendiary devices used by the Finns in their war with the Soviet Union. FTP, name him.

Vyachslav Molotov

22. At the end of World War I, this leader reversed the peace treaty imposed on his country, drove the Greeks and other occupying forces out of Asia Minor, and deposed the Sultan, ending the Islamic Caliphate. FTP, name this founder of Turkey as a national state.

Ataturk (or Mustafa Kemal)

23. This painter influenced the next generation of American artists to seek the "Maine experience" and paint their own versions of his 1895 seascape, "The Northeaster." FTP, name

this painter of "Kissing the Moon" and "The Gulf Stream."
Winslow Homer

24. Elected to Parliament in 1722, this Englishman developed an interest in the problem of people imprisoned for not paying their debts. He established a colony for debtors in America located between the Savannah and Altamaha rivers in 1933. Although he was later recalled to England because of his own debts, he managed to keep control of Georgia until his death. FTP, name him.

James Oglethorpe

25. This Prussian military official became a model for later Prussian and German war leaders. In 1818, he became director of the German War Academy, where he wrote a book stressing the importance of political, social, and personal factors in warfare and the necessity for the total destruction of the enemy. FTP, name this author of On War.

Karl von Clausawitz

26. Eliphaz, Bildad and Zophar were his friends, who tried to explain his misery as the result of his sins. Despite his undeserved misfortunes, this God-fearing man of Uz remained faithful and was awarded with happiness and prosperity. FTP, who was this Biblical character?

Job

27. This thriving city in Southeast Asia is one of the world's few city-states. A former British colony, it was taken by the Japanese during World War II even though the British forces outnumbered them three to one. FTP, name this city surrounded by Malaysia.

Singapore

28. Jailed and exiled after her father was deposed and hanged by the military, she returned in 1988 to become the first woman prime minister of a Muslim country. FTP, name this Pakistani leader who in 1990 was defeated in parliamentary elections.

Benazir Bhutto

29. Its name is a combination of the first letter of the product's scientific name and the first syllable of the scientific name for the meadowsweet plant which was the original source of the compound. FTP, name this common medication originally derived from the plant, *spiraea ulmaria*.

Aspirin (acetylsalic acid)

30. When President Polk attempted to obtain California from Mexico by going to war over a minor border violation, this newspaper editor protested: "Who believes that a score of victories over Mexico, the 'annexation' of half her provinces, will give us more Liberty, a purer Morality?" FTP, name this publisher, who popularized the phrase "Go West, young man."


